49ERS AT REDSKINS

The San Francisco 49ers travel coast-to-coast as they head to Washington D.C. to take on the Redskins under the lights on ESPN's *Monday Night Football*. This marks the 30th meeting between the two clubs with the 49ers leading the all-time series 18-10-1.

The Niners are looking to rebound from a hard-fought 23-20 loss to the New Orleans Saints. Offensively, WR Anquan Boldin recorded 6 receipts, for a team-high 56 yds. and 1 TD, while TE Vernon Davis added 33 yds. and 1 TD.

On defense, the 49ers were led by LB NaVorro Bowman, who recorded a game-high 16 tackles. LB Ahmad Brooks registered 1.0 sack, 1 forced fumble and 1 INT, which led to a 17-yd. TD pass from QB Colin Kaepernick to TE Vernon Davis. On special teams, S Bubba Ventrone recorded his second-career fumble recovery and K Phil Dawson made 2 of 2 FG atts., including one from a season-long 55-yds.

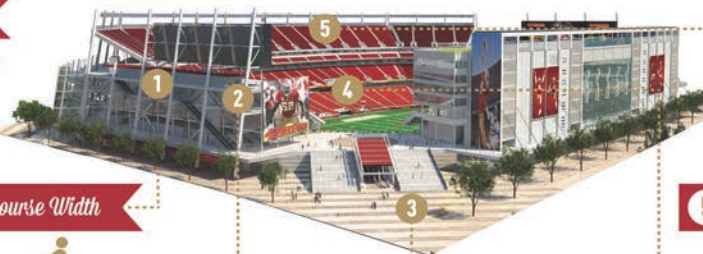

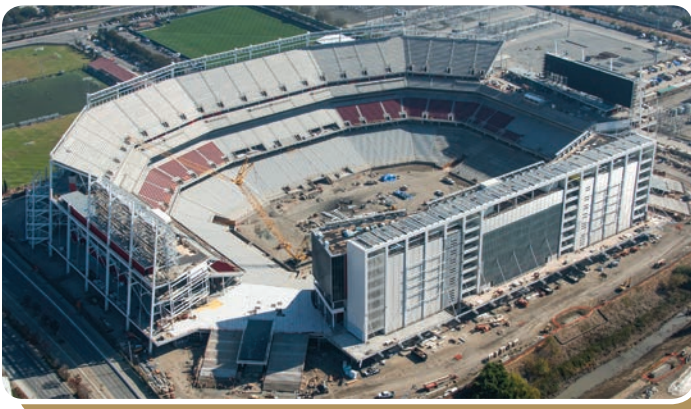

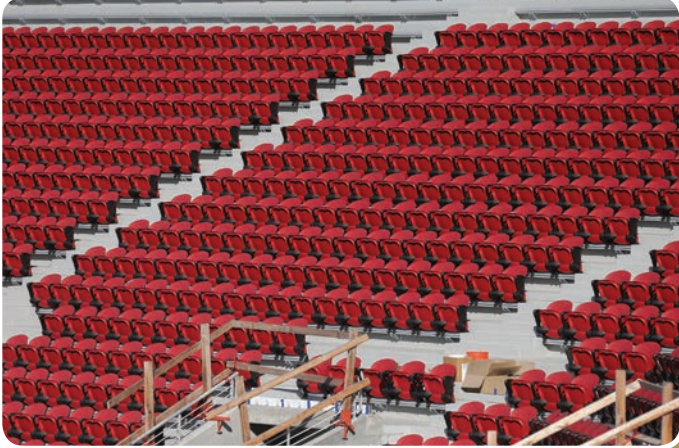
An aerial shot of Levi's® Stadium from October 2013.

LEVI'S® STADIUM

Levi's® Stadium will not only be the new home to the San Francisco 49ers, but it will also serve as one of the world's best outdoor sports and entertainment venues. It was designed by HNTB and is being built by Turner/Devcon for the Santa Clara Stadium Authority. The \$1.2 billion venue will have 1.85 million square feet, seat approximately 69,000 and will feature an expected 165 luxury suites and 8,500 club seats. It was designed to be a multi-purpose facility with the flexibility to host a wide range of events, including domestic and international soccer, college football, motocross, concerts and various civic events, and will be expandable for major events such as the Super Bowl.

LEVI'S® STADIUM PROGRESS AS OF NOVEMBER 2013

The new stadium will seat 69,000 fans during 49ers home games and will have the capacity to accommodate 75,000 for special events like the Super Bowl. Featuring over 45,000 seats (roughly two-thirds of the stadium's capacity), the lower bowl will be one of the largest in the NFL. This design eliminates the traditional club mezzanine level, which will bring fans sitting in the upper deck closer to the field.



Levi's® Stadium will provide fans with a world-class experience and offers significant upgrades from Candlestick Park, including concourses that are over three times more wide.



Levi's® will feature more than 100 additional concession points of sale. These open and easily accessible stadium access points will offer fans a more pleasant, less congested atmosphere. Stadium concourses will feature open field views so fans can watch the game while they purchase refreshments.



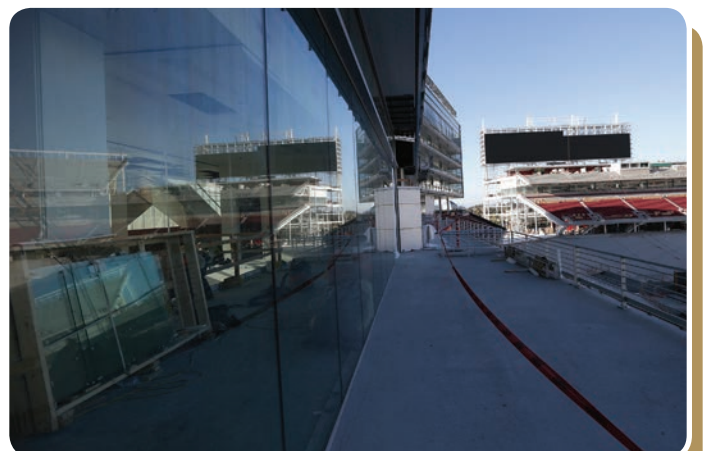
Levi's® Stadium will be home to numerous club spaces throughout the stadium. Individuals, organizations, and businesses hoping to host special events throughout the year will have the opportunity to do so.



Located within the Violin Memory Suite Tower directly above the 200 level club seats, The Broadcast Club features over 30,000 square feet of similar club space to the Champions Club and accommodates all C200 level club seat guests.



This club is planning to exclusively feature a "glass box" that will be home to the game day broadcast teams and viewable to all Broadcast Club patrons.



THE HEAD COACHES



Jim Harbaugh was named the 18th head coach in the storied history of the San Francisco 49ers franchise on January 7, 2011. Over the last two seasons, the 49ers have tallied a 27-9-1 overall record (3-2 in the postseason). After a 13-3 regular season record, and a trip to the NFC Championship Game in 2011, the Niners went 11-4-1 in 2012, on their way to Super Bowl 47. Harbaugh logged 18 years of coaching experience prior to joining the 49ers - Stanford (head coach, 2007-10); San Diego, (head coach, 2004-06); Oakland Raiders (offensive asst., 2002-03) and Western Kentucky (volunteer asst., 1994-2001). In college, he played at Michigan for the legendary Bo Schembechler from 1982-86. Jim and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and a son, Jack. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr. and Grace. Jim is the son of Jack and Jackie. His brother, John, is the head coach of the Baltimore Ravens, and his sister, Jackie, is married to Indiana University Men's Basketball head coach, Tom Crean.

Mike Shanahan is in his 4th season as head coach and Executive Vice President of the Washington Redskins. The 2012 season saw the Redskins capture their first NFC East Championship since 1999. The two Super Bowl championships on Shanahan's résumé make him one of 13 head coaches in league history to guide a club to a pair

of Super Bowl victories and one of only six to accomplish the feat in consecutive years. In his first season in Washington, Shanahan guided the Redskins to a two-win improvement over the 2009 campaign. During his time with the Broncos, Shanahan guided the franchise to two Super Bowl victories, three conference championship game appearances, seven postseason berths and nine winning seasons. Shanahan led Denver to 138 regular-season victories in 14 seasons. Shanahan arrived as head coach in Denver in 1995 from the World Champion San Francisco 49ers, where he served as offensive coordinator for three seasons (1992-94). He first went to Denver in 1984 as the club's wide receivers coach. He was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1985 and would serve the next three seasons in that capacity. Shanahan returned to Denver as quarterbacks coach on October 16, 1989, after serving as head coach of the Los Angeles Raiders in 1988 and through the first four games of the 1989 campaign.

In his first two seasons at the helm, head coach Jim Harbaugh guided the 49ers to 27 wins, including the postseason, consecutive NFC West Division titles and a trip to Super Bowl XLVII.

- Harbaugh became just the 8th coach in NFL history to win a division title in each of his first two seasons as an NFL head coach.

THROWBACK SUNDAY

Prior to becoming standout players in college, 49ers TE **Vernon Davis** and LB **NaVorro Bowman** played high school football just 10 miles apart in the Maryland/D.C. area. As the 49ers travel to FedEx Field to take on the Washington Redskins, two of their key players return to where it all started.

BOWMAN'S ACCOLADES AT SUITLAND HS

- Attended Suitland High School in District Heights, Maryland.
- Missed most of his senior season with a shoulder injury, but had a very impressive junior campaign, recording 165 tackles, 9 sacks, and 3 fumble recoveries as a linebacker. He also rushed for 1,200 yards and 22 touchdowns as a running back.
- Named the Maryland Defensive Player-of-the-Year in 2005.
- Rated by Scout.com as Maryland's No. 4 overall prospect
- First-team All-State in 2005.
- Washington Post first-team All-Met and first-team All-Conference in 2005.
- Held over 40 scholarship offers and chose Penn St. from a narrowed-down field that also included Ohio St., Michigan St. and Virginia Tech.



DAVIS' ACCOLADES AT DUNBAR HS

- Lettered in football, basketball, and track & field at Dunbar High School in Washington D.C.
- Despite missing three games to injury, caught 21 passes for 511 yards and 5 touchdowns as a senior. Also caught three two-point conversions and returned two kickoffs and two punts for touchdowns.
- Had 35 receptions for 385 yards as a junior.
- Selected to play in the U.S. Army All-American Bowl.
- Rated as the third-best tight end in the nation by ESPN.com's Tom Lemming.
- Ranked as the fourth-best tight end in the nation and the seventh-best player overall in the Atlantic East by Rivals.com.
- Was the 39th rated player nationally in SuperPrep's Elite 50.
- A Mid-Atlantic all-region pick by SuperPrep and the third-best player overall in the region.
- Second team ALL-USA by USA Today.
- Gatorade Player of the Year for the District of Columbia in 2003.
- Attended the University of Maryland while also holding offers from Florida, Purdue, Syracuse and Virginia among many others.

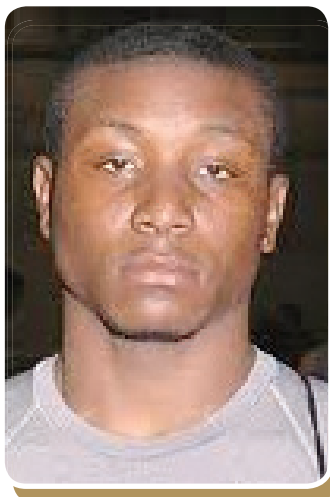

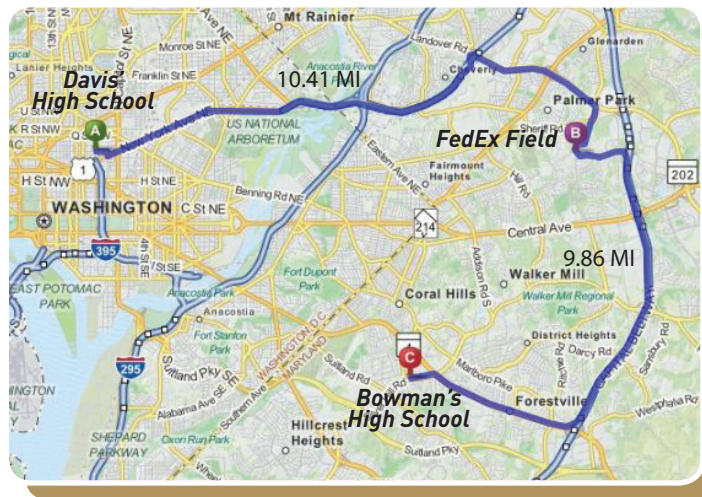

FRANCHISE BACK



As the heart of the 49ers offense for the past eight seasons, four-time Pro Bowl running back **Frank Gore** has established himself as one of the premier running backs in the NFL. The franchise's all-time leading rusher (9,587 yds.), he tallied his team-record sixth 1,000-yd. season in 2012, rushing for 1,214 yds. In 2011, Gore posted a new team

record by hitting the century mark in five consecutive games. He also holds the team records for career rushing atts., rushing TDs and 100-yd. rushing games. Despite suffering a season-ending hip injury in Week 12 of 2010, Gore joined LB Patrick Willis as the only two-time recipients of the Bill Walsh Award, which is voted on by the coaches, and given to the 49ers team MVP. The former 3rd-round pick is the first 49er in team history to record four consecutive 1,000-yd. rushing seasons (2006-09).

SEIZING THE MOMENT



Colin Kaepernick quickly grew into one of the most exciting and explosive players in the NFL after taking over the reins of the 49ers offense in week 11 of the 2012 season. Gifted with a rocket arm, blazing speed, killer instincts and poise beyond his years, Kaepernick guided the 49ers to the NFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl

XLVII in just his 10th career start, the 3rd fewest of any starting Super Bowl QB. ESPN Analyst and former NFL QB **Ron Jaworski** said of Kaepernick, "Kaepernick has a chance to be very special. He has a complete throwing skill set with a powerful arm that I absolutely put at gun level. His ball comes out with a lot of energy and velocity. And Kaepernick can drive the ball down the field, on the move, with accuracy. Kaepernick is one of the four or five most physically talented quarterbacks in the entire NFL. The elite skill set is still there."

In 2012, he went 7-3 as a starter and posted a QB rating of 90.0-or-better in 8 of the 10 games started. Kaepernick also tallied 3 rushes of 50-or-more yds., including the postseason, and had 22 completions of at least 25 yds. He set the all-time single-game rushing record (regular or postseason) for a QB with 181 yds. against the Green Bay Packers in the NFC Divisional Playoff game.

Kaepernick's 2013 Highlights...

- Finished with 164 passing yds., 1 TD and a passer rating of 117.7 at Jax. (10/27). Also had 7 carries for 54 yds. and 2 TDs.
- Completed 16 of 29 pass atts. for 252 yds. and 2 TDs vs. Arz. (10/13), including a 61-yd. TD pass to TE Vernon Davis.
- Completed a career-long 64-yd. TD pass to TE Vernon Davis vs. Hou. (10/6).

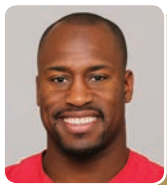

- In Super Bowl XLVII vs. Bal. (2/3/13), completed 16 of 28 atts. for 302 yds. 1 TD and a QB rating of 91.7. He also had 7 carries for 62 yds. and 1 TD. Kaepernick's 15-yd. TD run marked the longest TD run by a QB in Super Bowl history.

DT JUSTIN SMITH ON KAEPERNICK

"That's one thing that's cool about this game or any sport, it's all opportunity. Kaepernick got his opportunity last year, went out there and ran with it. He did a hell of a job and now he's one of the top quarterbacks in the league. He seized the moment and it seems like he's still doing that. He's working his tail off, leading by example and showing the other young guys how to do it. It's pretty cool watching from the beginning."

PRIME OF HIS CAREER



Vernon Davis has solidified himself as the most versatile and explosive tight end in the game. Selected by the 49ers with the 6th overall pick in the 2006 NFL Draft, Davis' star has shined when the lights have been the brightest. After registering 10 catches for 292 yds. and 4 TDs during the 2011 playoffs, becoming just the fifth

player in the Super Bowl era to register at least 2 receiving TDs in consecutive postseason games in the same season, he upped the ante the following year. Davis followed up his first trip to the playoffs with 254 rec. yds. in the 2012 postseason, joining Cardinals WR Larry Fitzgerald as the only two players in NFL history to register 4, 100-yd. receiving games in their first five playoff contests. Davis led the team in both receiving yards and touchdowns in 2009 and 2010, and was rewarded with a five-year contract extension on September 11, 2010. Davis is just as active off the field as he is on it, pursuing everything from curling and painting to humanitarian trips overseas.

S DONTE WHITNER ON DAVIS

"Vernon is a world-class guy, especially at the tight end position. Nobody that ever played the game that played tight end could run faster than him. Not many corners can run with him and definitely not many safeties or linebackers. He's a special player and when we need him, he comes up big. So, that's Vernon Davis for you."

- Registered his 48th career rec. TD at NO (11/17), tying former WR Dwight Clark for the 5th most rec. TDs in franchise history.
- Recorded 3 receptions for 52 yds. and 1 TD at Jax. (10/27).

"The guy's a great player, Vernon's a great player. And then what you're saying, I think is true. His chemistry with Kap is definitely improving. And that's what we believe in, the more we work at something the better we'll get. I think his command and comfort level in the system is definitely a contributing factor there."



One of the most productive wide receivers in recent NFL history, **Anquan Boldin** returns to the NFC West after spending three seasons with the Baltimore Ravens. The 10-year veteran and 3-time Pro Bowler brings big-play potential, toughness and plenty of savvy, veteran experience with him to San Francisco. Boldin is the fastest player in NFL history to haul in his 400th, 500th and 600th career receipts. He originally entered the NFL as a 2nd round draft pick (54th overall) of the Arizona Cardinals in 2003. Boldin started his NFL career in spectacular fashion, by setting the NFL rookie records for most receipts. (101) in a season and most rec. yds. in the first game of a career (217), on his way to earning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and Pro Bowl honors.

QB COLIN KAEPERNICK ON BOLDIN

"He's a savvy guy. He's played in a lot of games. He knows what the defense is doing. He knows where the weak spots in the defense are and where he wants to get to."

Boldin's 2013 Highlights...

- Registered team-highs in receipts. (6) and rec. yds. (56), and had 1 TD at NO (11/17).
- Recorded his 800th career receipt vs. Arz. (10/14). Became the 4th fastest player in NFL history to reach the milestone.

- Is the fastest player in NFL history to record 600 career receipts., reaching the milestone on 9/26/10 vs. Cle. in his 98th-career game, four games faster than the Colts' Marvin Harrison (102).
- Also holds the NFL record for the fastest to totally 500 career receipts., reaching the milestone on 12/14/08 vs. Min. in his 80th-career game, nine games faster than Denver's Lionel Taylor (89 games).
- Was the fastest in NFL history to reach 400 career receipts., connecting against Atl. (12/23/07) in his 67th-career game, five games faster than the previous record holder (Hall of Famer Kellen Winslow Sr.).

MOST VALUABLE PROTECTORS

Highlights on the O-Line...

- Provided excellent blocking for the offense to gain 212 rushing yds. at Jax. (10/27). It marked the fourth-highest rushing total in the NFL this season. Also, did not allow a single sack of QB Colin Kaepernick.
- Paved the way for RB Frank Gore to gain 101 rushing yds. vs. Arz. (10/13). Dominated the line of scrimmage on an 18-play, 89-yd. drive that was capped off by a 6-yd. TD run by RB Kendall Hunter.
- Provided running lanes for the offense to gain a season-high 219 yds. on the ground at StL (9/26). It marked the first time the 49ers had three different RBs score a rushing TD in the same game since 12/2/01 vs. Buf. (Garrison Hearst, Fred Beasley and Paul Smith). T Joe Staley...



Tasked with the duty of protecting the quarterbacks' blind side, Joe Staley has excelled in his role since being selected as the second of San Francisco's two 1st-round draft picks in 2007. He has been honored with Second-Team AP All-Pro selections in 2011 and 2012, and was also selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011 and '12. He was part of an offensive line that helped the team rush for 2,491 yards in 2012, ranking 4th in the NFL. As a rookie, he started all 16 contests at right tackle before switching to left tackle in his second year. A product of Central Michigan, Staley became the first player in school history to be drafted in the 1st round of the NFL Draft.

G Mike Iupati...



Mike Iupati has made a name for himself in just three seasons, being named AP First-Team All-Pro in 2012 and earning a starting spot on the NFC Pro Bowl roster. A mild and polite native of American Samoa, Iupati plays with a nasty mean streak on the field. He has started all 58 games, and all five postseason contests, since his rookie year in 2010. Selected 17th overall in the 2010 NFL Draft, Mike Iupati showcased his rare combination of size and athleticism as he was named the team's starting left guard during training camp his rookie season. Iupati, along with T Anthony Davis, are two of only four members of the 2010 NFL Draft class to start every game from 2010-12 (Jax. DT Tyson Alualu & Sea. S Earl Thomas).

C Jonathan Goodwin...



Jonathan Goodwin is in his second season with the 49ers after spending five seasons with the New Orleans Saints. A smart and savvy veteran heading into his 12th season, Goodwin is responsible for all the calls and adjustments made by the offensive line. In the heart of the trenches his durability is unquestioned, starting the last 80 regular season games in which he has appeared. He was selected to the Pro Bowl following the 2009 season and was a member of the New Orleans Saints Super Bowl XLIV Championship Team.

G Alex Boone...



In just four seasons, Alex Boone has developed into a Pro Bowl alternate at guard after originally signing as a rookie free agent tackle with the 49ers, in 2009. That year, he spent the entire season on the team's practice squad. When Boone reported to mini-camp the following year, he had lost 40 pounds of fat and replaced it with 25 pounds of lean muscle. He competed at both right and left tackle, and eventually proved his worth as he earned a spot on the 53-man roster. In 2011, Boone entered each game in short-yardage situations, and contributed on special teams. He was rewarded with a four-year contract extension on December 8, 2011, that runs through 2015. Boone became solidified as the starting right guard in 2012, and was part of a 49ers offensive line that used the same five starters for all 16 games and was regarded by most as the best unit in the league.

T Anthony Davis...



Armed with tremendous size, strength, and athleticism, Anthony Davis made an immediate impact at right tackle as a rookie after being selected with the 11th overall pick in the 2010 NFL Draft. Last season, Davis was recognized by his fellow offensive linemen as they selected him the 2012 recipient of the Bobb McKittrick Award, given annually to the 49ers offensive lineman who best exemplifies the dedication, excellence and commitment of its namesake. Davis, along with fellow offensive lineman G Mike Iupati, are two of only four members of the 2010 NFL Draft class to start every game from 2010-12 (Jax. DT Tyson Alualu & Sea. S Earl Thomas). They became just the third set of rookies to start every game on the offensive line since the 16-game schedule was instituted in 1978.



WINNING THE BATTLE

One of the biggest momentum swings in the game today comes from turnovers. Since 2011, the 49ers have won the turnover battle in 28 of 42 games under head coach **Jim Harbaugh**, and have posted a record of 24-3-1 in such games.

Since 2011, the 49ers have posted a +43 turnover differential, ranking 2nd in the NFL. San Francisco also ranks 1st in the NFL with just 41 giveaways and t-4th with 84 takeaways during that time span.

Since 2011, the 49ers rank 1st in the NFL, allowing just 90.0 rushing yds. per game. In 2012, San Francisco limited opponents to just 94.2 rushing yds. per game, ranking 4th in the NFL. In 2011, the 49ers defense ranked 1st in the NFL in rushing yds. allowed per game (77.3).

Their excellence in this regard is nothing new for the Niners as they rank 2nd in the league in that category since 2009, with a 93.0 avg. The team also leads the league in that span in rushing yds. allowed per carry (3.62).

A big reason why the 49ers are stifling passing attacks is the play of opposing quarterbacks. The 49ers defense is holding quarterbacks to an avg. passer rating of 74.8, ranking 4th in the NFL.

STOPPING FAMILIAR FOES

San Francisco's run defense since 2009 has been remarkable, especially against the NFC West. It is tough in the NFL to beat the same team twice in a season, let alone limit their offensive production on the ground each game. The Niners have been able to limit their divisional opponents rushing efforts, leading the NFL in numerous run defense categories.

- Since 2009, the 49ers defense has only allowed 2,278 yds. rushing vs. their own division, ranking 1st in the NFL over that time span.
- The 49ers also rank 1st in the NFL in rushing yds. per game allowed vs. their own division, giving up only 84.4 yds. per game and only allow a 3.53 avg. per carry, which ranks 1st in the NFL.

MR. EVERYTHING



Arguably the greatest linebacker in the game today, **Patrick Willis'** sheer athleticism and knack for the football make him an annual candidate for NFL Defensive Player of the Year. His superman-like performances week-in and week-out have contributed to the six-time All-Pro leading the NFL in tackles on multiple occasions. As the 11th-overall selection in the 2007 NFL Draft, Willis made an immediate impact as a rookie, earning First-Team All-Pro, Pro Bowl and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors. He has continued to build a resume that is destined for Canton. Not only has Willis been named All-Pro every year of his career, but he has also earned Pro Bowl recognition each season, becoming the only 49er to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of their first six seasons. A team captain in 2012, he ranked 2nd on the team in tackles (171) and finished the season with 9 PDs, 2 FFs and 1 FR. The leader of the 49ers defense was rewarded with a five-year contract extension that will keep him in the Bay Area through 2016.

Willis' 2013 Highlights...

- Registered 12 tackles and 1 PD at NO (11/17).
- Recorded 11 tackles and 1.0 sack of QB Cam Newton vs. Car. (11/10).
- Registered 8 tackles and forced a fumble by Jaguars TE Mercedes Lewis in the 4th qtr. at Jax. (10/27). The loose ball was recovered by LB Dan Skuta and returned 47 yds. for a TD.
- Recorded 8 tackles and forced a fumble by WR Larry Fitzgerald vs. Arz. (10/13). It marked his 15th career forced fumble. The turnover led to a 6-yd. TD run by RB Kendall Hunter.

Willis' Career Highlights...

THE QUINTESSENTIAL PRO



A relentless and explosive defender, two-time All-Pro Justin Smith anchors the 49ers defensive front. Nicknamed "Cowboy" for his blue-collar, Midwestern approach to his job, Smith is widely recognized as a leader in the locker room. In 2012, he was named Second-Team AP All-Pro at two different positions (DT & DE) after registering 130 tackles, 3.0 sacks, 1 FR and 2 PDs. His efforts also earned him his 4th straight Pro Bowl selection. In 2011, Smith posted 7.5 sacks and became just the third player in franchise history to register at least 6.0 sacks in four consecutive seasons. Since joining the 49ers in 2008, he has recorded 34.5 sacks and ranks 1st in the NFL among defensive tackles over that span. Smith's 34.5 sacks also rank 2nd in franchise history among DTs to Dana Stubblefield (46.5). In 2010, he tied his career high with 8.5 sacks, matching the total from his rookie year in 2001. Smith was rewarded with a two-year contract in June of 2013 that will keep him in red and gold through 2015.

HEAD COACH JIM HARBAUGH ON SMITH

"Justin Smith has been a quintessential pro, every single day."

Smith's 2013 Highlights...

- Registered 2.0 sacks at Ten. (10/20), marking his first multi-sack game of the season.

After his performance vs. the Giants in 2011 (11/13/11), Smith earned praise from various outlets, including *San Jose Mercury News* Columnist Tim Kawakami, who compared Smith with Yankees closer and future Hall of Famer Mariano Rivera, stating:

"Every serious playoff team needs an intimidating closer, and the 49ers have their guy in dominant form. Large fellow. Inspires his teammates. Weighs almost 300 pounds. Takes the game over when the drama builds and the stadium shakes...On a team that continues to rise to the NFL summit, Smith is the foundation, the quiet standard-bearer and undeniable tone-setter."

Two times in 2011, Smith came up big for the 49ers by making defensive MVP-like plays. First, at Phi. (10/2/11), Smith sealed the victory by punching the ball loose from Eagles speedy wideout Jeremy Maclin to cap off a 20-pt. come-from-behind win. And again vs. NYG (11/13/11), on 4th down, Smith stuck his paw in the air to bat down Eli Manning's last attempt and once again cap off the victory for the Niners.

- With 7.5 sacks in 2011, Smith became just the 3rd player in franchise history to register at least 6.0 sacks in four consecutive seasons.

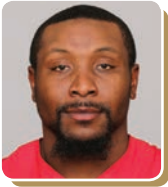

Talent, hustle, toughness and determination are all attributes 49ers linebacker **NaVorro Bowman** has displayed during his first three seasons in the NFL. He was named First-Team All-Pro in both 2011 and 2012, and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2012. A rock in the middle of the 49ers defense, he led the team in tackles in each of the last two seasons. On November 27, 2012, Bowman was rewarded with a five-year contract extension through 2018, solidifying one of the league's most talented linebacking groups for years to come. Growing up in the crime-infested neighborhood of District Heights, MD, Bowman relied on sports and a strong support system to keep him pointed in the right direction. He now shares his insights with the youth of the Bay Area and his hometown.

S Donte Whitner...



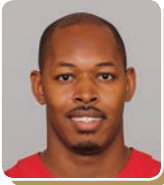
Donte Whitner's athletic career almost ended before it even had a chance to start. When he was just 6 years old, he was hit by a car while chasing a ball into the street. With multiple fractures in both legs, doctors told his mother that he would never be able to walk normal again. Donte has used that story as motivation throughout his life

to prove the doubters wrong. A first-time Pro Bowler in 2012, he recorded a career-high 119 tackles and 2 forced fumbles, while also scoring on a 42-yard interception return in New Orleans. In 2011, Whitner's first with the 49ers, he won the Garry Niver Award, which is given to the player who displays the most professionalism and cooperation in dealing with media. He was originally selected 8th overall in the 2006 NFL Draft by Buffalo and went on to help the Bills finish in the top 10 in pass defense in three of his five years (7th in '06, 2nd in '09, 3rd in '10) with the team.

In 2012, Rogers tallied 69 tackles and recovered three fumbles. In 2011, he earned 2nd-Team AP All-Pro honors and his first Pro Bowl selection as a starter. Rogers entered the NFL as the 9th overall pick in the 2005 draft by Washington, and went on to play six seasons for the Redskins, before signing a one-year contract with the 49ers in 2011. The Niners re-signed Rogers to a four-year contract on March 16, 2012, which runs through the 2015 season.

CB Tarell Brown...



Tarell Brown has become a mainstay in the 49ers secondary since taking over a starting role at cornerback in 2011, having started all 38 games since that time. Over the past three years, Brown has recorded 6 interceptions, 2 fumble recoveries and 35 pass break-ups, and logged a career-high 59 tackles, in 2012. Brown is known for possessing

a tremendous work ethic, a trait that helped him overcome a significant amount of adversity throughout his young life. Following his rookie season, Brown was presented with the team's coveted Thomas Herrion Award, which is given to a player, by the coaching staff, who has taken advantage of every opportunity, turned it into a positive situation and made their dream into a reality.

CB Tramaine Brock...



Tramaine Brock made the 49ers opening day roster in 2010, becoming the first undrafted rookie free agent to do so in five seasons. Now entering his 4th professional season, not only does he continue to contribute on the 49ers special teams units, having led the team in production points (681) and tackles (15) in 2012, but he has also evolved into a playmaker on defense. A converted strong safety out of Belhaven University, Brock only played a dozen snaps at cornerback during his collegiate career, which also included stops at Mississippi Gulf Coast Junior College and the University of Minnesota.

Brock's 2013 Highlights...

- Intercepted Panthers QB Cam Newton and returned the INT 41-yds. The takeaway led to a 25-yd. FG by K Phil Dawson.
- Recorded an INT at Ten (10/20). The takeaway led to a 1-yd. TD run by RB Frank Gore.
- Making his first career start, recorded 2 INTs and totaled 31 return yds. vs. Hou. (10/6). Intercepted the first pass of the game from Texans QB Matt Schaub and returned the pick 18 yds. for a TD. The two takeaways resulted in 14 pts.

S Eric Reid...

Eric Reid kicked off his NFL career with a bang, tallying an INT in each of the 49ers first two games, becoming the first rookie in franchise history to do so since the merger in 1970, according to the Elias Sports Bureau. A starter for the LSU Tigers since 2011, Eric Reid earned All-America honors and was a member of the All-SEC Academic Honor Roll in 2011 and 2012. Named a permanent captain by his teammates in 2012, he was a key member of an LSU defense that ranked among the nation's best in points allowed, total yards and rushing yards. Reid became just the second LSU safety to be selected in the first round of the NFL Draft, joining S LaRon Landry, who was selected sixth overall by Washington in the 2007 NFL Draft.

Facing the constant challenge of punting through the unpredictable weather conditions at Candlestick Park, **Andy Lee** is making his case as one of the NFL's best punters. He has the 3rd-highest net punting avg. in NFL history (39.5) and ranks 4th all-time in gross avg. (46.1). Since being drafted in the 6th-round of the 2004 NFL Draft, he has earned Pro Bowl honors in three of the past six seasons ('07, '09, '11). In 2011, Lee posted a net punting avg. of 44.0, setting the NFL single-season record. He followed it up with a 43.2 net avg. in 2012, the 3rd highest single-season total in NFL history, on his way to earning his 4th AP All-Pro selection. His athletic abilities have catapulted his name in the Niners record books as well. He is the franchise leader in punts, punting yardage, gross avg., touchbacks, punts downed inside the 20 and net avg. Lee was rewarded for his efforts with a six-year contract extension on 5/23/12, keeping him with the club through 2018.

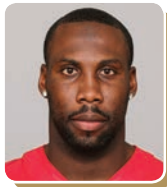

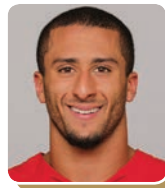

One of the most productive wide receivers in recent NFL history, Anquan Boldin returns to the NFC West, after spending three seasons with the Baltimore Ravens. The 10-year veteran and three-time Pro Bowler debuted for the 49ers in historic fashion, earning NFC Offensive Player of the Week in Week 1 by notching 13 receptions for 208 yards, breaking Jerry Rice's franchise record for the most receiving yards on opening day. Boldin is the fastest player in NFL history to haul in his 400th, 500th and 600th career receptions and notched his 800th career reception on a 7-yard pass by QB Colin Kaepernick vs. Arizona (10/13), becoming the 4th fastest in NFL history to accomplish that milestone, doing so in 146 games. He originally entered the NFL as a 2nd round draft pick (54th overall) of the Arizona Cardinals in 2003. Boldin started his NFL career the same way he started his 49ers career, historically, by setting the NFL rookie records for most receptions (101) in a season and most receiving yards in the first game of a career (217), on his way to earning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and Pro Bowl honors. Only one other person in NFL history, besides Boldin, has recorded 10+ receptions and 200+ receiving yards on Kickoff Weekend, Anquan has done it twice.



- Was the fastest in NFL history to reach 400 career receipts., connecting against Atl. (12/23/07) in his 67th-career game, five games faster than the previous record holder (Hall of Famer Kellen Winslow Sr.).
- Recorded the 700th receipt. of his career at Cle. (12/4/11), reaching the milestone in his 123rd game (3rd fastest all-time: Marvin Harrison - 114 and Andre Johnson - 120).

- In April of this year, Boldin hosted the ninth annual Q-Festival, with proceeds benefiting his foundation. The weekend-long event takes place in Boldin's hometown area of South Florida and includes free activities for youth and families. This year's activities included a golf tournament, a celebrity basketball game at his alma mater, Pahokee High School, and a "Fun Day in the Park." The golf tournament alone raised \$71,000 and over 3,000 participants attended the three-day event. "We had a great turnout, each year it continues to grow," said Boldin. "We probably had about 20 NFL guys come out and participate. We had nothing but great feedback from the community and as usual I'm looking forward to it again next year."

- This past March, Boldin went on a trip to Senegal, with Arizona Cardinals WR Larry Fitzgerald, to try to help understand and change the mining policies that allow the natives to be stripped from their land and left with nothing. "We wanted to go over there, see the entire process, see how things are run and just come back to the U.S. and advocate for the people who really don't have a voice. We have a trip scheduled to Washington D.C. so that we can actually talk to congress and try to get the policies changed."
- Boldin was inducted into the Palm Beach County Sports Hall of Fame on March 25, 2012, and was honored as a 2012 Distinguished Alumni by the Education Foundation of Palm Beach County, Inc. Another special honor that Boldin has earned in his hometown of Pahokee, FL, is the name of Pahokee High School's football stadium, Anquan Boldin Stadium.
- In April 2012, Boldin made a mission trip to Ethiopia, also with Arizona Cardinals WR Larry Fitzgerald, to bring attention to the horrible drought in East Africa. "One of the villages that we went to had a canal around their crops and they had a huge problem with hippos," he said. "So they needed some kind of protection to keep the hippos out. We went there, bought fences, and built fences around the crops so that the hippos couldn't damage the crops anymore." He also helped build retaining walls in one village so that when it did eventually rain, the villagers could catch the water and grow vegetation.
- He was named the Baltimore Ravens' 2012 and 2010 Walter Payton Man of the Year, as well as the Arizona Cardinals Walter Payton Man of the Year in 2004, for his efforts on and off the field.
- After the destruction of Hurricane Katrina in 2005, Boldin, along with several teammates, visited hurricane refugees that were displaced to Phoenix, AZ. He helped serve food and drinks to the Louisiana residents, while also donating money to the Hurricane Relief Disaster Fund.

In just four seasons, Alex Boone has developed into a Pro Bowl alternate at guard after originally signing as a rookie free agent tackle with the 49ers, in 2009. That year, he spent the entire season on the team's practice squad. When Boone reported to mini-camp the following year, he had lost 40 pounds of fat and replaced it with 25 pounds of lean muscle. He competed at both right and left tackle, and eventually proved his worth as he earned a spot on the 53-man roster. In 2011, Boone entered each game in short-yardage situations, and contributed on special teams. He was rewarded with a four-year contract extension on December 8, 2011, that runs through 2015. Boone became solidified as the starting right guard in 2012, and was part of a 49ers offensive line that used the same five starters for all 16 regular season games and was regarded by most as the best unit in the league.

// 2013 HIGHLIGHTS

- Was part of an offensive line that helped amass the 2nd most total net yds. on opening day in 49ers franchise history with 494 yds. (404 passing yds. and 90 rushing yds.) vs. GB (9/8).
- Helped pave the way for 219 yds. rushing at StL (9/26). It marked the first time the 49ers had three different RBs score a rushing TD in the same game since 12/2/01 vs. Buf. (Garrison Hearst, Fred Beasley and Paul Smith).
- The offensive line did not allow a sack on 17 total atts. by QB Colin Kaepernick and QB Colt McCoy at Jax. (10/27). The last time the 49ers did not allow a sack was 11/25/12 at NO. The 4 rushing TDs are tied for the most by any team in a game in the NFL this season [Ten. - at StL (11/3); Was. - vs. SD (11/3)].

// GOLDMINE

- For fans traveling to the San Francisco Zoo, they can keep an eye out for the zoo's endangered black rhinoceros named Boone, whom the zoo chose to name after the 49ers guard. In January of 2013, the San Francisco Zoo invited Alex to be the zookeeper for a day, where he fed giraffes, polar bears and other animals, learned the tools of the trade and met the black rhino who now shares his name. The black rhinos are the most aggressive species of rhinoceros. Black rhinos are known for their power in plowing through and running over things, which matches Boone's playing style on the gridiron to blast open holes and get into the open field when pulling on sweep plays. "We're very similar. It's very fitting. I'm very humbled and very honored to have a rhino named after me," Boone said. "I got to feed him, got to pet him, a very soft face, the horn, unbelievable to touch that. It's an honor and a blessing to have such a beautiful animal named after me." This also earned Alex the nickname "The Rhino."
- During the 2010 offseason, following his rookie season, Alex returned home to Lakewood, OH, where he began working out with former NFL O-lineman LeCharles Bentley. With Bentley's help and guidance, Alex returned for training in the best shape of his life, dropping 40 pounds before putting 25 pounds of muscle back on. "LeCharles helped me realize what it takes to be successful in the NFL," Alex said. "He has helped me with my footwork, my initial burst and my quickness. I know I'll be ready for whatever the coaches throw at me this season."
- The one person Alex always admired and wanted to be like was his grandfather. "My grandfather raised my brother and I with good morals and good values," said Alex. "He was always there for us." Alex saw him as a smart person who everyone looked up to. A very religious man, the two of them prayed together regularly and attended church every Sunday. His grandfather passed away when he was young, which left a void in his life. "It crushed me. I never really had to be by myself." Alex vividly remembers the moment he heard the news. "I remember I was eating pizza and I was 13 years old." Talking to his grandmother about him has been a breath of fresh air, reassuring Alex that his grandfather will always be with him. "He was a funny guy who loved to laugh. He was real jokester. I try to be like him every day."

Talent, hustle, toughness and determination are all attributes 49ers linebacker NaVorro Bowman has displayed during his first three seasons in the NFL. He was named First-Team All-Pro in both 2011 and 2012, and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2012. A rock in the middle of the 49ers defense, he led the team in tackles in each of the last two seasons. On November 27, 2012, Bowman was rewarded with a five-year contract extension through 2018, solidifying one of the league's most talented linebacking groups for years to come. Growing up in the crime-infested neighborhood of District Heights, MD, Bowman relied on sports and a strong support system to keep him pointed in the right direction. He now shares his insights with the youth of the Bay Area and his hometown.



- NaVorro earned his degree in criminal law and justice, and one day would like to use that to help out his hometown. With all of the violence and drugs in District Heights, MD, he believes being from that area will help others listen to him and understand that there are other ways to live life than what they currently know. "That's one of the reasons I got in that field - to open doors and possibly be able to get into a young child's head from my neighborhood."
- Two important and influential people in NaVorro's life recently and abruptly passed away. His father passed away from a blood clot that reached his heart, while his high school coach died in a car accident before Penn State's bowl game in 2009. "Dealing with as much adversity as I have in a short period of time has made me the man I am today. It's made me stay on track and strive to do those things that will possibly help me be successful, not just on the football field, but off the field also."

Tramaine Brock made the 49ers opening day roster in 2010, becoming the first undrafted rookie free agent to do so in five seasons. Now entering his 4th professional season, not only does he continue to contribute on the 49ers special teams units, having led the team in production points (681) and tackles (15) in 2012, but he has also evolved into a playmaker on defense. Brock registered his first multi-interception game against the Texans (10/6), picking off QB Matt Schaub twice and returning one of those interceptions 18 yards for his first career touchdown, earning NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors in Week 5. A converted strong safety out of Belhaven University, Brock only played a dozen snaps at cornerback during his collegiate career, which also included stops at Mississippi Gulf Coast Junior College and the University of Minnesota.

// 2013 HIGHLIGHTS

- In his first career start, Brock registered 4 tackles, 2 PDs and his first-career multi-INT game, picking off Texans QB Matt Schaub. It marked the first multi-INT game by a 49ers player since 1/1/12 (CB Tarell Brown – 2 INTs at StL) vs. Hou. (10/6). His performance earned him NFC Defensive Player of the Week for week 5.
- Brock picked off Texans QB Matt Schaub and returned it 18 yds. for a TD on the third play of the game, marking his first-career pick-six and third career INT. It is the first INT returned for a TD by the 49ers since 11/25/12 [S Donte Whitner (42-yd. return) and LB Ahmad Brooks (50-yd. return) at NO]. Brock notched his 2nd INT of the day in the 2nd qtr., picking off Schaub and returning it 13 yds. The INT led to a 2-yd. TD run by RB Anthony Dixon.
- Tallied his 3rd INT of the season and 5th of his career at Ten. (10/20). The INT led to a 1-yd. TD run by RB Frank Gore.
- Notched a career-high 6 tackles at Jax. (10/27).
- Registered his 4th INT of the season vs. Car. (11/10). It was the 6th of his career, picking off Panthers QB Cam Newton and returning it for a career-long 41 yds. The INT led to a 25-yd. FG by K Phil Dawson.

// GOLDMINE

- Brock's path to the NFL was not an easy one by any means. From the small country town of Gulfport, MS, he traveled 30 miles north to Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College in Perkinston, MS, where he spent two seasons before transferring to the University of Minnesota. Why would a southern boy decide on Minnesota? "I wanted to see what a big city felt like," Brock said. After one year, he transferred back down south to Belhaven University in Jackson, MS, a small Christian NAIA school.
- In February of 2011, Belhaven retired Brock's jersey for his accomplishments on both the collegiate and professional levels. He is the only player in the history of the school's program to have played in the NFL.

- Brock's passion for sports was developed at an early age and he would like to remain in athletics either as a coach or personal trainer after his playing career is through. "I want to teach people what I know and watch them perform and compete," Brock said. His father encouraged him join as football league in elementary school, and he also played basketball and ran track for his school's team. Recreationally, he played kick ball and baseball in his neighborhood. "My friends were all competitive with each other," he said. "We all wanted to be the best in the group."

Ahmad Brooks established himself as a full-time starter at OLB in 2011 by working his way up the depth chart since joining the team as a MLB in 2008. In each of his last five seasons, he has tallied at least 5.0 sacks, and his 31.0 sacks as a 49er rank 3rd-most in franchise history among linebackers. Originally selected in the 3rd round of the 2006 supplemental draft by the Cincinnati Bengals, Brooks joined the 49ers late in the 2008 season. After not dressing that year, he had a breakthrough year in 2009, when he registered 6.0 sacks and 5 forced fumbles, despite only playing in 14 games as a reserve. His 5 FFs also set a single-season team record among linebackers and ranked t-2nd among NFL linebackers that year. Brooks followed up his solid '09 campaign by posting 5.0 sacks in 2010, after battling through a kidney injury suffered in training camp.

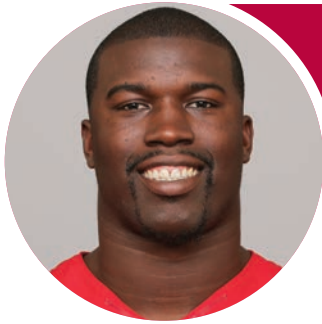

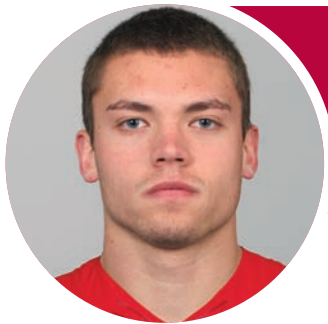
- Born Cornellius Carradine, he was given the nickname "Tank" from his mom. He always used to have a little toy army tank with him. "I could never go anywhere without that army tank," he said. "I just had to have it with me, and I used to always push people over, try to run over people." His mom still has the original toy tank.
- Carradine grew up in a rough neighborhood in Cincinnati, where many of the people he knew got into bad situations with drugs and violence. He grew up without much money and his family struggled to put food on the table. Through it all, he learned to walk the other way. "I saw how certain situations can end up. Talking to the older people and coaches, they told me to do the right thing," he said. "Good things happen when you try to do the right things. That was the biggest thing I learned." Football was the biggest opportunity which propelled Carradine out of the area, earning him a college scholarship, where he earned a degree in sociology from Florida State. "People kept telling me, 'Man, I wish I had that opportunity to play this sport.' I'd seen my opportunity and knew the chances I had, knew what I would be doing if I didn't accomplish these goals. That's why I thrive on football. I give it all I've got and I try to play every play like it's my last. I respect this game because of what this game has gotten me through. I take advantage of it by doing the right thing, being a positive player and being good to my teammates and for the organization."

- After going through a rough childhood, Tank has a passion for telling his story to kids. He volunteers his time at charity foundations and football camps. "If kids can hear the importance of doing the right thing, if I can help them succeed in life, if they can get it when they're young, they'll live up to those things instead of trying to get knowledge as they got older," he said. "Then it might be too late, because they've already been on their own in certain situations."
- Tank loves animals, and has a large collection of exotic pets, including snakes, lizards, ferrets, a monkey, a bird, piranhas and a shark. "I could see myself doing animal research working in a zoo," he said.

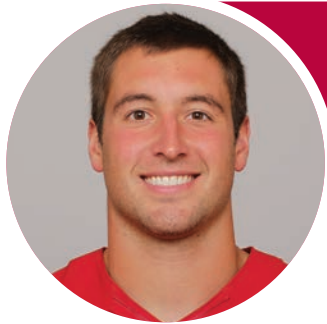

As the 10th overall pick in the 2009 NFL Draft by San Francisco, Michael Crabtree has showcased his rare combination of size, hands and run-after-the-catch ability during his first four seasons with the 49ers. A reliable receiver, Crabtree has caught a pass in each of his 58 NFL games played, which includes recording at least three receptions in 49 of those contests. He excelled in 2012, as he led the team in receptions and receiving yards for the second straight season. Crabtree set career highs last year with 85 receptions for 1,105 yards and 9 touchdowns. He became the first 49ers wide receiver to record a 1,000 yard season since Terrell Owens in 2003. Widely considered one of the most prolific receivers in college football history, Crabtree earned the coveted Biletnikoff Award - given to the nation's best receiver - in each of his two seasons played at Texas Tech.

- In 2012, Crabtree teamed with the video game "The Hip-Hop Dance Experience," to create a new touchdown dance, the Crab Shake. Each time Crabtree performed the routine in a game, the gaming company donated \$1,000 to Crabtree's favorite charity, the Boys & Girls Club. With help from Bay Area musician Too Short, he worked with a choreographer to perfect his dance moves. "Gotta show the Bay Area some love. I'm from Texas and the Crab Shake is straight from the south side, but the music, that's the Bay right there," Crabtree said. "The south side mixed with the Bay Area, to me, that's the best of both worlds." He also competed with Broncos LB Von Miller and Eagles RB LeSean McCoy to win fan votes on Twitter for the best dance moves.

With every Crab Shake touchdown dance, he chose to donate \$1,000 to the Boys & Girls Club because the organization meant so much to him from his own personal experiences. Growing up, Michael found refuge at his local Boys & Girls Club in Dallas. "This is real, because every day when I was growing up, I was at the Boys & Girls Club just playing everything," he said. "We played pool and ping pong. We were running and racing, playing football and basketball and boxing. I just grew up there, and they were even there for me when I needed tutoring, so I felt it was only right that I support them back. That's what's so great about this, I'm dancing and celebrating in the end zone, and I'm giving back at the same time. It really means a lot to me." In 2012, he rewarded the club with a career-high 9 touchdowns.

- A Jordan Brand athlete, Michael has big plans for unveiling some cleats during the 2012 season. Michael knows fashion and really gives his input on the details of the shoe design, "I tell them what material and color I want and where. I may tell them that I want this leather, this part suede and this part mesh." He hopes to set his own trends, "If everybody is doing it, then I'm not going to wear it."

Michael received a basketball scholarship as well as football coming out of high school, so it's understandable how humbling it is to wear the Jordan brand. "It's the best of both worlds right now. Jordan is real big on who represents him with his brand. He looks for sharp guys with good character."

- A nationally-ranked basketball player at Carter HS in Dallas, TX, Michael was rated among the top 50 prospects in Texas and received several scholarship offers from major colleges. As a senior, he averaged 20.8 points, 6.7 rebounds and 3.1 assists per game. Michael limited his college options to those that would allow him to play both basketball and football. He chose Texas Tech because both Bob Knight and Mike Leach recruited him.
- Michael has so many pairs of shoes he can't put a number on it. Shoes take up his parents' garages, his house in Dallas, and any other place he can store them. Some may say that's excessive, but they may not know the real reason behind his shoe collection. "Growing up I didn't have many shoes. I used to love shoes and cherish the ones that I had. I'd clean them up every day and polish them." Crabtree has big plans for a shoe rack at his home in the Bay Area so he can put them all on display. The shoes are not in boxes though, "I want to see them, my closet is going to look like Niketown."
- Michael's desire to play football can be traced to video games when he was young. "Growing up, all I did was play video games. I was a big Madden fan, and even before that, I was a big Tecmo Bowl guy," Crabtree said. "Tecmo Bowl, that was the game. It was so simple, but at the same time, I think that's what made it so much fun. There weren't even any flags, you could run all around the field with Bo Jackson. I love that game." Even now, he'll have fans come up to him to talk not just his play on the football field, but Crabtree's digital character in the video game and in fantasy football. He said he'd like to have the Crab Shake dance be used in the upcoming Madden game and laughed about being rated higher in the game. "They need to give me some more speed in there. I check the ratings, and I couldn't believe my score. My speed is a little suspect in that game, but I'm going to keep my cool [laughing]," he said, jokingly.

Dahl has registered 344 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 4 INTs, 3 FFs, 3 FRs and 1 blocked punt in his career.

- Registered his first-career blocked punt, at Sea. (9/15), on Seahawks P Jon Ryan, marking the first blocked punt by the 49ers since former LB Larry Grant blocked P Robert Malone's punt at NYJ (9/30/12).

// GOLDMINE

- Growing up in Minnesota where there are lakes everywhere, Dahl grew fond of water sports. In the summer time he enjoyed fishing, boating and water skiing. Now out in sunny and mild California, Dahl has taken up golf as a new hobby.
- Dahl's interest in mechanical engineering must have been peaked by working at his father, Terry's, home automation business growing up. A mechanical engineering major, Dahl was lucky enough to land an internship with an inventor in college. "We worked on about 12 projects of his. Inventions, ideas and new designs," said Dahl. "We did some studies in geothermal heating and cooling, which really interested me."
- He is a part owner of a commercial real estate company named 43 LLC. They handle real estate mostly in Minnesota, but have branched out into Texas as well.

Armed with tremendous size, strength, and athleticism, Anthony Davis made an immediate impact at right tackle as a rookie after being selected with the 11th overall pick in the 2010 NFL Draft. Last season, Davis was recognized by his fellow offensive linemen as they selected him the 2012 recipient of the Bobb McKittrick Award, given annually to the 49ers offensive lineman who best exemplifies the dedication, excellence and commitment of its namesake. Davis, along with fellow offensive lineman G Mike Iupati, are two of only four members of the 2010 NFL Draft class to start every game from 2010-12 (Jax. DT Tyson Alualu & Sea. S Earl Thomas). They became just the third set of rookies to start every game on the offensive line since the 16-game schedule was instituted in 1978.

// 2013 HIGHLIGHTS

- Was part of an offensive line that helped amass the 2nd most total net yds. on opening day in 49ers franchise history with 494 yds. (404 passing yds. and 90 rushing yds.) vs. GB (9/8).
- Helped pave the way for 219 yds. rushing at StL (9/26). It marked the first time the 49ers had three different RBs score a rushing TD in the same game since 12/2/01 vs. Buf. (Garrison Hearst, Fred Beasley and Paul Smith).
- The offensive line did not allow a sack on 17 total atts. by QB Colin Kaepernick and QB Colt McCoy at Jax. (10/27). The last time the 49ers did not allow a sack was 11/25/12 at NO. The 49ers also rushed for 221 yds. and 4 TDs on 38 carries at Jax., the most rushing yds. in a game by the team this season. The 4 rushing TDs are tied for the most by any team in a game in the NFL this season [Ten. - at StL (11/3); Was. - vs. SD (11/3)].

// GOLDMINE

- In 2012, Anthony won the 49ers Bobb McKittrick Award, given annually to the 49ers offensive lineman who best represents the courage, intensity and sacrifice displayed by the longtime offensive line coach. It is voted on by the offensive line. At age 23, Davis became the youngest player in franchise history to win the award.
- Anthony saw first hand the struggles of life while growing up, but that never discouraged him, or the person he leaned on most, his mom. "My mom made it happen, she never played the victim. She always taught me you've got to do what you've got to do."
- Anthony got his first tattoo when he was 15 and has added many more to his arms. "The eye on my hand means wisdom and protection." His favorite tattoo is on the inside of his left forearm, "Wealth is of the heart and the mind, not the wallet." The other ink on his arms range from the Rutgers Scarlet Knight, a dream catcher and a clown in a straight jacket, "I haven't named him yet."

Vernon Davis has solidified himself as the most versatile and explosive tight end in the game. Selected by the 49ers with the 6th overall pick in the 2006 NFL Draft, Davis' star has shined when the lights have been the brightest. After registering 10 catches for 292 yds. and 4 TDs during the 2011 playoffs, becoming just the fifth player in the Super Bowl era to register at least 2 receiving touchdowns in consecutive postseason games in the same season, he raised the ante the following year. Davis followed up his first trip to the playoffs with 254 receiving yards in the 2012 postseason, joining Cardinals WR Larry Fitzgerald as the only two players in NFL history to register 4, 100-yard receiving games in their first five playoff contests. Davis led the team in both receiving yards and touchdowns in 2009 and 2010, and was rewarded with a five-year contract extension on September 11, 2010. Davis is just as active off the field as he is on it, pursuing everything from curling and painting to humanitarian trips overseas.

- In 2009, his 13 TD receipts. tied the then-NFL record for most in a season by a TE (Antonio Gates - 13 TDs in 2004). Davis' TD receipts. tied for the most in the NFL with Patriots WR Randy Moss and Cardinals WR Larry Fitzgerald, making him the second TE (TE Rob Gronkowski - 17) in the Super Bowl era to lead the league (or tie for the lead) in TD receipts.
- Registered his 4th career 100-yd. game in the postseason vs. Bal. (2/3/13) in Super Bowl XLVII. He now ranks t-1st in NFL postseason history for the most 100-yd. receiving games by a tight end, [TE Keith Jackson (40)].
- Davis recorded 8 receipts. for a career-high 180 yds. and 2 TDs vs. Arz. (10/13/13). It marked his 6th career multi-TD game, and 2nd of the season. He became the first TE in franchise history to record a TD receipt. of 60-yds.-or-more in consecutive weeks with his 61-yd. TD receipt. vs. Arz. (10/13) [64-yd. - Registered his 5th career multi-TD game, as he hauled in 6 recpts. for 98 yds. and 2 TDs vs. GB (9/8).
- Davis' 6 TD recpts. vs. GB are the most by a tight end in NFL history, according to STATS, Inc.
- Davis hauled in a 12-yd. pass from QB Colin Kaepernick in the 3rd qtr. at StL (9/26), giving him 3 rec. TDs in 3 games played this season.
- Hauled in a 64-yd. TD pass from QB Colin Kaepernick vs. Hou. (10/6), marking the third-longest TD recpt. in his career [73t at StL (1/3/10); 66t at GB (12/5/10)].
- Davis recorded 8 recpts. for a career-high 180 yds. and 2 TDs vs. Arz. (10/13). This marked his 6th career multi-TD game, and 2nd of the season. His first score came on a 61-yd. TD strike and the second on a 35-yd. pitch and catch, both from QB Colin Kaepernick.
- Became the first TE in franchise history to record a TD recpt. of 60-yds.-or-more in consecutive weeks with his 61-yd. TD recpt. vs. Arz. (10/13) [64-yd. TD recpt. vs. Hou (10/6)]. The last NFL TE to record 60-yd. TD recpts. in consecutive games was Cin. TE Bob Trumpy [78-yd. TD vs. SD (9/21/69); 80-yd. TD vs. KC (9/28/69); 62-yd. TD at SD (10/4/69)].
- Registered 7 recpts. for 171 yds. and 2 TDs in the first half vs. Arz. (10/13). This marks the 3rd time in his career he had 100-yds.-or-more in a half [104 yds. in 2nd half at GB (11/22/09); 101 yds. in 2nd half vs. Phi. (10/10/10)]. His 171 rec. yds. in the first half are the 3rd most by any player in a half this season. The last TE to have at least 171 rec. yds. in a half was Broncos TE Shannon Sharpe [172 rec. yds. in 2nd half at KC (10/20/02)].
- Notched his 8th TD of the season on a 17-yd. pass from QB Colin Kaepernick at NO (11/17). With 1 rec. TD against the Saints, Davis now has 48 career TD recpts. and is tied with WR Dwight Clark for the 5th most rec. TDs in franchise history. He finished the game with 4 recpts. for 33 yds. and 1 TD, moving past WR Freddie Solomon (4,873) into 8th place in franchise history with 4,904 career rec. yds.

// GOLDMINE

- Davis opened his own Jamba Juice location in Santa Clara, CA, on March 1 of this year. "Not only are you helping people with a job opportunity, you are helping them to stay healthy and live an active and healthy lifestyle," Davis said about his new business.
- On December 10, 2012, Davis celebrated the grand opening of his new art gallery, Gallery 85, which is located in San Jose's upscale Santana Row and features pieces by Davis himself.

Vernon has always had an affinity for art and is an avid admirer of Michelangelo and the Renaissance period. In 2010 and 2011, he got the opportunity to give back to his passion for art. Director of Cultural Affairs for the San Francisco Arts Commission Luis R. Cancel, in conjunction with the Young at Art Festival, a project of the San Francisco Unified School District and the Fine Arts Museum of San Francisco, announced the launch of "Art Impact." Vernon was the inaugural speaker for Art Impact, and the San Francisco Unified School District created a scholarship in Vernon's name, called the Vernon Davis Visual Arts Scholarship, which will provide tuition support to a San Francisco youth interested in pursuing a career in the visual arts. In May of 2011, he handed out his first scholarship to San Francisco high school student, Sheryl Quock, a promising fashion designer.

- After a breakout season in 2009, Vernon was named the recipient of the Len Eshmont Award, the 49ers most prestigious annual honor. The Len Eshmont Award honors the player who best exemplifies the "inspirational and courageous play" of Len Eshmont and is voted on by the players.
- Vernon was named an honorary captain of the USA Curling Team at the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver, BC, Canada. He attended the games and served as an ambassador for the team in order to help gain support for the sport.
- During the 2010 offseason, Vernon also traveled to Afghanistan with five fellow NFL players as part of the NFL-USO tour. They first stopped at Al Udeid Air Force Base, 40 miles outside of Doha, Qatar, then traveled on to Bagram Air Force Base in Afghanistan. The trip gave Vernon perspective and knowledge of the efforts being put forth by our military in the Middle East.
- Vernon is not one to sit back and relax during the offseason. In March of 2010, he joined his younger brother, Vontae, and six other NFL players on a humanitarian trip to Uganda and Rwanda. The crew spent 10 days distributing 22,000 hearing aids throughout the African regions as part of the Pros for Africa organization. "It was amazing. It was breathtaking because you look at these kids who can't hear anything and you plug these hearing aids in their ears and all of a sudden they're responding. You can't do anything but be thankful to be able to help them hear and respond. It brought a lot of emotion. I'm already an emotional guy."
- During the 2010 offseason, Vernon and Vontae hosted a football and mentoring clinic at Howard University in their native Washington, D.C. "It means a lot to me, because I know how important it is to go out and give back and share some of the lessons and just the gifts that you always wanted as a kid," Davis said. "Growing up in a low-income, poverty area in the inner city of Washington, D.C., I know what it's like. When I think of the kids, it touches me in ways you can't even imagine."
- When Vernon was a freshman in college he wanted to honor the person who raised him to be the person he is today, his grandmother, Adaline. He decided to get a tattoo on the inside of his left arm with her name. His grandmother's reaction wasn't a good one at first, but she understood why he did it because in Vernon's words, he could look onto the inside of his left arm just to think of her. "She's really influenced me and really pushed me, made me open my eyes and see that besides football, there are other things that I can get involved with if I don't make it." Adaline was the one who raised most of his siblings and gave Vernon direction in his life, teaching him to set goals and molding him into the person he is today.

Dawson makes the move to San Francisco after establishing himself as one of the most accurate kickers in NFL history, ranking 9th all-time with a FG percentage of 83.9% (319 of 380) and 3rd in NFL history from 50+ yards, making 68.4% (26 of 38) of his kicks. While the windy elements of Candlestick Park can create difficult kicking conditions, Dawson has proven himself to be one of the most reliable kickers in extreme weather conditions in NFL history.

- His wife, Shannon, is a professional singer, who performed as a backup singer for Wayne Newton in Las Vegas. She's currently recording a country/contemporary Christian mix album that's set to come out at the end of the summer.
- Dawson's two main hobbies now are actually his first two part-time jobs growing up. His first official job, in middle school, was driving the tractor that picks up the golf balls at the driving range. "For every tray of balls I would bring in and pour in the washer, I'd get \$3," said Dawson. "The busier the driving range, the more money I made." His other job was mowing lawns. He and a friend would mow about 30 lawns every week during the summers. "I love golf and I love yard work," he said.

As an undrafted free agent, Demarcus Dobbs took advantage of every opportunity presented to him throughout the 2011 training camp to earn a spot on the 49ers 53-man roster. With Dobbs, NT Ian Williams and one other player making the 2011 opening day roster, it marked the first time since 2001 that the 49ers had at least three undrafted rookie free agents make the team (4 in 2001 - DT John Schlect, LB Quincy Stewart, LB Shane Elam and P Jason Baker). In 2012, Dobbs proved even more valuable to the 49ers by becoming a rare, two-way player at both tight end and defensive tackle while also appearing on special teams, where he played in every phase of those units.

- After growing up in foster care and overcoming a multitude of obstacles that would discourage almost anyone, Dobbs poured himself into his schoolwork and vowed to graduate high school – something no one in his family had yet accomplished. While working diligently in school, he managed to shine on the football field as well, earning a football scholarship to the University of Georgia. Dobbs excelled academically at Georgia, just as he had done his whole life. He majored in consumer economics and earned his degree a year early so that he would be able to have internships and job experience during his final year of football eligibility. After graduation, Dobbs was hopeful – but always realistic – about his chances of playing in the NFL. Many speculated he would be drafted, but when he did not receive a phone call from a team on draft night, Dobbs did not give up. He and his agent looked over NFL rosters and decided that he would fit best in San Francisco. They could not have been more accurate. Dobbs worked tirelessly during 49ers training camp and preseason. He impressed players, coaches and staff with his determination and athletic ability. “I’ve always been a guy to work hard,” Dobbs said. “I was voted the Defensive Leadership Award by the coaches at Georgia. I’ve always been a guy that gave great effort on the field. When I got here, I knew each day I was going to push hard and whatever happens, happens. As long as I can say that I gave my all and I did all I could do.”

He became the Chiefs first defensive tackle to ever start all 16 games as a rookie. Dorsey went on to lead the defensive line with 60 tackles in 2010, and repeated that total in 2011. Dorsey grew up in Gonzales, LA, and went on to play at Louisiana State University where he became the first player in LSU history to win the Lombardi, Outland, Nagurski and Lott awards while helping the Tigers win the BCS National Championship in 2007.

This was my favorite team and now I get to play for them. My grandmother passed away a few years ago, but she was the person that turned me on to the 49ers."
- In 2011, Dorsey teamed up with PETA, urging dog owners across the country to protect their pets during harsh weather conditions by bringing them indoors. "I love my dog. I don't have any kids, so he's like my best friend. PETA came to my house and did a photo shoot with myself, and my three-year-old English Bulldog, Bugsy. It was cool. It was a good deal working with PETA. It was for a good cause and it was fun."

"That's one sport that you could actually win money at that young age," said Fleming. "I would be 12 years old, placing in 3rd place and winning \$120, and to me that was a lot of money."

As the heart of the 49ers offense for the past eight seasons, four-time Pro Bowl running back Frank Gore has established himself as one of the premier running backs in the NFL. The franchise's all-time leading rusher (9,587 yds.), he tallied his team-record sixth 1,000-yard season in 2012, rushing for 1,214 yds. In 2011, Gore posted a new team record by hitting the century mark in five consecutive games. He also holds the team records for career rushing attempts (2,086), rushing TDs (58) and 100-yd. rushing games (34). Despite suffering a season-ending hip injury in Week 12 of 2010, Gore joined LB Patrick Willis as the only two-time recipients of the Bill Walsh Award, which is voted on by the coaches, and given to the 49ers team MVP. The former 3rd-round pick is the first 49er in team history to record four consecutive 1,000-yd. rushing seasons (2006-09).



- With 23 touches (21 carries, 2 receipts.) at NE (12/16), Gore reached 2,197 total touches and surpassed RB Roger Craig for the most in 49ers history. He currently has 2,413 career touches.

- Frank was named 15th winner of the annual Garry Niver Award by reporters covering the team who represent the SF Chapter of the Pro Football Writer's Association in December of 2007. The award is given in honor of the late Garry Niver, the San Mateo Times reporter, and goes to the player who shows "cooperation and professional style" in dealing with Pro Football writers on the job.
- During the 2010 offseason, Frank tried his hand at coaching for the first time as the defensive coordinator of the Little 49ers in a Miami youth league. Although his players were only 4 years old, Frank was still teaching them what's important. "The most important part is that the kids enjoy it. You can see how excited they get when they do something right."
- Frank's determination to run over defenders comes from his tough upbringing in Miami, FL. Some considered his football career over when he suffered two serious knee injuries at the University of Miami; however, he relied on his mother Liz's strength to help him through. "She had been on dialysis (awaiting a kidney transplant) since I was in the 11th grade and raised three kids as a single woman," Frank said. Unfortunately, Liz lost her battle with kidney disease before the 49ers second game of the 2007 season against the St. Louis Rams. Playing with a heavy heart, Frank responded by rushing for 81 yds. and 2 TDs, including a 43-yd. score on a 4th-and-1 carry, helping the 49ers to a 17-16 victory.

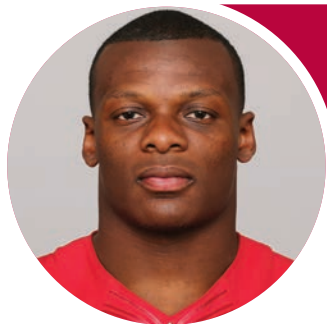

Kendall Hunter has been a key element in the 49ers ground game over the past three seasons. Mike Iupati has already made a name for himself in just three NFL seasons, having been named First-Team All-Pro and earning a starting spot on the 2012 NFC Pro Bowl roster. A mild-mannered native of American Samoa off the field, Iupati plays with a nasty streak on the field. He has started all 58 games, and all five postseason contests, since his rookie year in 2010. Selected 17th overall in the 2010 NFL Draft, Mike Iupati showcased his rare combination of size and athleticism as he was named the team's starting left guard during his rookie training camp. He and T Anthony Davis are two of only four members of the 2010 NFL Draft class to start every game from 2010-12 (Jax. DT Tyson Alualu & Sea. S Earl Thomas).



// GOLDMINE

- Growing up in the village of Nuuli in American Samoa, Iupati took English as a second language, but was still way behind the curve when he arrived in the United States prior to his freshman year of high school. When it came time to head to college and pursue a football career, he was behind academically due to the language barrier. Iupati began looking into junior colleges. While at a recruiting barbecue at Ceritos College, he met Johnny Nansen, an assistant coach at Idaho, who later convinced him to sign with the Vandals as a Prop 48. Four years later, Iupati was a first round NFL draft pick.
- When Iupati entered the NFL, his hair was very long, reaching the middle of his back. He had not cut it since the summer before his sophomore year at Idaho. When he returned to the Bay Area to begin the 2012 offseason program, he was sporting a buzz cut. "I needed a new start and thought now was the right time. I donated my hair to Locks of Love so that some kid would be able to make good use of it."
- Mike's brother did all of the tattoos on his arm and leg. All of the art on his body is reflective of Samoan culture. "Some of them are Fala, the centipede, the waves, the ocean, fish. It goes back to what we normally use." The lion on his leg was artwork that Mike liked and asked his brother to put a Polynesian design around it.
- Although Mike has not lived in American Samoa for several years, his mother will never let him forget his culture. "My mom was tough on us, but it's discipline. That's why a lot of Polynesians are disciplined when they come to the U.S. You have to always respect your elders. It's our culture."

LaMichael James made the most of his opportunities in 2012, after his NFL debut against the Miami Dolphins on December 9. His speed and elusiveness allowed him to tally over 500 all-purpose yards in just four regular season games at running back and kick returner. In college, James became the first two-time consensus All-America selection in Oregon history. In 2011, James led the nation, averaging 150.4 rushing yards per game, and ranked 2nd in the NCAA with 1,805 rushing yards. The recipient of the Doak Walker Award as the nation's top running back in 2010, James became just the third player in Pac-10/12 Conference history to rush for over 5,000 yards in his career.

// GOLDMINE

- One of James' biggest loves is building and restoring classic cars. In his collection, he owns a 1972 Impala, 1977 Chevelle and 1984 Monte Carlo. "It was just something that people do back in Texarkana," he said. "Everybody likes to trick their cars out, and bringing them up from nothing is a big thing there." It's become a hobby that he said relaxes him when he's away from football.
- Away from the gridiron, James has a passion for working in juvenile justice. "Hopefully, I'll be able to work with troubled kids that might not have a great background or a great home front," he said. "Hopefully I can make a difference in their lives."

- LaMichael James grew up in Texarkana, Texas, on the border of Texas and Arkansas. He described it as a tight-knit community with an emphasis on having a family atmosphere. All of his friends lived in the same neighborhood and pushed each other to stay active and involved. "We all played every sport. 'You do it, I do it.' It was one of those type of deals," James said. "That really kept me out of trouble and kept me focused with an eye on the prize." During the 2012 NFL Draft, James was invited to take part in the league's primetime event at New York's Radio City Music Hall, but James opted to stay home in Texarkana and witness the event with all the people he grew up with. "I'm never going to be bigger than the situation," James said. "I never want to turn my back on where I come from. That's where I've been my whole life. The people that have been there for me my whole life and have seen me grow up from a little boy, I wanted to share those moments with them."

After spending the first 15 games on the team's practice squad that year, he made his NFL debut against the Arizona Cardinals on December 30. - After his playing career, Jerod-Eddie plans to get a barber's license and open up his own barber shop. He would also like to continue staying active in athletics. "I'll try to get my Master's degree. I'm still trying to decide if I would like to be a coach. But I want to work in sports, as an academic advisor or athletic director."
- Jerod-Eddie was introduced to football playing for fun during recess and after school with friends at the age of 4. "Being from Texas, we eat and sleep football, and it starts at a young age," Jerod-Eddie said. "I love basketball too, it was my first love." He joined a basketball league in the 4th grade and started playing organized football a year later. "I started in the 5th grade and haven't stopped since," he said.

Colin Kaepernick quickly grew into one of the most exciting and explosive players in the NFL after taking over the reins of the 49ers offense in week 11 of the 2012 season and has since continued that trend in 2013, setting the 49ers franchise record for most passing yards in a season opener, when he threw for 412 yards against the Packers. Gifted with a rocket arm, blazing speed, killer instincts and poise beyond his years, Kaepernick guided the 49ers to the NFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XLVII in just his 10th career start, the 3rd fewest of any starting Super Bowl QB. In 2012, he went 7-3 as a starter and posted a QB rating of 90.0-or-better in 8 of the 10 games started. Kaepernick also tallied 3 rushes of 50-or-more yards, including the postseason, and had 22 completions of at least 25 yards. He set the all-time single-game rushing record (regular or postseason) for a QB with 181 yards against the Green Bay Packers in the NFC Divisional Playoff game.

- In the summer of 2010, Colin was drafted by the Chicago Cubs in the 2009 MLB Draft and was offered \$30,000 to go to Arizona for a month and throw a few bullpen sessions. Looking ahead to his senior season as Nevada's quarterback, he declined the offer saying, "What would that say about me as a leader of the team?"
- One of Colin's hobbies and favorite activities off the field is collecting and watching movies. "I own around 250 movies," said Colin. His favorites are no surprise, action and comedy, specifically the movie Step Brothers. What might be a surprise to some people, is the 6-4, 250 lb QB also enjoys watching cartoons and Disney movies. "Some movies I own that most people wouldn't think I like are The Incredibles, Finding Nemo, Despicable Me and How To Train Your Dragon."
- Even as a 4th grade student at Dutcher Elementary School in Turlock, CA, Colin knew he was going to play for the 49ers. In a letter that students had to write to their future selves, that despite his small stature at the time, Colin saw something special in himself. He wrote, "I'm 5-2, 91 lbs and a good athlete. I think in 7 seven years i will be between 6 ft. to 6-4, 140 lbs. I hope I go to a good college in football, then go to the pros and play on the Niners or the Packers, even if they aren't good in seven years."

Having mastered the constant challenge of punting through the unpredictable weather conditions of Candlestick Park, four-time All-Pro Andy Lee is making his case as one of the best punters in NFL history. He has the third-highest net average (39.5) and fourth-highest gross punting average (46.1) in NFL history. Since being selected in the 6th-round of the 2004 NFL Draft, he has earned Pro Bowl honors in three of the past six seasons ('07, '09, '11). In 2011, Lee posted a net punting average of 44.0, setting the NFL single-season record. He followed it up with a 43.2 net average in 2012, the 3rd-highest single-season total in NFL history, on his way to earning his 4th AP All-Pro selection. He is the franchise leader in punts, punting yardage, gross average, touchbacks, punts downed inside the 20 and net average. Lee was rewarded for his efforts with a six-year contract extension on 5/23/12, keeping him with the club through 2018.



// GOLDMINE

- Andy is considered a 'hometown hero' by his native Westminster, SC. The town mayor, Rusty Cater, presented Andy with a key to the city and a declaration commemorating "Andy Lee Day" on July 12, 2008.
- Andy never attended an NFL game growing up in South Carolina. Even when he went on to become a standout punter on the collegiate level at the University of Pittsburgh, he was still a stranger to live NFL action. The first professional game he ever witnessed in person was as a player with the 49ers in 2004. In fact, Andy didn't even set out to play football at all. "I was more of a baseball guy growing up. I actually wanted to be a Major League Baseball player. I played quarterback in 8th grade, and the coach asked, 'Who wants to try out for the punting position?' I didn't know you were supposed to spiral a punt, or turn it over, or any of that."

Ray McDonald has been a formidable force for opposing offensive lines to deal with over the last three seasons, having started 40 of 42 regular season games in that span. In 2012, McDonald played a significant role on the defense, posting a career-high in tackles (106) while adding 2.5 sacks and a forced fumble. A model of determination and resiliency, he has missed just three games to injury during his five-year career, after having overcome multiple significant knee injuries while in college. Over the past four seasons, he is one of only eight NFL defensive linemen to score at least two touchdowns. The 49ers grabbed McDonald as a 3rd-round pick (97th overall) in 2007. After earning a starting role at LDE in 2011, he was rewarded with a 5-year contract extension on July 29, 2011.

The Hazeltine Iron Man Award is given annually to the most courageous and inspirational defensive player as voted upon by the defensive coaches.
- Ray comes from an athletic family as his father, Ray Sr., played wide receiver for the Florida Gators in the mid-80s and was featured on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* (Nov. 11, 1985) after catching both scores in a 14-10 victory at Auburn in 1985. Ray's grandfather, Willie McDonald, played running back at Bethune Cookman and his uncle was a cornerback at UCF. Ray didn't have strong aspirations of playing football professionally until later in high school, when his father began to prepare him for the pro game. "He didn't really push me into playing football when I was growing up, but I told him I really wanted to take off with football. So he dedicated his whole year to working me out."

- Ray has had his share of success growing up playing football. While in high school, he won a state championship four straight years, and then a national title at Florida, but still strives to achieve the ultimate prize of an NFL championship. "I have individual goals, but it all comes down to winning. I come from a winning tradition. All I'm missing out on is an NFL Championship."
- Since the 2008 offseason, Ray has looked for other ways to improve himself as a pass rusher. He has been boxing with the 49ers strength and conditioning staff in order to add more moves to his pass rushing repertoire. "It's something that I can add to my tray with hand-eye coordination. It helps with my endurance and my hand placement and I have enough force to knock someone off balance."
- Despite entering the NFL with great concerns regarding the health of his knees, which hurt his draft stock and forced him to be selected in the 3rd round in 2007, McDonald has missed just two games in his five-year career to injury.

Named a permanent captain by his teammates in 2012, he was a key member of an LSU defense that ranked among the nation's best in points allowed, total yards and rushing yards. Reid became just the second LSU safety to be selected in the first round of the NFL Draft, joining S LaRon Landry, who was selected sixth overall by Washington in the 2007 NFL Draft.

// 2013 HIGHLIGHTS

- Made his NFL debut vs. GB (9/8), recording 7 tackles, 1 INT, 1 PD and 1 special teams tackle. His 1st career INT came off of Packers QB Aaron Rodgers. Reid became the first 49ers rookie to intercept a pass on opening day since both DB Don Griffin and CB Tim McKyer each registered an INT at TB (9/7/86).
- Registered his 2nd INT of the season, picking off a pass by Seahawks QB Russell Wilson vs. Sea. (9/15). According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Reid is the only 49ers rookie, since the merger in 1970, to register an INT in each of the team's first 2 games. The last rookie in the NFL to register an INT in the team's first 2 games was Phi. S Nate Allen in 2010.
- Notched a single-game career-high 9 tackles vs. Hou. (10/6), and also added 1 PD.
- Tallied 1 INT vs. Arz. (10/13), his 3rd of the season, picking off QB Carson Palmer and returning it 53 yds to the Cardinals 7-yd. line. Also recorded his 1st career FR, recovering a fumble by Arz. WR Larry Fitzgerald. The takeaway led to a 6-yd. TD run by RB Kendall Hunter.
- Recorded his 1st career special teams FR, picking up the loose ball after it was touched by Panthers CB Drayton Florence vs. Car. (11/10). The takeaway led to a 43-yd. FG by K Phil Dawson.

// GOLDMINE

- Jim Harbaugh not only wanted to draft Reid to the 49ers roster coming out of college, but Harbaugh had his eyes on the safety when he was still in high school. As Stanford's head coach, Harbaugh tried to recruit Reid to play college football for the Cardinal. Harbaugh exchanged a few phone calls with Eric and his father, Eric, Sr. as well as many emails with his mother, Sharon. Reid chose LSU to remain close to home. "[Stanford] was actually the only school that recruited me as hard as LSU did. All of the other schools pretty much gave up knowing that I was an in-state guy, but it said a lot about how much [Harbaugh] wanted me to go to Stanford and I appreciated it."

- Ironically, after choosing to stay local for college, Reid hoped to be drafted by the 49ers so he could be in Northern California's Bay Area. Eric's mother, Sharon Guillory-Reid, works as a traveling nurse. Since Eric was in middle school in 2004, she has been traveling back and forth from Baton Rouge, LA, and the Bay Area, working in hospitals in Oakland, San Jose and San Leandro, staying in each state two to three weeks at a time. Now, Eric can remain close to his mother and gain insight on the area.
- Growing up, Eric's parent's taught him the importance of hard work, the value of money and focusing on strong academics. His mother expected him to earn straight A's. When Reid wanted money to buy things, his parents made him get a job. He worked at a water park when he was 15 and at Wal-Mart at age 16. He would work four to eight hours a week, even between his regular high school football practices. Sharon bought him a 2001 Honda Civic, which the family still owns. But Eric had one ultimatum, if he wanted gas to be able to drive the car, he'd have to learn to budget his expenses.
- In addition to instilling high character into Eric, his mother also made an impact on the gridiron. Sharon also played tackle football, spending one season for the Baton Rouge Wildcats of the Women's American Football League. She played tight end and defensive end in the full-contact, tackle league. However, the Wildcats only lasted one season when the team folded due to Hurricane Katrina.

In 2012, Rogers tallied 69 tackles and recovered 3 fumbles. In 2011, he earned 2nd-Team AP All-Pro honors and his first Pro Bowl selection as a starter. Rogers entered the NFL as the 9th overall pick in the 2005 draft by Washington, and went on to play six seasons for the Redskins, before signing a one-year contract with the 49ers in 2011. The Niners re-signed Rogers to a four-year contract on March 16, 2012, which runs through the 2015 season.



- One of the things Carlos misses most about his hometown of Augusta, GA, is the southern food. "Being from the South, I love soul food," said the veteran cornerback. Carlos looks forward to his parents cooking every year during the holidays for dishes suches as collard greens, mac 'n' cheese, sweet corn bread and chicken. One of the most feared pass rushers in the NFL, Aldon Smith has wreaked havoc on opposing quarterbacks since entering the NFL as the 7th overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and has tallied the second-most sacks in the NFL since that time, totaling 38.0. Smith registered 33.5 sacks through his first two seasons, the most by any player since sacks became an official statistic in 1982. Smith tallied 30.5 in his first 27 games, becoming the fastest player to reach the 30-sack mark in league history. In 2012, he registered 19.5 sacks, to set a single-season franchise record and rank second in the NFL. Smith's performance earned him First-Team All-Pro honors and his first Pro Bowl selection (starter). He was named NFC Defensive Player of the Month in November by notching 9.0 sacks in just three games. As a rookie, Smith led the team and all NFL rookies with 14.0 sacks, the second-highest total by a rookie in NFL history (Jevon Kearse, 14.5 in 1999).



- Recorded 5.5 sacks vs. Chi. (11/19/12), the most in *Monday Night Football* history. The total is the 2nd-most in a game in team history [Fred Dean - 6.0 vs. NO (11/13/83)]. Smith has 10.0 sacks in 3 career games on *MNF*, the most by any player on *MNF*, since 2011.
- Set the 49ers rookie sack record (14.0) in 2011, surpassing DT Charles Haley's mark of 12.0 in 1986. Smith's 14.0 sacks led SF and all rookies in 2011 and ranked t-5th in the NFL.

A relentless and explosive defender, two-time All-Pro Justin Smith anchors the 49ers defensive front. Nicknamed “Cowboy” for his blue-collar, Midwestern approach to his job, Smith is widely recognized as a leader in the locker room. In 2012, he was named Second-Team AP All-Pro at two different positions (DT & DE) after registering 130 tackles, 3.0 sacks, 1 FR and 2 PDs. His efforts also earned him his 4th straight Pro Bowl selection. In 2011, Smith posted 7.5 sacks and became just the third player in franchise history to register at least 6.0 sacks in four consecutive seasons. Since joining the 49ers in 2008, he has recorded 34.5 sacks and ranks 1st in the NFL among defensive tackles over that span. Smith’s 34.5 sacks also rank 2nd in franchise history among DTs to Dana Stubblefield (46.5). In 2010, he tied his career high with 8.5 sacks, matching the total from his rookie year in 2001. Smith was rewarded with a two-year contract in June of 2013 that will keep him in red and gold through 2015.

Adam and his family hosted a fund raising party at his home, where he invited the people who used the service dogs. The Snyder family also owns two retired service dogs as pets.
- Ever since his freshman year in high school, Adam has made annual camping trips into the middle of the desert with his family and friends. "We've been setting up camp at the same place near Chiriaco Summit for years. It's basically in the middle of nowhere and we just ride 4x4's and enjoy one another's company."

- Growing up in Whittier, CA, Adam lived a short distance from the coast. He and his friends would often make the short drive to the beach, where they'd spend some time soaking in the rays and surfing. Due to the cold water in Oregon, Adam didn't surf in college, but he picked the sport back up when he was drafted by the 49ers in 2005. "On one of my first trips to Santa Cruz, I met a local shaper named Doug Haut. He shaped me a board and it kind of took off from there. I surfed quite a bit my first couple years in the league and try to get out there when I can these days." Adam now has a collection of five surfboards – three 10-footers, a nine-footer and a seven-foot fish – that he rides at the local breaks. His wife, Erika, learned how to surf in Hawaii and the couple enjoys the sport together.
- Since his early childhood, Adam has had aspirations to one day become a police officer. "It's been a line of work that has interested me for a long time. I imagine the camaraderie you build between your fellow officers is similar to the solidarity that's created among teammates on a football team. Everyone has each other's back." If Adam has any questions about joining the force, he doesn't need to turn far. His good friend and former 49ers teammate, Patrick Estes, joined the Santa Clara Police Department. Adam went on ride-alongs to get an up-close understanding of what being a police officer entails.
- Adam gained good work experience growing up in Whittier. He briefly served as a doughnut filler at Krispy Kreme Doughnuts before working a seasonal job at Honey Baked Hams, where he unloaded 50-60 pound boxes of meat into the freezer. Adam's most enjoyable job was at Rockview Dairy. "It wasn't your ordinary dairy, like milk and eggs. It was actually like a grocery store, it had everything. The coolest part was that it was a drive-thru. You'd just drive up, place your order and I'd go pick out the items from the back. I think it's weird that I haven't seen a similar type of place anywhere else."

Tasked with the duty of protecting the quarterback's blind side, two-time All-Pro Joe Staley has excelled in his role since being selected as the second of San Francisco's two 1st-round draft picks in 2007. In addition to being named All Pro in 2011 and 2012, he was also selected to the Pro Bowl both years, earning the starting nod in the latter. Staley led an offensive line that helped the 49ers rush for 2,491 yards in 2012, ranking 4th in the NFL. As a rookie, he started all 16 contests at right tackle before switching to left tackle in his second year. A product of Central Michigan, Staley became the first player in school history to be drafted in the 1st round of the NFL Draft.

New head coach Brian Kelly and offensive line coach Jeff Quinn asked the young tight end to make the switch to offensive tackle. He agreed and the transformation began. The 250-pound tight end began to wake up at 2 a.m. to consume a 2,000 calorie weight-gaining shake and would later work out twice a day to prepare his body for its new life in the trenches. In the first offseason, Staley added 20 pounds to his lean frame. By the time he was a senior, he reached 290 pounds and went on to become the first Chippewa to be drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft.
- During his time in the NFL, Staley has been known to sacrifice his privacy to help accommodate his teammates. In the past years, he has invited many young players to live with him free of cost. The long list of tenants includes current 49ers FB Brit Miller. "It helps out some guys so they can just focus on football," Staley said. "They don't have to worry about the rent and where the money is going to come from."
- This offseason, Staley was an ambassador for San Francisco's first Electric Run, a 5K race that benefits Smile Train, the world's largest cleft lip and palate charity. The race, which was held at Candlestick Park, raised \$10,000 for Smile Train and more than 8,000 people participated in the event. "Anything that benefits children is just a great cause and I was very excited to put my name down for the charity and the event itself," Staley said.

Donte Whitner's athletic career almost ended before it even had a chance to start. When he was just 6 years old, he was hit by a car while chasing a ball into the street. With multiple fractures in both legs, doctors told his mother that he would never be able to walk normal again. Donte has used that story as motivation throughout his life to prove the doubters wrong. A first-time Pro Bowler in 2012, he recorded a career-high 119 tackles and 2 forced fumbles, while also scoring on a 42-yard interception return in New Orleans. In 2011, Whitner's first with the 49ers, he won the Garry Niver Award, which is given to the player who displays the most professionalism and cooperation in dealing with media. He was originally selected 8th overall in the 2006 NFL Draft by Buffalo and went on to help the Bills finish in the top 10 in pass defense in three of his five years (7th in '06, 2nd in '09, 3rd in '10) with the team.

Arguably the greatest linebacker in the game today, Patrick Willis' sheer athleticism and knack for the football make him an annual candidate for NFL Defensive Player of the Year. His superman-like performances week-in and week-out have contributed to the six-time All-Pro leading the NFL in tackles on multiple occasions. As the 11th-overall selection in the 2007 NFL Draft, Willis made an immediate impact as a rookie, earning First-Team All-Pro, Pro Bowl and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors. He has continued to build a resume that is destined for Canton. Not only has Willis been named All-Pro every year of his career, but he has also earned Pro Bowl recognition each season, becoming the only 49er to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of their first six seasons. A team captain in 2012, he ranked 2nd on the team in tackles (171) and finished the season with 9 PDs, 2 FFs and 1 FR. The leader of the 49ers defense was rewarded with a five-year contract extension that will keep him in the Bay Area through 2016.

// CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Became the first player in franchise history to be selected as an All-Pro in each of his first six seasons (First-Team - 2007, 2009-12; Second-Team - 2008).
- A six-time Pro Bowl selection (2007-12), was the only rookie to earn All-Pro honors in 2007 as he was named the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. He became the first 49ers defensive rookie to make the Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro since CB Ronnie Lott in 1981. // GOLDMINE

- Patrick and his siblings were separated from his biological father when he was 16. He moved in with his guardians, the Finleys, who were in their 20's when they took in Patrick and his three other siblings. Chris Finley was a math teacher and Patrick's basketball coach in high school. Julie Finley taught 5th grade. He refers to Chris and Julie as mom and dad.
- Patrick believes several of the jobs he held as a youth have made him into the hard-working person he is today. At the ripe age of 10, Patrick worked in a cotton field to help financially support his family. "My grandmother got me a job chopping cotton. I got \$110 a week for chopping the weeds around the cotton so it could grow." Patrick's next job was in masonry, where he would mix mortar for the building of structures. He then worked alongside his father, who was a logger. "I would use a chainsaw and cut the limbs off. It was a pretty crazy job, I would get cut up all over." When Patrick was a sophomore and junior in high school, he would perform general maintenance around the school, which included waxing all the floors on the property.
- Patrick was a standout basketball player at Central High School, where he averaged close to 20 points and 10 rebounds per game throughout his career. An all-district, all-region and All-West Tennessee selection, Patrick played every position on the court and was named the district's Most Valuable Player. It wasn't on the blacktop where he crafted his game, but rather on the dirt in front of his house. At the age of 7, Patrick, his brother and his dad constructed a basketball hoop from cedar planks. For the next 10 years, one could often find Patrick and his family playing toe-to-toe on that very same hoop. "That's what kept me busy. We didn't have sport clubs, malls or movie theatres nearby. All we had was each other."
- Competition is what has driven Patrick throughout his life. "I love to compete, no matter what sport it is. Basketball, baseball, football, golf, bowling, fishing, whatever. Basketball was my first love...I played everything, guard, forward, center. In baseball, I played everything too, except for catcher." Patrick set the record for most home runs in his Little League. He started playing golf with his dad, Chris Finley, when he was 16. "Even though I'm not too good, I love to compete."
- One of Patrick's biggest influences growing up was his uncle, Arthur Joe Willis, who was a professional light-heavyweight boxer from 1989-2000, and competed in 33 pro fights. Patrick looked up to his uncle because he was able to make a name for himself as a successful boxer. Arthur matched up against James "Lights Out" Toney in 1990, and Toney later went on to beat former heavy-weight champion Evander Holyfield in 2003.
- Since moving to the Bay Area, Patrick has been able to purchase a house of his own. "Buying my house in the Bay Area was awesome, truly a blessing. To grow up in a house like I grew up in and then now to have my real, own house that I can call home feels amazing. I'm truly grateful." Having his own house has served as a great place for his family to come and visit. Pat, being the leader he is both on the field and off, also uses his house to host team get-togethers to bring the guys closer together. "I think having get-togethers at my house, hanging out with teammates and getting to know them off-the-field is big. At the end of the day, one or two guys don't win as a team, three guys don't win as a team, the whole group does. And I think we've built a camaraderie hanging out like we did last year, having get-togethers, just bonding time because it's like family."
- Patrick has a variety of tattoos, with each carrying its own special meaning. One of his most inspirational tattoos is the word 'Believe' on his forearm. "When a person says 'I think,' I feel that leaves room for doubt. If I want to do something, I want to 'believe' I can do it, not just think." Patrick has three tear drop tattoos, which signify three significant people that have passed away in his life – his grandfather, uncle and brother.
- Tragedy struck Patrick's family right before his senior year at Ole Miss. His brother, Detris, drowned in a swimming hole when he was just 17 years old. Detris was a talented FB/LB who was heading into his senior year at Central High School and was a Division I-A prospect. In memory of his late brother, Patrick had the Superman shield tattooed on his chest. "We both loved Superman growing up. We were strong no matter what, but also had our weaknesses." Below Patrick's Superman tattoo reads, "My brother shall rise again." "I believe someday when my time on earth is over, I'll see him again."
- In 2007 and 2009, Patrick was named the recipient of the 49ers Bill Walsh Award. The Bill Walsh Award is voted on by the coaches and awarded to the 49ers team MVP. Willis is one of three players in franchise history to win the award twice (RB Frank Gore, DT Justin Smith).

The 49ers opened up the 2013 season with a 34–28 victory over the Green Bay Packers. After forcing Green Bay to punt after their first two offensive possessions, QB Colin Kaepernick connected with five different receivers during a 13–play, 83–yd. drive as he completed 6 of 7 pass atts. for 79 yds. The drive was capped off with a 20–yd. TD pass to TE Vernon Davis. Green Bay responded with a 6–play, 80–yd. drive of their own as QB Aaron Rodgers found WR Randall Cobb for a 5–yd. TD pass with 1:05 remaining in the first quarter. On the Packers next possession, 49ers LB NaVorro Bowman brought down RB Eddie Lacy at the GB 13–yd. line, forcing a fumble. The ball was recovered by 49ers CB Tarell Brown, marking the first FR of his career. Three plays later, QB Colin Kaepernick connected with WR Anquan Boldin for a 10–yd. TD to take the lead 14–7. The Niners defense forced a three–and–out on the Packers next possession, and after trading punts, the 49ers recorded their second takeaway of the game. Packers TE Jermichael Finley bobbled an Aaron Rodgers pass and 49ers rookie S Eric Reid made a finger–tip catch for the interception. Reid became the first 49ers rookie to intercept a pass on opening day since both DB Don Griffin and CB Tim McKyer each registered an INT at TB (9/7/86). The 49ers could not capitalize on their strong field position as K Phil Dawson missed a 48–yd. FG att. wide left. With less than two minutes left in the first half, QB Aaron Rodgers led the Packers on an 8–play, 62–yd. drive that was capped off by a 12–yd. TD pass to TE Jermichael Finley with just 0:16 remaining in the first half. The TD evened the score at 14–14 heading into halftime. On the opening possession of the second half, 49ers QB Colin Kaepernick completed 4 of 4 pass atts. to WR Anquan Boldin for 70 yds. before finding TE Vernon Davis on a 2–yd. TD. After two subsequent punts, QB Aaron Rodgers led the Packers on a 7–play, 69 yd. drive and connected with WR Jordy Nelson for an 8–yd. TD pass to knot the score at 21–21. K Phil Dawson made a 27–yd. FG, his first for the 49ers, capping off a 10–play, 71–yd. drive. After three–and–outs by both teams, the Packers took their first lead of the game, 28–24. WR Jordy Nelson hauled in a 37–yd. pass and rookie RB Eddie Lacy rushed five times for 26 yards, including a 2–yd. TD run. The lead would last just 2:39 on the game clock. RB Frank Gore found the end zone on a 1–yd. TD run to put the 49ers up 31–28. The Packers offense was forced to punt after a three–and–out. The 49ers faced a fourth and two at the GB 36–yd. line with 3:00 remaining in the game. The 49ers converted the fourth–down attempt when Kaepernick scrambled right and connected with Boldin for 15 yds. Dawson connected from 33–yds., extending the 49ers lead to 34–28 with just 26 seconds remaining. Needing a TD, WR Randall Cobb hauled in a 36–yd. pass on the first play, but was tackled by S Donte Whitner inbounds to keep the clock running. Following a spike to stop the clock with 3 seconds remaining, 49ers LB Aldon Smith rushed QB Aaron Rodgers forcing an incomplete pass as time expired. 49ers QB Colin Kaepernick completed 69.2% of his passes for a career–high 412 passing yds. and WR Anquan Boldin finished with 13 receipts. and a league–best 208 receiving yds.

QB **Colin Kaepernick** set the 49ers franchise record for most passing yards in a season opener as he completed 27 of 39 atts. for 412 yds., 3 TDs and a QB rating of 129.4. The previous mark was set by QB Steve Young, who threw for 363 yds. vs. NYJ (9/6/98)...**Boldin's** 208 rec. yds. set the 49ers franchise record for most rec. yds. on opening day. The previous mark of 169 rec. yds. was held by WR Jerry Rice vs. LA (9/5/94)...**Boldin** is the first 49er to register at least 10 receipts. in a game since TE Vernon Davis notched 10 receipts. for 102 yds. vs. Ten. (11/8/09)...TE **Vernon Davis** registered his 5th career multi–TD game, as he hauled in 6 recs. for 98 yds. and 2 TDs...**Davis'** 6 TD receipts. vs. GB are the most by a tight end in NFL history, according to STATS, Inc...**Davis** has tallied at least 1 TD receipt. in all five regular season games against Green Bay...RB **Frank Gore** notched his 52nd career rushing TD...Rookie S **Eric Reid** notched his first career INT off Packers QB Aaron Rodgers. The 49ers played in a hostile environment at CenturyLink Field and departed from Seattle with their first loss of the 2013 season. On their first drive of the day, San Francisco went three-and-out but the defense forced Seattle into a three-and-out as well. As the Seahawks lined up for their first punt of the day, S Craig Dahl came flying from the left side to register his first-career blocked punt. It marked the first blocked punt by the 49ers since LB Larry Grant blocked P Robert Malone's punt at NYJ (9/30/12). After moving the ball to the Seahawks 5-yd. line, QB Colin Kaepernick's pass was tipped into the air by CB Walter Thurmond and intercepted by S Earl Thomas. Just five plays later, Seahawks QB Russell Wilson threw a deep ball that was intercepted by 49ers rookie S Eric Reid. On the play, Reid became the first rookie since the merger in 1970 to record interceptions in each of the team's first two games. Neither team managed to put together a scoring drive during the first quarter, which was temporarily suspended due to severe weather with 3:13 remaining. After a one-hour delay, play resumed at 7:05 PM PDT. With 10:44 remaining in the second quarter, 49ers FB Bruce Miller was flagged for holding in the end zone, resulting in a safety. The Seahawks received the punt and quickly were forced into another three-and-out. Choosing not to punt, QB Russell Wilson was stopped for no gain and the ball was turned over on downs. Two plays later, QB Colin Kaepernick had the ball stripped from behind by DE Cliff Avril, which was recovered by LB K.J. Wright at the SF 29-yd. line. The 49ers defense stalled the Seattle offense forcing a 30-yd. FG by K Steven Hauschka, extending Seattle's lead to 5-0. On the opening possession of the second half, Seattle went on a 10-play, 80-yd. drive highlighted by a 51-yd. pass to WR Doug Baldwin, with RB Marshawn Lynch capping off the drive with a 14-yd. TD run. San Francisco responded with a 9-play, 71-yd. drive of their own, but was forced to settle for a 21-yd. FG by K Phil Dawson. Seattle moved right back downfield, aided by two 49ers penalties totaling 54 yds. With 13:51 left in the game, QB Russell Wilson connected with RB Marshawn Lynch on a 7-yd. TD pass, extending the Seahawks lead to 19-3. Following an INT by CB Richard Sherman, K Steven Hauschka made a 37-yd. FG. After a Seattle punt, QB Colin Kaepernick was intercepted by S Kam Chancellor, who returned it to the SF 2-yd. line. RB Marshawn Lynch found the end zone on the next play with a 2-yd TD run, making it 29-3 with 4:26 remaining in the game.

NOTES: S **Eric Reid** registered his 2nd INT of the season, picking off a pass by Seahawks QB Russell Wilson. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Reid is the only 49ers rookie, since the merger in 1970, to register an INT in each of the team's first two games. The last rookie in the NFL to register an INT in the team's first two games was Phi. S Nate Allen in 2010...DL **Glenn Dorsey** notched his first sack as a member of the 49ers, and the 5th of his career, bringing down Seahawks QB Russell Wilson...LB **Aldon Smith** brought down Wilson two times, giving him 3.5 sacks on the season and 37.0 for his career. This marked Smith's 10th career game, and first of the season, with 2.0-or-more sacks. The San Francisco 49ers dropped a hard-fought battle with the Indianapolis Colts at Candlestick Park, 27-7. Indianapolis took a 7-0 lead on their opening possession when QB Andrew Luck lead the Colts on a 7-play, 80-yd. drive that was capped off with a 1-yd. TD run by RB Trent Richardson. After a three-and-out by both teams, the 49ers responded with a lengthy 91-yd. scoring drive to even the score at 7-7. RB Frank Gore had 3 carries for 54 yds. and RB Kendall Hunter found the end zone with a 13-yd. run to finish off the longest scoring drive of the season for the 49ers. On the ensuing possession, the Niners defense stopped Trent Richardson for no gain, forced an incomplete pass by Luck and recorded a 7-yd. sack by DT Justin Smith to force a punt, but could not turn the next possession into points. With 7:00 remaining in the first half, Indianapolis recaptured the lead when K Adam Vinatieri converted a 43-yd. FG att. Eight minutes into the second half, the Colts extended their lead to 13-7 when Vinatieri split the uprights again on a 41-yd. FG att. The score remained 13-7 until the 4th qtr. Colts QB Andrew Luck capped off an 11-play, 80-yd. drive with a 6-yd. TD run. On the next drive, QB Colin Kaepernick was sacked at the 49ers 8-yd. line and fumbled which was recovered by Indianapolis. RB Ahmad Bradshaw found the end zone with a 1-yd. TD three plays later to make the score 27-7. Colin Kaepernick completed 5 of 8 passes for 64 yds. on the 49ers final drive before his final pass was tipped at the line of scrimmage and intercepted. The Colts wound down the final seconds off the clock with a kneel down.

The 49ers rebounded on the road with a rout of the St. Louis Rams, 35–11, on Thursday Night Football. The Rams got on the board first when K Greg Zuerlein converted a 40–yd. FG att. with 7:13 remaining in the 1st qtr. Following several punts back and forth, the 49ers responded with a lengthy 80–yd. TD drive. A 27–yd. rush by RB Frank Gore and a 42–yd. pass from QB Colin Kaepernick to WR Anquan Boldin helped move the 49ers within striking distance of the end zone. On 3rd and 19, Kaepernick found Boldin, who tiptoed the sideline and lunged into the end zone, giving the 49ers a 7–3 lead with 6:22 remaining in the 2nd qtr. On the ensuing possession, Rams QB Sam Bradford threw a deep ball into the end zone that was tipped into the air by CB Tramaine Brock and intercepted by S Donte Whitner for a touchback. Kaepernick connected with four different receivers as the 49ers moved the ball into Rams territory. After a first–down run on 3rd and 1 by Frank Gore was reversed, the 49ers chose not to kick on 4th down. Instead, the ball was handed off to Gore, who received great blocking and outran the defense 34 yards to the corner of the end zone to give the 49ers a 14–3 lead. The Niners forced a very quick three–and–out and received the ball at the SF 39–yd. line. With 0:04 remaining in the first half, K Phil Dawson attempted a free–kick 71–yd. FG, which missed wide left. On the second play from scrimmage in the second half, RB Frank Gore was stripped by Rams LB Alec Ogletree and the ball was recovered by S Rodney McLeod at the SF 44–yd. line. Despite the great field position, the Rams offense was stifled and was forced to punt. The Niners then went on an 11–play, 88 yd. TD drive, capped off with a 12–yd. pass from QB Colin Kaepernick to TE Vernon Davis to extend the lead to 21–3. With 11:18 remaining in the game, 49ers LB NaVorro Bowman sacked QB Sam Bradford forcing a fumble. After a scramble to recover the loose ball, 49ers DT Tony Jerod–Eddie pounced on it at the StL 3–yd. line. Two plays later, RB Anthony Dixon found the end zone from 1–yd. out. The Rams scored their first TD of the game four plays after a 49ers turnover when Bradford connected with TE Lance Kendricks for a 6–yd. score. After a successful two–point conversion, the 49ers lead was trimmed to 28–11. The 49ers were handed great field position after the onside kick attempt went out of bounds. The 49ers extended the lead to 35–11 when RB Kendall Hunter found the end zone with a 29–yd. TD run, marking the first time the 49ers have had three different running backs score a rushing TD in the same game since 12/2/01 vs. Buf. (Garrison Hearst, Fred Beasley, Paul Smith). The teams traded punts before Rams QB Sam Bradford knelt to end the game.

The 49ers earned their second consecutive victory by scoring early and often in a rout of the Houston Texans, 34–3. On just the third play of the game, 49ers CB Tramaine Brock intercepted a pass by Texans QB Matt Schaub and returned it 18 yds. for a TD. It marked his third-career INT and first-career TD. The Texans put together a lengthy drive on the ensuing possession, but came up empty handed when K Randy Bullock missed a 45-yd. FG att. wide left. The 49ers used the good field position to turn their first offensive possession into points. QB Colin Kaepernick completed 4 of 6 pass atts. for 45 yds. and RB Frank Gore finished off the drive with a 1-yd. TD run, making the score 14–0. The 12-play, 65-yd. scoring drive lasted 5:51, marking their second-longest drive of the season. Following punts by both teams, CB Tramaine Brock came up with another stellar defensive play. With 7:08 remaining in the first half, Brock broke quickly on a pass intended for WR Andre Johnson, tipped the pass into the air, and hauled in his second INT of the game. He returned it 13 yds. to the Hou. 32-yd. line and put the 49ers in prime position to extend their lead once again. Colin Kaepernick scrambled for 14 yds. and Frank Gore rushed twice for 16 yds., putting the 49ers just 2-yds. from the goal line. RB Anthony Dixon took the handoff and got into the end zone, extending the lead to 21–0. It marked the first time Dixon had recorded TDs in consecutive games in his career. The score remained 21–0 until the 3rd qtr. Texans QB Matt Schaub and RB Arian Foster played key roles in a 7-play, 43-yd. drive, that was capped off with a 41-yd. FG by K Randy Bullock. After punts by both teams, the 49ers began from the SF 41-yd. line. The Niners gained 39 yds. on 8 plays, including a 26-yd. run by Frank Gore, to get into FG range for K Phil Dawson. Dawson nailed a 38-yd. FG, his third of the season, extending the 49ers lead to 24–3. With :33 seconds left in the 3rd qtr., 49ers DT Tony Jerod–Eddie intercepted a QB Matt Schaub pass and returned it 6 yds. to the SF 31-yd. line. It marked the first INT by a 49ers defensive lineman since DT Ray McDonald returned an INT 31 yds. for a TD at Car. (10/24/10). Three plays later, QB Colin Kaepernick found TE Vernon Davis open down the left sideline and hit him in stride. Davis outran S Ed Reed into the end zone for a 64-yd. TD, marking the third-longest TD receipt. of his career [73t at StL (1/3/10); 66t at GB (12/5/10)]. The 49ers registered their fourth takeaway of the game on the Texans next possession. With 13:34 remaining in the 4th qtr., 49ers S Donte Whitner stripped the ball away from RB Ben Tate and recovered the fumble. As he got up to run, the ball slipped out of his hands and was recovered by CB Tarell Brown, who gained 16 yds. and was shoved out of bounds at the Hou. 16-yd. line. After three short runs, K Phil Dawson converted a 24-yd. FG, his second of the game, extending the lead to 34–3. The 49ers forced an unsuccessful 4th down att. by the Texans on their next possession and knelt down to run down the clock.

The 49ers defeated division-rival Arizona 32-20 to earn their third consecutive victory. On just the Cardinals third pass attempt of the game, 49ers rookie S Eric Reid jumped a short route over the middle to record his 3rd INT of the season. Reid returned the pick 53 yds. to the ARZ 7-yd. line and K Phil Dawson converted a 35-yd. FG att. four plays later to give the 49ers a 3-0 lead. Later in the 1st qtr., the 49ers defense stepped up with another takeaway as CB Carlos Rogers intercepted a deep pass over the middle and returned it 11 yds. to the ARZ 11. The Niners extended their lead to 6-0 when K Phil Dawson made a 26-yd. FG with 4:35 remaining in the 1st qtr. The Cardinals took the lead just 1:25 later when QB Carson Palmer connected with WR Larry Fitzgerald on a 75-yd. catch-and-run TD. The 49ers then engineered a lengthy drive, but QB Colin Kaepernick has his pass intercepted by Cardinals S Jeremiah Bell in the end zone and fell forward to the 1 yd.-line. Three plays later, the Niners regained the lead when rookie LB Corey Lemonier came on a speed rush and sacked Palmer in the end zone for a safety. Just two plays after receiving the ball following the safety, the 49ers extended their lead to 15-7 as Kaepernick found TE Vernon Davis sprinting downfield for a 61-yd. TD. On the ensuing possession, the Cardinals answered with a TD drive of their own. Arizona used two long pass plays to get into the red zone and RB Andre Ellington capped it off with a 15-yd. TD run to make the score 15-14 with 7:09 remaining in the first half. Late in the 2nd qtr., the 49ers put together the final scoring drive of the first half. QB Colin Kaepernick completed 3 of 3 pass atts. for 58 yds., including a 35-yd. TD pass to TE Vernon Davis, extending their lead to 22-14 at the half. Davis finished the first half with 7 receipts. for 171 yds. and 2 TDs. After receiving the ball to start the second half, the 49ers punted to the Cardinals who produced a nine-play, 61-yd. scoring drive. Carson Palmer connected with WR Michael Floyd for a 10-yd. TD pass, but a failed two-point conversion left the score 22-20. Despite a 32-yd. run by Frank Gore on the first play of the next series, the 49ers were forced to punt. The Cardinals used their next possession to drive again, but 49ers LB Patrick Willis stripped Fitzgerald at the SF 23-yd. line. The loose ball was scooped up by Niners S Eric Reid at the SF 11. After getting the ball back, the 49ers used an efficient pass game and a powerful run game to march downfield. On the eighth consecutive run of the drive, RB Kendall Hunter scored from 6 yds. out to extend the lead to 29-20. The 18-play, 89-yd. drive lasted an NFL season-long 9:32. The Niners defense forced the Cardinals' 4th turnover of the game just two plays into their next drive when Lemonier stripped Cardinals RB Alfonso Smith, which was recovered by 49ers LB NaVorro Bowman. K Phil Dawson made a 44-yd. FG, his 3rd FG of the game, to give the 49ers a 32-20 lead with 4:20 remaining in the game. The defense held the Cardinals from putting any points on the board to secure the 32-20 victory and move to 4-2 on the season.

The 49ers earned their fourth consecutive victory with a 31–17 win on the road over the Tennessee Titans. Following a defensive stop on the first series of the game, the 49ers got on the board when K Phil Dawson converted a 44–yd. FG to cap off a 12–play, 65–yd. drive. The two teams traded punts before the Niners extended their lead to 10–0 with 6:50 remaining in the 2nd qtr. QB Colin Kaepernick engineered an 8–play, 80–yd. drive and finished it off by finding the end zone with a 20–yd. rush. Just three plays later, 49ers CB Tramaine Brock intercepted a Jake Locker pass and returned it 10 yds. to the TEN 45–yd. line. The takeaway marked Brock’s 3rd INT of the season. Following a 20–yd. run by Kaepernick and a 20–yd. pass to rookie TE Vance McDonald, RB Frank Gore got in the end zone from 1 yd. out to extend the lead to 17–0. With the score, the 49ers had converted each of their last 12 takeaways into points (8 TDs, 4 FGs). On the opening series of the second half, Kaepernick completed all 4 pass atts. for 62 yds. and helped set up Gore for another 1–yd. TD run to cap off a 12–play, 79–yd. drive that lasted 7:40. Gore’s 2nd TD of the game, and 67th of his career, moved him past former RB Roger Craig for the 3rd most TDs in franchise history. The score remained 24–0 until the 4th qtr. as the Titans strung together their first lengthy drive of the game and got as close as the SF 4–yd. line before a 9–yd. sack by LB Ahmad Brooks forced them to settle for a 31–yd. The 49ers earned their fifth consecutive victory by defeating the Jacksonville Jaguars 42–10 at Wembley Stadium in London. It marked the 49ers second trip to London to play in the NFL's International Series, and improved to 2–0 at Wembley Stadium. The 49ers, now 6–2 entering the Bye week, started the game by driving 76 yds. on 8 plays en route to a 19–yd. TD run by RB Frank Gore. Following a punt by the Jaguars, the 49ers regained the ball and put together another lengthy scoring drive. Kaepernick capped off the 8–play, 80–yd. drive with a 13–yd. TD run after picking up key blocks from Gore and T Joe Staley to extend the lead to 14–0. The Niners defense forced a three–and–out by the Jaguars and their offense began right where it left off. With 11:52 remaining in the 2nd qtr., QB Colin Kaepernick connected with TE Vernon Davis in the corner of the end zone, capping off a 10–play, 62–yd. drive and extending the lead to 21–0. The 49ers forced another three–and–out and took over at the SF 37–yd. line. Kaepernick completed long passes of 31 yds. and 19 yds. to TE Vernon Davis before using his legs to score his 2nd rushing TD of the game from 9 yds. out. The 6–play, 63–yd. drive took 2:38 off the clock. Both teams punted before the Jaguars were finally able to put points on the board just prior to halftime. Jacksonville drove 61 yds. on 12 plays and K Josh Scobee converted a 38–yd. FG att., making the score 28–3 at halftime. The Jaguars put together another lengthy drive on the opening possession of the 2nd half. However, after getting inside the red zone, the 49ers forced an incomplete pass on 4th and goal and held the Jaguars out of the end zone. On the ensuing possession, Gore was stripped by Jaguars DE Jason Babin and the loose ball was recovered by LB Russell Allen. Three plays later, Jaguars QB Chad Henne connected with WR Mike Brown on a 29–yd. TD pass, trimming the lead to 28–10. All of the 49ers running backs played a key role on the next possession. RB Anthony Dixon took the kickoff 47 yds. to the SF 46, RB Kendall Hunter rushed for 41 yds. on the first play of the drive and RB Frank Gore found the end zone with a 2–yd. TD run. The 4–play, 54–yd. drive extended their lead to 35–10. Four plays into the Jaguars next series, 49ers LB Patrick Willis forced a fumble by TE Mercedes Lewis and the loose ball was recovered by LB Dan Skuta who broke a tackle and returned the fumble 47 yds. for a TD. It marked Skuta's first career TD and first career FR. The 49ers defense then forced another unsuccessful 4th and goal att. by the Jaguars and were able to run out the remaining 5:03 of the game. With Gore and Kaepernick each rushing for 2 TDs, it marked the first time in franchise history that a quarterback and running back each had 2 rushing TDs since 10/1/61 (QB Billy Kilmer – 2 TDs and HB–FB J.D. Smith). The 49ers have now scored 30–or–more points in each of the last 5 games, tying the franchise record set in 1994 and 1997.

NOTES: The 49ers improved to 14–6 on the road since head coach **Jim Harbaugh** took over in 2011, tying New England Patriots head coach, Bill Belichick, for 1st in the NFL in road win percentage during that span (.700)... The 49ers improved to 2–0 all–time at Wembley Stadium, becoming only the second NFL team ever to win multiple games in London (New England – 2)... LB **Patrick Willis** tallied his 2nd FF of the season, 16th of his career, as he stripped the ball from TE Mercedes Lewis. The fumble was picked up by LB **Dan Skuta** and returned 33–yds. for a TD. It marked **Skuta's** first career TD and first career FR... The 49ers have scored 30–or–more points in each of the last 5 games, tying the franchise record. The team also accomplished this feat in 1994 and 1997... The 49ers converted 6 of 9 third down conversions (66.7 pct.), the highest third down percentage by the team since 12/14/03 (6 for 9 – 66.7 pct. at Cin)... The San Francisco 49ers dropped a hard-fought, defensive struggle to the Carolina Panthers, 10-9. The Niners received the opening kickoff and drove 46 yds. in nine plays to set up a 53-yd. FG by K Phil Dawson, his season long. Following several non-scoring drives by both teams, the Niners sent out P Andy Lee to punt from the SF 30. His punt was tipped by Panthers LB Jordan Senn and traveled 22 yds. before deflecting off of Panthers CB Drayton Florence. The loose ball was recovered by 49ers S Eric Reid at the CAR 41. Five plays later, K Phil Dawson converted a 43-yd. FG att. with 13:38 remaining in the 2nd qtr. to extend the lead to 6-0. Each team punted before the Panthers took over at the CAR 43. With 9:10 remaining in the half, 49ers CB Tramaine Brock intercepted a pass by QB Cam Newton and returned the pick 41 yds. to the CAR 24. A few plays later, K Phil Dawson made a 25-yd. FG, his third of the game, to give the 49ers a 9-0 advantage. On the ensuing possession, the Panthers had an 8-play, 80-yd. drive, which was capped off with a 27-yd. TD run by RB DeAngelo Williams to make the score 9-7. The 2nd half started with a punt by each team before the Panthers drove 59 yds. and lined up for a potential go-ahead FG by K Graham Gano. However, the 48-yd. FG att. was pushed wide left. The score remained unchanged until the 4th qtr. when Panthers K Graham Gano converted a 53-yd. FG att. to give Carolina their first lead of the game, 10-9. The 49ers defense provided a big stop on the Panthers final drive to give the offense a chance at a game-winning drive, but the last minute drive ended with an interception thrown by QB Colin Kaepernick.

The 49ers dropped a back-and-forth game to the New Orleans Saints, 23-20, in the Superdome. The game started slowly for both teams as each of the first five series resulted in punts. The Saints began their third possession of the game at its own 3-yardline before driving 97 yds. in 11 plays, capping off the drive with a 3-yd. TD pass from QB Drew Brees to TE Josh Hill. On the ensuing possession, 49ers P Andy Lee punted 37 yds. to the NO 11, where Saints WR Lance Moore muffed the catch. Niners S Bubba Ventrone quickly jumped on the loose ball to give the 49ers excellent field position. Two plays later, QB Colin Kaepernick connected with WR Anquan Boldin in the end zone for an 11-yd. TD pass to even the score at 7-7 with 10:21 remaining in the first half. San Francisco regained possession after forcing a three-and-out. On the fifth play of the series, Kaepernick was intercepted by Saints CB Corey White. White returned the pick to the SF 1 before Kaepernick chased him down causing White to bobble the ball as he extended for the goal line. The loose ball went out of bounds in the end zone for a touchback and the 49ers regained possession. The Niners proceeded to drive 43 yds. in six plays and K Phil Dawson converted a season-long 55 yd. FG att. to give San Francisco a 10-7 lead. Following an 82-yd. kick return by Saints RB Travaris Cadet, New Orleans regained the lead when FB Jed Collins found the end zone for a 1-yd. TD run. The score remained 14-10 until the third quarter. On the opening possession of the second half, Niners LB Ahmad Brooks intercepted a Drew Brees pass and returned it 22 yds. to the NO 22. Three plays later, Colin Kaepernick found TE Vernon Davis for a 17-yd. TD. The 49ers defense came away with another takeaway on the next series. With the Saints choosing to go for it on 4th and 4 at the SF 40, S Donte Whitner broke up a pass intended for Josh Hill and the Niners regained possession. Kaepernick connected with WR Anquan Boldin on three consecutive third down atts., and K Phil Dawson made a 29-yd. FG to give the 49ers a 20-14 advantage. On the ensuing series, the Saints countered with a field goal of their own by K Garrett Harley, making the score 20-17 with 7:53 remaining in the game. After a San Francisco punt, the Saints took over at the NO 28. Several plays later, New Orleans faced a 3rd and 2 from the SF 35. LB Ahmad Brooks got into the backfield and sacked Brees, forcing a fumble. Despite LB Patrick Willis recovering the loose ball, the turnover was negated due to a penalty for a blow to the head and neck area of the quarterback. The Saints retained possession and tied the game with a 42-yd. FG from K Garrett Hartley. San Francisco was forced to punt on the next series and the Saints began from the NO 40. Six plays later, Hartley converted a 31-yd. FG att. as time expired to give the Saints the victory, 23-20.

CEO Jed York Feature Story

The Hail Mary in Santa Clara

Sitting at his desk at the 49ers' Silicon Valley headquarters, the din of a nearby construction project almost 20 years in the making reverberating into his second-floor office, Jed York holds two cuff links and begins to cry. He catches himself, though, his eyes red and glassy. He always catches himself. York -- by title the 49ers CEO, by inheritance the owner, by his own characterization the steward -- isn't a crier. He's an almost crier, and he seems to almost cry when talking about two things, usually when they intersect: his family and his stadium.

His family is both iconic and controversial in the Bay Area, a mixed legacy that enriches and burdens him. York is 33, and though he was born into one of America's richest families, the DeBartolos, he has scars. He feels deeply the pain of public humiliation for which he bears no fault but aches to fix. He carries himself with a self-awareness that is rare for an owner. He gives away tickets to games at NinersFanContest. During league meetings, while many owners enlist a flack to carry their ballot to a box, York always delivers his personally. He gives his employees the best rooms at hotels, even if it means he stays in one with two twin beds. He is grateful for his job because he's seen how fast it can all slip away.

His stadium is under construction, a skeletal shell just 14 feet away from the 49ers' offices. It is already famous in the stadium world for what it will be: state of the art, green and wired, of Silicon Valley as much as it is in Silicon Valley. Levi's Stadium is its official name, but locals call it the House That Jed Built, a 68,500-seat miracle that will open next fall.

A miracle. It's strange to ascribe that term to a \$1.3 billion building. But it fits. This particular stadium is being constructed in a region surrounded by cash-strapped counties, in a state that hasn't built a pro football venue in almost 50 years. It will open a year ahead of schedule. It will not only host the 2015 Super Bowl but house a Super Bowl contender, only four years after the 49ers were as irrelevant as the hopes for a new stadium were dismal. But beyond all that, the sharp clap of steel on steel emanating into York's office represents a wrong that he has spent years trying to right. The toll of that battle bubbles up in seemingly innocuous moments, such as when he opens a little box, colored 49ers scarlet, and tells the story of two cuff links.

Gold and weathered and shaped like footballs, engraved with a silhouette of a miner and the words 49ers Football, the cuff links once belonged to a woman named Josephine Morabito, whose family founded the team. In 1977 she gave them to Eddie DeBartolo -- "Uncle Eddie" to York, "Mr. D" to his players, the oldest son of Edward Sr., the late billionaire inventor of the modern mall -- after he purchased the team. Not really a cuff link guy, DeBartolo wore them only once, on Jan. 10, 1982, the day Dwight Clark made The Catch to send the Niners to their first Super Bowl. That was the beginning of the rise before DeBartolo's fall.

York skips forward to this past January, when he sat with Uncle Eddie in an Atlanta hotel the night before the NFC championship against the Falcons. DeBartolo gave the cuff links to York with a note that read, "It's your time to get what's yours."

As York speaks, holding the cuff links in his palm like dice, the pain he has spent years internalizing surfaces. His eyes dampen, and his mind drifts off. His office is both loud and quiet. Then he catches himself and puts the old gold back into the scarlet box.

Inside a baton rouge bar, a man slid a piece of paper across the table into the hands of Eddie DeBartolo Jr. It was March 1997. For years, DeBartolo had been courting former Louisiana Gov. Edwin Edwards, a longtime friend of his father's, hoping that Edwards could help him secure a state gambling license to open a riverboat casino. But Edwards had demanded a price, and the price kept rising. He wanted Super Bowl tickets and part ownership in the casino, and then, at the bar, he reached into his pocket and passed DeBartolo a note with the final charge: "\$400,000."

"This has to be taken care of by next week," Edwards said, "or there is going to be a serious problem with your license."

DeBartolo was scared, a rarity for a power broker so vain and combustible and generous. But Eddie and his sister, Denise DeBartolo York, had just begun to manage their deceased father's vast fortune of real estate, racetracks and the ultimate prize, the 49ers. DeBartolo had also launched his own real estate company, and he badly needed a successful development. His first project -- replacing the "pigsty" that he called Candlestick Park with a new \$400 million stadium and an adjoining mall -- was off to a rocky start.

DeBartolo had spent years lobbying San Francisco politicians and unions and environmentalists to secure a ballot measure to allow public funds for a new stadium to be built next to the old one. The vote was three months away, and polls showed him losing. DeBartolo was campaigning around town at all hours, visiting bars and union halls. His desperation seemed to cloud his judgment. He'd already given Edwards Super Bowl tickets and caved on the ownership stake, and though his advisers had warned him to stop dealing with a crooked former politician, he panicked at the bar.

"I'll take care of it," DeBartolo said. One week later, he handed Edwards a briefcase full of crisp \$100 bills, totaling \$400,000. That decision has haunted the DeBartolo family and the 49ers franchise ever since.

Three months later, in June 1997, Jed York, then a high school sophomore, woke up in his parents' Youngstown, Ohio, home to the news that his Uncle Eddie had won -- barely -- the measure for a new stadium. The oldest of Denise and John York's four kids, Jed didn't know much about stadiums, but he'd always been a favorite of both his grandfather and uncle. He had inherited some of their most defining traits: the elder Eddie's guts, the younger Eddie's temper. Uncle Eddie was his godfather, and they sort of look alike. Black hair, heavy eyebrows over warm eyes.

Jed always felt comfortable hanging with the big boys. At age 7, he would fly on his grandfather's private plane to 49ers games, playing gin with the adults on board, the hands sometimes eclipsing \$1,000. Even from a young age, Jed always wondered, What can I do to carry on the family legacy?

By the end of 1997, that question took on new significance when DeBartolo's payoff came to light. Turns out the feds had been wiretapping Edwards for months. The former governor was convicted on 17 counts of racketeering, and DeBartolo was charged with fraud. He pleaded guilty to failing to report a bribe, paid a \$1 million fine, ceded control of the 49ers to Denise and accepted a one-year suspension from the NFL. Any chance of a new stadium went down with him. "Louisiana killed it and hung it on a vine," says Carmen Policy, the former 49ers president.

But Louisiana did more than kill a stadium. It crushed the DeBartolo family and damaged the relationship between Eddie and Denise, igniting years of tension. It also changed Jed York's future in ways that as a teenager he couldn't have foreseen. In 2000 DeBartolo surprised everyone by declining to return to the 49ers following his suspension. There was just too much baggage. He and Denise divided the family assets: Eddie took the real estate holdings and relocated to Tampa; the Yorks got the 49ers.

The team was a train wreck, on and off the field. An iconic franchise had fallen from perennial Super Bowl contender to single-digit win totals, plagued by constant salary cap woes. The Yorks decided to start running the business prudently, an affront to Mr. D's tradition of lavishness. During home games at the eroding Candlestick Park, fans chanted "Fire the owner!" DeBartolo and John York traded barbs in the media. At one point, a few 49ers staffers removed some pictures of the former owner from the facility, whitewashing the past as dysfunction defined the present.

The only thing the two sides of the family agreed on was that the team desperately needed a new stadium. John York spent years trying to revive his brother-in-law's plan, but the area near Candlestick had neither the space nor the infrastructure for a new stadium and mall, and the city didn't have the money for fixes. In 2006 John York announced that the team was turning its attention to an empty lot in Santa Clara, 38 miles south of San Francisco. "We started over," he says.

The idea that the 49ers could leave the city infuriated fans. It also painted the owners into a corner: They had to make it work in Santa Clara, and they had to do so with little public support and no promises of public money; the construction costs would have to be privately financed as the U.S. economy was heading into the Great Recession. Still, John York cobbled together enough signatures and local support to get a ballot measure permitting the team to build a Santa Clara stadium, to be completed by 2015. The vote was scheduled for June 2010, and John York knew, as he says now, that to have a prayer of winning, the team needed "a fresh face."

So he handed the franchise over to his 29-year-old son.

"There's no template for this," Jed York says on an August morning, walking within the shell of the stadium.

Around him, 1,200 workers are busting their asses. York is wearing a hard hat and a yellow construction jacket over a black suit and scarlet tie. He talks about every nut and bolt of the stadium like a marketer would: energetic, polished, always on. He seems too young to be building a stadium, but he's been deeply involved in the franchise for almost 10 years. It's his team now. He's in control.

He reminded everyone of that recently when he stepped out in front of the situation regarding Aldon Smith, the star linebacker arrested for his second DUI in two years. Moments after a late-September loss to the Colts, Smith made a brief statement, apologizing and pledging to enter rehab. York then stood at Smith's locker to answer questions for him, taking the bullets so that Smith -- and coach Jim Harbaugh and GM Trent Baalke -- didn't have to. "I will take any shots that anybody wants to write about the organization," York told the media. "You can direct them to me, and I will support Aldon as long as he's willing to work at this and fight to get better." Players appreciate the little things York does, like attending the opening of Vernon Davis' art gallery and publicly backing Kyle Williams after his disastrous fumbles in the 2011 NFC title game.

York now realizes that he's spent his entire life preparing for this job. He graduated from Notre Dame -- just like his grandfather and uncle -- in 2003 and worked for two years in New York as a financial analyst. Then, in 2005, he shifted to the Niners and spent the next four years embedded in every facet of the organization. His parents gave him one responsibility: to learn, for York had known since his freshman year in college that one day he would take over.

And that's precisely what many San Francisco fans were afraid of. When York did assume control in 2009, he was viewed not as a savior but as the latest in a series of trust-fund debacles. Jed somehow needed to cast himself as a break from the past, even as he relied on his family for guidance. "His role was to perform well," John York says. "We stayed in the background."

Really, Jed's role was to sell the new stadium. Facing stiff winds, he consulted one of the few people who could relate: Uncle Eddie. "Treat it like a campaign," he told his nephew. York took the advice and dusted off his uncle's playbook. He spoke with voters at restaurants, bars and coffee shops, just as DeBartolo had in the 1990s. In one bar in the Castro, a patron asked DeBartolo, "How do you feel about gays?"

"Eh, you know," DeBartolo said. "I feel fine about them."

"Would you give me a kiss?"

"Well, it depends where you want to be kissed. But I'll do anything for a vote!"

York went even further than his uncle had, going door to door in Santa Clara. Four nights a week for a year, he entered strangers' houses, sometimes bearing coffee and cookies, where voters waited, armed with questions. Most residents were concerned about one particular topic: traffic. But others asked about York's first major decision, hiring Mike Singletary as head coach, a move that looked worse after each 49ers loss. Still others would just try to get under his skin by saying: "Your parents don't know how to run

a football team. You shouldn't run one either." One night, a voter got straight to the point, asking, "Are you really serious about building a stadium in Santa Clara?"

York replied: "I'm in your living room on a Friday night at 11 o'clock. I'm serious."

Some of his co-workers knew why he was so determined. York would say only vague things like, "My family didn't have a fun time from 1998 to 2000." But to those around him, the pain came through in brief flashes, his eyes glassing up when conversation turned to his parents or his uncle before he'd catch himself. They knew that he was really waging two campaigns -- one for the stadium, another for forgiveness -- and that in his mind they were intertwined.

York also has a personal goal: to get Uncle Eddie, who's won more Super Bowls than any other owner, inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The first step was to reintroduce him to fans. In 2009, at his first home game after taking over, York honored DeBartolo at halftime. It was the first time the 49ers had celebrated their former owner in more than a decade. Jerry Rice introduced him, and DeBartolo fought back tears as the crowd erupted, filled by a rush that had once sustained him. Then he returned to Tampa, back in the shadows, an exiled ghost, to advise from afar.

Meanwhile, York continued working coaches' hours, sleeping at the office. And his block-by-block canvassing gradually shifted public opinion. On June 8, 2010, ballot Measure J passed with 58.2 percent of the vote. York had the land. Now all he needed was a better football team.

And \$1.3 billion.

It was always an exercise in faith, this stadium. Though the reality that it's being built has long settled in, when York stands at the highest deck -- the Green Roof, as they call it -- he still seems in awe of the simple fact that it exists. Dude, we built a stadium! He peers over the ledge to a mass of dirt that next year will be the field. "It's going to be the coolest area in sports," he says.

And not only because of the amenities. The team is pretty good too. Strange to think that only a few years ago the 49ers were, as York says, "the worst team in football." The losing under Singletary galled him. In Uncle Eddie's style, York would explode after losses, punching holes in walls. After the 49ers dropped the 2010 opener against the Seahawks, York stalked into the San Francisco locker room and pounded a chair against a wall until it broke. "I knew at that point that we didn't have the right coach," he says. "And I was very upset."

He consulted his uncle, who'd burned through three coaches before hiring Bill Walsh. "If it isn't working, make the decision," DeBartolo told him. York fired Singletary in December that year and began an overhaul of the team's structure. York had a long conversation with Bill Belichick, who along with Patriots owners Robert and Jonathan Kraft had become an informal mentor. Belichick told York that before hiring a coach, he should answer a simple question: "What kind of football do you want to watch?"

York wanted a quarterback-driven team and a quarterback whisperer as coach, owing not only to necessity in today's NFL but to 49ers history. But mostly, he wanted a smart franchise. So York promoted the team's salary cap manager and analytics specialist, Paraag Marathe, to COO. He handed the GM job to Baalke, an unknown 49ers personnel director whose judgment he implicitly trusted. York told Baalke that he didn't want to be one of those owners who pick players but that he needed to play a central role in finding the right coach.

Together, York and Baalke targeted Harbaugh, the Stanford coach who'd emerged as a favorite for jobs with the Dolphins, Broncos and the University of Michigan. The 49ers interviewed him first, for five hours. DeBartolo called Harbaugh on behalf of his nephew, just to remind him of what happened the last time the 49ers hired a coach from Stanford.

At the interview, York made a curious decision: Rather than refusing to let Harbaugh leave unsigned, he intentionally allowed him to leave unsigned. York knew that Harbaugh's wife, Sarah, had just given birth.

"Give him some space," York insisted. That night, amid rumors that the Dolphins were sending a private plane for Harbaugh, York told his staff, "If it's meant to be, it's meant to be." The next morning, as York says now, "Jim chose us as much as we chose him."

One year later, Baalke would win executive of the year and Harbaugh would claim coach of the year as the 49ers reached the 2011 NFC title game. And they did it with Alex Smith, whom the team did not consider to be a franchise quarterback. The Niners brass had been grooming an unknown passer they thought could take the team even further. In the 2011 draft, Baalke and Harbaugh had traded up to pick No. 36 for Nevada's Colin Kaepernick -- a decision that was based in part on a proprietary study about college passers compiled by 49ers assistant coach Geep Chryst and Marathe. Many observers thought the mobile quarterback would go late in the second or early in the third. But he turned out to be more than a coup: He validated a belief system that dates all the way back to Walsh and Uncle Eddie.

The 49ers believe that draft picks are essentially coin flips, no matter the talent level of the players or the evaluators. So they simply play the odds by accumulating picks: The 49ers had an NFL-high 13 before this year's draft and will have 11 in 2014. The numbers allow Baalke to take risks, just as the 49ers did in the 1980s when they traded second- and fourth-round picks for Steve Young even though they already had a Hall of Fame quarterback in Joe Montana. So Baalke bundled the 45th, 108th and 141st selections to move up and snag Kaepernick, who as he says now "was the guy we wanted."

The 49ers were building something special, even if nobody except insiders could see it. York had sold the stadium to Santa Clara on faith. He had met with sponsors and season-ticket holders and completed the hundreds of tedious but crucial tasks for a new stadium by asking people to believe in him. Now York had to persuade one more crucial group of people to take a leap of faith with him: the bankers.

York knew the money men would play hardball. He was sitting in a New York skyscraper in the summer of 2011, having finished a pitch to a major bank. Seated next to him was his new team president, Gideon Yu, then 40, the former CFO of Facebook and YouTube whom York had hired with a clear mission: Persuade banks to loan \$1.3 billion to the franchise and an agency that would manage the stadium.

It was ballsy that York and Yu were even pitching banks in 2011. After joining the team, Yu -- tall and skinny, a fast talker and an even faster thinker -- had produced a stadium state-of-the-union report, detailing the reasons the project could meet York's 2015 deadline. Even with \$200 million from the NFL in startup money, York had to raise nearly \$1 billion over the next two years, more than twice what most owners borrow for new stadiums. But after he discussed with Yu the combination of low interest rates on loans, good projections on ticket sales and how Silicon Valley's young millionaires would buy expensive suites, he asked his team president, "Why can't we just do it now?"

By that, York meant accelerating the stadium opening to 2014. Yu felt it was a huge risk. To meet construction deadlines, they'd have to raise \$850 million in about a month. Yu reminded York that banks usually entertain such requests only once, and they would need to see how the loan would be repaid. But the 49ers were still working on sponsorships and had yet to sell any seat licenses. And if they couldn't sell hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of those licenses, the family might have to sell the team -- or, per league rules, the NFL could seize it and sell it -- to repay the loan. "That would be the consequence of a bad decision," Yu says now.

The public humiliation from losing the family's prized possession would be worse than Louisiana. But as York puts it, "If you believe in something, you're willing to take the risk." He and Yu set up 50 meetings in Manhattan with executives of the world's biggest banks and spent weeks working 18-hour days to prepare.

They were nervous, and they knew that the banks would try to exploit their desperation. In one of the first meetings, they got an offer to finance the entire \$850 million -- with a catch: The bank wanted to include naming rights, which were valued at more than \$200 million. York immediately said no. Yu sat next to him, astonished. York's entire life was riding on this deal, but after years of asking people to show faith in him, he showed confidence in himself and moved on to the next bank. The decision confirmed to Yu what

he had suspected when he left Mark Zuckerberg to join the 49ers: that his current boss was as wired to "take on the world" as his former one was.

Then it happened: A bank said yes to partially funding the stadium -- without getting naming rights. And then others began to follow. Emerging from one meeting in a 49th-floor conference room, York ran toward Yu and hugged him so hard that they fell over in the hallway.

A few weeks later, York took the call bearing the loan that put them over the top. This time, he actually did cry. "You just say, 'Wow,'" York says. "Nobody thought we could do this. We were literally the only people in the world who thought this could happen, and it did."

Several months later, in April 2012, York stood in front of a crane and a large crowd. He wore a three-piece suit, like his grandfather would have. When it was his turn at the podium, the crowd cheered louder than for anyone else. Leaning into the mic, he looked to his parents, seated in front. "I don't think anyone knows what you've been through to get this stadium built," he said. His eyes soon welled up, and he looked down, burying whatever was about to surface. Minutes later, York dug a gold shovel into dirt. Confetti fell. Everybody hugged.

One person was missing.

"He's the only one in the family who could do it," Eddie DeBartolo says. He's talking about Jed and the stadium, but he could be talking about the redemption of the team and family. DeBartolo is sitting in a TV room in his Tampa mansion; behind him is a showcase with his five Lombardi trophies glinting under spotlights. He's a young-looking 66, with about eight gray hairs. He's proud and remorseful. He says Louisiana was a "blessing in disguise," because it forced him to look clearly at himself and his life. He rebuilt the family's real estate business, and his net worth is now \$2.6 billion.

But as Policy, his friend of five decades, says, "I think he's bored stiff."

DeBartolo says he's had chances to buy another NFL team. Roger Goodell wrote him a letter making it clear that he is permitted to do so. But the travel, the stress, the losing, the caring for players as if they were his kids, the learning curve required to operate a modern team, the residual stains from Louisiana -- DeBartolo doesn't have the energy anymore. "It takes too much out of you," he says. "It's tough enough just, you know, existing."

He stays connected through Jed. He has told his nephew that his battles with Walsh weren't healthy and reminds York not to fire a once-in-a-generation coach just because they get on each other's nerves. And when York spent big on his coaches during last season's Super Bowl -- extra rooms, day care, even their own personal concierge -- it was very Eddie of him. "I see a lot of myself in Jed," DeBartolo says.

But Mr. D's identity is as an owner. And he can neither redeem himself through his nephew nor buy what he wants most: enshrinement into the Hall of Fame. Thanks largely to York's efforts, DeBartolo was a finalist last year. But the Louisiana shadow follows him, and his plan to outrun it has been to stay out of the spotlight. He rarely attends games, but he had so much fun at the NFC championship last season that he tore his meniscus. He just hopes that silence and time bring forgiveness.

His home is filled with trophies and pictures from his 49ers years. But there are no mementos from his 1997 stadium push. The pain of losing the stadium blends with the humiliation of losing his reputation, one casualty of many. He knows that if not for Louisiana he would have gotten that stadium, which might have cemented his legacy as the greatest owner in the history of sports.

Instead, in a storage room five minutes from his house, a crate contains a cardboard model of his old plans, white and gray. But the model, like the dream, is broken, incomplete. Earlier this summer, DeBartolo told one of his assistants to throw it away. "What am I going to do with it," DeBartolo says now, "build a stadium?"

For some reason, she never did discard the model.

Jed York's hurt is private, but it's also there for the world to see, if you look closely. He is proud of the new stadium. He carries himself a little bigger, as if the din of construction fills him like church bells. Back in his office, he describes the 49ers museum that will highlight the main entrance. York reverts into marketing mode, talking about all the bells and whistles, like framed Montana jerseys and interactive exhibits for kids. Then he mentions the statue that will be erected out front, a familiar face welcoming all. Suddenly, the pain and pride bubble up again, if only for a second, before he stuffs it back down.

The statue will be of Uncle Eddie.

Jed York the secret behind 49ers return to greatness

Imagine you are Jed York at 28 years old -- with a youthful face belying even those years -- and have been entrusted with one of the more storied franchises in the NFL, though one that has fallen on decidedly hard times.

The 49ers had suffered through a family tussle for control of the team, with a roster in disarray, cycling through coaches and saddled with one of the most out-of-date stadiums in the NFL.

You have inherited all of this under the massive shadow cast by your uncle, the beloved Eddie DeBartolo, once the boy genius of the league who began creating the 49ers empire as a 30-year old himself in 1977. And you take over at a time when your father, John York, was being questioned loudly for his stewardship of the club. The old guard of the NFL is skeptical you will be able to navigate much of this -- by appearances at least, you are overmatched. The future of the franchise seems bleak, the inter-familial dynamics are awkward and complicated at best and should you attain even a modicum of success advancing the cause of the San Francisco 49ers, well, that alone would be an accomplishment.

Now let's fast forward five short years, to the present. You suffered through some uncomfortable missteps -- the turbulent Mike Singletary era, for instance -- but followed your gut and stuck to your plan. You went on to assemble what some would call the strongest front office in the NFL, hiring a first-time general manager in Trent Baalke and nabbing a big-fish head coach Jim Harbaugh, who was widely sought after in the pro and college ranks. With that tandem you came one play from winning a Super Bowl last February in New Orleans, and, during Super Bowl week, managed to further reconnect the York and DeBartolo families, while also mending fissures with some 49ers greats from their dynasty days.

Your office now sits next a glistening state-of-the-art stadium that is set to open in 2014, overcoming steep odds to do so considering the state of the Bay Area economy and the extreme environmental hurdles California presents. Oh, and that facility (Levi's Stadium -- you also are primarily responsible for securing those lucrative naming rights as the point-person on that project from Day One) will host one of the NFL's all-time crown jewels, Super Bowl 50.

You are a father now with a young family, and you are hardly satisfied, still eager for that first ring of your own, and deflecting all attention and accolades to those who work under you. But make no mistake, the rebirth of the 49ers is a decidedly Jed York creation, and given the dynamic manner in which he has led this ascent, there is every reason to believe that York's ultimate vision for a franchise that once again wins multiple Super Bowls will one day come true.

"It's really all Jed," said Paraag Marathe, the 49ers COO and someone who works very closely with York. "He deserves a ton of credit. Everything we've achieved, this is all his vision. He's just got the 'It' factor. He just sort of always has a great pulse on what's coming next, and the other thing is he doesn't get flustered. He's always calm despite how bad things might get.

"His compass is always pointing North. It's always pointed in the right direction, man. I'm not sure where he gets it from, but he's so wise beyond his years. You really feel like sometimes you are working with someone who has the maturity and knowledge of a 50-year old."

York has clearly come into his own.

This vision of his -- a term you hear used by those throughout this organization -- has included shunning groupthink, being cunningly aggressive, taking some chances, and addressing issues head-on. Where in the past it might be unusual for players much his elder to be working for him, it's no longer even worth noting. When York, who chooses his times to address the full team quite judiciously, commanded the attention of the players on the flight back to San Francisco following their heartbreaking loss to Baltimore

in the Super Bowl, telling them how proud he was of them, how inspired he was by them and how certain he was that they would back in the title game again in a year, he did so emboldened by the fact that all 53 men believed in the young owner.

"That was one of the moments," said long snapper Brian Jennings, the longest-tenured 49er entering his 15th year with the club, "where for him as the leader of the organization he was taking those steps. It doesn't have to be publicly and it doesn't have to be regularly, but you could just see he was understanding the weight that his voice does carry. When ownership speaks it does carry weight for him to make certain comments at certain times. And for sure this organization is moving in the correct direction. Jed has this set up to thrive for years to come."

Jennings can remember York as a teenager, literally, having been here since 2000. "They were kids when I got here," Jennings said, who saw first-hand the crumbling of San Francisco's dynasty and lived through the worst of times. He speaks of York's accomplishments with part astonishment, the rare long-snapper who shares something of a personal relationship with an NFL owner. "We converse on a personal level that I really appreciate."

Jennings saw the transition from the end of the DeBartolo era -- where spending lavishly and bestowing every creature-comfort imaginable upon the players was the norm -- to the more stoic, much more fiscally-restraining period when John York took over. Things were far less whimsical, a quiet pragmatism replacing magnetism in the owner's box. And the 49ers became also-rans.

From 2003-2010, a span of eight seasons, a franchise that won five Super Bowls from 1981-1994 failed to finish above .500, with a combined record of 46-82.

"In hindsight, you can see we really weren't built to have success in some of those years," Jennings said. "And there's a lot that goes into that. It's not all simple solutions."

Animosity brewed between some of DeBartolo's Golden Boys and the new breed of ownership. There were complaints about not nearly enough money being spent, an inability to connect with the Yorks, who seemed disengaged to some. The old guard felt alienated; new stars and free agents no longer strove to be a 49er. This is the cauldron that Jed York stepped into when he assumed the team's presidency in 2008.

"You have no idea how bad it was," one former high-ranking official said. "Jed saved the day, because if things stayed the way they were, I think they would have crashed and burned. Jed was a Godsend. He listens to new ideas, he's open-minded, he's current. He was able to get the team to spend more money. He's not a vindictive guy."

With their lack of success for that period of time, the York's were ripe for criticism. However, as others are quick to point out, give John York (married to Eddie DeBartolo's sister, Denise) credit for having the gumption and great sense to give his son such power at such a young age and at such a critical time in the team's history. And, lest we forget, it's not as if Jed isn't close to his parents. They have been sounding boards and provided a foundation upon which he has helped steer the team to greater prosperity on the field and off. Some of these spoils must be shared as well.

"It should be pointed out that Dr. York did some good things, too," said Baalke, entering his ninth year with the team. "Jed just brought a passion and a vision; he brought an understanding to the organization that has energized it."

The turnaround began with the assembling of this front office.

Following Mike Singletary's meltdown as head coach in 2010 (with Jim Tomsula finishing the season in that role on an interim basis), York out-manuevered the Dolphins and several top college programs to secure Harbaugh, already in the Bay Area at Stanford. After interviewing a bevy of more experienced previous general managers, Baalke was promoted to that position and Marathe, already with a big role in

business, ticketing and stadium affairs, was by then serving as the team's chief contract negotiator as well.

It wasn't particularly conventional, but was fitting a bold streak that Marathe describes as a "carefully aggressive strategy."

"Think about it," Marathe says, "bringing in coach Harbaugh, having the resolve to hire Trent as the GM when Trent at that time in league circles was a relative unknown, but knowing Trent had the chops to be a really good GM. Shoot man, giving me a chance and putting me in charge of contracts without a ton of experience seven or eight years ago, even down to securing the naming rights [to Levi's Stadium]."

Baalke said: "Any time you're dealing with the acquisition of talent -- and I don't care at what level -- there is risk involved, there is unknown involved, and what is your risk-tolerance? Obviously, Jed's is very high."

The 49ers' tremendous success in the draft (punctuated by landing quarterback Colin Kaepernick in the second round in 2011), their willingness to be proactive in getting key players signed to long-term extensions, and their ascent to the NFC Championship Game in 2011 and the Super Bowl in 2012 are well documented, with a roster comprised to maintain competitiveness into the future.

Jed York, who was not with the team today while tending to business in New York, also became the more gregarious, lively, outgoing conduit of ownership, opening a dialogue with fans on Twitter and elsewhere with personal touches like using a black-and-white picture of him as a child next to Bill Walsh and DeBartolo as his avatar for a spell. He was working behind the scenes to repair the 49ers brand with their legion of great former players and to restore relations between the Yorks and DeBartolos, with fissures dating back to when Eddie DeBartolo's legal problems eventually led to him ceding control of the team to Denise in 2000.

When the 49ers established their Hall of Fame two years ago, Jed made Eddie D the first person inducted and reunited the families at a big gala in downtown San Francisco. Jed York has been eagerly involved in a media campaign to get DeBartolo into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, making the rounds at radio row during Super Bowls (unless, of course, his team happened to be playing in it). During long road trips, with multiple games on the East coast, the 49ers have spent the week between games training in Youngstown, Ohio, where the DeBartolo family was based.

DeBartolo was the 49ers' honorary captain at the last two NFC Championship Games, and photographers captured the sheer emotion in the post-game celebration this year as DeBartolo handed the trophy to the Yorks, Jed's uncle, mother and father in harmony as the 49ers headed back to the Super Bowl for the first time since 1994. Jennings, who actually played on DeBartolo's last team as owner, with Steve Mariucci as head coach and Walsh still running the draft, was particularly touched.

"For the Jed/Eddie relationship, and whatever that is, I think it strengthens us as an organization on a national scale, on a large scale," Jennings said. "That's something I for one am so happy to see ... I think it makes us stronger when Eddie is involved -- to whatever appropriate extent Jed sees fit -- and the legendary players, to whatever extent they can be involved, it definitely makes us stronger.

"I agree, it did seem to be an awkward situation for a period of time, and it seems to be that Jed had said, 'Wait, at the very least we want to make peace in a way that strengthens us.' And I think he's pulled that off miraculously."

Mariucci, the last coach prior to Harbaugh to take the 49ers to the playoffs and still a fixture in this community, put it this way: "Jed is doing a remarkable job of bringing the organization back to where it should be."

As one former 49er player pointed out, things aren't entirely back in order, noting that DeBartolo's connection with Jed has brought some former stars back into the fold, but "there is still some fence-

mending that needs to be done," he said. "Jerry [Rice] still doesn't come around. There is still some distance with some of the older guys."

But there were plenty of former old 49ers in New Orleans last year as they prepared for the Super Bowl, and few would be surprised to see even more in New York next February with San Francisco a legit favorite to land another world championship. And if that day comes, this sixth Lombardi will belong to Jed York more than anyone else, though the man himself would never contemplate it on that level.

Disciples of Ditka cultivate respect as coaches

As an NFL coach, Mike Ditka was known more as a motivator than innovator.

His no-nonsense, straightforward style echoed his Hall-of-Fame career as a rugged tight end, which earned him the nickname "Iron Mike."

Now, 14 years after he coached his final game, Ditka's legendary passion could help explain why 16 percent of the NFL's head coaches are his former Bears players: San Francisco's Jim Harbaugh, Carolina's Ron Rivera, Minnesota's Leslie Frazier, St. Louis' Jeff Fisher and New Orleans' Sean Payton, who played for Chicago during the 1987 NFL strike.

In advance of the 49ers' meeting against the Panthers on Sunday, a game that will pit two ex-Bears teammates, Harbaugh was asked to account for Ditka's extensive coaching tree. He began by mentioning Ditka's own fiery coach with the Bears, who doubles as one of the NFL's founding fathers.

"If I had to pinpoint one thing, I would say the legendary George Halas," Harbaugh said to the North Carolina media. "We all came to know the legendary George Halas through the qualities of Mike Ditka."

In other words, those ex-Bears have coaching bloodlines that date to the creation of the NFL. Halas, a charter member of the NFL Hall of Fame in 1963, had a 40-year coaching career that began with the 1920 Decatur Staleys, who became the Bears, who are one of the two original NFL franchises still in existence.

Given that history, perhaps it's not surprising that Harbaugh and Rivera, a former linebacker, lead bruising teams that would make the early-1940s-era Bears, the original "Monsters of the Midway," proud.

Entering Sunday's meeting, the 49ers (6-2) and Panthers (5-3) have positioned themselves for the playoffs thanks to some tried-and-true ingredients: a punishing run game and suffocating defense.

In an increasingly pass-happy league, both teams' reliance on the run is almost archaic: San Francisco, which leads the NFL in rushing, and Carolina, which ranks eighth, are two of three teams in the league with more rushing attempts than passes.

Meanwhile, their defenses both rank among the NFL's top four in points allowed led by the type of run-stuffing linebackers, such as Dick Butkus and Mike Singletary, who have dotted the Bears' history. The 49ers boast All-Pros in Patrick Willis and NaVorro Bowman, while the Panthers are headlined by Luke Kuechly, the 2012 Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Former Bears wide receiver Tom Waddle, who played with Harbaugh and Rivera, says it's no accident two Ditka disciples lead sock-you-in-the-mouth teams. But Waddle stressed his former teammates are also savvy and forward thinking. Halas and Ditka, after all, didn't have new-age quarterbacks such as the 49ers' Colin Kaepernick or Carolina's Cam Newton running the read option.

"They certainly both have those old-school kind of teams," said Waddle, who co-hosts a sports radio show in Chicago. "And they're both talented and smart enough to adapt the talent on their rosters to the style they would play."

"If they found themselves with a group of players to where the passing game would be more effective, they could transition to that. But as their rosters are currently constituted, it lends itself to playing an older brand of football. And you're definitely seeing that."

Waddle also sees teams that play with a passion tied to their relationship with their head coaches.

In his two-plus seasons with the 49ers, Harbaugh has never criticized a player to the media, and his coaching style, while demanding, is heavy on positive reinforcement. As for Rivera, in his third season in Carolina, Panthers defensive end Kevin Hardy said his coach's honesty and candor have won over the locker room.

"People and players respect that," Hardy said to the North Carolina media. "That's how you get people to play for you."

To Waddle, that sounds familiar. Despite his hot temper, Ditka, he says, earned his players' respect with transparency and loyalty.

"I think what you have in Jim and Ron are two guys who have the respect and admiration of their rosters," Waddle said. "I always felt the essence of Mike Ditka was his belief in the two most important commodities between a coach and players, loyalty and honesty."

"In a sport that's so vicious, so physical, as long as you have loyalty and honesty, there's a mutual respect. Even though tough decisions have to be made, I think the tone is set by the head coach. And I think both use some of what they learned in playing for Mike Ditka in their own style."

Harbaugh in full military mode in London

When Mike Singletary vowed that his struggling 49ers would have their "finest hour" in London three years ago, he didn't realize he was quoting the greatest Briton in the past 100 years, and on British soil no less.

Singletary's successor won't make the same oversight.

Hanging above the desk of 49ers coach Jim Harbaugh in Santa Clara is a framed black-and-white photograph of Winston Churchill flashing his signature "V" for victory sign at the end of World War II.

Harbaugh sips coffee from a mug featuring Churchill's likeness. Harbaugh's bookshelf is full of Churchill biographies, including William Manchester's three-part "The Last Lion" series. And when Harbaugh wants to inspire a team or punctuate a moment, he borrows from the former British prime minister and famous orator.

In fact, Harbaugh quoted Churchill in the team huddle after practice Friday, hours before the 49ers set off on a two-week trip that includes this Sunday's game against the Jacksonville Jaguars in London: "History will be kind to us because we intend to write it," he told his players.

Did any of them pick up on the reference?

"There were nods," Harbaugh said with a laugh. "(Linebacker Nate) Stupar nodded."

The 49ers will practice this week at a country club in Watford, north of London. The players, and especially the coaches, won't have much time to tour the city.

But Harbaugh said one of his goals is to see the underground cabinet war rooms on Downing Street, where Churchill and his staff ran Britain's World War II efforts during the Blitz. After all, he'd like to pay homage to his favorite historical figure.

"The perseverance. The titanium in the spine. The iron will. The character," he said. "If our leaders in D.C. had half that character, it would be a different world right now."

Harbaugh's knowledge – and his quotations – extend beyond Churchill. He is a military history buff with books on the Civil War and 20th-century conflicts atop the stack on his bedside table.

Family members say his love of history began in Mrs. Hiller's fifth-grade class at St. Francis of Assisi in Ann Arbor, Mich.

"You know how there's always one teacher who sparks your interest, really opens your eyes?" his father, Jack, said. "For Jim, that was Mrs. Hiller."

Harbaugh's interest grew deeper when he realized his two coaching idols – Michigan's Bo Schembechler and especially Ohio State's Woody Hayes – were history nuts.

Hayes was fascinated by Gen. George S. Patton and was friends with President Richard Nixon. He taught military history at Ohio State.

"He had a deep, abiding respect and appreciation for the military," Harbaugh said. "And therefore I, through Woody Hayes, have come to have the same deep, abiding respect and appreciation for the military and its correlation with the game of football."

That correlation can be a delicate one. A number of players and coaches have been chided in recent years for referring to themselves as soldiers and linking themselves to the military.

For Harbaugh, however, it's not mere lip service. He has brought in four-star generals and servicemen to speak to the team, and before the 49ers played the Redskins last season, they visited Arlington National Cemetery.

Col. Jim Minnick, a friend since the eighth grade, has spoken to Harbaugh's teams on several occasions. Minnick, in fact, was on hand as the 49ers went through their final walkthrough in a hotel ballroom before they faced the Chiefs in the preseason. Afterward, Minnick told Harbaugh he liked the "ROCK" the 49ers performed.

"Rock? What rock?" Harbaugh asked Minnick.

"Rehearsal of Combat Knowledge," Minnick replied.

Harbaugh and the 49ers have since referred to the team's final preparation as a ROCK instead of a walkthrough.

"There's a lot of parallels there, in my opinion," Harbaugh said. "And the military, the American military, they've been doing it for 400 and something years. They've been doing it a lot longer than we've been doing football. So we definitely can learn a lot from them."

NFL coach teaches faith, football to Peruvian kids

Jim Harbaugh, coach of the San Francisco 49ers, recently completed a one-week mission trip to Piura, Peru, where he taught poor children about their Catholic faith and American football.

This is the fifth consecutive year that Harbaugh – whose team made it to the 2013 Super Bowl before losing to the Baltimore Ravens, coached by Harbaugh's older brother – has volunteered at the Peruvian parish of Santísimo Sacramento, which means Most Holy Sacrament.

The parish's pastor is Fr. Joseph William Uhen, an Oklahoma native serving in the Archdiocese of Piura. Harbaugh has been volunteering with Fr. Uhen since his time coaching at Stanford University.

This year, Harbaugh lead a group of Californian missionaries who helped build houses, visit the poor, the elderly and those jailed at the Río Seco prison, and successfully teach football to kids in a country dominated overwhelmingly by soccer.

"Jim's not a big vacation guy, but he's never going to miss this trip to Peru," said John Feuerborn, the coach's brother-in-law, who accompanied him on the recent trip. "It's a different side of him people don't see."

Harbaugh has been a supporter of the Family to Family Program, created by Fr. Uhen to help some 1400 Peruvian families receive monthly support from their "Padrinos," or Sponsor Families. Each month, the Padrinos donate \$25 to give their Peruvian families the food they need.

"A relationship of faith, hope, and prayer is established and occasional letters and photos are interchanged," Fr. Uhen explained.

"This charity provides more than bodily nourishment, it provides hope and affirmation that they are indeed loved and worthy of being cared for," he said.

According to Harbaugh, his trips to Piura are some of "the best experiences of my life."

"My experience in Piura is a great spiritual time for me," he said. "I feel God's presence with the people of Piura...the children, the farmers, and the sick."

"Teaching American football to the kids gave me overwhelming joy and happiness, and Father Joe's sermons move me each and every Mass and give me inspiration to live life abundantly and that things are possible through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."

The Archbishop of Piura, Jose Antonio Eguren, presided at a Mass on Super Bowl Sunday this year for players and coaches of the 49ers in New Orleans.

"At the end of the very emotional Mass, just a few hours before the Super Bowl game, Jim told the players and his assistants: 'if you really want to have a life changing experience, go to Piura, visit the Archdiocese and the parish of Santísimo Sacramento,'" Archbishop Eguren told CNA.

Defensive Line Coach Jim Tomsula Feature Story

49ers' Tomsula back to where it all began

Before 49ers defensive line coach Jim Tomsula was one of the NFL's most respected assistants, he was an entrance-mat salesman working on straight commission who wasn't being paid a penny to do what he loved: coach at Division II Catawba College in Salisbury, N.C., as an assistant.

It wasn't the best of times for Tomsula, then a 29-year-old husband and father of two young daughters, and matters only figured get worse. The entrance-mat company was about to go under so he began calling Kmart, where he hoped to land contracts buffing their floors after closing time.

Instead, someone called Tomsula. And his career in professional football was improbably launched.

The call came from Lionel Taylor, a former NFL wide receiver who was the head coach of the England Monarchs in NFL Europe. Taylor's question: Did Tomsula want to coach his defensive line in London? Tomsula's response: Get the heck out of here.

"I really thought he was messing around with me," Tomsula said. "I really thought it was some type of gag ... Well, it turns out he wasn't messing around."

This week, Tomsula, 45, is back in the country where it all started in 1998, preparing for the 49ers' meeting on Sunday against the Jaguars at Wembley Stadium in London. Taylor's call launched Tomsula's nine-year career in NFL Europe. After one season in London, he went to Edinburgh, Scotland (Scottish Claymores), Berlin (the Thunder) and finished in Dusseldorf, Germany, where, at 38, he became the league's youngest head coach when he led the Rhein Fire in 2006.

He's now the 49ers' longest-tenured assistant, the only coach on staff to work for Mike Nolan, Mike Singletary and Jim Harbaugh. On Wednesday, Harbaugh said his decision to keep Tomsula around was a no-brainer when he arrived in 2011.

"It was a very easy decision after speaking with him," Harbaugh said. "He's had a special gift of presence, personality, of teaching ability and that came shining through. I remember that first meeting. And that's one position I've just never had to worry about since I've been here as the head coach."

Tomsula may have received his big break in 1998, but that didn't translate into big bucks.

He and his wife, Julie, didn't have \$200 in their bank account when they moved the family to Croydon, in south London, and took up residence in a hotel room with a king bed and a pull-out couch for their daughters.

"You'd put a towel on the floor," Tomsula said. "Then you get the cheeses and the bread and put it on the things. And then you sit around and have a picnic in the room. Honest to God, that's the way it was."

Tomsula, who constantly credits Julie for her unwavering support, didn't mind the paycheck-to-paycheck existence. He was so passionate about coaching he would have worked for free, which he'd recently proved at Catawba.

Fifteen years later, Tomsula's zeal for his job apparently hasn't waned. Last week, he was posed with a significant challenge when rookie nose tackle Quinton Dial, who had been sidelined since undergoing toe surgery in January, was promoted to the 53-man roster. Then, after just three NFL practices, the fifth-round pick debuted in 31-17 win over the Titans on Sunday and played seven snaps.

The race to get the rookie ready required intense instruction. And Tomsula was thrilled.

"It makes my blood pump," he said. "I mean, I love it. I love it. That's what you do, you know? You're coaching."

Not surprisingly, Tomsula was similarly stoked to begin tutoring one of the biggest projects in recent NFL history: defensive lineman Lawrence Okoye.

Okoye, the British record holder in the discus, had never played football until this spring, but his eye-popping size and athleticism inspired interest from several teams willing to sign the neophyte. Why the 49ers?

"Jim was the complete, 100 percent, the reason I chose to come here," said Okoye, who is on injured reserve and won't play this season. "He instilled so much faith in me and he's proven over the last few months that he's committed to making me better. When I saw him, I met him, he made that clear to me in a way that other coaches and other personnel people hadn't. And I'm 100 percent committed to Jim and I'm going to make sure that I prove him right."

The self-deprecating Tomsula deflects such praise. He's famously fond of referring to himself as "Jim Nobody From Nowhere."

But Tomsula and his family, which now includes a son, have been everywhere: from the Vatican, to the Mediterranean, to the Super Bowl.

It all started with that phone call from out of nowhere. Tomsula still doesn't know who offered his name to Taylor, who has kept the matter a secret. Left to guess, Tomsula has an idea who was working on his behalf.

"I'm a good Catholic kid," Tomsula said. "To me, God takes care of everything. I don't give anyone religion lessons, but, personally, yeah, that's the deal, man."

49ers assistant Tomsula has a world of experience

Jim Tomsula has searched for NFL prospects in Belarus. He's held clinics on American football in Zurich, Paris and Rome. He's helped run kicking camps in Cancun.

Which is why British former Olympian Lawrence Okoye, who hadn't played a snap of football until Friday, figured San Francisco was the ideal spot for launching an NFL career.

"His background coaching guys in NFL Europe (who had) minimal experience in the game was a big contributing factor to my decision," Okoye said of Tomsula, the 49ers' defensive-line coach. "It made me realize that if these other guys can do it, there's no reason why I can't do it."

The comfort level is mutual.

Tomsula not only coached in NFL Europe from 1998 to 2006, he spent his offseasons as a quasi football missionary. He taught the sport to young men who had never buckled on a football helmet while globe-trotting in search of athletes who could be converted into American football players.

Sometimes the prospects came to him.

Ten years ago, Tomsula coached a clinic in Germany at which one of the standouts was a 13-year-old boy named Bjoern Werner. Last month, the Colts drafted Werner, who played defensive end at Florida State, 24th overall.

Rugby players, obviously, had skills suited for football. Track and field athletes were good targets, too. British track star Dwain Chambers, for example, had a short stint at wideout with the Hamburg Sea Devils of NFL Europe before the league folded in 2007.

Other leads were more vague and required more detective work.

One summer, Tomsula headed to a town in Belarus because the league received a tip there was a promising athlete there.

"We had no idea what the guy looked like," he said. "The only thing we knew was that he had a tattoo on the inside of his lower lip."

Tomsula said the experience taught him how to evaluate athletes with no football experience.

He said he remembered scouting a big rugby player from Southampton, England, named Tom Tovo. The first thing Tomsula noticed was that Tovo turned his head when he tackled. Observing from the sideline, Tomsula turned to the man next to him and said Tovo was afraid of contact.

No, he was told. That's how rugby players are told to tackle.

"So I got taught how to look at these guys," he said. "You have to know their background, their culture."

Tomsula wants to tamp down the expectations on Okoye, a former rugby player and discus thrower whom the 49ers signed after the draft. On Friday morning, Tomsula moved aside some of the desks in the 49ers' defensive meeting room and showed Okoye how he should line up when the team took the field later that day.

It was the first time the 21-year-old had been taught a proper football stance.

Still, Tomsula admits none of the prospects he discovered or coached overseas were quite like the 6-foot-6, 308-pound Okoye.

Two other defensive linemen, second-round pick Tank Carradine and fifth-round pick Quinton Dial, are sitting out the 49ers' rookie minicamp, which ends today. As a result, Okoye has received most of the snaps at right defensive end, and by the end of Friday's practice, he was huffing and puffing like, well, someone who had never gone through a football practice.

But he still had enough to finish with a flourish.

The 49ers ended Friday's session with the rare "box-jump drill," in which the players first leaped, from a standing position, onto a 21/2-foot-tall box, and in the same motion sprung again – rear end first – onto a large mat.

It was like watching a line of 300-pound men do a series of cannonballs into a pool. The star of the drill was Okoye, who soared to seemingly impossible heights for a man his size before crashing onto the mat and returning to the back of the line to get ready to do it again.

As Tomsula recalled the drill, a smile spread across his face.

"Did you see how high he got?" he said. "That's what I'm talking about.

"He's got all the right stuff."

QB McLeod Bethel-Thompson Feature Story

49ers' backup QB has special link to London

McLeod Bethel-Thompson knows the stories about the gold medal his grandfather keeps in an old leather case in his closet and takes out only when someone asks to see it.

Wilbur "Moose" Thompson won it on a drizzly afternoon 65 years ago when he squatted low, sprang forward and heaved a 16-pound metal ball farther than anyone else in the shot put that day.

It's where Thompson, now 93 and living in Long Beach, made his throw that has special interest to Bethel-Thompson, the son of his daughter Patricia.

He did it at the 1948 London Olympics at the former Wembley Stadium. That facility, the site of five European Cup soccer finals and the 1966 World Cup final, was torn down in 2003 and replaced in 2007 by the new Wembley, a 90,000-seat stadium where Bethel-Thompson and the 49ers will play the Jacksonville Jaguars on Sunday.

It will be his second visit this season. Bethel-Thompson, who played at Sacramento State, was the Vikings' third-string quarterback last month when they beat the Steelers at Wembley. He has the same role with the 49ers.

"The last time I was there, I thought about what he's endured and overcome in his life," Bethel-Thompson said of his grandfather. "I'll think about him for sure, pray for him."

Sunday's game, and the run-up to it, will be filled with NFL-style pomp and circumstance.

There will be a rally featuring a member of NFL royalty, Joe Montana, on Saturday at Trafalgar Square. More than 80,000 flag-waving fans will fill Wembley, the largest crowd many 49ers players have had for a game. About 2 million Britons watched last month's game on television, and more could tune in Sunday considering the 49ers are the third-most-popular NFL team here behind the Patriots and Dolphins.

It will be a pageant of plenty in stark contrast to the 1948 Olympics.

The previous two Games had been canceled by World War II and the world, Europe in particular, still was struggling after the six-year conflict. In a phone interview, Thompson, who is dealing with congestive heart failure, recalled that London had been bombed just a few years earlier.

"They were still rationing food," he said. "And they were still cleaning up the bomb damage."

Those Olympics came to be known as the Austerity Games.

Thompson spent three years in the Army before he began training for the Games while working a part-time job as a laborer at the Hollywood Bowl and studying part time at USC. He had his first child in 1947.

There was no Olympic Village when he and the American team arrived in England. The athletes slept on cots in an old air force barracks. Food was rationed, but in the spirit of the Olympics, everything was shared, even among competitors. Bottles of Burgundy brought by the French were passed from athlete to athlete.

On the morning of the competition, Thompson's pre-Games meal consisted of a small watercress sandwich. He said he lost weight while in London and estimated he was about 175 pounds on the day of his 56-foot, 2-inch toss, which broke the Olympic record by 3 feet.

In contrast, the man who won the shot put in the most recent Olympics, Poland's Tomasz Majewski, weighs 313 pounds and had a throw of 71-10.

When Thompson returned to the United States, there were no parades and only a few interviews. He tucked the gold medal away and went about his life.

He doesn't begrudge today's athletes the attention they receive compared to 1948. It was a different time, he said.

But Sunday's game gives his grandson a chance to redirect the NFL's klieg lights onto a long-forgotten event and a seldom-discussed gold medal.

After the Olympics, Thompson earned an engineering degree and raised a family, and Bethel-Thompson said the gold medal never defined his grandfather.

Still, it's nice to brag about your grandpa every now and then.

"He's a proud man, but a humble man," Bethel-Thompson said. "He'd never bring attention to himself. There aren't a lot of people around who remember those Olympics."

49ers' vagabond comes home to a new playbook

McLeod Bethel-Thompson. With that name and with his neatly trimmed beard and college education, the 49ers' newest quarterback could pass for some type of aristocrat. But in his chosen world of football, he is a drifter, a gypsy, king of the road. He might as well be named Scruffy Muldoon.

He has made more stops than the midnight Greyhound to Yuma, and who knows? The 49ers might be his last stop - in a good way or in a bad way.

Bethel-Thompson is the new third-string quarterback, inheriting the title from John Skelton, who held it for one week. How do you lose that job in one week? Forget to pick up your socks? In some ways, this is a terrible job. No security, no glory (this column doesn't count), constant pressure, no reasonable expectation to even suit up on game day, and you're one whimsical front-office decision away from the AFL, the CFL or the AFL-CIO.

So why can't Bethel-Thompson stop smiling? Maybe because two bus stops ago, he was the third-string quarterback for the Sacramento Mountain Lions, and four stops ago, he was quarterbacking the San Jose SaberCats for \$296 per week, plus coupons for free Chacho's tacos.

"You just kind of cherish the game," Bethel-Thompson said Wednesday. "You love it even more (because of the hardship), it makes you work twice as hard.

"It's been a great journey. It's been an awesome journey. It's been an unexpected and kind of unlikely journey. But I enjoy that and I embrace that and I'm working my butt off every day to make it continue, and try to go to the mountaintop."

Bethel-Thompson's football pedigree would seem to work against his chance of success, but working in his favor is that he hasn't had to adjust to a fall from stardom, unless stardom is leading Balboa High to back-to-back Turkey Bowls, 2004 and '05. After a less-than-fulfilling college career at UCLA and Sacramento State, he still had "the juice," as he calls it, for football.

His dad, a former rock-and-roll roadie, understood.

"Chase your dream," Mac says his dad told him. "We'll help you any way we can for six months. Then you need to get serious and do something."

Just as the six-month mom-and-pop scholarship was ending, the 49ers signed Bethel-Thompson and brought him to training camp. When camp broke, it looked like he would be on the practice squad, but the 49ers got another QB off waivers and Bethel-Thompson was gone, headed to the UFL, but with enough taste of the big time to have football qualify as an addictive drug.

He got some action with the Vikings. He played well in the preseason. He was on the active roster for two real games, one in last season's playoffs and one two weeks ago, in London.

Ah, but then our high-plains drifter made a classic mistake: He signed a lease on an apartment in Minnesota and bought some furniture. Talk about lobbing a fat pitch in the wheelhouse of the football gods. The ink wasn't dry on the lease when the Vikings signed Tampa Bay castoff Josh Freeman, and showed Bethel-Thompson the door.

The 49ers remembered him fondly from his brief stop in 2011, and called him.

Now he lives at the Marriott around the corner from 49ers headquarters and arrives for work every morning at 6, along with Colin Kaepernick and the Dew Crew. Gotta soak up a new playbook, Bethel-Thompson's seventh since high school.

"Sometimes you're thinking about 10 different things you learned three years ago," he said, "sometimes it's easy, because you have learned a couple of offenses. You're going to use the pieces that help you, and try to forget the pieces that don't."

He has a history degree, plans to use it someday to work with kids in the inner city, remembering buddies at Balboa who sometimes didn't have a place to sleep. But he's a quarterback now - for the next 10 minutes or 10 years.

He gives passing thought to the chances he didn't get and the times he got overlooked, but mostly he thinks about the people who helped him and the breaks he was given, and talking about those, Bethel-Thompson sounds like an actor giving an acceptance speech for an Academy Award, rather than someone hopping freights in the football world.

"I've been many places, and there's been different scenarios, and many reasons why I left or didn't leave," Bethel-Thompson said. "I just somehow found a way, and the hard work has never stopped, and that will never stop, and I just love to play the game and will play the game wherever I get a chance to ..."

"It's been a wild ride, yeah."

49ers' Boldin passionate about charity work

Anquan Boldin grew up poor, something he learned only later in life.

"I didn't realize I was poor because everybody else around me was in the same situation," he said.

Now that he's making \$6 million a year, the 49ers receiver has a belated understanding of what it means to struggle financially. He sees the hardship firsthand whenever he returns to the neighborhoods littered with boarded-up windows in his hometown of Pahokee, Fla., where the median household income is just over \$20,000.

When Boldin goes back, he does so as the conquering hero: the Pahokee High kid who went on to win the Super Bowl and earn NFL riches.

Which is why he goes back.

"I try to make sure that I show my face around town," Boldin said. "People can get a sense that even if you make it out, you can still reach back and help others.

"That's my main focus. I'm not in this position just to live a life of luxury. I think I've been placed here to help others. That's my sole purpose."

Boldin, in his 11th season, has had the same priority at each of his NFL stops: to receive (he leads the 49ers with 38 catches for 551 yards) and to give (his charitable foundation, Q81, is in its 10th year).

He has already introduced himself to the Bay Area on the field. This Monday, Boldin will launch his first major fundraising event in San Jose by hosting a celebrity server dinner and silent auction at Morton's The Steakhouse. (Details at q81.org).

Over the years, Boldin also has provided college scholarships, taken kids on holiday shopping sprees and served Thanksgiving meals for thousands of families. He's flown to Ethiopia to study the drought problems and to Senegal to champion the rights of poor mining families.

Next up, Boldin said, is probably a trip to West Africa to work with a women's microfinance group.

"There was a lot that I lacked growing up," Boldin said. "And I hate to see others not have."

Because of so many phony baloney charity efforts among athletes, it's easy to get cynical. Write a check, show up at bowl-a-thon, and all of a sudden you're a heck of a guy.

Andrew Blejwas, who works with Oxfam America, remembers being on a street in Ethiopia when he got a call about Boldin and NFL pal Larry Fitzgerald being interested in traveling to the country to see how they could help.

He hung up the phone and thought: Yeah, right.

"You have your doubts about whether they are committed," Blejwas recalled.

It was soon obvious that this was no publicity stunt. They arrived well-read on the dire conditions in Africa and jumped right in by building fences for a community garden.

"You have to understand: Men in that community don't do that kind of work. It's extremely rare," Blejwas said. "And the women were beside themselves seeing them do the work."

"The community was super excited about it. They were happy and singing songs for them, and it was a pretty moving experience. And the husbands in the community started working on that project shortly thereafter."

Boldin, never known for his sound bites, prefers to have real conversations. In Ethiopia, he said, he spoke with a farmer who walked three hours to work and three hours back just to make 98 cents a day. It was the only way he could keep his six kids in school.

"It blew my mind just to hear the stories," Boldin said. "And at that point, you want to give everything that you have."

"As Americans, we couldn't even fathom the conditions that they were living in. It was crazy."

During his visit last March to Sabodala, a village in Eastern Senegal, Boldin saw the way the rural communities were being devastated by large-scale gold-mining operations. The land was rich -- but farmers were often forced off at a moment's notice while being offered scant compensation.

"These companies go in, they mine the land -- and they make billions of dollars doing so," Boldin said. "And once they leave the land, it's no longer of use. It's been stripped. So the locals can't go back and continue to farm and sustain their way of life."

On the spot, Boldin promised the people he would take their stories back to the United States. And then he did. When Boldin returned home, the three-time Pro Bowl selection used his star power to score meetings with influential lawmakers.

"We (at Oxfam America) don't get meetings with the senators and the representatives, ever. We get meetings with their staff," Blejwas said. "But going with Anquan, we got the meetings -- in their offices. And I think that's how he got things changed."

Among the meetings was a sit-down with Congressman Chris Smith (R-New Jersey), the chairman of the House International Relations Africa, Global Human Rights and International Operations Subcommittee.

Smith asked Boldin if he would be willing to testify at a hearing. Boldin said to name the time.

So on July 18, Boldin stepped inside an office building on Capitol Hill to deliver a speech called "Is There an African Resource Curse?"

"As a direct result of his visit, legislation got rewritten to include people from Senegal. It's fantastic," Blejwas said. "That's not an easy thing to do, and I think what he is probably beginning to realize, if he hasn't already, is that he has quite a bit of power."

"We got the audience for two reasons. One, because he's a known name. But that doesn't get you anything unless you're widely respected. And every single person that we met with, every senator and every congressman, knew Anquan's character."

Because Boldin is famously tight-lipped during his day job -- he jokes that even his mom can't get a good quote out of him -- his off-field work remains unknown in his new Bay Area home.

But those back in Pahokee are hardly surprised. Joe Marx, his high school football coach, anointed Boldin as his quarterback largely because of his leadership skills. He first coached him on the basketball team and saw the way other players gravitated toward the no-nonsense point guard.

Now, Marx watches Boldin come back every year to deliver a few more assists.

"He does a charity basketball game where he just lets everybody in for free. And of course he spends the whole two hours before the game signing autographs and taking pictures with kids," Marx said.

"Then he has a golf outing where he raises money for the community -- and spends all the time with the kids.

"People see him. That's really important to him, I know it is. He's not a real verbal guy. He's never going to toot his own horn at those kinds of things. But he'll never forget Pahokee and he'll never leave those people behind."

Boldin may have grown up not knowing he was poor. But he seems well aware of what it means to live a rich life.

Immune to the Haters

Reading the comments beneath a story is often a journey through Trollville, where faceless residents send rivers of shocking vitriol flowing through the streets. Still, there are occasions when the remarks are more insightful than infuriating. One such instance occurred in 2009, when the Palm Beach Post wrote about Pahokee High School's new football field being named after Anquan Boldin, the local boy who became a star in the NFL.

"This decision was FITTING and PROPER for one of our own," the comment began. "Mr. Boldin has and still is representing Pahokee High School and the City of Pahokee with superlative standards. The Anquan Boldin Q81 Foundation annually gives to the youth in Pahokee, Pahokee High School and the City of Pahokee. We are proud of you Anquan, you make us feel good. There can be only one, you are the right one. A GREAT DECISION PAHOKEE!!"

The respect for Boldin isn't limited to his hometown. It can also be found throughout the NFL, where Boldin is considered a man's man and a pro's pro. It's not just what he does, like returning to the field just three games after being knocked unconscious and having reconstructive facial surgery from a helmet-to-helmet hit in 2008. It's also how he does his job, with a steady professionalism that sets the standard for everyone else—a point that's particularly significant to the 49ers, who sent a sixth-round pick to Baltimore to acquire Boldin in an offseason trade.

San Francisco, which has played in back-to-back NFC Championship Games and advanced to the Super Bowl last season, is seasoned at every position but wideout. With Michael Crabtree and Mario Manningham out with injuries, Boldin's 137 career starts are 84 more than the combined total for the 11 other healthy receivers on the roster. None in that group has started more than 17 games.

The role of mentor is one that Boldin neither seeks nor runs from. He won't impose himself on others, but he will divulge everything he has learned over the past 10 seasons—the first seven with Arizona before being traded to Baltimore—if a teammate is interested.

"Q has been so good with the younger guys, trying to teach them how to be professionals," says fourth-year receiver Kyle Williams. "He's not just teaching them what to learn, but how to learn it, how to learn concepts and how you can see certain things in coverages. I think his whole mentality, his whole approach to this game is something we all can learn something from. He's so serious about it. He doesn't play around. I mean, he'll joke around. It's not like he's a hard guy to be around or anything. But it's all business with him. That's something to be admired and a standard for young guys who are looking for someone to model their game after or their mentality after. There may not be another guy that you want a group of young guys to learn from."

Talk may get someone's attention, but production is what holds it. Boldin's achievements include most receptions in a rookie season (101), most receiving yards in the first game of a career (217) and most receptions in a player's first 26 games (157). He's the fastest in NFL history to pull down 400 career receptions (67 games), as well as the fastest to 500 (80 games) and 600 (98 games).

What he lacks in speed he makes up for with quickness, toughness, vise-lock hands and a MENSA football IQ. Last February in Super Bowl XLVII he had a game-high six catches for 104 yards and a touchdown, helping the Ravens outlast the 49ers, 34-31. If a big play needed to be made, he made it. On consecutive possessions late in the second half—after San Francisco had cut a 28-6 deficit to five and two points, respectively—he picked up 30 yards on 3rd-and-3 to help set up a field goal, then 15 yards on 3rd-and-1 to position Baltimore for another field goal.

The beauty of Boldin's game is that even when he appears to be covered, he's not. "He's so strong that he knows how to get the ball in traffic," says cornerback Nnamdi Asomugha, who has known Boldin since

they attended the same football camp in high school. “He’s like one of those basketball players who, even if he’s double-teamed in the post, knows how to fight and position himself to hold onto the ball. You can’t sleep on him.”

Yet Boldin’s value cannot be measured solely in statistics. He brings toughness and tenacity to the offense and the locker room. The next time he shies away from a block will be the first. The next time he pulls a verbal punch will be the only time. For instance:

- After striving to win a championship for 10 years, including a Super Bowl loss with Arizona, which was better, the reality or the fantasy of winning a title? “The reality—and then some. I don’t care what anybody says, unless you win a championship you don’t feel complete as a player.”
- After getting a ring, is the hunger still there? “For me it doesn’t change. That’s the reason why I didn’t go to the ring ceremony at the White House. If you take time to celebrate, you kind of lose that edge, lose that hunger.”
- On being a mentor: “The guys that are successful in this league, they take heed. The guys that don’t, they fall by the wayside.”
- How does he like to be coached? “I’ve never liked for a coach to tell me, ‘You’ve got it.’ I want to be pushed and challenged every day.”

In San Francisco, Boldin will be challenged by offensive coordinator Greg Roman, who has one of the game’s most creative minds. How will Boldin fit into the 49ers’ scheme? Will he run the same type of layered routes that he did in Baltimore? Roman isn’t one to get too specific about how a player will be used.

“We’re always going to look at the player and what the player does well and adapt the offense to the player,” Roman says. “He’s a pretty easy guy to adapt to. He’s so smart and he’s a strong, physical guy who can make the plays short, make the plays deep. If you put it near him he’s probably going to make a play. He has great ball skills. He has such a strong will to get it done.”

Boldin is proud of his accomplishments on the field, but he takes greater pride in what he has done to help kids in his hometown. That’s why each offseason he returns to Pahokee for a weekend fundraiser known as Q-fest. His foundation, Q81 Foundation, has partnered with Florida Crystals Corp. to fund a summer program that gives high school students a chance to catch up academically through computer-based credit recovery courses.

“Anquan has made countless plays on the field, but the man he is off the field is what makes him so special,” says former Cardinals teammate Larry Fitzgerald. “Q continues to inspire the children from that area, and that’s much bigger than any touchdown he will ever catch—and he has caught a lot of them in the biggest of moments. He just won’t turn his back on [the kids].”

“I love football, but one day that ends,” Boldin says. “My foundation is something that will carry on when I’m done, and others will benefit from that. It has a lasting effect. I care about my name. I care about how it’s carried, how it comes out of other people’s mouth. And I believe if you’re going to put your name on something, you have to be involved.”

That type of attitude is not only why Boldin is so valuable to a team and a community, but also why he has the respect of everyone, from the NFL to Trollville.

Boldin is all business when playing football

Before Anquan Boldin spoke with the media for the first time in training camp, it was logical for some reporters to wonder: Will the recently acquired 49ers wide receiver actually, you know, speak? Consider the responses from Boldin's colleagues when queried about the new guy's personality. Said running back Frank Gore, who has trained with Boldin in their native Florida: "He's not a talkative person."

And linebacker NaVorro Bowman: "He's quiet. He comes to work, does his job and goes home." For his part, ever-energetic rookie wideout Quinton Patton did get Boldin to say a word. Sort of: "At first, I came out here smiling and was trying to talk to Anquan. He just kept a straight face and was like 'Sup.' " Given such a buildup, it was a bit surprising when the all-business Boldin flashed a wide smile Friday when asked about his reputation for not being Mr. Sunshine.

Nothing personal, he said: Even his mom, Brenda Banks, has commented on his less-than-radiant ways.

"Yeah, I've heard that before," he said. "I've heard that from a lot of people. That I can seem unwelcoming, or not warm at times. I guess that's just who I am. Not that I'm a mean person or whatever. But if I'm playing football, I'm focused on doing that. I don't see the need to chit-chat. If you catch me in the right position, I will talk to you, but out here, for me, it's business."

Of course, Boldin's intense focus helps explain how a wideout with average height (6-foot-1) and below-average speed (he ran a 4.71-second 40-yard dash at the 2003 combine) has had such a decorated career. A three-time Pro Bowler, Boldin is the fastest player in NFL history to collect his 400th, 500th and 600th career receptions.

New 49ers wideout Anquan Boldin, stretching at training camp in Santa Clara, is serious on the field.

At 32, he had 22 catches, 380 yards and four touchdowns last year in the Ravens' four-game romp to the Super Bowl title, capping the run with six catches for 104 yards against the 49ers. Less than two months later, the 49ers acquired him for a sixth-round pick, a move that appeared quite prescient after Michael Crabtree tore his Achilles in May.

On the field, Boldin is now the No. 1 wideout. Off the field, he fits in well on a team where many of the biggest stars - linebacker Patrick Willis and defensive tackle Justin Smith among them - are not big talkers. This week, both Gore and Bowman said Boldin's no-nonsense approach reminded them of their own. Not surprisingly, Jim Harbaugh, who bleeds pigskin, appreciates his personality.

"He's very serious about winning," Harbaugh said. "I admire that about him. He's not always the friendliest guy to sit down next to in a meeting or at lunch and have a conversation with, unless it's about football." Boldin may be quiet, but he's not unapproachable. Before reporting to his first training camp last week, Patton called the 10-year veteran to talk about "life and football." Given Boldin's reputation for aloofness, the rookie's outreach might surprise some. But Boldin's reserved personality shouldn't be confused for an unwillingness to help others.

He's taken mission trips to Senegal and Ethiopia, respectively, the last two offseasons and is actively involved in his foundation, which provides after-school programs and scholarships for underprivileged children.

"I really didn't know him as a guy," offensive coordinator Greg Roman said. "So, just seeing what a high, high character guy he is allows you to connect all the dots and say, 'OK, here's why this guy has been so good for so long.' "

On the field, it appears Boldin has established a strong rapport with quarterback Colin Kaepernick. During the first practices of training camp, the duo has combined for several eye-opening connections. On Friday, Kaepernick rifled a back-shoulder throw to Boldin, who reeled it in despite tight coverage. Moments later, Boldin streaked across the middle and caught a 30-yard laser from Kaepernick between two defenders.

Still, Boldin says he's just at the beginning stages of his on-field relationship with Kaepernick. Not surprisingly, the wideout said the ideal partnership with a quarterback is one that requires few words.

"You want to be to the point where you don't really have to communicate, verbally," Boldin said. "You can just look at each other and tell what the other guy is thinking. I think the more time we spend together, the more reps that we have, we'll get there."

The All-22 All-Stars: Alex Boone Stands Tall

The phone rang just after 3 a.m. Amy Boone didn't know who was calling, but she knew why.

A few hours earlier, her son Alex had called from California. It was Super Bowl Sunday 2009, and the former Ohio State tackle was at a party near where he was training for the NFL combine. The night was old enough on the West Coast, and in her son's voice, Amy could hear the gathering rage that sometimes came with his nights of heavy drinking. His sentences were sharp. His words were curt. He was starting to "sizzle."

Amy asked to speak with Alex's agent, a younger man about whom she'd had her reservations. Her son didn't need another friend. He needed someone to tell him "no." She asked that he take Alex home, while he might still be able to control her 6-foot-8, 330-pound son.

When the phone rang the second time, it was the Orange County Sheriff. Boone had gotten so drunk that he started jumping on the hoods of cars and trying to pull a tow truck by its cable. When confronted by police, he fled, and after finding him hiding under a porch, officers had to use a Taser — twice — to subdue Boone. After she got the call, Amy sunk to the floor. "All I could think," she says, "was that his career was over."

The NFL draft came and went without Boone hearing his name, and as each round passed, he looked across the room at the woman who had to answer those 3 a.m. calls too often. "A lot of times in life, you want to say, 'It's not my fault,'" Boone says. "At that moment, I had to look at myself. There was nobody else to look at."

In February, Alex left his mother with another Super Bowl memory. But this time, she was sitting on the 40-yard line at the Superdome, her son jogging onto the field as part of the best offensive line in football. Since that night in 2009, Boone has gone from an undrafted free agent to the practice squad to one of the best guards in the NFL starting in the biggest sporting event of the year. "We say it all the time," Amy says. "We can't cover it up. It's who he is. It's what happened. And it's OK. It's all on the way up now. We look back on it and say 'I wish that hadn't happened,' but if it hadn't, god knows where he'd be."

In the Boone house, no one ever had to be alone. When Amy got married at 19, she bought the house next door to her parents in Lakewood, Ohio. Amy was one of four siblings, and whether it was a Tuesday night gathering for grandma's famous cheeseburgers or a big Sunday breakfast, there was always someone around. Alex was a crowd-pleaser. At the age when most children learn that cruelty can be funny, Amy says, her son's humor remained self-referential.

What was missing from those family gatherings — and the rest of Boone's life — was his father, who'd divorced Amy when Alex was 6 years old. He lived in California, was mostly a stranger to Boone and his older brother. Boone was raised by his grandfather. "He was the kind of grandpa they could talk about things with," Amy says. "He was like their dad. He was their dad, for all intents and purposes."

Boone was 14 when his grandfather died. He served as the crossbearer at his funeral. As he walked toward the altar, Amy glanced down the aisle at her son. "The devastation on his face ..." she says. Abandoned by one father and robbed of another, Boone struggled to reconcile his newfound anger. "When he died, that's when I started going off the wall," he says. It's also when he started drinking.

There's a story that Amy tells now. It happened years later. Alex was home from college, and drunk. He and Amy were on the front porch, and it was the only time she could remember him being angry with her. When his grandfather died, Alex had been home while his mother and brother visited the hospital. "He's telling me that he can't forgive me for not having allowed him to be there," Amy says. That's when it came

— the sizzle. All rationality was gone. Boone walked inside and toward his room, but not before leaving an imprint of his fist in the plaster wall.

Football was a different type of outlet. Not only did Boone like the game he'd been playing since he was 6, he was good at it. By his senior year, Boone had become the best player in the state of Ohio, typically considered one of the nation's best collections of talent. His name was mentioned alongside players like Eugene Monroe, who'd go on to be the no. 8 overall pick in the 2009 draft, as the best offensive tackle in the country. When it was time to choose a university, Boone elected to stay close to home and enroll at Ohio State.

"It was everything I expected it to be," Boone, who started as a freshman, says, "and more. I didn't take the first year very seriously. I drank a lot. Everybody knows that. I just really wanted to party. I thought playing football was fun, but I loved the fact that since I was a football player, I could party and get away with it. So I tried to do it as much as I could." And he could get away with it.

The first major incident came that spring when he was arrested on suspicion of DUI after hitting a car near campus. He pleaded guilty. It had become clear to Boone and those around him that he was losing his grip. Head coach Jim Tressel warned him that one more incident would be his last. Following that night, Boone went the next several months without a drink.

"It just never worked, though," Boone says of trying to stay sober. "I was such an addict. I always had to take it to the extreme. 'I'm feeling good now. But I want to feel even better.' So I'd just keep going and going and going."

Boone had his moments for the next three years — altercations at parties, mostly — but he says that his coaches' support was enough for him to slow down. As a senior, he finished the season on the All-Big Ten first team, but Boone's college career never lived up to his potential. He arrived in Columbus as one of the best offensive linemen in the country, and he left a late-round prospect.

The NFL combine was less than a month after Boone's arrest in Orange County, and no team wanted to talk about much else. It was Tennessee or Dallas — he can't remember — but there was one assistant who laid into him hardest. I don't even know why you're here.

And they didn't just know about that night. "They knew things that I thought [only] two people in the world ever knew," Boone says.

Nothing surprised Boone about the draft. He knew what was coming. The phone did eventually ring, but not until all seven rounds had passed. It was the 49ers, who were willing to bring Boone in as a free agent. Boone's family members sat, shocked. It wasn't until his uncle Keith, a police commander, walked back in that everything started to come into perspective. Amy recalls: "[Keith] looked at me and said, 'He's lucky that he has a job,' and I thought, That's right. He has a job."

He wasn't there 10 minutes before it started. On Boone's first day at the 49ers facility, he turned a corner, and there was Mike Singletary — known hardass and San Francisco head coach. Singletary pulled Boone into his office. "He called me and said, 'Mom, you're never going to believe what just happened,'" Amy says. "He told me he was going to break me like a wild horse."

Singletary laughs when asked about the line now. "I just wanted to be honest and let him know that I'd be watching him," Singletary says. "Everything he told me, I wanted to make sure he did that. The first time he didn't follow through, I was going to have to get rid of him."

And so that's how his first training camp went, with the head coach tearing into an undrafted rookie whenever possible. "At the time, I couldn't stand it," Boone says. "All the time: 'You're not good enough. I don't even know why we kept you.' I just thought, This guy is just fucking driving me nuts. Looking back, it's probably the best thing that's ever happened to me." This summer, during a conversation with a few of

the players who'd been with San Francisco since before Jim Harbaugh, Boone was reminded that without Singletary, he wouldn't be here.

"He opened my eyes to what this league really is," Boone says. "Here I thought I was going to come in, and it was going to be college with lots of money. It really wasn't. It was, 'We're going to work hard every day.' He kind of got me back to my roots. My whole family is blue-collar. Everyone's either a cop, a teacher, or a nurse. He brought me back."

Boone found his next mentor closer to home. When his first season, which Boone spent on the practice squad, ended, he came back to Lakewood and reached out to recently retired NFL lineman and Ohio State product LeCharles Bentley, who was looking to start a program to train young offensive linemen.

The key when they started, Bentley says, was patience. "To sell him on the idea that I could wave a magic wand and turn him into a Pro Bowler overnight would be complete bullshit on my part," he says. "And I do my best not to sell guys bullshit."

Together, they mapped out the next three years of Boone's life. There were football goals, but the overall plan was more granular. Boone's bedtimes were already planned. Bentley didn't just outline what Boone would eat, but when he would eat it. The days of grandma's cheeseburgers and mom's cinnamon buns were over, replaced with green goop that Amy describes as "algae."

The goals were modest at first. Boone had to start by making the team, which he did in 2010. The next year, it was about actually getting to play, which Boone did, as the team's third tackle.

Following the 2011 season, Mike Solari, San Francisco's offensive line coach, told Boone that the plan was to move him to guard for the 2012 season. The change meant that Boone would get a chance to compete for a starting job, but it also meant reshaping his entire approach to the offensive line.

For some, the move from tackle to guard might mean little more than sliding a few feet down the line of scrimmage, but for Boone, it meant changing everything. It started with his body. Typically, guards are shorter, stockier players who are built to play in small areas. At 6-foot-8, Boone is one of the tallest guards in football, and Bentley's task was turning that length from a detriment into an advantage.

One change was in trying to make Boone's biceps larger, in order to lessen the distance from his long arms being fully extended to compressed. "Now, I've created a pillow between you and your shoulder," Bentley says. "When you sit down on a bull rush, you're not worrying about your arms completely collapsing." They watched film, Bentley says, of players "better than [Boone]." That meant guards in today's league, but it also meant tape of players like Larry Allen and Randall McDaniel.

The currency for tackles is space, and creating as much of it as possible off the snap. "Against Osi Umenyiora, you want to get back," Boone says. "You want to see what he's doing first." At guard, the prize is leverage. "When you go against Vince Wilfork, you don't want to give him three feet to get going," Boone says. "You'd rather cut that space down. Don't let him get his engine running."

"The hard thing initially for tackles moving to guard is that all of a sudden, things happen so much quicker," Solari says. "They have a tendency to overset, and in that limited space, the defensive tackle has his hands on you."

On the first day of training camp that summer, Boone lined up across from defensive tackle Ray McDonald, and from the moment McDonald hit him with a bull rush, he knew that this is where he'd always belonged. He won the right guard job before the third preseason game, joining an offensive line that features three first-round picks.

As the season progressed, though, it became apparent that Boone wasn't the weak link on an otherwise great line. His play mirrored his Pro Bowl counterparts, and by season's end, he'd had one of the better

years for any guard in football, especially as a run blocker. "The way he attacks and the way he plays the game is just beautiful to watch if you love line play," Solari says.

He wants to be the best. And although the list is shrinking, Bentley still isn't selling bullshit. "I think he's burgeoning as the best guard in the league, but I told him this — [Ravens guard] Marshal Yanda is better than you," Bentley says. "I think Marshal Yanda is better than you, and until you dethrone him, he's the king."

June 29, 2009. That's the date Boone says he took his last drink. When he talks about getting sober, the humiliation of draft day comes up. But like his reasons for drinking the way he did, sobriety was about more than that. This summer, Boone spoke to his father for the first time in years, and it was a conversation that confirmed everything he'd thought growing up. "When I got sober, everyone was like, 'You've got to be better than this. You've got to be better than this,'" Boone says. "I said, 'Fuck that. I want to be better than him.' I wanted him to look back one day and be sorry that he never knew me."

It started with spite, but what keeps him going is purer. "When you're young and immature, it's, 'Let's go play football. We'll go play football, party after, and who gives a shit about anything else,'" Boone says. "Now, this is my job. I have a wife. I have a kid. I have another kid on the way. I want to make them proud."

Don't overlook NaVorro Bowman

As bad as life has been for the San Francisco 49ers lately -- with mounting injuries, an absent superstar and a disappointing 2-2 start -- they have had some positive news. The most noteworthy is the play of inside linebacker NaVorro Bowman. He has been overshadowed at times and overlooked far too often because of San Francisco's star power on defense. But as the 49ers work through their issues, he's quickly changing the debate about who the best linebacker in football really is.

Bowman's exceptional teammate, Patrick Willis, has held that title over the last few years, but Bowman has made a strong case to be considered even better. The fourth-year veteran leads the 49ers in tackles (34). He ranked second in the NFL in that category last year (with 148) and had 143 stops in 2011. Most important, Bowman has been leading the 49ers' defense when they've most needed somebody to embrace that role this season.

The people who watched the 49ers' 35-11 win over St. Louis last Thursday understand this. With Willis sidelined by a groin injury, nose tackle Ian Williams on injured reserve and Pro Bowl outside linebacker Aldon Smith just starting an indefinite stay in a rehabilitation facility, Bowman went off. It wasn't merely that he produced serious numbers (six tackles, two sacks, one forced fumble). It was that everything he did seemed timely, as if he knew exactly when to give his team a jolt of energy.

Bowman later said that somebody "had to step up" and that he "was just playing [his] game," but that's also how he operates. No fanfare. No fuss. Just fantastic production at a position where he has quietly become one of the game's rising stars. "My big word has been 'maintain,'" Bowman said during a recent interview that will air in an "E:60" story later this month. "I don't want to get complacent. I don't have any stats or statistics I'm trying to reach. I just want to win, and if I go out there and give it my all every single game, I'm going to have a good game."

It's not hard to see why Bowman is now only starting to earn some acclaim. Despite being voted first-team All-Pro in each of the last two seasons -- and earning his first Pro Bowl nomination last year -- he has been one component in a defense that hasn't lacked for big names. Willis has been a Pro Bowl player since he entered the league in 2007. Justin Smith is one of the best defensive tackles in football. Aldon Smith has produced 38 sacks in 35 career games. Bowman, on the other hand, has been a bit like the girl next door: The more people notice him, the better he looks.

Bowman didn't become a starter until 2011, and even then his elevation on the depth chart seemed like a gamble to outsiders. The 49ers had veteran Takeo Spikes playing alongside Willis the previous season, and Bowman was only an unheralded second-year player. Bowman was a young kid looking to make a name for himself. It didn't hurt that his pride had been wounded after he became a third-round selection. As Bowman said, "I thought of myself as a good linebacker when I came out. But the NFL didn't."

It took one opportunity for Bowman -- while filling in for an injured Spikes against Arizona in the 2010 season finale -- to see how far he could go. "I wanted to find out if I could play at this level," said Bowman, who is listed at 6 feet and 242 pounds. "Because I kept hearing I was short, wasn't tall enough, wasn't big enough. I wanted to know if I could play at this level. I went out and had eight tackles. And that's all I needed. Every day after that I knew I could play. All I had to do was put the work in and I was going to be all right."

Bowman has been more than fine. He won league-wide praise when he became a starter in 2011, after the 49ers decided against re-signing Spikes. His biggest fans saw him as an eerie clone of Willis, an instinctive tackling machine who had a knack for the big play and a freakish quickness that served him well during his days as an AAU basketball teammate of NBA star Kevin Durant. Those same people should see even more in Bowman today. After all, it was his defensive effort in that NFC title game that put the 49ers in position for their first Super Bowl berth in 19 years.

The Falcons, trailing by four, were down to their last scoring chance of that contest, a fourth-and-4 from the 49ers' 10-yard line with 1:13 remaining. When they came to the line of scrimmage, Bowman sensed a deviation in the Falcons' tendencies. Instead of finding Pro Bowl tight end Tony Gonzalez across from him in the slot, Pro Bowl wide receiver Roddy White had taken Gonzalez's place. It should have been a mismatch. Bowman turned it into a pass deflection that became the defining play of his career.

Said Bowman: "I knew something was about to happen. A linebacker on a receiver? It had to be something that they were trying to do with me right there. So I just broke down, got ready and did what I do. Nothing crazy was going through my mind. I just wasn't going to let him score or catch the ball."

One team source later said the Falcons considered Bowman to be the 49ers defender they most had to fear on that afternoon. It was a surprising statement then but one that makes plenty of sense today. The 49ers may be battered and bruised and bombarded with all sorts of questions about whether they can hang with this year's other championship contenders. But one thing they don't have to worry about is Bowman. His place in the game is already set for years to come.

CB Tramaine Brock Feature Story

Tramaine Brock's improbable rise is a divine story

As a single mother of three children, Marsha Brock relied on multiple jobs and a strong faith to support her family in Long Beach, Miss.

In fact, when her youngest child, Tramaine, had friends spend the weekend, his buddies hung out on one condition: They would occupy a pew at Forrest Heights Missionary Baptist Church in nearby Gulfport on Sunday morning.

"I told them 'Don't think y'all are going to be over here eating up all my food, playing around and then leaving without going to church,'" Brock said, laughing. "I made it clear: 'If y'all are going to spend the weekend, you will be sitting in church on Sunday.'"

Years later, Tramaine currently spends his Sunday mornings preparing to serve as the 49ers starting nickel cornerback, a rather improbable occupation considering his background.

Brock landed with the 49ers in 2010 as an undrafted free agent who had just completed a three-college odyssey that ended at Belhaven (Miss.) College. Formerly known as Belhaven College for Young Ladies, the NAIA school has fewer than 4,000 students and its football team faces the likes of Kentucky Christian on an off-campus community field.

The 49ers were the only team that offered Brock a contract – he was given a near-laughable \$500 signing bonus – and he spent his first three NFL seasons in relative anonymity, carving out a role as a key contributor on special teams.

In 2013, however, Brock, 25, has elevated from bit player to big contributor for a defense that ranks sixth in the NFL in passing yards allowed and is tied for seventh in interceptions. Two weeks ago, Brock officially wrested the No. 3 cornerback job from former All-Pro Nnamdi Asomugha, 32, with a two-interception, one-touchdown performance in a win against the Texans that earned him NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors.

Entering Sunday's game at Tennessee, Brock's two picks rank second on the team and quarterbacks have a middling 70.3 passer rating when throwing in his direction, according to Pro Football Focus.

So how did Brock get from Nowheresville to a national stage?

Perhaps not surprisingly given his upbringing, Brock doesn't dismiss the possibility of divine intervention. After mentioning he prayed before his big game against the Texans, he noted it was a pre-kickoff ritual.

"Oh, yeah," he said, smiling. "My momma raised me in church."

Marsha Brock also raised Tramaine, Kenny, 28, and Phyllis, 26, by herself after she divorced Felix Gardner (who has not remained involved in Tramaine's life) when her youngest son was in elementary school. Kenny, a pharmacy technician, and Phyllis, who works with the disabled, still live in Long Beach.

For several years, Marsha had two jobs – she also worked with the disabled and was a housekeeper at a casino — which allowed her to realize a dream and buy a home. She said she was eventually prompted by God to drop her custodial job so she could attend more of her children's activities, which included Tramaine's high school football games.

"Having just that one paycheck wasn't always easy – there were tough times," Marsha said. "But I'm the parent God gave them. And I wanted to be the very best parent I could be."

As a child, Tramaine informed his mother he'd star in the NFL, and his dream didn't appear far-fetched shortly after high school. He earned first-team All-American honors as a sophomore at Mississippi Gulf Coast, a perennial junior college power, and selected Minnesota over offers from schools such as South Carolina and Louisville.

At Minnesota, he played safety and ranked third on the team in tackles in 2008, but became academically ineligible following the season. Brock planned to regain his eligibility and play as a senior, but says he sensed the coaching staff had other plans.

"Once I got suspended, I think they just didn't want to deal with me any more after that," he said.

His academic issues led him to Belhaven in Jackson, Miss., where some of his former junior college teammates were playing and his then-girlfriend was attending Jackson State.

With his transfer, Brock moved from college football's big time to its backwoods. Belhaven's practice field is about 20 yards shorter than regulation and the team walks to games at nearby H.T. Newell Field. In Brock's senior season, they bused to all road games, which included treks to Montgomery, W.V., (750 miles) and Jackson, Tenn. (450 miles).

Brock said the step down in class wasn't an issue since he wasn't far removed his junior-college days, which featured similarly spartan facilities. Indeed, any concerns Blazers coach Joe Thrasher had about the Division I transfer adjusting to small-college ball quickly evaporated.

"If I had just one word to describe Tramaine it would be humble," Thrasher said. "He came here to a small NAIA school from Minnesota. You expect him to have a chip on his shoulder and he never did. Talk about being driven, he'd say 'Coach, the NFL is the goal and I'm going to do it.'

"I cannot adequately articulate how he embraced his one year here. He wanted to work every single day, was coachable and made his teammates better. He saw this as an opportunity and he made the most of it."

After leaving Belhaven, Brock received scant interest after the 2010 NFL draft. Two teams offered him a tryout, but his lone contract offer came from the 49ers. Brock's signing bonus was close to \$250 after taxes.

"It was nothing at all," Brock said. "I couldn't buy a pair of Jordans with it. But I didn't really look at that at the time. I was just happy to be here and to get a chance."

Given that opportunity, Brock became the first undrafted rookie to make the 49ers' opening-day roster in five seasons, and he did so thanks to a blend of athleticism and attitude. Niners general manager Trent Baalke believes a key to Brock's unlikely success is based partly on his swagger.

"He's a very, very confident young man and the NFL stage, even coming from Belhaven, wasn't too big for him," Baalke said. "He acted like he belonged early on his career, but he was always very respectful. These small-school guys that come in not only have to prove they belong physically, they also prove they belong from a confidence standpoint. With T Brock, you knew early on that wasn't going to be a problem."

Three years later, Brock, in the midst of his breakout season, is careful to keep his confidence properly corralled. Before the Texans' game two weeks ago, he prayed in the locker room for humility. Then, on the game's third play, he returned an interception 18 yards for a touchdown to set the tone in a 34-3 win.

In Long Beach, Miss., Marsha Brock, who was watching the game with a host of family and friends, was part of a shake-the-floorboards family room celebration.

Did she ever doubt Tramaine would star on such a big stage? Marsha laughed.

She's always had faith.

A kicker for all conditions: 49ers' Dawson has weathered it all

According to Weather.com, here's Thursday's forecast for San Francisco, where the 49ers will host Denver in their preseason opener: high of 58, low of 54, 10 percent chance of rain and winds blowing from the west at 8 to 13 miles per hour.

But Phil Dawson already knew that.

The 49ers placekicker is a weather-web-site wonk after spending the first 14 seasons of his career kicking in Cleveland's inclement weather. Given the nature of his job, and his previous place of employment, he's well-versed on late-game pressure and barometric pressure.

Does he have a favorite weather app? Dawson smiled. Trust just one source? Please. Dawson, 38, routinely mines data from weather.com, AccuWeather.com and WeatherBug.com.

"I'm pretty psycho, I've got to admit," he said. "It's a borderline problem."

Dawson's history in wind, sleet and horizontal-blowing snow became relevant when he signed with the 49ers in March. Dawson's new home stadium, Candlestick Park, is known for its swirling winds that mess with field-goal attempts, and kickers' heads.

But Dawson has been there. Endured that. He's played 204 of his 215 career games outdoors, with 108 coming at the Browns stadium, which is perched on the shores of blustery Lake Erie.

Dawson has played 12 percent of his career games in Cleveland in December. The average forecast for the city in the final month of the year: High of 30.9 degrees with 12-mile-per-hour winds and .38 inches of snow fall (that's from climate-zone.com, Phil).

In Cleveland's 8-0 win against Buffalo on Dec. 16, 2007, Dawson drilled both of his field-goal attempts, from 35 and 49 yards. Big deal? The game was played in what the Associated Press termed "blizzard-like conditions better suited for the Iditarod sled-dog race." With winds gusting up to 40 miles per hour, Dawson aimed comically left and sliced his 49-yarder over the goal post.

Despite consistently weathering less-than-ideal conditions, Dawson ranks ninth in NFL history in field-goal percentage (84.0) and third in percentage from 50-plus yards (70.6). Seventeen months removed from his 40th birthday, he's improving with age: He ranked second in the NFL in field-goal percentage (93.5) in 2012 en route to his first Pro Bowl and has drilled 14 of 15 attempts from 50-plus yards since 2011.

The 49ers believe they've upgraded after six-time Pro Bowler David Akers, 38, who was cut in March, endured his worst season in 2012. Dawson has missed 14 attempts (93 of 107) since 2009, one more than Akers missed in last year's final 14 regular-season games.

Given his sustained success, Dawson is optimistic he can handle the inevitable surprises during the 49ers' final season at The Stick.

"I think those experiences can only help, but they're no guarantee," Dawson said. "So I've still got to put the work in. I've got to wear out Weather.com like I always do trying to figure out hourly forecasts and wind directions. Has it rained that week? Is the field going to be soft? Is it going to be firm? All that kind of stuff. I've got to do my homework."

Dawson did some advance Stick scouting in the offseason, visiting the stadium several times to get more acquainted after only playing two career games in San Francisco. In 2003, Dawson missed his only

attempt, a 48-yarder, at Candlestick. In 2011, he made his only kick, a 52-yarder. Not surprisingly, Dawson recalls that he kicked in ideal conditions during his previous visits to the stadium.

"The weather's been perfect," Dawson said. "I'm still holding out hope that I'm bringing that with me. Lord knows I've played in rough stuff elsewhere."

Dawson has also endured rough seasons, from a team perspective. He's appeared in just one postseason game and the 49ers' recent success was alluring when he weighed his free-agent options.

Now, the weather wonk who has kicked in all elements is eager to experience playoff conditions for the first time since 2003.

"I'm more looking forward now to kicks that are more team-centered, rather than personal accomplishments," Dawson said. "It's been communicated to me that's why I'm here."

Dixon a father figure for brothers

Rashun stays in Northern California in the baseball offseason and gets to see almost all of his older brother's games with the 49ers in person. They encourage each other, but it's the way they competed and pushed one another that kept them going during the hard times.

That hasn't changed. When asked, each of the Northern California based brothers claimed to be the best athlete in the family. Technically, it's still possible that Rashun could end up playing football to prove it. He has eligibility remaining at Mississippi State if he wants to put the pads back on. It's up to Rashun, because there's no chance Anthony is stepping in a batter's box any time soon.

"Rashun was a good football player," the elder Dixon said. "I feel like he could come out here and dominate. If he ever wanted to put the baseball bat down, I definitely feel he could make the transition."

From homeless to sports heroes. The Dixon bros. are a true example of the American Dream. Their story proves that almost anything is possible if you put your mind to it.

"It was a struggle, but it made us stronger," Anthony Dixon said. "We are definitely stronger for it today."

DL Glenn Dorsey Feature Story

Has Glenn Dorsey shed the bust label?

After being considered the best defensive player in the 2008 NFL Draft and someone who would anchor the Chiefs defense for years, Glenn Dorsey was deemed a disappointment by many.

The Chiefs did not re-sign their former fifth overall pick, who recorded just four sacks in five years with Kansas City.

But the 49ers snapped him up as a free agent during the offseason, and he seems to finally have found a nice fit.

"I've got all day to talk about Glenn Dorsey," beamed 49ers defensive line coach Jim Tomsula during a conversation with NFP. "Glenn is doing just a tremendous job."

Dorsey's "tremendous" play is all the more impressive, considering the adjustments he's had to make during his six year-career, which now finds him at nose tackle.

Drafted by the Chiefs in the Herm Edwards regime as a penetrating defensive tackle for the Tampa-2, 4-3 defense in the mold of Tommie Harris or Warren Sapp, Dorsey was then moved to defensive end in 2009 when Todd Haley and then Romeo Crennel installed the 3-4 defense used by the Patriots.

During his rookie season, Dorsey had just one sack despite starting 16 games as the three-technique tackle, lining up on the guard's outside shoulder. After moving to defensive end in a 3-4 — where, granted, sacks are not the best measurable to evaluate a defensive lineman — he collected just three more over the next four seasons while never really becoming a run stuffer either.

After nose tackle Ian Williams broke his ankle in Week 2, Dorsey became San Francisco's starting NT, a new role where he goes against the center.

"(It's) drastically different than what he was doing," Tomsula said. "This is a new schematic, new techniques and a position change for him."

At the listed figure of 6-1, 297, Dorsey seems small for the nose tackle position, which is typified by players like 300-pound behemoths, Casey Hampton and Vince Wilfork.

But for their scheme, the 49ers want defensive linemen who can move, and Dorsey, who has started six games for San Francisco, has the requisite lower body strength and can play with excellent bend and leverage.

"We play the nose guard position differently," Tomsula said. "The only fat guy I want in there is me."

Williams is just 6-1 and 307 pounds. Now with the Colts, Ricky Jean Francois, a LSU product like Dorsey, played some nose last year despite being 6-3 and 297 pounds.

Dorsey's success as an undersized nose — where he already has matched his career-high of two sacks — begs the question why Kansas City didn't use him as such instead of as a 3-4 defensive end where his role was to clog traffic rather than penetrate and wreak havoc up the field.

When pressed, Tomsula shrewdly sidestepped that hornet's nest of a question, instead answering respectfully.

"I thought Glenn played at a high level for the Kansas City Chiefs. I thought he did a nice job within the scheme," Tomsula said. "He did exactly what they asked him to do."

Although using Dorsey at nose instead of Kelly Gregg, Amon Gordon or Ron Edwards potentially could have elevated a Kansas City team that amassed just 23 wins from 2009 to 2012, the point is now moot.

Kansas City has found a very good one in 6-3, 346-pound Dontari Poe, who has 4.5 sacks in his second year.

With San Francisco, Dorsey has accelerated his transition to nose because of his work ethic, which Tomsula lauded.

When Tomsula picked up Dorsey at the airport for his free agent visit, they drove to the 49ers facility, passionately talked technique and walked the field, going over football schemes until about 3 a.m.

"He has just worked tirelessly," Tomsula said. "(He's) just a guy who's really excited about football."

In addition to Dorsey's athleticism and enthusiasm, he is bolstered by a scrappy, blue-collar but talented line, including Justin Smith, Ray McDonald, Demarcus Dobbs and Tony Jerod-Eddie, on one of the NFL's best defenses.

"I have the best coaching job in football," Tomsula said.

As part of his job, Tomusla has enjoyed working with Dorsey and overseeing the transition of a 28-year-old who may be on the cusp of fulfilling his potential.

"There's so much room to continue to grow," Tomsula said.

Gore is older, wiser, still an elite back in 9th season

Frank Gore wore a gray, hooded 49ers sweatshirt and a weary look on his face. He slowly walked through the locker room one day last week, moving with the deliberate gait of an old, creaky man.

Don't be fooled.

The 49ers take a four-game winning streak into Sunday's matchup with Jacksonville in London, fueled in part by their ageless and relentless running back. Gore reached an impressive milestone Oct. 13 against Arizona, surpassing 2,000 carries for his career.

He keeps getting the ball because he keeps cranking out yardage. Gore leads the NFL with 487 yards rushing over the past five weeks, a testament to his staying power at age 30. He also leads the league this season in runs of 20 yards or longer, with seven.

At least one former 49ers running back noticed.

"Frank doesn't play like he's hungry - he plays like he's starving," Roger Craig said in a phone interview. "He runs with a lot of tenacity and resilience."

Those traits are pushing Gore into an elite neighborhood. He stands No. 32 on the all-time list with 9,386 yards rushing; he needs only 22 more to pass Hall of Famer Earl Campbell.

Among active running backs, only Steven Jackson has gained more yards and carried the ball more times than Gore.

Craig spent 11 years in the NFL and had 1,991 carries (Gore also passed him on the all-time list Oct. 13), so he knows something about longevity at the position. Craig still lives in the Bay Area, follows the 49ers and closely watches the way Gore burrows through the slimmest of openings.

That running style helps explain how he's avoided catastrophic injuries throughout his pro career.

"He's not a big target, so you don't get a good clean shot on him," Craig said. "He stays low and his shoulders are always squared. Any time a running back keeps his shoulders squared, he protects himself and doesn't take really vicious hits."

"Frank is smart, he's patient and he knows how to use his blocks. A lot of running backs don't set up their blocks - they just run through the hole. Frank has a knack for setting up his blocks, and he's patient enough to hit the hole at full speed while staying really low."

Craig, in some ways, connects the generations of NFL running backs. He broke into the league with the 49ers in 1983, at a time when Walter Payton had established himself as the game's premier player at the position.

Payton also established one way for running backs to weather the weekly punishment: Hit force with force, as Craig put it.

That was the advice Payton gave Craig when they played together in the Pro Bowl after the 1985 season. More than two decades later, Craig passed along the same advice to Gore soon after he joined the 49ers.

Gore listened. Even now, after all these years, he initiates contact as often as he absorbs it.

"Those two guys really have one thing in common - they attack the defense," said 49ers running backs coach Tom Rathman, who blocked for Craig and now coaches Gore. "Both guys take the game to the defense instead of letting the game come to them. You've got longevity if you do it that way."

Gore has discovered another, uncommon ingredient to longevity: boxing. He incorporated that into his offseason training program two or three years ago, working out at Undisputed Boxing Gym in San Carlos and also at a gym in his hometown of Miami.

No, he doesn't take punches to the head. Gore works with mitts and bags and does a variety of drills. Rathman thinks it's helped Gore with his endurance, footwork and reactions.

"It's a different kind of conditioning - constantly moving, having your hands up, moving for three minutes and then resting for 30 seconds," Gore said. "Sometimes, between (football) plays, you see a lot of guys huffing and puffing. And I'm just breathing slowly. Boxing helps me with my breathing."

Gore has evolved in other ways, too. As recently as 2009, when Rathman rejoined the 49ers for his second stint as an assistant coach, Gore hated skipping even a single play - not only in games but also in practice.

His work ethic and sense of duty were admirable, but they weren't the wisest ways to extend his career.

Now 30, Gore understands the value of occasional rest. He's smarter than he was at 22 or 23, and he knows the 49ers have other capable running backs in Kendall Hunter and Anthony Dixon.

So Gore no longer demands or expects to shoulder the burden alone. He no longer views taking a play off as a sign of weakness.

"If he gets tired, he'll pull himself out of the game for a play or two," Craig said. "He's more mature now and understands he can't run every play. That's what I like about him - he listens. He's not beating himself up as much as he did early in his career."

Gore and Craig trade text messages occasionally, and Gore also talks to Hall of Famer Marshall Faulk, now an NFL Network analyst. Faulk had 2,836 carries in his 12-year career, putting him No. 15 on the all-time list.

Ever so steadily, Gore is climbing that list. He should soon pass Ahman Green and Earnest Byner. If he continues at his current pace of 18 carries per game, Gore also will pass Terry Allen, Shaun Alexander and Campbell by season's end.

It's nice company for a running back whose bruising, blue-collar style seldom attracts national headlines. But 2,000-plus carries speaks loudly about Gore's durability, production and perseverance.

"I didn't know I had that many," he said, smiling. "That's a lot, man."

49ers' Frank Gore hungrier than ever

Frank Gore got mad at the television last week at the 49ers' team hotel. Replays of Super Bowl XLVII appeared, and Gore's anger returned over a lost Lombardi Trophy.

The next day, after his first practice of training camp, Gore adamantly staked his claim for 2013.

"I respect all my guys here. I'm glad they push me," Gore began. "But I'm being real: I train like I still want to be 'The Man.' I really do.

"I'm not ready to pass the baton yet."

Overshadowed amidst the emergence of quarterback Colin Kaepernick's, Gore isn't about to minimize his impact on another Super Bowl run. Nor is he giving up the copyright to run behind an elite offensive line.

"That's what makes him great," right tackle Anthony Davis said. "If you look at him on the field, he looks like a rookie. Coaches have to pull him out of drills. He's trying to impress himself."

Eight years after arriving as a third-round gamble with surgically repaired knees, Gore's passion for football burns like an eternal flame inside his 5-foot-9 cauldron.

His constant search for validation could stop easily at the 49ers' record book, where he holds all major rushing records: 8,839 yards, 1,911 carries and 51 touchdowns.

But Gore knows how 30-year-old tailbacks are discriminately viewed, and he just hit that so-called age barrier May 14.

"People like to say what happens at 30," Hall of Fame running back Marshall Faulk said. "He'll find out. It has nothing to do with skills. It's the nature of the position.

"A boxer can take only so many punches, a tire has only so much tread. It's about being prepared for it."

Outside of conditioning in the 49ers offseason program — an undisclosed injury kept him out of team drills — Gore also worked out in his native south Florida with personal trainers, including Pete Bommarito and Terek Maddox.

"You look at it and you get angry, especially when you feel like you were the better team," Gore said. "As long as we keep that bitter taste in our mouth and keep working, hopefully we get back and win it this time."

Gore nearly won it for the 49ers last time, only to see the Ravens escape with a 34-31 win.

His 33-yard run out of the pistol formation put the 49ers at the Ravens' 7-yard line with 2:31 remaining. It was his final carry of the season. The only man between him and a Super Bowl-winning, legacy-defining touchdown was linebacker Dannell Ellerbe, who ran Gore out of bounds.

Gore (19 carries, 110 yards, one touchdown) initially thought he could have cut back to score. But upon watching replays later, he's convinced Ellerbe took a perfect angle. Four plays — and three incompletions — later, the 49ers got no closer than the 5-yard line.

"Yeah, I wish I could have scored it," Gore said. "But it's not just that. There are some plays on the goal line, like the last play. I wish I would have read the defense better, then stepped back inside (to block) and help Kap get a better throw."

Hurried up the middle, Kaepernick's fourth-down pass fell incomplete to Michael Crabtree, sealing the 49ers' first Super Bowl loss in six trips.

Blocking is what's separated Gore from most tailbacks. Last season, he smothered Bears linebacker Lance Briggs on a goal-line, blitz pick-up. But the block — the play — most admired by running backs coach Tom Rathman came two weeks later, when Gore threw a cut block that sprung Kaepernick for a 50-yard run in St. Louis.

As Gore returns for a ninth season, it's worth noting Rathman played in nine (1986-93 49ers, 1994 Raiders) before his body told him to retire. (Gore's contract runs through 2014.)

"He's still got some youth left in him," Rathman said of Gore. "Look at him when he runs. He still has the same moves as he's always had. He's a tremendous football player with great passion and desire to be one of the best."

Faulk, who played until he was 32, is also proud of Gore's mindset. But Faulk expects Gore's workload to diminish, in part from the offense's use of read-option plays.

"It took him time to adjust to that (last season)," Faulk said. "Frank is like me — old school, where you line up and want to know if you're getting the ball."

Gore's main understudies, Kendall Hunter and LaMichael James, provided relief last season while Gore raced for 1,214 yards and eight touchdowns, the second-highest marks of his career.

The proverbial baton, however, remains firmly in Gore's grasp. Hunter is coming off an Achilles tear. James is learning the pro game after debuting just last December. And Marcus Lattimore, this year's third-round draft gamble, may not play until next season because of his surgically repaired knees.

"Everyone wants (Gore) to be the man," receiver Kyle Williams said. "No one is going to take that from him."

Eight years ago, Gore reported to camp as Kevan Barlow's understudy, a scenario that came to Gore's mind last season when Kaepernick waited behind Alex Smith.

"Even though Alex was the man, he wanted to play," Gore said of Kaepernick. "He reminded me of my rookie year. It's never wrong to think you're better than the guy. He always wanted to play.

"I remember telling him the week of the (Oct. 7) Buffalo game: 'Just keep working. You'll get your shot.' It eventually happened, and he took advantage of it."

So has Gore.

Remarkably resilient Gore getting better with age in San Francisco

For obvious reasons, we spent much of the season marveling at the freakish recuperative powers of Vikings running back Adrian Peterson, who made a serious run at the single-season rushing record despite being less than a year removed from major reconstructive knee surgery. If there were a lifetime award for playing at a high level after overcoming or playing through significant injuries, however, San Francisco running back Frank Gore might win hands down.

He tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee during spring ball following a solid freshman season at the University of Miami, but was back on the practice field late that fall. The next year he tore the ACL in his right knee, but returned to run for more than 1,000 yards the following season. Since entering the NFL in 2005 as a third-round choice, he has suffered abdominal strains, ankle and shoulder sprains, a hip pointer, a broken hand and bruised ribs, among other things. Yet he has missed an average of just under 1.5 games a season the last seven years.

His resiliency is largely due to genetics and toughness, but there is an ample dose of passion in the recipe. It might not be as public as a Ray Lewis pre-game dance or speech, but it's obvious behind the closed doors of the locker room, where the soft-spoken 5-foot-9, 217-pound veteran has been known to cry at his locker after losses, or on the practice field, where during training camp in 2007 coaches had to hide his helmet because he kept sneaking onto to the practice field despite having a broken hand.

Gore was so upset with what his coaches had done that his emotions fluctuated between anger and disappointment. Never mind that he was the franchise back who had just signed a \$28 million extension. His love for the game is deeper than a Langston Hughes poem.

"He was legitimately upset, down on himself, teary-eyed, mad that he's not out here practicing with us," quarterback Alex Smith said at the time.

His passion has not dissipated five seasons later. If anything it's increased, because the 49ers can advance to their first Super Bowl since the 1994 season with a win Sunday in Atlanta. They were in the same position a year ago, but lost in overtime to the visiting Giants. For Gore, the defeat hurt more than any injury he had ever experienced. If the redness in his eyes last January didn't say so, the smile on his face last Saturday after beating the Packers did.

Making that moment sweeter Saturday was Gore's ability to play through injuries. Neither he nor the team would discuss his ailment, but doctors hovered around him in the locker room and led him away for examination shortly after the media were allowed in. He returned later and said he was fine, but with Gore you never know, because he's always there when the 49ers need him.

"It's truly remarkable," says Broncos great Terrell Davis, whose career was cut short by a knee injury. "Guys typically don't come back to be the same player after that type of knee injury, and you definitely don't see many bounce back and have the type of career that Frank is having. When he had his second injury, I'm sure people wrote him off and said his career is over, or maybe he'd be just an average back at the next level. Now he's one of the top three backs in this league."

Gore turned 29 last May, which is typically the age when running backs start slowing down. But this season he ran for 1,214 yards and eight touchdowns, the rushing total the second-most in his career, and the touchdowns tying for second-most. His 8,231 yards rushing over the last seven seasons trail only Peterson (8,849) and Steven Jackson (8,416). To him, age truly is just a number. Against the Packers last week he got stronger as the game progressed, gaining 73 of his 119 yards in the final one-plus quarters.

"I've known Frank since we were little kids in Miami," says Lions linebacker Stephen Tulloch. "We played against each other in Little League, high school and college. I have more respect for him now than ever. To tear his ACL in two different legs, to lose his mother to [kidney disease], to face the injuries he's faced as a pro -- he just stays so positive and works so hard. We train together in the offseason, and he goes twice a day. He's just what you'd expect from an All-Pro."

Gore is one of the game's most complete backs, a threat as a runner and a receiver and unflinching as a protector. His football IQ is among the highest on the team, which is a testament to not only him but also position coach Tom Rathman, who got him to see the game as a quarterback does. That was invaluable, because it allowed Gore to recognize the stress points in the defense and to see where the holes and crevices would be before the snap. Not that he needed the advantage.

His vision and balance already make him a monster to bring down. He also runs low behind his pads and has the power and burst to break tackles or slip through small openings. His breakaway speed isn't what it was early in his career, and he has had to learn to be more patient with his reads after the 49ers began using more option-like zone reads with Colin Kaepernick at quarterback instead of Smith. But when it's time to deliver, he's always there.

Part of it stems from conversations he used to have with wideout Isaac Bruce, who spent two years with the Niners before retiring in his mid-30s. "He told me when I hit 28, 29, everyone was going to tell me that I'm supposed to decline," Gore says. "But he always told me, 'Don't ever listen to them. As long as you train hard, put the right stuff in your body, go out there and practice hard, you can do whatever you want to do.' Ever since he told me that, I never listen to the statistics of a running back. I know that from this point on in my career, I'm going to hear that every year, every year. As long as God blesses me in the morning to get up and work hard, I'm going to take advantage of it."

That means seeing a "muscle doctor" and massage therapist on Monday when his body is hurting. It means more therapy on Tuesday or Thursday, if necessary. It means laser therapy to help heal his soft-tissue injuries. And it means a visit with the chiropractor on Friday.

With age comes wisdom, which is why Gore now says he sees his knee injuries in college as a blessing. "I was always a hard worker, but when I was younger I didn't have to put the extra work in like some of the other guys," he says. "I'm happy that God made things happen the way that they happened because I probably would have left school real early, with my mind not right, and been a top-five, top-10 pick, not ready for that. I would have probably been hanging around the wrong guys, who were behind me just because of what I was doing.

"But when things started happening to me [from an injury standpoint] I kind of saw who my real friends were," he continues. "I'm glad God put me through that. It made me even hungrier to get back to something that I love to do. Third-round pick, looking at the other guys who I felt weren't better than me that went before me -- it always gave me something to push toward."

His primary goal used to be finishing with more career rushing yards than the running backs selected ahead of him in 2005: first-round picks Ronnie Brown, Cedric Benson and Cadillac Williams, and second-rounders J.J. Arrington and Eric Shelton. He not only has done that -- his 8,839 yards are 2,822 more than Benson -- but his six seasons of at least 1,000 yards rushing are equal to the combined total of the aforementioned five.

"The turnover at that position is so great because there's always somebody younger to take your job, so really it's a remarkable story what Frank has done," says Cardinals guard Adam Snyder, who teamed with Gore from 2005-11. "I can remember being in college and I saw the story on Frank on ESPN. I just remember thinking, 'Wow! What a story.' To have both knees blown out and still be drafted -- and that highly -- for me he's an inspiration, he really is. To just have the drive to keep going, most guys would have probably given up. But he doesn't know what that means. He's incredible."

All-Pro lupati aims to get even better

Mike lupati is the 49ers' quiet superstar.

Many others get the high-profile endorsement deals and camera time, but the 49ers' left guard has become every bit the NFL standout at his position as Patrick Willis, Justin Smith, Aldon Smith, Colin Kaepernick, Frank Gore and Vernon Davis.

lupati just goes about his business without much fanfare. In his third NFL season, lupati was a big reason the 49ers averaged 5.6 yards a carry on their 213 rushing attempts to the left side a year ago. He earned his first selection to the Pro Bowl and was chosen as a first-team All-Pro.

But the soft-spoken lupati does not get too carried away with the national recognition he received as a result of last season.

"Mostly, I want to win," he said. "Personally, I want to be better than what I was last year. It's not about accolades. It's about improving my technique and getting better every snap."

lupati, an imposing 6-foot-5, 331 pounds, is known as a punishing force in the run game. But defensive linemen and linebackers are not the only things he hits hard. He is among a group of veteran players coach Jim Harbaugh said sets the tone for the entire team with maniacal workout habits.

"Mike lupati is one of those guys who just hits it hard," Harbaugh said. "(He's) here in the morning along with all the other guys who hit it hard, hit it every day and come in extra. Mike's one of those morning guys.

"He's a 'Be-about-it guy' not a 'Talk-about-it kind of a player,' which is universally respected in the locker room. A strong, tough man."

He was plenty good when he arrived on the scene as the 49ers' No. 17 overall pick in the 2010 draft. lupati mostly relied on brute force, but his work with offensive line coach Mike Solari helped him nail down the Week 1 starting job.

As he enters his fourth NFL season, lupati has made every start in his career. Solari has been there every step. This will be his third season getting instruction from Tim Drevno, who shares the offensive line responsibilities with Solari. Former Washington State coach Paul Wulff is in his second year as senior offensive assistant with a focus on line play.

"The technique was there, but it's not as good as now," lupati said of his rookie season. "I'm learning a lot from coach Solari and the offensive line staff -- Drevno, Wulff -- they're the ones who teach you everything, day in and day out. You just have to listen and absorb everything, and then execute it on the field."

The 49ers developed one of the best offensive lines in the NFL a year ago. And most of the group has a chance to remain together for a while.

Pro Bowl left tackle Joe Staley, who combines with lupati to provide the 49ers with perhaps the best left side in the NFL, is signed through 2017. Right guard Alex Boone has three seasons remaining on his contract. And right tackle Anthony Davis, who was chosen six spots ahead of lupati in the 2010 draft, signed a contract extension in April that averages more than \$6.5 million annually through 2019.

lupati, 26, is one of several young 49ers players in line for big second contracts. lupati, Kaepernick, Aldon Smith and Michael Crabtree are signed through the 2014 season.

Iupati could become among the highest-paid guard in the NFL with his next contract. Currently, Tampa Bay's Carl Nicks averages \$9.5 million annually, while New England's Logan Mankins and New Orleans' Jahri Evans average \$8.5 million and \$8.1 million per season.

There has been no significant progress toward an extension, and it's possible serious talks will not resume until after the season. Iupati made it clear he wants to remain with the 49ers for a long time.

But in the meantime, he said he tries not to think about his future beyond this season.

"I don't know," he said. "I have one more year (after the current season) left on my contract, and all I'm going to do is play my heart out and we'll see from there.

"I don't want to think about it and something doesn't go right, and this and that. I just play football."

Hard work keeps Kaepernick ahead of the game

A cloud of skunk spray wafts across the players' deserted parking lot, above which looms the 49ers' embryonic stadium.

Skunks don't do daylight, so yes, it's very early, a few minutes before 6, Wednesday morning. The first shift of stadium-construction workers hasn't yet fired up its equipment, so the scene is quiet. Players are not required to report for work until 8:45.

I was in Indianapolis over the weekend covering the Raiders-Colts and read an excellent profile in the Indianapolis Star on Andrew Luck, painting him as the un-celebrity quarterback.

The article quotes an Advertising Age reporter and sports-business expert, Michael McCarthy, on Luck turning down millions of dollars of offseason endorsement deals.

"He decided he didn't want to take the focus off football," McCarthy said. "If you're the 49ers, you have to ask yourself if you want Colin Kaepernick running all over the place and shooting commercials in the offseason. If you're the Redskins, do you want RGIII doing the same thing? For the most part, teams don't want their players distracted."

I pause here to give 49ers players and coaches a moment to wipe away tears of laughter.

On this, a typical morning, the only thing that might distract Colin Kaepernick from his mission might be a skunk waddling in front of his car as he swings into the driveway.

At exactly 6:01, Kaepernick's car glides into the empty lot and into the parking space nearest the entry gate. Wearing a knit cap and sweatshirt, Kaepernick hops quickly out of the car.

My plan is to say hi and ask him a couple questions, but Kaepernick slips through the gate like a spy and is gone. Elusive even in a parking lot.

Sunup is exactly 46 minutes away, but the lot is brightly lit. A few minutes later, I sneak a peek into the team's giant workout barn, also brightly lit, and Kaepernick is pounding a Stairmaster into submission.

That's your Hollywood quarterback, 49ers fans: always seeking the spotlight.

Let me make it clear that Kaepernick almost surely will frown when he learns a newspaper man staked out his arrival, like a skulking paparazzi, to verify reports of his early-birding. Kaepernick has been asked about it and always deflects the questions into praise for all his teammates.

The chronic early arrival is not designed to impress, is not an act of one-upsmanship over his teammates, although (again, I'm guessing) Kaepernick wouldn't mind if he were to inspire teammates to seek a slightly higher training gear.

And, in fact, he does.

Frank Gore, relentless footballer, tools into the players' lot at 6:32, beating the sun but not the Favored Son.

"I'm trying to beat Kaepernick," Gore tells me a couple of hours later. "I believe in 'First man here, last man to leave, best results.' "

Why arrive early?

"You get to do the extra stuff."

Did Gore ever beat Kaepernick to work?

"Tie a couple of times," Gore says with a smile, then adds, "I get Whitner."

Sure enough, safety Donte Whitner pulls into the lot at 6:48.

"I want to make sure I get my workout in," Whitner says later. "Really, I want to get my mind ready for the day."

Whitner adds, "Not too many people want to get up before 6. It means you are in bed early the night before."

During Wednesday's lunch break, Kaepernick does his weekly NFL mandated news conference in the locker room. I don't ask him about his work habits because I know I would get a nonanswer. For a celebrity quarterback, Kaepernick does not exert himself romancing the media. Many questions are greeted with mild discomfort, like when your dentist asks you if you've been flossing.

This is Kaepernick saying, I understand my media duty, but I'm here to work.

Does Kaepernick out-work Andrew Luck? That's like comparing apples and apples. Under the superficial differences - one guy is hip-hop, the other is uber-nerd - Luck and Kaepernick are practically twins.

Luck spent his offseason finishing his degree at Stanford. Kaepernick did a lot of Hollywooding, but they both worked like dogs on football.

Kaepernick always starts early.

"He's here when it's dark," says Mark Uyeyama, the 49ers' strength and conditioning coach.

Uyeyama takes care to salute the work ethic of all the players, but he gives a nod to the relentless nature of Kaepernick, whose conditioning, including plyometrics and other speed-enhancement work, is year-round.

"Kap's not gonna take down time," Uyeyama says. "He's just not."

The security guards at the entry gate say amen.

"He was here early every morning even on days when the other players weren't here," one of the guards says.

"He'll be out there doing crazy stuff," the other guard says. Running sprints in the dark. Pulling a weighted sled.

"Have you seen his abs?"

Not abs of tinsel, I would guess.

Breaking the Mold

Here is Colin Kaepernick posing with Michelle Obama a few weeks after the Super Bowl, both of them smooching a bicep in the quarterback's trademarked gesture. There he is on the cover of GQ, opening a leather jacket to reveal one of the tattoos that ignited a cultural conflagration. And there he is at the Country Music Awards; in a new Jaguar ad; in a tomato-red blazer and shades onstage at the ESPYs; at a Fourth of July party in a Miami Dolphins cap; in the buff for ESPN the Magazine's annual Body Issue.

This time last year, Kaepernick was invisible, sitting behind Alex Smith on the 49ers' depth chart while NFL pundits cooed over first-round rookies Andrew Luck and Robert Griffin III, apparently destined to become the quarterbacks of their generation. By mid-November, they had company, the kind that takes over the master bedroom and never leaves.

Kaepernick, a 2011 second-round draft pick, debuted as a starter on Monday Night Football, set a rushing record for quarterbacks with 181 yards in his first playoff game and ended the season just five yards from a winning touchdown in the Super Bowl. His No. 7 jersey soared to the top of the NFL sales chart during the spring. As the perks of instant fame began rolling in, so did predictable punditry concerns that his head would swell, and his teammates would be turned off.

Typically, an NFL player with only 10 starts on his resume cannot balance a celebrity circuit with the demands of growing in his job and maintaining his teammates' respect. In Kaepernick, however, we are looking at something of an original: a 25-year-old with deep wells of maturity about the things that matter and a healthy disregard for the things that don't; a quarterback who thinks, throws and runs with equal power; and a personality that ranges from teacher's pet to edgy fashionista.

"What can really be confusing to most people is that Colin is a very private, quiet kind of kid, and obviously, this summer it doesn't appear that that's the case," his father, Rick, said.

"But a lot of the things Colin did, he did at the request of his agents or the 49ers. And he got a great business degree from University of Nevada, where they taught him well. He understands what it is to market yourself."

Among the invitations he passed up was a night at the Grammy Awards, which took place a week after the 49ers lost the Super Bowl. Kaepernick had arranged to start training at CES Performance in Atlanta, and a glamorous event wouldn't deter him. He attended an industry party the night before the ceremony, then bailed out of Los Angeles.

"I was like 'Nooooo,'" his older brother, Kyle, said in mock exasperation. (He and his wife, Lindsay, ultimately went to the Country Music Awards with Colin.) "I think it was too close to the Super Bowl, and he just wasn't up for it. But could he have waited to get on the plane till Monday instead of Sunday? I think so, but he was: 'Nope, I've got to get to Atlanta to start working out.'"

A couple of months later, 49ers coach Jim Harbaugh uttered his lone skeptical remark about off-season excesses from Kaepernick. He worried about the quarterback's fondness for the weight room.

"It's something we've talked about," Harbaugh told CSN Bay Area. "I don't want you getting too jacked-up, Colin."

After training-camp sessions this summer, as most of the 49ers dragged themselves off the field, Kaepernick routinely galloped toward the locker room, beating everyone there and beaming as he did it. In the spring, when the 49ers worked out together, one of the beat writers, Matt Barrows of the Sacramento Bee, noticed that a certain car always sat in the space closest to the entrance, an indicator

that the driver had been the first arrival. It was Kaepernick's white Jaguar, compensation from the most elite of his new sponsors.

He was repeating a pattern set at Pitman High School, where he'd race through the halls to get a seat up front in Amy Curd's pre-calculus class.

Curd has frequently told that story to reporters, making it difficult to fret over Kaepernick's staying power in the mentally challenging job of an NFL quarterback. How many sensational athletes turn an advanced placement math teacher into a go-to interview subject?

"Not only is he super-gifted physically, but he's very, very cerebral," 49ers left tackle Joe Staley said. "He is Tom Brady and Peyton Manning-smart with the athleticism of ... I don't know who to compare him to."

Focusing on only the physical gifts, some people have compared him to Michael Vick. But at this stage of his career, Vick did not have an accurate arm. His entire six seasons in Atlanta, he never completed more than 56.4 percent of his passes; Kaepernick completed 62.4 last year. Vick has also admitted he did not apply himself to studying the game. No one would accuse Kaepernick, the A student, of that.

"What I see, on top of all the talent, is football IQ," said ESPN analyst Ron Jaworski. "The ability to decode defenses, when he's at the top of his drop, to know where to go with the football. Now, is this every time? Absolutely not. But a guy as inexperienced as he is on the field, when I see grasp the concepts of the 49ers' offense, I think he has a really high football IQ."

Greg Roman, the 49ers' offensive coordinator, says that Kaepernick's study habits reinforce a gift for processing information.

"He's the kind of guy that once he sees something, it gets embedded," Roman said.

When Jaworski predicted two weeks ago on ESPN that Kaepernick "could be one of the greatest quarterbacks ever," the hyperbole police went on high alert. They skirted the "one of" phrase while chiding Jaworski for ignoring the small sample size of Kaepernick's skills.

Jaworski only said what became startlingly obvious over those 10 starts, adding the credentials of a former NFL quarterback to the observation. He saw the potential very early in Kaepernick's November debut against the Bears, replacing the concussed Smith. The first point of sale came on a 57-yard pass midway through the first quarter.

"The Kyle Williams corner route against a man-coverage press in the slot was a phenomenal throw, just a phenomenal throw," Jaworski said. "He read the coverage, anticipated the throw, threw him open, just a perfectly thrown ball and a perfect read."

The closest parallel to Kaepernick's development would be the arrival of Brady, who also became the starter early in his second season for a strong team that ended up in the Super Bowl. In 2001, Brady started 18 games for the Patriots, finished three with a passer rating over 100, came in below 70 six times, and didn't top 90 in any of his three postseason starts. In 10 starts, Kaepernick compiled a passer rating over 100 five times, hit a low of 72, and posted a rating over 90 in all three postseason games.

Remember: The passer rating discounts Kaepernick's 181 playoff rushing yards against an utterly flummoxed Green Bay and his 679 yards for the season.

Kaepernick balks at attempts to classify him as a running quarterback, and he pointedly told GQ that he had negative rushing yards in high school, mostly because his coaches did not want him to get hurt.

"I could just hear chainsaws, like someone was going to cut the franchise in half," his coach at Pitman, Brandon Harris, has said.

In this exhibition season, the 49ers' coaches limited him to just 40 snaps and 23 pass attempts, less than half of Peyton Manning's 54 attempts in his second preseason with the Broncos. Clearly, the coaches weren't worried about whether he had lost focus in the off-season.

"There's definitely something that really drives him to be great, to be successful," Harbaugh said. "We hand out a goal packet every year and guys list their individual goals and their team goals. Just for fun, I went back and looked at his goals from last year, and it was darn near verbatim what he achieved."

Asked to explain the goals, the coach followed a pattern of withholding specifics, a modus operandi the quarterback has adopted in his own formal media sessions.

In Harbaugh, an NFL quarterback for 15 years, Jaworski believes that Kaepernick has found something of a football soulmate. He is not alone in that opinion.

Immediately after he was drafted, Kaepernick and his parents, Rick and Teresa, drove the 100 miles from their Turlock home to the 49ers' complex. Colin would stay in the Bay Area and visit Harbaugh's home that night. "We were just hanging out to get to know each other," Kaepernick said. Before his parents departed, the coach

handed a phone number to Rick Kaepernick and asked him to call it. The next morning, he and Jack Harbaugh, Jim's father and a longtime college coach, spent about an hour talking.

"That was a lot of fun. We had some good discussions about Jim and Colin growing up and comparing the two and how competitive they are," Rick Kaepernick said. "I think the two of them are alike, a lot alike."

Friends and teammates argue that the pair's off-field personas diverge too greatly for anyone to confuse them. "Kap's got 400 pairs of shoes, Harbaugh's probably only got two," said a grinning Ricardo Lockette, a wide receiver who has roomed with the quarterback for most of the past two years. "Kap plans his clothes out every day, and Harbaugh wears the same thing all the time."

Lockette then smiled and added cheekily: "You know Kap has a lot of hats, right?" Ah yes, the Dolphins cap. The lamentations about its connotations became the dumbest controversy of the NFL offseason.

"Chalk it up to a slow time in the media cycle," Harbaugh said, spot-on in his dismissiveness. In his playing days, such an accessory would have been deemed traitorous. Then again, in his day, accessorizing wasn't much of a priority. The coach understands that Kaepernick is very much of his generation, and that the two can be miles apart in style and of one mind about football.

In a game or practice, they're apparently quite in sync. "If the tempo is just a little bit off, they both simultaneously get on everybody," guard Alex Boone said. "At this camp, not once has Kap missed a beat on anything."

As a lineman, Boone said, he appreciates that his young quarterback will ask the coaches to move a practice along to get the big guys off their feet sooner. Kaepernick also interceded when reporters surrounded center Jonathan Goodwin after a soggy night in New England led to four fumbled snaps. Crossing the locker room, Kaepernick told the media: "Don't ask Goody about it. It was my fault."

Kaepernick has established a pattern of meticulously showing gratitude to the people who take care of him. When his high school coach decided to leave Pitman to move closer to his ailing mother, Kaepernick appeared on stage at graduation ceremonies and brought Harris to tears with a surprise goodbye. The Grammys, he could skip. Not this.

After the draft, Kaepernick asked his parents to help him find a charitable organization that he could support. He wanted one devoted to children with heart defects, honoring the memory of two Kaepernick sons -- Lance and Kent -- who died shortly after birth. Still longing for a child to join Kyle and their

daughter, Devon, Rick and Teresa adopted Colin. The family moved to California a few years later and moved on as much as possible, but Colin didn't overlook his family's loss.

"When we would take the kids back to Wisconsin, we would always stop at the cemetery, but we never really dwelled on it," Rick Kaepernick said. "We just said 'These are your two brothers, and this is what they died of,' and we'd go back home and we didn't talk about it. So there were some tears from me and Teresa when he told us what he wanted to do."

The Kaepernicks chose Camp Taylor, based near Turlock, and the involvement bloomed beyond Colin's donations. Teresa recently spent a long weekend volunteering at a gathering for families of the ailing children.

Since Colin's quick ascent, his family has done a lot of storytelling on his behalf. The history was too big to cover in the quick interviews allowed during a football season: how a white family gained a biracial son; how he rebuffed MLB teams hoping to draft him as a pitcher in favor of the sport that yielded just one Division I scholarship offer; how he chose a tortoise destined to live a century and reach 115 pounds as his pet; how he always, always ended up being different and still fitting in anywhere he wanted, and why his tattoos did not make him, as a Sporting News columnist infamously wrote last year, "look like he just got paroled."

The columnist, David Whitely, now says he wishes he could take a mulligan on the piece, focusing on what Kaepernick's prominent body art means in an era when institutions like the military still restrict visibility of tats. "I would have dropped my usual lame satire," he said by e-mail, "and been far more serious and precise in attempting to make the point."

Kaepernick's parents stood up for him in USA Today, and plenty of people who knew the quarterback pointed out that the tattoos consisted largely of Bible verses. Their son responded wordlessly, pressing his facemask against his inked right bicep after a touchdown. Social-media users coined the term "Kaepernicking." The quarterback and his agents trademarked the term. The First Lady, now dethroned as the owner of America's most renowned biceps, struck the pose when Kaepernick joined her and several other athletes at an event promoting physical fitness in Chicago.

"It's ironic that the tattoo article actually ended up springboarding a lot of his opportunities after the season," his father said.

Kyle Kaepernick said his brother sometimes seemed taken aback by the extent of his new fame. The two went to a grocery store not far from their parents' home on Fathers' Day, and a mobbing ensued. "It's not like he went to LSU or Alabama, so he was used to all of it," Kyle said. "People knew who he was in Reno, but it was never like that." Lockette, the longtime roommate, said the two would try to devise disguises to get Kaepernick out of the house without creating a scene.

"He'd say 'You know, maybe nobody will recognize me if I just put some shades on,'" Lockette said. "I'm like 'OK, so if Obama walked into the mall and he put shades on, you think no one would recognize him?'"

His family isn't quite so surprised. His brother and father both suspected that history and personality would make him a source of fascination.

"He never really fell into norm," his father said. "He would do the Punt, Pass and Kick (when he was young), and he'd win it every year. Then the last few years, he said, 'I don't want to do it anymore. Let someone else win it. I don't care.'"

Very soon, Rick Kaepernick wants to retreat from the stage and just enjoy being a dad to three successful children. (Kyle and Devon work at the Hilmar Cheese Co., where Rick is a vice president.) "Most of the story's been told," he said, "and I think it's time for us to get out of the spotlight and let the rest of it happen. When he's 40, it should make a really interesting book."

The family has been approached about a biography, he said, but declined for the same reason that Colin demurred when told that Jaworski had projected him as an all-time great.

"I'm very flattered by it," he said. "But at the same time, I haven't played a full season yet."

49ers' Kaepernick is an uplifting presence

Anyone worried whether Colin Kaepernick's sudden celebrity has altered the 49ers' quarterback or turned him Hollywood-soft need only arrive at the team practice facility at, oh, 5:55 on any given morning.

There you'd find Kaepernick's white Jaguar sedan – recompense for one of the ads he shot this offseason – in the first stall of the parking lot and Kaepernick on a bench in the weight room. Or sprinting across the practice field. Or tethered, via a 10-foot chain, to a stack of 35-pound plates he's dragging across the turf.

Michael Wilhoite, a young reserve inside linebacker eager to stay on the squad last year, said he'd routinely arrive before sunrise intending to be the first player in the weight room. Instead, he'd find Kaepernick, then a backup to Alex Smith, had beaten him into the office.

"And it's the same situation this year," Wilhoite said. "You walk in and he's already drinking his protein shake. Because he's already done with his workout."

Kaepernick's fame hasn't dimmed his work ethic, and it hasn't changed his everyman appeal, either.

Coach Jim Harbaugh said he's never seen a quarterback who moves among different age groups, different cliques, different positions in the locker room like Kaepernick. That's what makes him a unique leader – he not only has everyone's respect, he has everyone's affection.

"You don't always see that, but I see that with Kap," Harbaugh said. "He's universally respected in the locker room and loved by his teammates. I guess I see that from the 25-to-35 demographic, too, buying jerseys. People relate to him. They like his company, they like being around him, and I've noticed that very much from our team."

Indeed, universality has become Kaepernick's signature.

His biological parents are biracial. He was adopted by a Midwest family who moved to California. He's a quarterback who's known as much for his running ability as his powerful right arm.

The notion his tattooed arms and torso make him appear thuggish – silly and old-fashioned when it was written in the Sporting News in November – seems even more absurd now after an offseason when advertisers approached him in droves. His body art literally has become a selling point.

Buttoned-up Jaguar shot a series of commercials with Kaepernick in its F-Type sports car in May. He also has deals with Nike, MusclePharm, Yahoo Fantasy Football and SK Energy, an energy drink created by rapper Curtis "50 Cent" Jackson.

His No. 7 jersey has been the league's top seller since April. And further evidence an inked-up athlete is no longer seen as menacing – he's wildly popular among children. Kaepernick found that out when he was mobbed by kids at an Xbox event in Corte Madera last month.

When nose tackle Ian Williams visited a Boys & Girls Club in his native Orlando, Fla., this offseason, the kids there politely asked about him, the hometown hero, but they really were interested whether Williams ever hung out with Kaepernick.

"It was, 'Do you know Kaepernick? I mean I like you, but I love Kap! I want his jersey!' " Williams said with a laugh.

Williams knows the quarterback quite well. He and Demarcus Dobbs, two undrafted defensive linemen in 2011, were part of Kaepernick's rookie class. They remain among his closest friends on the team, heading to his house to play video games or chatting about Kaepernick's favorite topic – sneakers.

"He'll walk off the practice field and he'll headbutt Justin (Smith) or Ray (McDonald)," Williams said. "He's still the same. He's still focused. He's a good guy. He's my boy."

Another indication Kaepernick doesn't feel his status and celebrity have put him above his mates: He anticipates repercussions from perhaps his most well-known offseason venture, the ESPN The Magazine cover from earlier this month in which tattoos are the only thing he's wearing.

So far, Kaepernick said, there have been no related hijinks. But he knows they're coming.

"I haven't had anything real bad yet," he said. "So I feel like they're plotting on me right now."

Wilhoite insists the quarterback has nothing to fear.

"No, I give him props," he said of the magazine shoot. "It takes a lot of guts to do that. He worked hard on his body, and he's always in the weight room. So I think everything he's getting right now he deserves."

Colin Kaepernick 'Universally Respected'

After 10 starts in the National Football League, Colin Kaepernick has become a popular figure in national news headlines, but even more so in the 49ers locker room.

"Kap is a diverse guy," Jim Harbaugh said on Thursday, the first day of San Francisco's training camp. "The coaches love him. The players love him. It's unique."

The 49ers coach believes Kaepernick was a respected player even before he took over the starting reins last season in a dominant win over the Chicago Bears on "Monday Night Football," but it's only heightened based on the young quarterback's commitment and leadership in the team's offseason program.

"I see that with Kap," Harbaugh said. "He's universally respected and loved by his teammates. People relate to him. They like his company. They like being around him. I've noticed that very much from our team."

Harbaugh believes it's an important aspect for a quarterback to be revered by his teammates. He's noticed in the locker room and in the meal room. Kaepernick is never alone.

"For a leader to be effective, they've got to be followed by most of the group that he's leading," the 49ers coach added. "Colin Kaepernick definitely has that love and respect from his teammates."

Kaepernick agrees with his coach.

"I think it's very important," Kaepernick said. "If your players and teammates don't respect you, someone they can talk to or associate with, they're not going to follow you... they're not going to play as hard for you."

National media recognition for the 25-year-old quarterback doesn't bother Harbaugh. The head coach sees no change in Kaepernick even with commercials, magazine covers and award shows under the 49ers quarterback's belt this offseason.

"Not going to peel back the onion in every possible way, but he's a very diverse guy and very intelligent guy," Harbaugh said of Kaepernick's off the field activities in 2013. "He's got a lot of common sense. It's plus, plus, plus across the board when you talk about the way he thinks, the way he operates. It's A-plus."

Kaepernick isn't worried about the attention from his off the field clothing commentary or appearances in the ESPN Body Issue.

Football is all that Kaepernick cares about, or cares to discuss.

"Football is football. I'm here to work," he said. "I'm here to make sure I get better."

Harbaugh only wants to see Kaepernick continue to improve each day of camp, just like the rest of the team.

"Make each day an accomplishment for our future," Harbaugh said repeatedly in opening camp press conference, stressing the importance of taking the team's NFC Championship defense one day at a time.

Kyle Williams also shared insight on what makes the 49ers quarterback so likable. Like many players on the roster, Kaepernick had to work his way into a prominent role. That fact, too, makes the 49ers quarterback universally admired.

"He's able to relate to all of us," said the 49ers wideout, who was removed from the PUP list and added to the active roster prior to the start of camp. "He went through the struggle of being a backup like all of us."

"He knows how to prepare himself and guys respect that," Williams, the fourth-year pro went on to say. "I don't know if there's a better competitor in the league."

Justin Smith, a defensive co-captain and respected All-Pro defensive tackle, co-signed the sentiment of the 49ers wide receiver when asked about Kaepernick, a former second-round pick.

The way Kaepernick earned his starting role was also recognized my players in the trenches like Smith. "He seized the moment and it seems like he's still doing that," said Smith, who is now 100 percent healthy following a late-season triceps injury. "He's working his tail-off and leading by example and showing the other guys how to do it.

"It's pretty cool to watch him do it from the beginning."

With the respect of his teammates, Kaepernick has found that many of the 49ers are coming up to him with football questions.

"I think they're more comfortable with me," he said. "I think they have more confidence with me."

Colin Kaepernick Does Not Care What You Think About His Tattoos

On a hot May night in California's Central Valley, graduation night at Pitman High, eight police officers stand in a multipurpose room listening to instructions. One is an undercover cop. A couple are SWAT-teamers in bulletproof vests. Something very big is fixing to happen.

The officers are given their assignments by veteran detective Jason Tosta—they're told to make sure that no one rushes the stage and that the guest speaker enters and exits without being mobbed. "This was supposed to be a secret," says Tosta, "but now it's all over Facebook and Twitter, so I'm sure some people know he'll be here." The detail is told there was lax security at a grocery store appearance recently; people were pushing over displays to get to the guest, who had to make a hustling exit to escape the fray—only to be followed by three cars after he left.

Then Colin Kaepernick, quarterback of the San Francisco 49ers, walks in, accompanied by his parents, Rick and Teresa. Pleasantries are exchanged. Colin, Pitman Class of 2006, hugs a few of his former teachers. Pictures are taken. The cops brief him on what's about to happen.

In a moment of downtime before Kaepernick takes the stage, a couple of the officers have a chance to engage with him. Do they ask him what it was like to start in the Super Bowl, seven years after he took a photography class in the room right across the hall? How it felt to set an NFL record for rushing yards by a quarterback in a game—in the playoffs, no less? Whether he's daunted by following in the footsteps of Joe Montana and Steve Young?

No. They want to talk body art.

"Love your tattoos," Tosta, 42, tells Kaepernick. "I've got my family history running down my left arm. My mom had to have a heart transplant, so I've got a hand holding a human heart."

Kaepernick tells them about his post-Super Bowl tattoos. He had massive Polynesian tribal symbols done on both pecs, so that his upper torso is covered in a rubric inscrutable to most of us. "They represent family, inner strength, humility and spiritual growth," Kaepernick says of the images. He had the work done in San Jose three nights after the Super Bowl, sitting for six hours until it was finished at 2:30 a.m. The officers are at rapt attention.

New world out there. New quarterback for it.

Adopted. Biracial. Supremely tatted. A runner sometimes. A thrower sometimes. Colin Kaepernick, age 25, is the anti-Manning, and he likes that. A lot.

Not that Kaepernick—who played his college ball at Nevada, the only school to offer him a ride—has anything against the quarterbacks with the classic big-school football pedigree: Tom Brady, Peyton and Eli Manning, Aaron Rodgers, Matthew Stafford, Matt Ryan. But none of those quarterbacks was adopted at the age of six weeks. None had friends questioning whether he was white or black. None is being pursued by a birth mom he's not interested in knowing. None, apparently, has the same yearning to have 70% percent of his upper body covered in ink. None has rushed for 181 yards in an NFL playoff game. For none did his 10th NFL start come in the Super Bowl.

Now, after paying tribute to his retiring former football coach, after stopping to pick up pepperoni pizza at Little Caesars, and after dropping his mom and dad off at their house in Modesto, Kaepernick is in the

back seat of an SUV, heading to his home near the 49ers' training facility in Santa Clara. It's past 10 p.m., pitch-black outside on California 99, and the 90 miles or so to cover means there's plenty of time for Kaepernick to talk frankly about himself and his place in the NFL. At the Super Bowl, when the world was trying to get to know him, he gave brief, vanilla responses in his press conferences; his longest answer might have been about 14 words. Now, he's got a lot more to say:

"I want to try to break that perfect football mold. I don't want to be someone who can be put into a category. I want to be my own person. I want my own style. I want to be someone who can't really be compared to anybody.

"And I want to have a positive influence as much as I can. I've had people write me because of my tattoos. I've had people write me because of adoption. I've had people write me because they're biracial. I've had people write me because their kids have heart defects—my mom had two boys who died of heart defects, which ultimately brought about my adoption. So, to me, the more people you can touch, the more people you can influence in a positive way or inspire, the better."

Great players can touch more people, and Kaepernick knows that half an NFL season does not make him a great player. But today's game sets up nicely for a quarterback with his tools: fast feet and a powerful arm. The movement toward a new style of quarterback is here. Pete Carroll, the Seahawks' coach, told me in January that the spate of young, mobile QBs "is the evolution of football—screaming at us." Ohio State coach Urban Meyer said of Kaepernick: "I mean, Wow! He's running 60 yards untouched? When was the last time you saw a quarterback run untouched in the NFL for 60 yards? People said, 'You can't do that in the NFL!' Yes you can."

During the ride back to the Bay Area, Kaepernick is enlightening when talking about the final, frustrating drive of the Super Bowl, the series he keeps playing over in his head. But it's all the other stuff that makes him a compelling protagonist in the world of football, and in the larger, more complicated world beyond sports.

ADOPTION

Kaepernick was born in Milwaukee in November 1987 to a tall, athletic 19-year-old woman named Heidi Russo. She is white; the father, whom Russo has never identified, was African-American. A month after Colin's birth, Russo gave the baby up to a young couple from Fond du Lac, Wisc., Teresa and Rick Kaepernick, who'd lost two infant boys to heart disease and were pining for a son to join their two other children, son Kyle and daughter Devon.

For a while Teresa sent Russo photos of Colin as he grew, but it took such an emotional toll on Russo that, she has said, she asked Teresa to stop. Russo, in interviews over the past year, has said she wants to meet Colin and has reached out to him through social media, trying to arrange a meeting. He has declined, saying he feels he knows his parents.

I know my mom would never tell me not to go meet [my biological mother]; she would help me do it if I wanted to. But in my mind, that's just not something I'm willing to do.

"Do you feel you've drawn the line with her, and you just don't want to meet?" I ask him.

"I feel like I have drawn that line," Colin says. "I feel like it's been drawn for a while. The way things transpired at the end of the season and this offseason, that line just became darker. That's not going to happen. It's not something I want to do. Ultimately I know who my family is, and I know who my mother is."

Colin already wasn't inclined to have a relationship with his birth mother. He called it a personal decision. And he's been put off further by what he thinks is Russo's aggressiveness in trying to make it happen.

“People asked me to do interviews on it,” he says, “and they asked my family to do interviews on it, and we turned them down and said, ‘It’s not a story. In the future, if I have a change of heart and I want to meet her, then it will happen.’ The same interviews we turned down, she did. I felt like that was disrespectful to me, my family and especially my mother. I feel like if I go down that road now, I’m disrespecting my mother as well, and that’s not something I’m willing to do. I know my mom would never tell me not to go meet her; she would help me do it if I wanted to. But in my mind, that’s just not something I’m willing to do.”

Kaepernick makes it clear he’s “very grateful, very happy” Russo gave him up for adoption. “But past that,” he says, “she wasn’t the one who was taking me to football practice, she wasn’t working 12-hour night shifts so she could be with me when I went to school and got home. I think people see what my birth mom did and say, ‘Well, that was great, what she did for you. You should go see her and give her that recognition and be happy for what she did for you.’ I don’t think people realize the sacrifices my mother [Teresa Kaepernick] has made and what she has done for me, and what she has been through in her life to help me to get to where I am now.”

In the middle of Super Bowl week, ESPN’s Rick Reilly wrote a column headlined “A Call Kaepernick Should Make” that angered the Kaepernicks. Reilly has an adopted Korean daughter, Rae, who with the support of her adoptive family returned to South Korea to meet her birth mother. Reilly wrote about how healthy and healing he thought it would be for Colin to reach out to Heidi Russo and for the two to meet. “You can’t imagine what it would mean,” Reilly wrote.

“I know exactly what column you’re talking about because someone sent it to me,” Colin says. “He referenced his situation with his daughter. My first instinct was, Well, number one, it’s none of your business what my decision is, and number two, just because your situation worked out doesn’t mean it will work out like that for everybody else. The fact that he said [the meeting] brought closure to his daughter and she feels better about it now To me, there’s no closure to be had. There’s no benefit from it.”

It’s a strange situation. Kaepernick wants to tell the world, “This is a private matter. Leave me alone.” But the game is public, and the media covering pro football is as intensely interested in the people who play the game as it is in the game itself. The bigger Kaepernick gets, the more intense that interest will be. How will he deal with it as his football star grows?

RACE

Kaepernick says his biracial makeup was never a big deal in his formative years in Turlock, mostly because his parents were open with him about it. “They were honest with me from the moment they had me. My parents always told me we could talk about it anytime I wanted to. I never really completely understood what it meant when I was young. To me, they were my family. I don’t remember how old I was. But I said to her one day, ‘Why is my skin darker than yours? I don’t really look the same as you.’

“She told me, ‘It’s because you’re adopted, but I wish I had pretty brown skin like you.’

“I never really thought much about it. Kids would say things sometimes, but my family just always loved me. That was the important thing to me.”

TATTOOS

Another column, by David Whitley of the Sporting News, made the Kaepernick family hot too. “Kaepernick is going to be a big-time NFL quarterback,” Whitley wrote in late November. “That must make the guys in San Quentin happy.” Quarterbacks, Whitley reasoned, are team CEOs, “and you don’t want your CEO to look like he just got paroled.”

“My mom has always been so-so with tattoos,” Kaepernick says. “Like, ‘When are you going to stop? Please don’t get any more.’ As soon as that article came out, she did a complete flip. She was like, ‘How

dare you judge my son for his tattoos! Do you even know what his tattoos mean? Do you know what they mean to him?’ ”

The SUV drives through the California night. No radio. Just Kaepernick on a roll.

“It blows my mind that people still think tattoos are just gang-related, or have negative connotations,” he says. “So many people have tattoos because their family’s been through something—you heard that police officer tonight—or it’s a situation they’ve been through that’s made them stronger, and they want to make sure they remember it forever. I don’t think people fully understand how deeply people believe in their tattoos.”

Kaepernick’s dad was like many American fathers who despise tattoos, telling his son, “While you live under my roof you’re not going to have a tattoo.” Many of us have said words to this effect to our own teens. So Colin waited until he got to Nevada to start getting a series of religious-themed tattoos. “My first one,” he said, “was Psalms 18:39.” The scroll coming down his right shoulder quotes the Bible verse: “You armed me with strength for battle; you humbled my adversaries before me.” Ever since, he says, “It’s been a constant working piece.

“To me it’s just another way to be different and try to separate myself as my own man. If I get judged for something like my tattoos, so be it. I was talking to a few of the Rams players [this offseason]. One of their defensive linemen told me, ‘I love the fact that you started kissing your tattoos because of someone writing an article, basically showing everybody that you have tattoos and you’re still a good person. I have tattoos and I get judged for them. You’re really helping me change the perspective of tattoos.’ ”

And on the seventh day, he plays quarterback for the San Francisco 49ers.

The last time we saw Kaepernick on the field, he was failing, and flailing. Super Bowl XLVII, 49ers’ ball at the Baltimore 5, third-and-goal. Game clock stopped at 1:55 in the fourth quarter. Ravens up 34-29.

“That’s the play I’d like to have back—the play we had to call timeout,” he says. “It was just a slow operation all the way through.”

Kaepernick, set back about five yards from center in the Pistol formation, had the Niners ready at the line with 11 seconds left on the play clock. He started barking signals in the deafening Superdome. With five seconds to go he stepped forward, apparently adjusting the protection because of what he saw in the Baltimore defense. With a couple of seconds left on the play clock, coach Jim Harbaugh scrambled over to the side judge, and just before the clock reached zero the Niners got a timeout.

The players, though, weren’t aware. The ball was snapped. Kaepernick took it and dropped back a step as running back Frank Gore darted left in front of him. Tight end Vernon Davis sealed off linebacker Terrell Suggs, who’d slanted inside from his spot on the right side of the defense. Gore and second tight end Delanie Walker blocked safety Bernard Pollard and could account for cornerback Cary Williams, at the goal line. One more Raven remained to be blocked: Ray Lewis. And here was right guard Alex Boone, pulling left, with Lewis in his sights. Colin Kaepernick, of the very new breed, versus Ray Lewis, of the old school, on what might very well have been the last play of Lewis’s career.

But the showdown didn’t happen. Kaepernick took two running steps toward the left flank before he realized the play had been blown dead.

Rewatch that dead play, and all you can do is dream about what might have been. The play-caller, offensive coordinator Greg Roman, told me last February, “Will it eat at me? Of course it will.” He isn’t alone.

Now it’s silent both inside and outside the SUV—even the normal road noise seems gone—as Kaepernick’s mind goes back to that play in February in New Orleans.

"I constantly think about it," he says. "I replay it. I rehash it. What could I have done better? If I got everybody up and got them set quicker, we wouldn't have had to worry about the play clock. The way the play looked to me, I don't feel there was anybody that was going to stop us from getting in the end zone . . . It looked like it could have been a walk into the end zone."

"You saw it the way I saw it?" I ask. "That there's a good chance it could have been you against Ray Lewis for the Super Bowl?"

"Yeah, I mean ... There was a linebacker coming over the top—Ray—but I just don't feel that was something that was going to matter."

San Francisco didn't want to run the same play after the timeout, so Kaepernick ended up throwing his second of three straight incompletions to Michael Crabtree. On fourth down Kaepernick felt pressure and threw too high and far for Crabtree—who wrestled with corner Jimmy Smith getting off the line and couldn't get to the ball. It's doubtful Crabtree would have had a chance at the pass anyway, but Kaepernick didn't like that there was no penalty call against Smith. "I'm not going to comment on it, but you're asking the question for a reason," he says.

"How long," I ask, "did it take you to get over the game?"

"Still not really over it," he says ruefully. "It feels like something was stolen."

But look at what Kaepernick accomplished last year. When Brady and the Patriots fought all the way back from a 31-3 deficit against the 49ers to tie the game at 31 on a rainy December Sunday night in Foxborough, Kaepernick responded. He faced down a zero blitz by New England and found Crabtree for the decisive touchdown in a 41-34 stunner. "What a surreal moment," he says. "It was crazy, going to shake [Brady's] hand after the game, knowing we'd just beaten a guy who's going to go down as one of the greatest ever. I can't even remember what I said, or what he said."

By the time the playoffs began, no one knew quite what to expect from Kaepernick, who'd been running the crazy read-option maybe 20% or 30% of the time. Against the Packers in the divisional round, he kept the ball a lot, rushing 16 times for 181 yards. The NFL had been alive for 93 seasons, and no quarterback had rushed for that many yards in a game—ever. That game made Kaepernick realize what a crazy weapon his legs can be.

Still really not over it," he says of the Super Bowl loss. "It feels like something was stolen.

"It got to a point," he says, "where we could hear [the Packers' defenders] arguing while we were in our huddle. 'You're supposed to do this,' or 'You have to do this, then the other.' At that point, our offense was like, It's over. As soon as you start turning on your teammates, you're not going to be productive. You know you have them in the palm of your hands."

At Atlanta the next week, for the NFC title, Kaepernick ran the ball exactly once off the read-option . . . and got buried for a two-yard loss. His arm won that game. And in the Super Bowl, it pulled the Niners back after they'd fallen behind 28-6 in the third quarter.

Now? He'll miss Crabtree, out for at least half the season with a torn right Achilles. He'll need newcomer Anquan Boldin, stolen from Baltimore for a sixth-round pick, and last year's first-rounder, A.J. Jenkins, to pick up the slack. "I've trained and thrown a lot with A.J. this offseason, and his progress is fantastic," Kaepernick says. "Night and day from last year. And Anquan, he's such a man. So glad to have him." Roman trusts Kaepernick enough to have asked him his likes and dislikes this offseason, and he won't have the challenge of Alex Smith—traded to Kansas City before the draft—to worry about. The 49ers are Kaepernick's team, and they should be for years to come. Provided, of course, he doesn't get KO'd running around too much.

In San Francisco's final minicamp practice on June 13, before the team dispersed for its summer break, Kaepernick finished with five straight completions to five different receivers, taking the first-team offensive unit downfield crisply against the first-team defense.

"Colin," said coach Jim Harbaugh, "he's been on it all offseason."

Flash back to Kaepernick's appearance at Pitman High: Everything went smoothly—nothing out of the ordinary other than a few shrieks from graduates who were thrilled that the school's most illustrious alum had returned to pay tribute to his retiring former coach, Brandon Harris. The coach was stunned to see Kaepernick. The two walked off the stage together, back into the multipurpose room, and shared a rib-breaking hug. Harris took in the scene, perfectly orchestrated by the cops and a 49ers PR aide, right down to the police escort that would get Kaepernick back on the road.

"This is amazing!" Harris said. "Colin has . . . he has handlers!"

Outside, his parents climbed into the back row of the SUV, and Colin sat in the middle row. Three motorcycle cops, sirens blaring, led the way out, zooming past the stopped traffic, through a red light and onto Highway 99.

"This is one serious escort," Colin said.

"Anymore, we never know what to expect," Rick Kaepernick added, shaking his head. "But we're learning."

A few quiet minutes later, rolling down the highway, Colin went back in time. He was no longer the 49ers quarterback. He was a boy again, a son.

"Mom? We got any food back at the house? I'm starved."

Well, Teresa said, not really—not enough, anyway. So the SUV pulled into a Little Caesars, and Colin walked in to get a pepperoni pizza to go.

The kid behind the counter took the order, looked up . . . then looked up again before saying, "Whoa!" Kaepernick signed autographs for him and his pizza-maker, paid and thanked them both.

As Kaepernick walked out, another teen held the door for him—and didn't have to do a double-take. It was Colin Kaepernick, in the flesh. Only one word came out of the kid's mouth as Kaepernick walked by carrying his pizza box.

"Beast!"

RG3 inspires Marcus Lattimore's 'miracle'

This must be a miracle, right? What else can it be? Because logic says Marcus Lattimore should not be ready to play football. Logic says he shouldn't have been running the steps at South Carolina's football stadium last month or sprinting up a hill behind San Jose State University as he did last Thursday afternoon.

Not on his knee. Not after that day against Tennessee last October when his right knee essentially exploded on national television. The doctors and trainers who looked at him that afternoon imagined the tangle of torn ligaments to be so severe they said it would be a year before he walked.

Imagine that. The best running back heading into the NFL draft wouldn't even walk for a year. Nine months later he was rumbling up a hill that has become something of a legend among 49ers players.

So what else can this be?

"Yes, it is a miracle," Lattimore said by phone.

Then he repeated himself.

"Yes it is."

He will not practice when the 49ers open their training camp this week. The team has already put him on the physically unable to perform list, where he will remain until the season's sixth week. He does not want this, of course, but he is trying to be understanding. He gets how this must not make sense to any rational person looking at an injury like his.

He realizes waiting is in his best interests and so he said: "I'm cool with it, it gives me more time to make sure I'm really ready when I do practice."

But he can also feel the knee's strength. He senses the power that has returned. He knows he can run and run fast. He knows, too, that he doesn't need to be on the physically unable to perform list. He knows he doesn't need to wait until October to play.

"Physically, I do feel I can practice now," he said.

That he can even utter that statement is remarkable. He is reported to have damaged his ACL, MCL and PCL, making his injury among the most severe of its kind. Even today where quick recoveries from awful injuries are the norm Lattimore's is particularly startling. He simply shouldn't be this far along. Not after what happened last October.

Yet the amazing thing about his knee is how it felt so strong so soon after orthopedist James Andrews fixed it not long after the injury. The year before he had torn the ACL in his left knee – a serious but smaller injury by comparison – and still his right knee was recovering faster. Perhaps much of this had to do with the fact he was rehabilitating with Redskins quarterback Robert Griffin III, whose knee was reconstructed by Andrews in a January operation. Like Lattimore, Griffin had torn an ACL in his other knee a few years before. He understood the angst of building back from one devastating injury only to suffer another. And also much like Lattimore, RG3 was determined to prove he would return quickly from his injury.

Maybe even more determined than Lattimore – if that was possible.

Griffin brought energy, he brought enthusiasm, he brought an intensity that few other athletes could. If Lattimore was motivated to heal quickly, watching Griffin drove him only more.

"I knew why he has been so successful," said Lattimore who is doing a series of interviews on behalf of the supplement company EAS in part because he believes the company stayed committed to him through his recovery. "I don't think we had to say anything to push each other."

Each watched the other man and knew what he had to do.

At night, they talked, the quarterback who dazzled the NFL last season and the running back who wants so much to do the same this fall. They talked about their previous injuries, about their own, about their surgeries and their recoveries. And even though they were in the gloomiest of predicaments, with shredded knees that had just been restructured, they would not mope, they would not despair.

"There were no down conversations, no negative conversations about our injuries or about anything," Lattimore said. "All our conversations were about what we were doing and what we were going to do tomorrow or the next day."

Then Lattimore laughed.

"I was blessed to have him out there," he said. "I know he helped me a lot."

Then again, it's impossible to know who inspires whom.

There was a moment recently when Lattimore walked into a FedEx store in Columbia, S.C., and a customer approached him. It was man, just a regular guy with a regular job. The man had something he wanted to say. The man said he had moments where he woke up tired and didn't want to get out of bed. The man said there were days he didn't want to go to work.

Then he thought about Lattimore and the injury and the way he was already walking and there was video out of him running the stadium steps at South Carolina, and, well, what could the man do?

Lattimore had become his inspiration.

On the phone, Lattimore went quiet for a moment.

Do you feel like you are becoming an inspiration, he was asked.

Yes, he finally said.

"You're making a difference, that's what it's about," he said. "I can't describe what it's like to have someone come up to me and say something like that guy did. I just appreciate that he did."

Lattimore paused again.

"You know, we as athletes are human, too," he said.

Even when their recovery from debilitating injuries seems anything but.

49ers' Lemonier proves to be fast learner

After 49ers rookie outside linebacker Corey Lemonier finished his junior season at Auburn and declared for the NFL draft, his parents were elated.

Not because their son was going to the pros: They thought he was coming home to hang out for a few months.

Yeah, just like old times!

Lemonier had to explain that college prospects don't prepare for the draft by hanging out with their parents in Miami. He was leaving for Athletes' Performance in Phoenix, where he would train for the NFL combine.

"They didn't know anything," Lemonier said, smiling. "They thought I was going to come home and spend all my time with them. I was like, 'Mom, I've got to go train somewhere different.' They just didn't understand how it all worked."

That was hardly the first time Henry and Francoise Lemonier were vexed by the sport in which their middle son has excelled. As Haitian immigrants, they didn't grow up with football and, in effect, shrugged when Corey decided to take up the sport as a sophomore at Hialeah High.

Six years later, Lemonier, a two-time all-SEC selection at Auburn, has clearly done just fine without Mom and Dad micromanaging his career.

After flashing his pass-rushing prowess in the preseason, Lemonier, a third-round pick, has teamed with fifth-year veteran Dan Skuta to capably fill in for All-Pro Aldon Smith, who is in treatment for a reported substance-abuse problem.

In two games without Smith, the 6-foot-3, 255-pound Lemonier has two quarterback hits and five hurries in 45 pass rushes, according to Pro Football Focus. Entering Sunday's game against the Cardinals at Candlestick Park, he has seized the attention of Arizona quarterback Carson Palmer, who, unprompted, noted the recent performances of reserve inside linebacker Michael Wilhoite and Lemonier.

"You lose Patrick Willis, and there's a guy in there (Wilhoite) that has been playing for them that has played phenomenal," Palmer said. "You lose your best pass-rusher - a guy that went for the sack record - they had a rookie come in (Lemonier) and he's rushed the passer very well."

Given his late start in football, it's tempting to say Lemonier's success is improbable. But that's not quite accurate.

A former basketball player, Lemonier was persuaded by Hialeah's football coaches to dabble in a second sport as a sophomore. He had tremendous size - he had grown to 6-3 and about 220 pounds before his junior season - and they soon discovered he possessed natural instincts at defensive end. Despite never having done so, he settled easily into a three-point stance and flashed a blink-and-you'll-miss-it first step off the line of scrimmage.

Less than a year after he'd played his first-ever football snap, Lemonier, a rising junior, was named the MVP of the "Down and Dirty Camp" in Florida - a showcase for more than 400 offensive and defensive linemen. With that, the novice was soon fielding scholarship offers from a laundry list of big-time programs, including Georgia, Miami, Florida, Notre Dame, South Carolina and West Virginia.

"It was crazy," said Lemonier, who stopped playing basketball after his sophomore year. "I didn't know I was that good until I did all that against those other guys at (the camp). Then I kind of knew and I felt like, 'I kind of like this whole football thing.' "

Lemonier credits his rapid rise to former Hialeah defensive line coach Jeff Klores, 71, a legendary figure in Dade County high school football circles. Now retired, Klores, a former two-way lineman at Florida State, began coaching in the area in 1964 and counts a host of NFL alums as his former pupils.

Based on more than four decades coaching in a talent-rich state, Klores said Lemonier's above-average size and natural ability didn't necessarily foreshadow a Division I scholarship, let alone an NFL career. Klores said he has seen countless players more gifted than Lemonier fail to maximize their potential.

Lemonier, however, spent so much time in the weight room that head coach Marc Berman routinely went home when his defensive end was the lone remaining player pumping iron. On the field, Berman says, Lemonier never gave up on a play, habitually chasing down running backs 50 yards downfield.

Klores wonders what some of his more decorated defensive line proteges could have accomplished had they possessed Lemonier's passion and drive. Lester Williams, a first-round pick of the Patriots in 1982, had a six-year NFL career, and John Browning spent 10 seasons with the Chiefs, who selected him in the third round in 1996.

"Neither one of those guys had Corey's work habits," Klores said. "He was so focused. His work habits really outshone his ability, and he never stopped working to get better."

Lemonier didn't get football tips from his parents, who enlisted Berman to help their son navigate the college recruiting process. But Lemonier insists he wouldn't have the toughness and dedication needed to flourish in football without their hard-working example.

His dad, now retired, was an offshore welder who has lived with chronic pain since a broken hip at age 19 left him with a permanent limp. Lemonier recalled when a metal rod in his dad's leg began pressing against a nerve and required surgery. His father also has limited mobility in one of his hands, a result of a welding accident that tore most of the skin from his palm.

"It just got sewn up and now it's kind of frozen, but he never complained about it," Lemonier said. "It's just crazy some of the stuff he went through."

His mom, a nurse who worked grueling shifts, has attended only a handful of his games since high school because she fears for his safety. However, she often played a drill-sergeant role with Corey and his brothers, Steven, 24, and Jessie, who is a junior defensive lineman at Hialeah.

One summer, she noted Steven was too pudgy and ordered him to start a twice-a-day running regimen.

"I was skinny as heck," Lemonier said, "and she said, 'You have to run, too.' "

When a reporter recently asked Lemonier if he could speak to his parents, the rookie smiled. Their accents, he said, could make a telephone interview difficult to decipher.

But Henry Lemonier was relatively easy to understand when reached at home last week. He explained that he knew nothing about football when his middle son said he wanted to start playing the sport.

Looking back, though, it's clear his fatherly advice was more valuable than any X's-and-O's knowledge he could have imparted.

"I told him, 'OK, that's your choice. You can do whatever you want as long as you give it all you have,' " Henry said.

He paused.

"And I think Corey's done that."

McDermott Most Anonymous 49er – As He Likes It

It's in the realm of possibility that you already know Kevin McDermott's name. You might even know his position with the 49ers. But you probably don't know his face. Who needs to know what the long snapper looks like?

If he's doing his job, the answer is no one.

And McDermott isn't bothered by this fact. He actually welcomes the anonymity. Where teammate Colin Kaepernick has stopped trying to walk around the city of San Francisco, McDermott enjoys free range. The fans don't know who he is.

The question becomes: Shouldn't they?

To borrow special teams coach Brad Seely's word, McDermott is vital to the 49ers success on punts and point-after attempts. The squad is off to a 6-2 start, thanks in part to its Pro Bowler-laden third unit, and is enjoying its Week 9 bye away from the facility in Santa Clara.

McDermott, though, was taking part in what Jim Harbaugh called opportunity practices beginning on Tuesday. The specialist hasn't made a single error – a noticeable one anyway – on the field so far in his rookie campaign. He seems out in front of making his first.

And he's doing it without the attention that a Kaepernick or Frank Gore doesn't ask for yet receives.

Go ahead, Google him. There are a handful of semi-famous Kevin McDermotts in the world. Type those two words together in any search bar, and learn about a men's underwear photographer and a Scottish singer-songwriter.

San Francisco's newbie snapper is also on the list. But he's clearly in need of distinction.

Not searchable on the web: The fact that McDermott – our McDermott – likes a good story above most else. And more than being told a good tale, he likes to offer his own, taking his listeners from start to finish without sparing a single detail. The means are more fun than the ends, especially if his audience lacks patience for the punch-line.

There's McDermott's narrative of catching a 250-pound blue marlin off the coast of Costa Rica – and we'll get to that – but first things first.

McDermott doesn't always get to spin his stories in the 49ers locker room. His stall is along the far wall and closest to the exit. Situated nearby and to his right are the coworkers he spends most of his time with, 31-year-old punter Andy Lee and 38-year-old kicker Phil Dawson. Nice guys both, but grizzled veterans not about to let their 23-year-old teammate spout off about just anything.

And McDermott doesn't necessarily want his story – his real one – shared. But it's a good one. And it won't require removing his helmet.

NASHVILLE – McDermott was destined to snap. There were only 14 players on his seventh-grade football team. Coach Robbie Sinks asked him to be the one among them. McDermott accepted the challenge.

So he wasn't surprised to also receive the assignment as a freshman at central Tennessee's Ensworth High School. He had about 30 teammates, 16 of which had never played the sport before. They were a part of Ensworth's inaugural 82-student class that year, 2004. A pioneer among peers.

Ricky Bowers, the coach there back then and now the athletic director, remembers McDermott as the smartest, most hardworking and willing player on that first squad. He was also growing into his 6-foot-4 frame, and his large hands made him a natural fit under center on special teams.

That wasn't McDermott's only duty. Bowers asked him to play tight end and along the line on offense, and at tackle and end on defense. He never came off the field.

Football wasn't even his best sport. Playing everything asked of him by the fledgling school – lacrosse, you name it – McDermott had his eyes on playing college basketball, the way his father, Kevin, once did.

An easier route to amateur athletics revealed itself. McDermott set up this self-promotional website – OK, fans, he still has that thick brown hair and chiseled chin that he did as a teen – to get the word out.

COSTA RICA – Hours passed without a bite. In his first open-sea expedition, McDermott, flanked by his dad, and coach Bowers, among other friends, were starting to wonder where the fish went. Their inhospitable local for a captain wasn't keen on helping them either.

Pointing their boat back toward shore and shallower waters, the group stopped to swim with a porpoise. Once back on board, however, the McDermotts and their party were, to steal Bower's phrase, starving, hot and still without fish. Kevin, a movie buff, was very likely running out of James Bond-connected conversation or anecdotes about his college choice.

This, after all, was the spring of 2008. McDermott was no longer just any Tennessee teen.

Then a blue marlin appeared. He wouldn't fill their empty stomachs – they'd have to throw, er, slide him back into the water – but they still wanted to catch him. After taking turns on the rod that snared him, they soon realized this was a chase, not a catch.

Finally getting him onto the boat and at their feet long enough to take pictures of him – the suddenly smiley tour guide estimated the weight to be 200 to 250 pounds – their day was made. And McDermott had another story to tell.

WESTWOOD, CALIF. – In the self-titled Three Amigos that also comprised punter Jeff Locke and quarterback Kevin Prince, this was McDermott's idiosyncrasy. He'd start telling his roommate/teammates about a particular adventure – and they couldn't wait to know how it ended. The son of an accomplished journalist – Deb McDermott was inducted to the Broadcast and Cable Hall of Fame this week – McDermott enjoyed the turns as much as it turned out.

Locke, now a punter for the Minnesota Vikings did not. He was thrilled with being a part of McDermott's story, however. Without a specialists-centric coach at UCLA – then-special teams assistant Jeff Ulbrich, a former 49ers linebacker, could only teach so much – the two spent their four years training themselves. There were side sessions on adjacent fields and extra reps in the weight room. Whatever they could do to push each other to get better.

Without a scholarship and behind then Bruins snapper Christian Yount, a four-year standout and now a member of the Cleveland Browns, McDermott redshirted in 2008, the year he used his spring break for a memorable fishing trip. In 2009, he appeared in a game at tight end, the position he believed he could play long-term. It wasn't until 2011 that McDermott made the first of 28 straight starts as a snapper in the Pac-12 conference.

He was a rock, according to Ulbrich, who arrived in 2012. As steady a football player as he's been around, and Ulbrich's been around many. He played for the 49ers for 10 seasons, until 2009.

NEW YORK – At the recommendation of the 49ers scouting department, Seely had already seen McDermott on video and visited him for an individual workout at UCLA. When San Francisco's higher-ups

decided it didn't need to spend an NFL Draft pick on him here on the East Coast in April, Seely waited until its completion to phone McDermott and convince him to come West.

All McDermott needed to hear: He would be given equal opportunity with 49ers incumbent snapper Brian Jennings to win an Opening Day job. First, he would have to best another ex-undrafted free agent in Kyle Nelson during OTAs.

When Seely spoke with his recruit after the seventh round, McDermott told him that his parents, Kevin and Deb, knew who Seely was. Turned out that while Mr. and Mrs. McDermott were playing hoops and cheerleading at South Dakota State University, Seely was playing offensive line – and snapping – for the football team. From 1974 to 1977 to be exact.

McDermott does like good plot-twist.

San Francisco started to feel right, especially when his girlfriend accepted a job with a Bay Area firm soon before he signed on the dotted line. Everything seemed to point him there, except for the challenge that awaited.

SAN FRANCISCO – The odds were against McDermott of staying here for more than months, if not weeks, when you consider what – rather, who – he was up against. Jennings was the longest-tenured 49ers player. In 13 seasons, he was charged with a single fumble (on punter Jason Baker's mishandling of a catchable snap in 2011). He was, time and again, a model of consistency.

And Jennings, one of the most likeable members of the team throughout his career, had warded off whippersnappers before. Just last year, he bested in a training camp competition a player with twice as many Pro Bowl appearances (two) as he had, ex-Browns specialist Ryan Pontibriand.

Part of why Jennings was so successful: He knew his role, and he performed game in and game out. Had Jennings made the 2013 Opening Day roster, in fact, he would have played in a franchise record 209th straight.

He's stuck on 208 and out of the league.

SANTA CLARA, CALIF. – McDermott and Jennings haven't spoken in the two months since. The latter wasn't in the locker room when the former found out he had taken his place.

McDermott actually learned his fate from an equipment manager, who wished him congratulations after seeing Jennings' empty locker. Then McDermott made his phone calls. His long-running group text with Locke and Prince blew up.

All Seely said was, Let's get to work.

They already had, too. While Jennings was still around, he was more than cordial and even offered tips. But beyond McDermott's pre-draft interaction with specialists guru Gary Zauner, Seely was the first true special teams coach he ever had access to on a daily basis. His feedback on the so-called little things was invaluable.

An example: When McDermott first showed up on the practice fields and snapped the ball the way he had been taught – and become accustomed to – at every prior stop in his career, the football's nose perked up at the last instant, sometimes sailing inches higher than usual.

McDermott got away with this slight imperfection at the picturesque Rose Bowl stadium while playing for UCLA. But in the NFL, with his home games taking place at the windy Candlestick Park and his road games on first visits to new ballparks – wet Wembley in London – it could cost him dearly.

The margin for error even smaller, Seely helped McDermott close it. His instruction: to lay the ball more flat on the ground before starting his motion backward and between his legs. This way, the ball would rise naturally.

Seely, who believes there's a fine line between the best and the other guys, thinks McDermott can join the former group.

LOS GATOS, CALIF. – Even the nobody among somebodies needs to get away. Fishing at the nearby reservoir is one way for McDermott to be noticed even less. It's an escape from work and a potential treasure trove for future stories.

Eight games into his NFL career, McDermott hasn't stopped trying to improve.. except for short spurts like spending an afternoon on the lake.

Back at the facility, there's a placard above his locker stall reminding of him of his Not Ranked high school status by every major college recruiting outfit. There's also the absence of Jennings, who he wants to emulate but not embody. There's even his younger, bigger brother, Conor, a talented offensive lineman at UCLA blessed with greater physical talents.

And yet, the minute Kevin McDermott becomes a household name is the minute he'll have to start worrying. This is the dynamic of being an NFL long snapper. The better McDermott does at his job, the more thankless it becomes.

Fortunately, he wouldn't have it any other way.

McDonald Enjoys Mentorship Role

The 49ers selected two defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft and added two more as undrafted free agents.

Defensive line coach Jim Tomsula has plenty of talent to work with his incoming rookies, but he's not the only one giving instruction.

Veterans on the defensive line like Ray McDonald and Justin Smith have been active mentors to the incoming rookie group of Tank Carradine, Quinton Dial, Lawrence Okoye and Mike Purcell.

McDonald, a sixth-year veteran, has been with Tomsula his entire career in San Francisco. The 6-foot-3, 290-pound defensive tackle has a firm grasp of defensive line techniques and has been eager to share them with rookie teammates.

Consider it to be "The Forty Niner Way."

"We don't want to be seen as older guys who don't want to help the younger fellas," said McDonald, who totaled 106 tackles, 2.5 sacks and one forced fumble in 2012. "It's good that we have guys here who we can help, take them under our wings and show them the ropes."

The mentoring relationship has been increasingly important with Okoye, a former Olympic discus thrower who was also accepted to study law at Oxford University.

"He's smart and has great athleticism," McDonald, the established defensive tackle said. "It'll be cool to see how he progresses."

Tomsula has spent a great deal of individual periods fine tuning Okoye's stance and footwork. The defensive line coach has taken a steady step-by-step approach with Okoye and it appears to be working. Okoye, a 6-foot-6, 304-pound athlete with a rugby background, continues to improve with every day he's soaking up information at 49ers headquarters.

"He wants to learn, he wants to get better," McDonald noted. "He's never played football before, but he wants to learn to get better and that's all we're looking for, guys who want to get better."

McDonald, too, is not above picking up additional insight. The hard-working defensive lineman has become a quiet force in one of the best front-sevens in professional football. Even so, McDonald is using Organized Team Activities to have his best season yet.

"It's good to get back into the swing of things," McDonald said. "It's fun to get back out there with the fellas and it's good to have everybody back. It's good to be back because everyone's spread out when the season is over."

The 49ers defensive line group remains a tight-knit group. Despite losing Isaac Sopoaga and Ricky Jean Francois in free agency, McDonald is looking forward to seeing who lines up nose tackle when the season begins on Sept. 8.

"It's going to be real competitive," McDonald said.

The team has a number of options to line up at nose tackle including Ian Williams, Glenn Dorsey, Tony Jerod-Eddie and Lamar Divens. The rookies, too, will have their chances to compete.

Williams and Dorsey appear to be the closest competition to anchor San Francisco's 3-4 defense.

"They're both athletic, strong and they're smart," McDonald noted. "It's going to be a battle come training camp to get that spot but we feel comfortable with the guys we have."

"It'll help the team out a lot."

The "iron sharpens iron" sentiment is prevalent at 49ers headquarters. Competition at every position has been a hallmark of Jim Harbaugh's coaching career in San Francisco.

And while McDonald feels secure as a starter as a right defensive tackle, he still wants to improve his standing amongst counterparts in the NFC. McDonald has not been to a Pro Bowl, but was selected as an alternate after the 2011 season.

"It's motivation for me," McDonald said. "I'm seeing the guys I'm playing with make it, I want to be a part of that."

Six of San Francisco's starters made the Pro Bowl last season and McDonald wants to join the group this coming season.

"It's going to take a lot of hard work this offseason for me to make it to that point, but I'm looking forward to it."

49ers fullback Bruce Miller takes over as Frank Gore's leading man

Bruce Miller constantly hears what his job entails in the NFL's top-ranked rushing attack.

He hears it even as plays unfold, with directions coming from the guy running behind him: 49ers all-time leading rusher Frank Gore.

"I can feel him grabbing on the back of my jersey sometimes, like he's almost steering me through there," Miller said of his lead-blocker role.

Now 2½ seasons into his 49ers tenure, Miller has developed into not just a reliable fullback but a versatile one -- and a converted defensive end from his college days at Central Florida.

"He's made a smooth transition," center Jonathan Goodwin said. "Hey, maybe he was a terrible defensive lineman but a good fullback back then and didn't know it. He doesn't get a lot of credit, but he's huge for our offense."

The 49ers (6-2) lead the league by rushing for 153 yards per game. When they host the Carolina Panthers (5-3) on Sunday, they'll encounter a defense that's expected to deploy a standard seven-man front, unlike other opponents that have flooded the line of scrimmage with extra defenders.

Figuring out which guy to block has been a learning process for Miller.

"That was the biggest thing: reading the front at the line of scrimmage when the ball is snapped and everybody's moving," Miller said. "How to get through there to the second level to block my guy, it was tough to learn if you've never done it before."

Helping mentor him has been position coach Tom Rathman, one of the 49ers' all-time best fullbacks, as well as Gore, who ranks seventh in the league with 618 rushing yards this season.

"I tell him to read it like he's running the ball," Gore said. "It's common sense: read and react."

Miller hasn't been a true running back since his freshman year in high school, however. Even then, he said, he saw action only in practice.

But last game, Miller got his chance to run with the ball into a wide-open field.

On the second snap of their 42-10 win over the Jacksonville Jaguars in London, the 49ers called "Big Sleeper," a play in which Miller dupes the defense by pretending he's running to the bench before the snap.

Miller stopped short of the sideline and was uncovered long enough for Colin Kaepernick to throw him a quick-count pass. Miller rambled 43 yards to the Jaguars' 30-yard line, setting up the first of four 49ers touchdowns before halftime.

"I was a little too focused on the catch," Miller said. "I should have been running more to pick up more yards. It was executed great by Kap and the guys in the huddle."

Meanwhile, Miller's heart was "pounding" and "going 100 mph" before the snap as he looked to pull off a play the 49ers first attempted to run a year earlier against the Jets, when Kaepernick lined up wide before a timeout was called.

"Yeah, it was pretty smooth," Miller said half-jokingly. "I wish I was running a little faster at the get-go and not sizing it up."

Getting tackled by the Jaguars' safety resulted in Miller getting ribbed by his teammates.

"He got caught," Goodwin said. "Even though he went 40-something yards, it seemed quick that he got caught."

To Miller's credit, his 43-yard reception matched the longest this season by leading wideout Anquan Boldin.

"They gave me a hard time because I looked slow. I don't know what they expected from me," Miller joked.

Three years ago, Miller certainly didn't expect he'd be playing fullback or much less catching passes in the NFL.

He topped out at 265 pounds as a college defensive end, then shed 30 pounds to run the 40-yard dash at 4.5 seconds at his pre-draft pro day.

The 49ers drafted him in the seventh round, and he's been their starting fullback since his rookie season.

Now weighing 255 pounds, Miller realizes he doesn't have breakaway speed. More important, he knows that's what Gore is there for, helping dictate directions at the same time.

"I can kind of hear what he's saying and figure it out in the play," Miller said. "Yeah, it moves fast, but you get more chemistry and know what he wants to do."

Added Gore: "Bruce is smart, so it's easy with me and him to communicate."

49ers' Okoye absorbs American football

Lawrence Okoye can tell you Justin Smith's weight, where Ray McDonald went to high school, when Glenn Dorsey will celebrate his birthday.

Though that kind of knowledge has earned him ribbing from his 49ers teammates, it's an indication of how deeply the Englishman, who went through his first American football practice in May, has immersed himself in the sport.

"He's a football nerd right now," defensive-line coach Jim Tomsula said of Okoye on Wednesday as the 49ers prepared for Sunday's game against Jacksonville at Wembley Stadium. "It's all football. He talks it. He eats it. He sleeps it. ... The guys get on him because he can tell you where everybody's from. He can tell you what school they went to, what high school they went to, how tall they were in the ninth grade, how tall they are now."

Okoye injured his knee in the 49ers' third preseason game, and the team shortly thereafter placed him on injured reserve, ending his season. He can't practice, but he's permitted to rehabilitate alongside teammates, attend meetings and, mostly, study the game.

"I watch several hours of film a week, and I understand what's going on," he said. "I'm learning certain things, and things that didn't click before click now."

And his knowledge of minute NFL details extends beyond the 49ers' roster.

Before the draft, Okoye expressed admiration for Houston defensive lineman J.J. Watt, the league's reigning defensive MVP, who is similar in size to the 6-foot-6 Okoye. Asked if he's noticed other tall defensive players – perhaps Arizona's Calais Campbell – in the six months since, Okoye had a precise answer.

"He's slightly taller – he's 6-8," Okoye said. "He's got the Margus Hunt type of size."

Campbell and Cincinnati's Hunt are listed as 6-8.

Okoye said he has a better understanding of how defensive linemen play and what makes the good ones effective. Perhaps the best at his job, he said, is Smith, who had far fewer sacks than Watt last year – three vs. 20 1/2 – but whom teammates elected as one of their captains for 2013.

"I can see the game better (now); I can see all the good stuff he can do," Okoye said of Smith. "He's not just a pass rusher. He affects the game in as many, if not more, ways than J.J. Watt does."

The 49ers gave Okoye a chance as an undrafted free agent not only because of his size and athleticism but because he's proven he can master a sport quickly. He took up the shot put when he was 18; at 20, he represented Great Britain last year in the London Olympics.

Okoye said training camp was "the hardest thing I could have gone through" and that playing against left tackle Joe Staley and guard Mike Iupati this summer "was a nice rude awakening."

Okoye said he can't wait to show those guys how much he's learned – something that may not happen until the next training camp in late July.

Until then, Okoye is proving his worth in other ways.

The South London native has been especially popular this week with teammates who are eager to see the city.

"They think I'm the ... Yellow Pages," he said with a smile. "I just point them in the right direction."

'Football nerd' Okoye looks ahead to '14 training camp

In the Summer of 2012, Lawrence Okoye represented Great Britain in the Olympic Games.

He made the Olympic finals after taking up the discus just two years earlier.

Now, the discus is gathering dust. He pursued American football just before the NFL draft, and he is collecting \$288,000 this season while on injured reserve with the 49ers.

He is a defensive lineman in a sport that is far down the list of popularity in the United Kingdom. But he is still carrying his nation's flag.

"I can tell you, in terms of country pride, in terms of pride of England and pride of Great Britain, he is presenting this country well – extremely well," 49ers defensive line coach Jim Tomsula said. "Everything he can do, he's doing, and then some."

Okoye has been a forgotten man among the 49ers since the beginning of the season. But he was in the limelight on Wednesday upon his return to his homeland as a professional athlete in a sport that does not exist professionally at a high level in his country.

Okoye sustained a partially torn posterior-cruciate ligament in his right knee in the 49ers' third exhibition game. He was placed on season-ending injured reserve, though the injury is not considered serious.

"I'll be 100 percent in the next few weeks," Okoye said.

He is unable to practice due to his spot on injured reserve. But he continues to study all aspects of football to grow his knowledge of the sport.

"I feel like I think like a football player now," Okoye said. "I definitely didn't think like a football player before. I didn't have the football IQ that I have now a couple months ago or even a month ago. I'm improving every day.

"Physically, I always felt like I was up the standard. (But) I can't declare myself as a football player until I get out on the field."

At 6 foot 6, 304 pounds, Okoye's size, strength and athleticism have never been questioned. What has remained in question is the unseen: How much does Okoye want to play football? To what lengths will he go to make up for the many years he went without playing the sport?

When he showed up for training camp, he did not know how to properly outfit himself in football pads. Then, he went out and lined up against, perhaps, the best offensive line in the NFL.

"Training camp was good because that's the hardest thing I could've gone through," he said. "Having zero experience and going out against Joe Staley and Mike Lupati was a nice, rude awakening."

He has spent his time off the field getting more familiar with the game of football. And he has studied minutiae about the individuals who play the game. He is able to tick off heights and weights of players from around the league, among many other tidbits.

While he defers his enrollment into Oxford to study law until 2017, he exercises his mind while rehabilitating his body.

"He's a football nerd," Tomsula said. "It's all football. He talks it, eats it, sleeps it."

"The guys get on him because he can tell you where everybody's from. He can tell you what school they went to, what high school, how tall they were in the ninth grade, how tall they are now. He can go through the statistics.

"But not to get lost in that, he studies the game itself. He studies every aspect of it."

Okoye confirms his peers tease him because of his encyclopedic knowledge of the men who play the game.

"Sometimes the guys on the D-line take the piss out of me," he said to laughter from the British media at the 49ers' team hotel.

Okoye had a promising rugby career only to move on to the discus. If he devoted himself fully to the discus, he could easily become challenger for an Olympic medal in three years.

"I don't think past tomorrow, let alone 2016," Okoye said. "I'm just focused on being a football player. And the next biggest thing on my horizon is 2014 training camp. I'm not worried about 2016 or anything else."

Patton's passion wins over coach

There is a special place in Jim Harbaugh's heart - which, incidentally, is shaped like a football - for guys who attack the game with an enthusiasm unknown to mankind.

Colin Kaepernick is one of those rare birds.

"There's something special in what drives him," Harbaugh said of Kaepernick Wednesday.

Another player on Harbaugh's short list of inhumanly eager beavers is rookie wide receiver Quinton Patton from Louisiana Tech.

They are at polar-opposite ends of the star spectrum. Kaepernick has been on every magazine cover published in the last three months. Patton has not.

Football people wonder if Kaepernick will make the Hall of Fame. They wonder if Patton will make the 49ers.

But Harbaugh, I'm guessing, loves 'em equally.

Harbaugh and Kaepernick bonded instantly, when the coach drove to Reno to check out the hotshot college passer whose pro potential was iffy. They played catch, Kaepernick rudely dusted Harbaugh in a couple of passing contests, and it was game-on.

Patton was another case of love at first sight for Harbaugh. More accurately, love before first sight.

"There's something special in what drives him," Jim Harbaugh says of Colin Kaepernick (center).

A couple days after the 49ers drafted Patton in the fourth round, 128th overall, he packed his bags back home in Nashville, told friends and family he was off to conquer the NFL, bought himself an airline ticket to the Bay Area, rented a car and phoned the 49ers' office for directions.

"No!" Patton was instructed. "You can't be here! Turn around and go home!"

League guidelines prohibit rookies from reporting before specific dates. Had Patton driven to the team complex, the 49ers faced a big fine.

Patton sadly U-turned, but he flew to Louisville, embarrassed to return home one day after his triumphant departure.

Was Harbaugh mad at the rookie's bonehead move? Yes, madly in love. Harbaugh told the story on KNBR, said he couldn't wait for the youngster to arrive for real so he could give him a hug.

"It's going to be rough if you have to cut him," said interviewer Eric Byrnes.

"That's not going to happen," Harbaugh said.

As heartfelt as that statement was, it's not legally binding. The 49ers are thin at wide receiver, but early in camp Patton jammed a finger on a bullet pass from Kaepernick, and Patton's pass-catching is medically restricted.

(Last season it was Randy Moss and who got Kaeper-nicked.)

But Patton still scrimmages, catching one-handed, working practices like a puppy at a Frisbee fest.

First day of camp Patton ran up to 10-year veteran Anquan Boldin and introduced himself with much eagerness. The ultra-reserved Boldin looked at Patton as if he had just hopped out of a hovering UFO. Now they get along fine.

Is Patton still extra enthusiastic?

"Yessir, yessir, happy to be out here every day," he said, and I glanced over my shoulder to see if he was talking to the school principal. "Some people are more quiet on the field, you know what I'm saying? This is what I do, I just love being out there, I show my love for the game, go out there, holler, run around, all of that."

Do the vets ever tell him to dial it back?

"Nah, they tell me keep going, always keep it up. 'Cause I made my mark as a loud, enthusiastic guy. Keep it up, just don't be a distraction for the other players.' "

Patton says he wasn't always this exuberant, not until his position coach at Coffeyville (Kansas) Community College, Kelton Copeland, told the kid to either crank up the energy level or look for a job outside of football.

"I wasn't lazy," Patton said, "but I wasn't a hard-working person."

Harbaugh and Patton had a chat when Patton finally legally reported, but no hug.

"Nah, he ain't give me my hug yet," Patton said with a smile. "I guess I got to make some plays first before I get a hug."

Kaepernick doesn't have Patton's eager-rookie vibe, but he's no less the maniacal footballer Harbaugh spotted as the 49ers' future three years ago.

"He's the type of player who studies the game plan," Harbaugh said Wednesday, "studies the ready list, studies our practice tape, opponent's tape, and somebody that contributes to the game plan and formulates ideas, asks questions, knows what everybody on the offense is doing, and getting very good at understanding defenses and what they're trying to accomplish and what their adjustments are. Still evolving. ... Continues to learn. Continues to grow. He's always eager to learn, always eager to understand, eager to have input, as well."

When - if - Kaepernick and Patton hook up for their first joint touchdown, it's going to be a hell of a celebration.

Niners rookie safety Eric Reid isn't panicking after unceremonious 1-2 start

Eric Reid knows better than to panic. Playing three years at LSU, you learn how to deal with pressure.

So despite the fact the San Francisco 49ers are a surprising 1-2 with a struggling quarterback, a banged-up defense and All-Pro Aldon Smith away from the team while he gets treatment for alcohol dependency, the rookie safety Reid believes that the defending NFC champs will be just fine.

In his first three regular-season games, Reid has been a major factor in the 49ers defense with 14 tackles and both of the team's interceptions so far this season. While the 2012 All-America has grasped the defense quickly, he admits it hasn't been easy and that he has experienced some "growing pains" adjusting to the NFL. But spending extra time meeting with the coaches has paid off on the field, and has Reid playing with a new level of confidence.

When the 49ers decided to let Pro Bowl safety Dashon Goldson walk to Tampa Bay in free agency in the offseason, their plan was to address the situation through the draft. And after spending a first-round pick (No. 18 overall) on what they believed to be a can't-miss prospect like Reid, they expected he would play right away.

"For me this is a dream come true," Reid told FOXSports.com in a telephone interview Tuesday. "This is the job I've wanted since I've been in middle school and to have this opportunity is a blessing. I'm just grateful for every chance I have to go out and play with this defense in San Francisco."

Reid has been under the tutelage of defensive coordinator Vic Fangio, but the rookie attributes much of his growth to eight-year veteran and fellow safety Donte Whitner, who has looked after Reid on and off the field.

"We have veteran guys like Patrick Willis and NaVorro Bowman, but Donte is a safety so he knows what I'm going through on a play-to-play basis," Reid said. "He's definitely taken me under his wing. He's another coach for me. We have great coaches on the team, but he's given me a player perspective on things. He's always telling me how I can do something better or something to look out for on the field."

The 49ers will be undermanned for Thursday night's tilt against the Rams in St. Louis. Along with Smith, San Francisco may be without tight end Vernon Davis, who continues to battle a nagging hamstring. And Willis' status is uncertain after sustaining a groin injury in Week 3. That didn't stop Willis from calling an "out of the blue" meeting with the defense this week, stressing the importance of taking the season one game at a time and to not make too much of the disappointing start.

Although the 49ers employ an aggressive defense that relies on instincts and timing, penalties handicapped the secondary in the Week 3 loss against the Colts, cornerback Tarell Brown drawing three of the 49ers' six flags. But says that won't stop the secondary from challenging opposing wide receivers at the line of scrimmage.

"There has not been one word of that," Reid said. "Our corners are very aggressive and that's how we like them to play. We want them to challenge receivers. I guess we need to be a little more aware of how deep we are when we get past five yards, we have to let off a little bit. But that's the style of play our coaches ask of us to have."

The Rams pose threats on the outside with speedy receivers such as Chris Givens, Tavon Austin and Austin Pettis. The real playmaker in the Rams' offense, though, has been fifth-year tight end Jared Cook. The Rams acquired the 6-foot-5, 254-pound target from Tennessee in free agency and his immediate impact (seven catches, 141 yards, 2 TDs in the season opener, his last game in St. Louis) has the 49ers keying in on him.

"He's tall and deceptively fast," Reid said of Cook. "You can see on film that he has a nice stride. We just have to be aware of him when he's on the field and the position that he's in. If the linebackers need help, then we have to help them but at the same time we just need to execute our calls."

If Reid has anything to do with it, he'll make sure that the 49ers don't get caught up in the hysteria that goes with the national spotlight and instead finish Thursday with a win.

49ers' rookie Reid, grade-A student and dad, readies for first NFL start

Matching wits with Green Bay Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers in your first NFL start may seem like a daunting proposition for a rookie.

Eric Reid, however, has had to grow up fast before.

In 2009, when the 49ers safety was 17, he had a 4.0-plus grade-point average, a starring role on his high school football team and, to everyone's surprise, a child. His daughter, LeiLani, was born three months before his senior year began.

Eric Sr. and Sharon Reid made sure their son knew LeiLani was his responsibility. Eric Jr. cared for his daughter on weekends and got a job as a cashier at his hometown Wal-Mart. He made \$8.10 an hour.

One year later, he improved his GPA to 4.6, was ranked the No. 4 safety in the nation and landed a scholarship to play at LSU.

"I never even knew he had a job," said Benny Saia, who coached Reid at Dutchtown High in Geismar, La. "He worked. He paid for diapers. He did everything he had to as an adult."

Maturity and responsibility are recurring themes with Reid.

Even though the 49ers traded to move up 13 spots in the first round to draft Reid, defensive coordinator Vic Fangio didn't want to just hand the starting free-safety job to a rookie, so he threw him into a four-way competition for the role.

But it quickly became apparent that Reid, who is 6-foot-1 and weighs 213 pounds, wasn't just athletically superior to his veteran rivals – he quickly caught up mentally, too.

"He's smart, he's very athletic, and he don't mind hitting," linebacker Patrick Willis said. "And he listens really well. It's not like you talk to him and he looks lost and doesn't know what to do. That's a big thing to be able to look back there and say, 'Hey, on this formation, I'm counting on you.'"

At Dutchtown and LSU, Reid was known foremost as a vicious hitter.

"He tried to kill everybody he hit," Saia said.

But he also was a thinking man. Asked to describe his style of play after he was drafted, Reid pointed to brains before brawn.

"I'm a very cerebral player," he said. "I pride myself on knowing the defense. I pride myself on being able to get the guys lined up on the team, and being a great teammate and also doing my job."

Eric Reid Sr. was a three-time All-America hurdler for LSU from 1984-87 and is a member of LSU's Athletic Hall of Fame, but academics were paramount in his house.

Bring home a C on a quiz, a test, a paper or – heaven forbid – a report card, and there would be consequences. Mediocrity was not tolerated.

"If they came home with a C, they lost some privileges," Eric Sr. said of his children. "Eric knew that if he didn't take care of academics, he wasn't playing any sports. I only remember a couple of B's. The rest were A's."

Eric Jr. didn't get any breaks after LeiLani was born, either. When she was 6 days old, he watched her alone for the first time. He expected the newborn would sleep in his parents' room. After all, they had practice, having raised four kids.

Eric Sr., however, quickly squashed that idea. The baby, he told his son, is sleeping with you in your room.

The next morning, Eric Sr. asked his son how the first night went, and Eric Jr. said the baby slept pretty well.

"But how'd you sleep?" he asked his son.

"I didn't sleep at all," his son replied.

Said the father: "Welcome to parenthood."

49ers rookie Eric Reid's mother also has football skills

Eric Reid, the 49ers' first-round pick, inherited speed from his father. Eric Reid Sr. was a three-time All-American hurdler and an inductee into the LSU Athletic Hall of Fame.

Football? That comes from mom.

Sharon Guillory-Reid was a tight end and defensive end for the Baton Rouge Wildcats of the dearly departed Women's American Football League.

"This was full-contact women's tackle football. And I had the time of my life," she said with a laugh recently. "If I could go back and do it again, I'd do it in a heartbeat."

Alas, Guillory-Reid's pro football career lasted one meager season before Hurricane Katrina hastened the end of the Wildcats' existence.

These days, the part-time Bay Area resident hopes her son can have a more lasting impact on the football field. The 49ers traded up to nab Eric Reid with the NFL draft's 18th pick. Reid and his fellow rookies are taking part in a three-day rookie minicamp this weekend in Santa Clara.

The 6-foot-1, 213-pound safety was a key member of an LSU defense that ranked among the nation's best in points allowed, total yards and rushing yards.

In Reid, 49ers coach Jim Harbaugh finally gets the man he tried so hard to lure to Stanford. Harbaugh launched a determined, if quixotic, recruiting pitch trying to land a kid dead set on LSU almost from birth. (The Reids, both LSU grads, live just 15 minutes from campus.)

Harbaugh refused to surrender, figuring his wild card was the former Wildcat: He tried to work through Sharon.

"His mom is a wonderful, wonderful person, and we really connected through the whole process," Harbaugh said. "(Eric) was a very, very fine student. That was something that was very important to his mother. So I felt like we had a shot."

They did: Guillory-Reid says now that she was so honored that such a renowned academic institution wanted her son that she tried to get Eric to at least make an official visit. Eric told her a trip to Stanford wouldn't make any difference: He was going to LSU.

The defensive back went on to be a two-time All-American and a member of the All-Southeastern Conference academic honor roll over his final two seasons. Reid became just the second LSU safety ever selected in the first round, joining LaRon Landry (2007).

Now, as Reid gets adjusted to the Bay Area, his first scouting report will come from Mom, who plans to use her knowledge of the area to get her son settled. Guillory-Reid lives in Louisiana but has been making regular trips to the Bay Area for the past eight years.

As a registered nurse licensed to work in several states, she has spent significant time at Highland General Hospital in Oakland, as well as at San Leandro Hospital. Guillory-Reid works on a per diem (as-needed) basis because she likes the flexibility it allows her in working her schedule around her family.

So, since 2005, Guillory-Reid has been heading out to the Bay Area for two- or three-week stints before returning to her permanent home in Louisiana. She's scheduled to be here now.

"She has a ton of flight miles," Eric said. "She can show me around here."

And, boy, was Harbaugh right about Sharon's emphasis on education. Eric Reid and his siblings couldn't watch TV until all their homework was done. And in the summers they had to read -- even if nothing was required by school. With a standard that might have prepared Reid for the 49ers, Mom and Dad demanded their kids attack schoolwork with an enthusiasm unknown to mankind.

"They'd be like, 'Mom, you ought to be happy I got a B,'" Sharon said in a phone interview. "I'm like, 'No, a B for you is not acceptable to me. A B for another kid might be good, but I know what you're capable of. And you can easily make all A's.'"

When Eric got to the age where he wanted money for things like video games, his parents had a three-word answer: Get a job. By 15, Eric was working at a local water park. By 16, he was a Wal-Mart employee.

"I told him, 'I don't care if it's four hours or eight hours a week between practices: You work. You learn what it means to earn money,'" Guillory-Reid said. "I got him a little car, a 2001 Honda Civic -- in fact, I have it right now -- and told him that if he wanted to put gas money in it, he had to learn how to manage a budget."

Eric played football, basketball and followed in his father's fleet footsteps in track. Eric Sr. was the NCAA champion in the 110-meter hurdles as a senior in 1987.

Sharon, also an LSU grad, played recreational soccer, basketball and other sports -- before launching her short-lived career in the women's football league. Eric's gridiron scouting report: "I only saw a couple games. She was pretty good."

Along the way, both parents taught Eric that there's an academic side to sports.

"And he gets a really big kick out of studying playbooks and studying the other teams," Mom said. "Mentally, he knows what's going to happen next. He knows, 'If they do this, then, I'm going to do that.'"

On draft day, Eric explained that the discipline of childhood now translates to game days. There's a reason his LSU teammates named him a permanent captain in 2012.

"I think I'm a very cerebral player," he said. "I pride myself on knowing the defense. I pride myself on being able to get the guys lined up on the team, and being a great teammate and also doing my job."

"I'm very fortunate to be on such an incredible defense with the guys that are up there now. And I just can't wait to get to work."

49ers: Aldon Smith keeps growing

As part of a mercifully quiet offseason, 49ers linebacker Aldon Smith found time to return to his Missouri roots.

He stopped by his old school, Raytown High, where he spoke to an assembly and signed a jersey for the school's display case. Along the way, he delivered a message that would sound just as suitable for the 49ers as they prepare for Sunday's regular-season opener against the Green Bay Packers.

"I remember him saying: 'Shoot for your dreams. Shoot for your dreams,' " recalled junior Brian Taylor, the backup quarterback for Raytown.

Smith knows firsthand what it means to aim high. He enters his third season as the 49ers' pass-rushing maestro, with the league's single-season sack

Not bad for someone less than a month shy of his 24th birthday.

Six years ago, Smith was playing for Raytown High and "just trying to win the game on Friday," he said. Recruited to the University of Missouri, then drafted by the 49ers, Smith has compiled more sacks in his first two seasons (331/2) than anybody in the 30-year history of the statistic.

That shocks no one who saw him as a teenager.

"I can't tell you we were super surprised," former Raytown coach Ken Clemens said of Smith's NFL success. "We knew he had a special skill."

Raytown High is located about four miles from Arrowhead Stadium, home of the Kansas City Chiefs. The schools' trophy cases don't reflect much special about its football team, aside from one 8x10 photo: Smith's senior portrait.

Across the hall is the basketball team's treasure trove, including a group photo with Smith's 6-foot-4 frame centered in the back row.

"Our football team wasn't that good, so football wasn't my best way to get friends," said Smith. "Our basketball team was really good, so that helped out."

Before he transferred to Raytown his junior year, Smith was known mostly as a hoops player. He lived with his family in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and played basketball but not football.

When his parents divorced, Smith chose to live with his father, Thurston, near Kansas City, rather than with his mother in Georgia "It was definitely a decision that weighed a lot on my life and how it's turned out," Aldon Smith said.

More decisions awaited him, such as: football or basketball? Clemens recalled that Smith was a "real good" basketball player who specialized in rebounding and defense. "He just couldn't shoot," Clemens said.

Smith's father preferred basketball for his son. "But he had to make his own decision," Thurston said, "and he made the right one."

In football, Smith excelled on defense, where he had 12 sacks and forced seven fumbles as a senior for a team that finished 3-7. Smith also helped out on offense.

"He was a great tight end in high school," Thurston said. "And I thought he stood out more on offense. But at that level, everyone focuses on offense, anyhow."

Missouri's coaches also saw Smith's two-way prowess during their recruitment of him. So they gave him a choice of which side of the ball he would play. "I felt defense was the way to go," Aldon Smith said. "I was better at it."

Good call. Smith went on set Missouri's single-season record for sacks (111/2) as a redshirt freshman, breaking the standard set by current 49ers teammate Justin Smith.

Drafted seventh overall in 2011, Aldon Smith promptly began terrorizing opposing passers. He had a franchise-record 19 1/2 sacks last season, all in the first 13 games.

A combination of a torn shoulder labrum, the opposition's increased focus on him, and Justin Smith's triceps injury hindered Smith's late-season production. The 19 1/2 sacks left him one short of the league leader, Houston's J.J. Watt, and three behind Michael Strahan's league record.

But Smith's contribution to the defense can't be measured by sacks alone.

"I don't think any situation is too big for him," 49ers defensive coordinator Vic Fangio said. "His Atlanta game (for the NFC championship) was as good a game as he played for us last year. He just didn't have any sacks. Even on the last play ... he gave us great rush and affected the play."

Fangio insists there is still more upside. He said Smith still can improve his technique and knowledge of the game, "little things" to raise his and the defense's production.

After a turbulent offseason last year -- getting arrested on suspicion of drunken driving, suffering stab wounds at his own party -- Smith is coming off a quieter 2013 offseason. He tinkered with mixed-martial-arts training and underwent surgery on that torn labrum.

And, of course, there was that trip back to Raytown High and the pep talk he gave to students about shooting for their dreams.

Six years ago, Thurston Smith was the one offering such encouragement to his son.

"As he's matured, he's understanding the game better," the elder Smith said. "With that, and staying healthy and humble, those are ingredients the future Hall of Famers had.

"He always tries to find a way to get better. He's never satisfied. To be in the league a long time, you have to have that mentality. I don't think he, or anyone, is going to be satisfied until he gets a Super Bowl ring."

Aldon Smith Builds on Experience

Two seasons, 33.5 sacks.

Aldon Smith has been a disruptive pass-rushing force to start his career with the San Francisco 49ers, but he's still striving towards bigger goals as he enters his third year in the National Football League.

It's an impressive frame of mind when you consider the starting outside linebacker's 33.5 sacks are the most by a player in his first two seasons in NFL history. The 6-foot-4, 258-pound linebacker reached the mark by passing Hall of Fame defensive end Reggie White's 31 sacks.

Smith isn't satisfied with his instant production which includes totaling the most sacks in consecutive seasons by any player in 49ers history. Smith also won the team's coveted Bill Walsh Award, given to the team's Most Valuable Player. Although he earned first-team All-Pro honors and was selected to his first Pro Bowl, San Francisco's third-year linebacker is eager to showcase more of his talents.

How can he do that?

"By improving off last year," Smith said after the first day of 49ers Organized Team Activities. "My rookie year I did alright. I came in next year and did better so I've got to do the same thing this year coming up, just keep getting better and not take any steps back."

Smith went from 14.0 sacks as a rookie to a single-season, franchise record, 19.5 sacks as a sophomore. Smith finished with the most sacks in the NFC and second-most in the NFL behind J.J. Watt's 20.5 sacks. He also donated \$5,099 for each of his regular season sacks to the Boys & Girls Clubs of San Francisco and East Palo Alto.

Even more impressive, Smith totaled his 19.5 sacks in San Francisco's first 13 games of 2012. The mark stands as the most sacks through a team's first 13 games in NFL history.

Smith remained a valuable contributor in San Francisco's Super Bowl run despite playing through a shoulder injury which lingered into the postseason.

Even so, Smith had time to do light Mixed Martial Arts training this offseason with an emphasis to improve his cardio. The 49ers linebacker plans to utilize various training methods like MMA throughout his football career.

"It was helpful," Smith said. "I didn't do it as much as I wanted to at the time, but I'll work myself back into that."

For now, Smith can't help but notice the rookie lockers filling up the walking space in the team's locker room. The third-year pro and No. 7 overall draft pick didn't have OTAs as a rookie due to the league's work stoppage in 2011, but he can still relate to what the newcomers are experiencing this offseason with the 49ers.

"It's cool seeing everyone come in and figure it out," Smith said. "That's where you were three years ago, so it's cool to help them through it."

Smith is growing with his experience as an outside linebacker, too. He played defensive end in college at Missouri, but feels more comfortable with the variety of roles he can play in Vic Fangio's 3-4 defensive scheme.

Smith now feels he can provide even more to the 49ers defense.

"I'm able to try and get the best out of everything I can offer," he said.

If that means being more of a leader, Smith is fine with that.

"It's something I've always tried to do," the 2012 team MVP said. "Vocal is not yelling, I've been cool with everybody so if I saw something, I'd open my mouth about it and people would listen.

"I'm trying to continue that and keep my leadership role up."

And while Smith feels more like a veteran in the 49ers locker room, he doesn't feel the need to call out opposing pass rushers for sport. Smith has previously talked about sack competitions with fellow third-year linebacker Von Miller of the Denver Broncos, but those conversations have quieted down now that they're entering year three of promising professional careers in their respective cities.

"We don't even talk about that," Smith said of his close friend. "We talk about our lives and make sure we're all good. We don't talk about sacks."

Smith and Miller might avoid sack banter, but there will likely be some back-and-forth when both players learn of their rankings in the NFL Network's Top 100 Players of 2013 list.

Smith has shot promotional interviews for other players in the top 100 and expects to be on the list in 2013 which unveils 10 players at a time in weekly installments.

"I don't know where I'm at, but for me being on the list it's a good feeling," the 49ers linebacker said. "They left me hanging last year, it should be interesting to see where I'm at this year."

Smith continues to be an interesting personality in the 49ers locker room. If his play didn't stand out enough, he was sporting a new haircut with a white headband after Tuesday's practice.

"It's the Jheri curl," Smith said with a grin. "I'm rocking this."

49ers' Justin Smith is never one to coast

Before they fully realized he was as steady as the sunrise, some of those closest to 49ers defensive tackle Justin Smith worried success would change him.

Ron Cole, his coach at Jefferson City (Mo.) High, wasn't thrilled when Smith accepted a full-ride scholarship to Missouri before his senior season. With his college future secured, Cole figured Smith would coast. Instead, Smith resided in the weight room, never missed a practice, led Jeff City to a state championship and was in the weight room the morning after the state-title game.

"Nothing changed," Cole said. "Just being who Justin is -- he stayed the exact same."

Four years later, D.J. Thrash, one of his best friends since childhood, worried that Smith, the No. 4 overall pick in the 2001 NFL draft, would change after becoming an instant multimillionaire. A few months after the draft, however, Smith returned home and Thrash explained that he'd lost his cell phone number. When Smith said he no longer had a phone, Thrash was perplexed.

"He said it was \$40 a month and that was too much money," Thrash said. "I was like 'Really? What in the world's wrong with you, man?' That's kind of when I knew Justin wouldn't stray far from his roots."

Smith's roots are in central Missouri. He spent much of his childhood on his family's cattle ranch in Holts Summit (pop. 2,935), which is about 125 miles away from the Edward Jones Dome, where the 49ers will visit the Rams on Thursday night.

The 49ers (1-2) will arrive looking a bit different than the team that played in the Super Bowl less than eight months ago. They are on their first two-game losing streak since 2010, have suffered their worst back-to-back defeats since 2006 and transcendent quarterback Colin Kaepernick has crashed to earth with six turnovers and no touchdowns the past two weeks.

On Thursday, their defense could also be without two All-Pros. Outside linebacker Aldon Smith entered a treatment facility this week for a substance-abuse problem and inside linebacker Patrick Willis might be sidelined because of a groin injury.

Any guesses on who's stayed steady through the 49ers' mini-storm?

In Week 1, Smith, who turns 34 on Monday, was the reason Packers guard Josh Sitton had three penalties, including two holding calls. In Week 2, he memorably bull-rushed Seahawks center Max Unger into Tacoma. Last week, he had San Francisco's only sack against the Colts.

Beyond his continued All-Pro on-field performance, Smith has contributed in his role as team captain. Last week, Jim Harbaugh asked Smith to deliver "Wise Words," a post-Friday-practice ritual in which a player offers a message to his teammates. Smith delivered a message he's lived out: Don't let success make you soft.

Yes, 12 years after signing his first NFL contract, the four-time Pro Bowler is still allergic to the trappings of stardom: He doesn't do commercials, magazine covers (he's rebuffed Sports Illustrated) and he declined a one-on-one interview for this story. His charity work is done with the understanding that it won't be publicized.

Last week, though, he did explain the gist of the message he delivered to members of a team that went 24-7-1, won two division titles and reached the Super Bowl the previous two seasons.

“Anytime, a team or people are having success, it’s a natural reaction to exhale a little bit,” Smith said. “I don’t think that’s what we’re doing, but just to be aware of it.”

In Holts Summit, they’re still waiting for Smith to exhale. He grew up on cattle farms with his parents, Dave and Ginger, and his older sister, Sarah, but much of his legendary work ethic can be traced to his paternal grandmother, Virginia Mae Smith, who died in 2009 at 84.

His teammates call Smith “Cowboy.” But his family has often called him “Virge,” a nod to the former nurse who had a never-ending list of farm chores that needed to be finished.

Asked about his mother’s influence, Dave Smith laughed: “You had to work every second. And you had to feel guilty if you weren’t.”

And Justin inherited the work gene. At 2, Smith cried when his dad left him inside and toiled on the farm. At 4, he’d attempt to lift 20-pound buckets of grain onto the tailgate of Dave’s truck, topple backward from the weight, beat the corn dust off and try again. Later, he’d do anything to make farm work even harder to get a more strenuous workout. A wagon had flat tires? He wouldn’t inflate them. A riding lawnmower? No thanks. He pushed a hand mower. During youth baseball games, he did pull-ups in the dugout.

Recognizing Justin’s aptitude for back-breaking work, Cole, who has his own ranch, hired him during the summers before football practice began.

“I couldn’t afford a hay elevator that shoots it up to barn,” Cole said. “So I just had Justin throw it.”

Smith’s maniacal work ethic has been well-documented during his 13-year career. A favorite offseason bit of training: Doing squats until he vomits. He even places a trash can in the middle of the weight room. It all traces back to Holts Summit.

“When he goes to the gym to work out four times in a day,” his sister, Sarah Dubbert, explained, “he’s being Virge.”

Smith credits his upbringing for his football success. And his attachment to his roots explains why he owns – of all things — a golf course in Holts Summit.

Smith, of course, is pure country, not country club. He famously has an Anheuser-Busch tattoo on his left bicep and his father doesn’t recall his blue-jean-and-cowboy-boots-wearing son ever wearing a tie (he did wear a sport coat at the 2001 draft, he notes).

Smith seldom golfs, but the Railwood Golf Club occupies acres that used to be his grandparents’ farmland. His dad grew up here amid rolling hills dotted by oaks, maples and sycamores. When the golf course was in financial trouble about 10 years ago, Smith stepped in and bought it. He’s more concerned about making sure the largely blue-collar clientele can afford 18 holes than turning a profit: It costs \$25 to play, with a cart, on the weekends.

Asked about Justin’s desire to buy Railwood, Dave allows that, yes, the land has meaning to his son. But he doesn’t offer much more. The Smiths, you see, don’t really do sentimental.

Dave, for example, developed Guillain-Barre syndrome when Justin was 9. The rare muscle disorder left him completely paralyzed, in a hospital, for seven months, barely able to blink. He spent about two years in a wheelchair, nearly died on several occasions and still walks with a limp 25 years later.

How did their father’s illness affect Justin and Sarah, who was 11 when Dave got sick? Sarah doesn’t look back with outward angst. They simply ploughed ahead, she explained: “You were out on the farm. The hay still had to come in. The cows still had to be fed. That’s just the way it was. That became the norm for that period of time. I don’t know that we ever thought about it any other terms.”

The not-cushy lifestyle is what Smith wants for his three sons, who range in ages from 5 to 3 months. Those close to him believe he and his wife, Kerry, who grew up in Moberly, Mo., and met Justin in college, will leave the Bay Area and return to their home state after Smith retires. Smith, who negotiated his own two-year contract extension in June that includes \$9.5 million in guaranteed money, can afford a fleet of hired hands for his future life on his farm. But his boys would be missing out.

"He wants to buy land to have them work it," Thrash said. "He wants them to get out of air-conditioned house and the pool and go sweat."

Before retirement, however, it appears Smith still has plenty of football left to play. On Thursday, he will make the 189th start of a career in which he's missed just two games because of injury.

The 49ers will arrive looking different than they did en route to winning the NFC title last season, but one element of their team hasn't been altered.

"There's not much that changes," his sister said. "At the end of the day, he's got a lot of country boy in him. He is who he is and you can take it or leave it. One thing I've never really worried about is Justin ever changing."

The Joe Staley Experiment

It's hard not to eat everything in sight in the 49ers cafeteria. For one, you can always find cookies and brownies. Sometimes they even have Rice Krispies Treats with Oreo pieces inside. If that's not tempting enough, there's plenty of carbs to go around. The meals, available three times a day, are there to help players keep their weight consistent throughout the year. But the healthy options far outnumber the guilty pleasures. The never-ending salad bar, steamed vegetables, grilled chicken breasts and fish of the day option remain available on a daily basis.

Joe Staley has no problem navigating through the meal room. The two-time Pro Bowl left tackle maintains a disciplined approach. Staley, a former first-round draft pick, was once a 250-pound college tight end who ate everything in sight to become a 300-pound blue chip offensive line prospect. Staley could revert back to his days of eating heavy meals and keeping his body large and in charge like many of the linemen found in today's National Football League. But he doesn't. Staley prefers a complex and colorful lunch, much like his personality. It's a Friday afternoon in April and there are two pieces of grilled chicken covered with sliced avocados lying next to an assortment of vegetables – even brussels sprouts – on the plate. Talk about discipline. The 49ers blind-side protector isn't looking the other way when he's fueling his body during offseason workouts; he's carefully tailoring his meals to match his training habits.

"I eat this stuff every day," he says, digging into a leafy spinach salad to go with his protein plate.

Staley is smart on the field and puts just as much thought into the decisions he makes away from it. That, in a nutshell, is how Staley has grown into the player he is now entering his seventh season in San Francisco.

It's that thoughtfulness combined with one of the biggest personalities in the locker room that has turned him into one of the team's biggest leaders. Big, however, really isn't the appropriate word for it. Looking at the 6-foot-5 tackle, his appearance is nothing like it was years ago when he felt his body break down and foot speed diminish. Staley has since trimmed his weight, increased his strength and become a role model for aspiring offensive linemen. Why you ask? Because he can do it all.

Staley is as good at dropping anchor to neutralize bull-rushing defenders as he is at asking stupid questions to some teammates. The 49ers left tackle is one of a kind. And, he just so happens to be coming into his own. The athletic competitor is changing the game for left tackles in the NFL. Most of this year's top offensive tackle prospects want to be like him, too. Maybe not host a show on a web site like "The Joe Show," but they want to play the game just like him. They want to be tough, intelligent, consistent, nimble and passionate. That's No. 74 in a nutshell. And the nut that he is, is too good of a player to ignore.

SKINNY JOE SHOW / the 250-pound tight end

Rockford doesn't churn out Division I football prospects like other areas of Michigan. It did, however, produce Staley, the first, first-round draft pick in Central Michigan football history. Staley wasn't destined to be a first-rounder when he accepted a scholarship to play tight end for the Chippewas. Truth be told, he just wanted to play football for as long as possible following a football and track career at Rockford High School. The NFL was hardly in Staley's mind back in 2003 when he appeared in 11 games as a true freshman, catching 11 passes for 130 yards and one touchdown.

"It was never a goal," Staley says sitting upright at 49ers headquarters in Santa Clara. "It wasn't like I came to school saying, 'My goal is to become an NFL player.'"

That's precisely what happened though. After Central Michigan suffered a sixth-consecutive losing season, the coaching staff that recruited Staley was replaced by up-and-coming Grand Valley State

coach, Brian Kelly. Central Michigan's program would enjoy its best years in the coming seasons, the very same years Staley switched from tight end to offensive tackle.

It was the collective idea of Kelly and line coach Jeff Quinn, who knew what they're doing on a football field. It also turned out best for all parties involved. Kelly has since moved on to head coaching stints at the University of Cincinnati and Notre Dame, where he led the Irish to the BCS title game in 2012. Quinn, the energetic offensive line coach, was hired as the University of Buffalo's head coach in 2010.

At first, it wasn't an easy sell. Staley would have to put aside his receiver gloves for padded blocking gloves. He also had to go on an uncomfortable weight-gaining spree. Staley considered the move for a few days and eventually accepted the challenge. If it would help the team, Staley was up for it. Even if the change meant waking up at 2 in the morning to drink 2,000-calorie weight-gaining milkshakes and lifting weights twice a day. Staley did those things in college and never lost his quickness along the way.

"It was a big step because No. 1 he was a very good tight end. He probably would be playing in the NFL as a tight end if he had stayed at that spot," says former CMU strength coach Paul Longo, the current strength and conditioning coach at Notre Dame. "We saw him as having the ability of being a great left tackle. Once he made up his mind, he never looked back."

Quinn, Staley's collegiate position coach, had a history of identifying athletic players at other positions and switching them to offensive linemen. Staley would be his latest and perhaps, greatest, experiment. "With a high-tempo system of offense, you need athletic offensive linemen," Quinn says. "We weren't just going to run power, we were going to run screens and pass pro. You needed guys with quick feet and good smarts. That's what I was looking for."

The Chippewa coaching staff recognized Staley's strong work ethic and adaptability; they also knew they were dealing with a team-first player who loved the game. Staley, however, had reservations. He felt like he was a liability as a blocker, so when the coaches approached him about moving to the line it was most perplexing.

"I was really confused with it," Staley recalls, "but they said put in a lot of hard work. I had the right mindset about it. I've always been about the team, doing what I could do to help the team. They sold me on that was the best position for me to help the team win, so I did it."

CMU was looking to rebuild its depleted offensive line depth and had a system that fit Staley's athletic talents. Quinn saw a gifted tight end in Staley, but he also saw a tall, lean, passionate kid. Quinn recalled the initial conversations involved a selling on his part. But Staley, the ultimate team guy, accepted the opportunity to help his school as a tackle. "When those things are both there along with the talent," says Longo, "you know you really have something."

The weight gain came easy – Staley put on 20 pounds the first offseason under Longo's workout and meal plan. Still, Quinn was apprehensive about how the converted tight end would physically and mentally adjust to the new position. But those concerns were put to rest early.

"Joe was maybe no more than 250 pounds soaking wet," Quinn recalls. "We had a tough practice one day and I remember Joe coming off and his face-mask was full of dirt. I looked at him and wondered is this guy really into it or not? I said, 'How you doing Joe?' and he grabs me, he says, 'I love this (expletive)!'"

He did, indeed. Staley started 11 games as a right tackle in 2004. He took his lumps early on but learned the techniques needed to excel in Division I football. The following year, Staley moved over to left tackle and didn't allow a single sack while recording 53 knockdowns in his first season as a blindside protector. By the start of 2006, NFL scouts flocked to CMU to learn about Staley. The Chippewas went 10-4 in Staley's senior year and won the Motor City Bowl, the first bowl victory in school history.

Staley was instrumental in that success. He also had a great time doing it. Was the future 49ers left tackle the very same outgoing player that fans see on "The Joe Show?" Yes. Very much so, according to coaches who laughed at his impersonations of teammates and coaches. Staley's personality has always been one of a kind. "The Joe Show" was always rolling; it just didn't have cameras to capture it. "That would be accurate," Longo says. "That hasn't changed. He just got bigger; it was a skinnier Joe Show back then."

Humor aside, Staley was all-business on the field. Quinn recalls Staley allowing one sack during his senior year and that didn't come against Big Ten opponents: Michigan, Michigan State or Penn State. Considering he went from 225 pounds in high school to 290 as a senior in college, Staley's rise on NFL draft boards was quite impressive to say the least. All the while, he maintained his speed. Staley's 40-yard dash clocked in at 4.7 seconds at his college pro day.

"He's one of the smartest and most knowledgeable players I've ever coached and is very sound with his fundamentals and techniques," Quinn recalls. "He finished. This guy played as hard as he could every snap. That was something we instilled in that group and they were rewarded, they won a MAC Championship Joe's senior year because of his leadership. The next thing you know, we go to a bowl game and he's drafted in the first round."

DIET RIOT / the anti-weight loss campaign

The 49ers not only drafted Staley in the first round of the 2007 draft, they traded a first-round selection in 2008 and a fourth-round pick in 2007 to the New England Patriots in exchange for the No. 28 overall pick to get him. Staley was their guy.

But it wasn't just San Francisco that tried to acquire his services. The Kansas City Chiefs were also in pursuit and were strongly considering making Staley their pick at No. 23. San Francisco's offensive line coach, Mike Solari, was a member of the Chiefs coaching staff in 2007 and remembers Staley nearly being Kansas City's choice.

"We also had him really high," Solari recalls. "It came down to the situation where we felt we needed a receiver, Kansas City chose Bowe, but Joe was right in the conversation on if we were going to take his card up."

The longtime offensive line coach who was with the 49ers from 1992-96 and returned to the team in 2010 can still remember spending time with Staley before the draft. Solari also recalled why teams were enamored with the CMU prospect. "Joe stood out just with his ability to run and move in his perimeter blocking," Solari says.

Staley began his professional career as a right tackle where he started all 16 games as rookie in 2007. The following year, Staley moved to the left side of the line and continued his heavy eating and lifting schedule. Staley got up to 325 pounds by the end of the 2009 season, but he also felt it was a detriment to his on-field success. In 2009 and 2010, Staley only started in 18 games, nine in each year. Injuries and slow foot-speed made Staley want to change back to his college playing weight.

"I was fat," the left tackle says looking back on his appearance. "Everybody would tell me you have to be a certain size to play in the NFL and I kept gaining weight. By my third season it was the first time I really felt like I lost all the foot speed that I had, the agility. I was sacrificing all of that just to put on weight. I didn't feel like I was a good player anymore. Then I started getting injured. After that fourth season I was about 320-325, I said to myself, 'My career is going to be over before it really begins.'"

Staley made a decision in 2010 to get back to his style of play and work towards achieving a leaner body. He worked out with teammates at San Jose State University during the NFL's offseason work stoppage and maintained his focus of adding strength and losing weight. It worked. By Staley's fifth season he reported to camp at 308 pounds and went on to make his first Pro Bowl.

The choices Staley made were well-received by his former coaches, too. Quinn credited it to Staley being an intelligent football player. "He's really true to what will make him most successful," Quinn says while taking a break in between Buffalo's spring practices. "He's tailor-made it into what fits him. It's not about the weight, it's about the body fat, the body composition, the ability to anchor and still have strength and power."

Staley's evolution also speaks to a trend in football at all levels. Offenses need quick linemen to neutralize the athletes on the other side of the ball. If defenses are more explosive, players like Staley have to compete with their foot speed. "You don't need to be 330 pounds to be an effective offensive lineman," Quinn says. "It's a myth. I was always looking for lean body types. For Joe, it's been cool to see what he's been able to do."

NOSE BRO / round 1 of 19

Staley kept the same mindful approach to his offseason workouts before the 2012 season and enjoyed the best year of his professional career. The 49ers won a second consecutive NFC West title and reached the franchise's sixth Super Bowl. The offensive line was recognized by several media outlets as the best in football, including by Hall of Fame coach John Madden who named them his "Most Valuable Protectors." Staley made his second consecutive Pro Bowl at his preferred playing weight.

To get there, however, the blindside blocker dealt with a shot to the system in Week 1 of what turned out to be a 19-game schedule. In the season opener against the Green Bay Packers, Staley faced another Pro Bowler, outside linebacker Clay Matthews. The Packers standout totaled 2.5 sacks in the game and left his mark on Staley.

After repeated collisions in the first quarter, the bridge of Staley's nose was cut from his own helmet rubbing down on his face. It was painful. Staley's white road jersey was covered in his own blood before San Francisco even made to the locker room inside of historic Lambeau Field. Not to be deterred, Staley produced an inspired second-half performance against one of the league's best edge rushers.

"I viewed it as he was being a tough guy, a team-guy first," 49ers co-offensive line coach Tim Drevno says. "He would find a way mentally to push through it. He's going to help us try to win the football game. At Green Bay, he was battling one of the best defensive rush guys in the league – it was courageous."

"Joe is a tough guy," Solari says, echoing Drevno's stance. "He's not just a hard worker, he'll compete and when his nose was busted open, he didn't want to come out. He got it cleaned up and he said, 'I'm ready to go.' He has accountability to his fellow offensive linemen. Those guys took a lot of pride in playing together and Joe sets the table in that aspect."

Staley dealt with the pain from his nose. In doing so, he battled in the run game against Matthews and opened lanes for Pro Bowl running back Frank Gore. San Francisco's balanced offense that day all but took the wind out of Green Bay's sails as they defeated the Packers on the road for the first time since 1990. Staley's college coaches took tremendous pride in seeing their former pupil succeed in challenging circumstances, too.

"You talk about mental and physical toughness, Joe represents that," Quinn says of Staley's gutsy performance in Green Bay. "That's what Joe's all about. In this game, your toughness will be revealed. A lot of guys can make excuses. That's not Joe Staley. His mindset is all about winning."

LUCKY 13 / passing the torch

Staley is looking at the upcoming 2013 season the same way he viewed the past two years under Jim Harbaugh. He's eating smart and training harder. He's also showing his veteran wisdom even more than ever.

"You have to do what plays to your strengths," Staley says. "My strength has always been being quick, athletic and being able to move well. I don't want to sacrifice that just to be a certain size."

In Staley's mind when you get too light, the opposition tries to bull-rush you. Strength is crucial. That's been the emphasis of the left tackle's off-the-field training. "If I lose weight, I have to keep my strength up," he says. "Right now I feel stronger than I've ever been, while also being smaller I've ever been in my career."

The workouts, now being done at 49ers headquarters as part of the team's offseason strength program, remain important to Staley. That's why he continues to set the tone with the commitment needed in training. Drevno thinks of Staley as another coach in the o-line room. "He's one of the tireless, hardest workers," the offensive line coach says. "Football is important to him. It's a coach's dream to work with him because he's such a complete guy."

Besides asking the right questions in meetings during the season, Staley tirelessly studies opponents, with an eye on always looking for insight on the opposing pass-rusher's best moves. Those study nights won't take place for some time though. For now, the players are in the second week of offseason workouts to be followed by two weeks of on field instructions from the 49ers coaching staff. Then comes organized team activities and minicamps. Drevno can hardly contain his excitement. He can't work with the players just yet, but he'll be ready when the time comes.

"You're like a little kid in the candy store when the guys get back," the 49ers line coach says. "It's awesome to start working with them when the time comes for us to do that. Going on the field and being able to coach is your medicine. You can only do so much film-watching, you need to break the huddle, get down on the line, see the ball handed off to Frank Gore, or see Colin Kaepernick standing back there throwing a bullet to somebody... You get a new surge of energy for the year. And this is a good football team; all we can do is get better in what we do."

To get better, the 49ers will rely on leaders like Staley. Solari appreciates how his left tackle sets the example for the younger linemen on the roster, how he treats offseason workouts and practices like regular seasons games.

"It doesn't matter if it's an OTA, a minicamp, a training camp or during season, Joe's always going to give you all he has," Solari says. "He has great work ethic. The way he approaches the meetings, he's always prepared. He wants to know what's going on and he's very detailed."

Solari has worked with several athletic linemen during his coaching career. He also knows how those traits were stressed by legendary 49ers offensive line coach Bobb McKittrick, an inspirational coach who passed away from cancer in 2000.

"Joe fits that standard," Solari explains. "Bobb always wanted athletic offensive linemen and Joe fits tradition of athletic offensive linemen being able to play low to the ground. Joe is right there with the Harris Barton-type of athlete."

Solari has enjoyed seeing Staley's maturity in the last three seasons he's worked as the 49ers offensive line coach. Solari appreciates how his left tackle continues to hone his craft and play with better technique, especially learning the best ways to use his hands to counteract aggressive pass-rushers.

As the offensive line coaches dig through this year's draft prospects, they couldn't help but notice several incoming rookies mention Staley as a source of inspiration. Top tackle prospects like Eric Fisher and Lane Johnson singled out Staley's as a role model for their own athletic play.

"Quite a few of them have been a tight end earlier in their careers because of the athleticism you're looking for and the foot speed," Solari says of the offensive line prospects he's studied in this year's draft. "Joe was able to develop and put the weight on properly, he was a leaner athlete. Being leaner, you're

quicker and have more athleticism in your body, more of a quick-twitch. In this year's draft you're seeing former tight ends become tackles.

"The nice thing about Joe is that he can fit into any system because he is quick, he is explosive and he does a great job of playing with leverage. He's always got knee-bend. You appreciate Joe when you watch his athleticism and his ability to stay with defensive ends that are fleet-footed."

Staley, on the other hand, hasn't paid much attention to compliments he's receiving from incoming rookies. He does, however, appreciate Fisher's rise in prominence. The offensive tackle figures to be the next CMU prospect to be drafted in the first round and the highest ever in school history. The tackles spoke at Fisher's pro day, too. Staley has given back generously to his alma mater, all while supporting charities that look out for children. Staley always makes a point of making an offseason trek to his home state to check up on his family and school.

"When I go back there it reminds me of how long ago it was," Staley says. "I didn't have any aspirations of playing in the NFL when I got to college. I was just happy to be playing college football; it was something I was happy to do. It was the way my career went, becoming a draft prospect to someone who was drafted kind of high and here I am, working."

Staley might not want to dive too deep into his remarkable journey, but his former coaches love every moment of it though.

"I have a ton of respect for Joe," Longo, the former strength coach says. "He's earned his success every step of the way. It's nice to see when you have a vision for the kid and the kid buys in and that comes true. In our business that's as good as it gets. It's a life-changer for the player."

Turns out, the weight shakes and double-day workouts were all worth it in the end.

"Joe is the epitome of what you can become through strength and conditioning," Longo adds. "To make such a big change like that and be at a small school and put on all that weight and take it all the way to a Super Bowl and two Pro Bowls, it's inspirational. I use him as an example to my young players. This is what you can be.

"He doesn't know it, but he inspires a lot of the young guys who are out there right now."

Quinn shares Staley's rise to NFL stardom to all of his linemen at Buffalo as well.

"It's a great story. He's a great example and a great man. We're all really proud."

Parents boost 49ers linebacker Michael Wilhoite

As a general rule, NFL job prospects are bleak for former Division II players who are selling shoes at the West Ridge Mall in Topeka, Kan., a year after leaving college.

Granted, it's a small sample size, but employment at the Finish Line typically represents the end of the line for a football player.

Such was not the case, however, for 49ers inside linebacker Michael Wilhoite, who always had two fans with an unwavering belief he'd play in the pros: his mom and dad, of course.

"Oh, no, I never doubted Michael would do it," said his mom, Jan Buchheim. "It's his determination. If you tell Michael no, or he can't do something, or something just can't be done, he'll do it if he's got his mind set to it."

Evidently.

Twenty months after he was peddling sneakers and living with his mom in Topeka, Wilhoite, 26, is Kurt Warner Lite: a small-college player from the Midwest who toiled at a regular-Joe job before improbably realizing his NFL dream.

Now, after thriving on special-teams as a rookie last year, Wilhoite appears poised to pen the next chapter in his rags-to-riches tale.

With the 49ers seeking a capable backup for All-Pro inside linebackers Patrick Willis and NaVorro Bowman, Wilhoite began training camp as the next man up. And he's since strengthened his hold on the No. 3 spot: With Willis sidelined with a broken hand that apparently won't cause him to miss a regular-season game, Wilhoite started Thursday and collected a game-high 10 tackles in the preseason opener against Denver.

A college safety, Wilhoite has flashed athleticism that allowed him to play six positions, including quarterback, in high school. One example of Wilhoite's athletic prowess: He had a 36 1/2-inch vertical jump before the 2011 draft, 7 inches higher than Bowman leapt at the 2010 combine.

"He's not too far from me and Pat," Bowman said. "He has the ability to do the things that we do."

Less than two years ago, Wilhoite wasn't doing much of anything related to football. After finishing his career at Washburn University in Topeka, he played a season in the now-defunct United Football League with the Omaha Nighthawks.

That stint in football's minor leagues didn't inspire an NFL call. So he went to work. A lot. During a six-week stretch starting in November 2011, he worked at the Finish Line, was a personal trainer at Maximus Fitness and interned at WIBW Radio in Topeka.

He didn't give up on football, though. He routinely rose at 5 a.m. to work out before returning home to shower and cook eggs that he ate on his commute to the mall.

His pre-dawn workouts started when he was a 190-pound, 6-foot redshirt freshman at Washburn who was buried on the depth chart. He began rising with the roosters to change his standing and the perspiration paid off: He finished his career as a 240-pound, three-time captain with professional aspirations.

Looking back, he realizes friends probably thought his I'm-going-to-play-in-the-NFL talk was delusional. But his mom and dad, Greg Wilhoite, who divorced when he was 18, were all back slaps and you-can-do-its.

Even when he was selling sneakers and living at home.

"The situation I was in, most people would say, 'You're crazy. Why are you still trying? You look like a fool,' " Wilhoite said. "But my parents never did. I think that's one of the reasons why I kept pursuing it, because they never questioned it. They never thought for one second that I couldn't play at this level."

Fortunately for Wilhoite, he eventually found another believer: the 49ers.

He was signed to San Francisco's practice squad on Dec. 14, 2011, and stayed there for the first 12 weeks of the 2012 season. After his promotion to the active roster, he made a mark on special teams: In eight games, including the playoffs, he had a team-high 11 special-teams tackles.

Entering his second season, he's learning the finer points of inside linebacker, a position he did not play in college. He's still adjusting to shedding blocks from 320-pound guards, and diagnosing run plays. He has kept up in coverage, presenting a challenge for tight end Vernon Davis, one of the 49ers' fastest players.

"I've gone against him quite a few times and, to me, going against linebackers, sometimes it's really easy," Davis said. "With him, I really have to approach him as if he's a safety or something like that because he's quick, He's fast. He's a tremendous athlete."

On Friday, Wilhoite will enjoy a homecoming when the 49ers visit Kansas City, which is about 70 miles from Topeka. At Washburn, head coach Craig Schurig will cancel team meetings so his players can gather and watch Wilhoite play on TV.

A group of about 50 friends and family members will be at Arrowhead Stadium, including Wilhoite's parents. His mom always believed, but even she struggles to comprehend how her son went from out of the house and onto her television.

"It's like I asked someone the other day: Do mothers ever get used to this?" Buchheim said. "Do mothers ever get used to seeing their sons doing something like this? I just don't know if I'll get used to it, but it's a wonderful feeling."

McDonald out: Head coach Jim Harbaugh said rookie tight end Vance McDonald, a second-round pick, won't play Friday because of an undisclosed injury. Harbaugh said McDonald could be sidelined for about seven to 10 days.

Eric Wright Returns to Football Roots

Eric Wright has a chance to play professional football in his backyard. Literally.

The seventh-year veteran cornerback was recently activated from the team's Reserve/NFI list and is awaiting his opportunity to suit up for his childhood team, the San Francisco 49ers. The 49ers made room for Wright on the 53-man roster by releasing veteran Nnamdi Asomugha earlier this week.

Wright grew up in the Bayview-Hunters Point district of San Francisco and is eager to play for his hometown team, whenever he gets the chance in the team's remaining eight regular season games.

"Candlestick is literally in my backyard," Wright told 49ers.com. "I could pretty much walk to it."

The 5-foot-10, 193-pound cornerback spent the first nine weeks of the season on the NFI list, but was able to work out with teammates and participate in meetings. Wright made it a priority to bond with his new teammates and consistently display his work ethic.

Wright, a starter of 81 of his 85 career games with three different teams, called his time away from the field, "a very humbling experience."

Being back in the Bay Area has revitalized the cornerback, even if it means handling extra ticket requests for upcoming games.

"Having an opportunity to play for a team I've been watching my whole life is something that's a testament to hard work," Wright said. "It's something the kids can look at, that dreams do come true."

"I will have a lot of ticket requests, but I'll handle it accordingly. I'll get my family members out here and my immediate family will always be here to support. These are people who've been there my whole career and my whole life supporting me, they know it's a dream come true and they're excited for me."

Defensively, Wright offers the 49ers defensive depth at both perimeter and slot coverage duties. Wright had 363 career tackles and 14 career interceptions.

"The experience helps, not only to play in different systems, but having to adapt to different systems," Wright said. "I was able to relate to different things I've done in the past and learn some new things at the same time."

"We definitely have one of the best defenses in the league from a schematic standpoint and from a player standpoint."

Wright joins the NFL's No. 8 pass defense, a unit that allows an average of 220.5 yards per game. Wright aims to complement an improve secondary in any form or fashion.

"It's a great group of guys," Wright said. "They've been playing very well for us and have a great grasp of the system."

"I'm excited to have the opportunity to help out in any way I can and help out to an already solid unit."

49ers Eric Wright ready to start a new phase of his life

For every wayward NFL player like Richie Incognito, there's 10 others like the 49ers newly activated Eric Wright. The cornerback and San Francisco native has wrestled with his own problems, including arrests for suspicion of DUI and a suspension for performance enhancing drugs.

Now, Wright is dedicating himself to fatherhood, his craft, and humanizing professional athletes. Take playing cornerback first, which Wright might be doing as this Sunday against visiting Carolina, Wright said the mental part comes last, particularly from a player who last played in 2012.

"It's more just doing the movements, it's hard to simulate that, other than just doing it," Wright said. "Getting lined up, pre-snap reads, shifts, motions, to do all that you have to do it to get in shape and I mean in shape mentally."

When and how Wright fits in still needs to be worked out. The top three cornerbacks, Carlos Rogers, Tarell Brown and Tramaine Brock have graded out highly and will be near impossible to dislodge. Wright could serve as a dime back when the opposing offense goes to six receivers. He would need to supplant Perrish Cox for that role.

Other than football, Wright has been greatly affected by the birth of his now seven-month-old daughter, Reagan Joelle Wright.

"It's something you really can't describe, it puts a lot of things in perspective," Wright said. "It's something you dream about your whole life and it's something you are responsible for. It's definitely very, very different. It's another thing in my life that I want to be the best at. I was blessed to have a great father and great role model and I strive to be that for my daughter."

Wright talks to his own father, Talim, often for advice. He's also all in as a dad from going to birthing classes with his wife LaTanya to changing diapers today.

At his website, ewright21.com, Wright is extremely positive about life events. He does the same thing on his twitter page, hoping to interject some humanity into a profession that's increasingly becoming dehumanizing.

Wright said he actually understands those who lash out on twitter. He grew in Hunter's Point, just outside Candlestick Park, and was a huge fan of the 49ers in the glory years.

"Somebody out there might be in the exact same position (in life) as me, I just happen to be a professional athlete," Wright said. "I use social media and my website a lot to bring the humanity (back into professional athletes) I try to raise awareness towards everyone in this field."

When signed, 49ers coach Jim Harbaugh said Eric Wright could be a great story. Soon, he will take the next step in that story by resuming his NFL career.

"My next down I will be playing it as a father, that's cool, really cool," Wright said.
