THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

For the first time in nearly a month (Week 7 vs. Green Bay) the Cardinals are home at State Farm Stadium as they host the San Francisco 49ers in Week 11.

Sunday's game marks the 69th all-time meeting between the teams in a series that dates back to their first-ever matchup in 1951. Arizona welcomes its division rival to State Farm Stadium for the 19th time - and for the first time since the Cardinals earned a 47-24 victory in Week 17 last season. Arizona is looking for its third win in its last four games vs. the 49ers.

Making his fifth straight start since a foot injury to Kyler Murray, QB **Jacoby Brissett** will be starting against the 49ers for the second consecutive season. One of his five starts with New England in 2025 came in Week 4 at San Francisco. This will be Brissett's third-ever start against the 49ers (other coming in a 2017 win while with the Colts).

The Cardinals will either be facing QB **Mac Jones** for the second time this season (Week 3) or Arizona native **Brock Purdy**. Purdy has missed the last two games vs. the Cardinals, who earned their first win in four tries vs. the Queen Creek native and former Perry (Gilbert) High School standout in the last meeting (Week 5 in '24). In addition to being an Arizona native, Purdy was also the 2017 Arizona Cardinals High School Player of the Year and 2016 Arizona Cardinals High School Offensive Player of the Year during his time at Perry.

Purdy is one of three current 49ers players who starred at Arizona high schools and will be returning to the Valley this week. Another is rookie WR **Ricky Pearsall**. A native of Phoenix, Pearsall attended Corona Del Sol (Tempe) High School, which is located just two miles from the Cardinals practice facility (Dignity Health Arizona Cardinals Training Center). Pearsall set an Arizona High School 6A single-game record for receiving yards with 342 as a junior in 2017. He then went on to play three seasons (2019-21) at Arizona State.

On Sunday vs. San Francisco, DL **Calais Campbell** will play in his 80th career game at State Farm Stadium (including postseason). Only WR Larry Fitzgerald (121) has played more. The venue's all-time sack leader (31.5), Campbell has 3.0 sacks, 5 tackles for loss and 3 QB hits in four home games this season.

Following this week's game vs. San Francisco, the Cardinals remain home as they host Jacksonville in the Jaguars second-ever regular season visit (2017) to State Farm Stadium. Jacksonville is the only remaining NFL team who has yet to play multiple games at the venue. The 49ers will return home to face the Carolina Panthers.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- In their Salute to Service game the Cardinals host the division-rival San Francisco 49ers. Arizona is looking for its third win in its last four games vs. the 49ers at State Farm Stadium.
- QB **Jacoby Brissett** enters Week 11 having attempted 144 consecutive passes without an INT. That represents the 5th-longest streak in franchise history. For his career, Brissett (1.3) has the lowest INT percentage in NFL history (min. 1,500 attempts) just ahead of of Steelers QB Aaron Rodgers (1.4).
- Brissett has 8 TD passes in 2025. That is the most in franchise history in a player's first four starts with the Cardinals. Brissett is the first player in Cardinals history to throw multiple TD passes in each of his first four starts with the team.
- TE **Trey McBride** leads Arizona in receptions (61), receiving yards (602) and TD receptions (6) in 2025. Among NFL TEs he ranks 1st in receptions, 2nd in receiving yards and is tied for 2nd in TD receptions this season. McBride has at least one TD catch in each of the last four games.
- In his first 9 games since signing with the Cardinals as a free agent (Philadelphia), LB **Josh Sweat** has 14 tackles, 8.0 sacks, 12 QB hits, 10 tackles for loss, 3 forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and 2 passes defensed. His 8.0 sacks, 10 tackles for loss and 3 forced fumbles are all team highs.
- CB **Denzel Burke** has an INT in each of the last two games. He became the first Cardinals rookie with an INT in back-to-back games since Corey Chavous (Games 12-13) in 1998.
- Arizona is tied for 4th in the NFL in both forced fumbles (9) and fumble recoveries (7) this season. The Cardinals are tied for 7th in the NFL with 13 total takeaways (7 FR; 6 INT) in 2025.
- WR **Greg Dortch** scored his first career rushing TD on a 4-yard run last week in Seattle. It was his first rushing TD since his senior year at Highland Springs (VA) High School in 2015 when he had a 66-yard TD run in the state championship game win vs. Stone Bridge High School.

49ERS ROSTER FEATURES ARIZONA PREP STARS

Three current 49ers players are Arizona natives who played high school football in the state.

San Francisco's fourth-year QB **Brock Purdy** - selected by the Niners with the final pick (7th round, 262nd overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft - is a native of Queen Creek, AZ and attended Perry High School in Gilbert.

A two-time first-team All-State selection, Purdy was the 2017 Arizona Gatorade Player of the Year as a senior after throwing for 4,405 yards and 57 TDs in leading Perry to the Class 6A state championship game. Both his passing yards and passing TD totals were 6A state records. He also ran for 1,016 yards and 10 TDs that season.

Purdy was honored numerous times by the Cardinals during his prep career:

- 2017 Arizona Cardinals High School Player of the Year
- 2017 Arizona Cardinals High School Player of the Week (Week 9)
- 2016 Arizona Cardinals High School Offensive Player of the Year

OTHER 49ERS WHO PLAYED HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL IN ARIZONA

49ers WR **Ricky Pearsall** is a native of Phoenix, AZ and attended Corona Del Sol (Tempe) High School where he set the Arizona High School 6A single-game record for receiving yards with 342 as a junior in 2017. Pearsall also played at Arizona State for three seasons (2019-21).

49ers CB **Chase Lucas** is a native of Chandler, AZ and attended Chandler High School, where he rushed for 2,219 yards and 25 TDs while tallying more than 1,000 receiving yards. He was a member of the school's 2014 state championship squad. Lucas then went on to attend Arizona State, appearing in 53 games over six seasons (2016-21).

Cardinals practice squad QB **Jeff Driskel** was selected by the 49ers in the 6th round (207th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft.

Cardinals TEs coach **Ben Steele** entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with San Francisco in 2001.

Cardinals Director of Football Performance **Shea Thompson** spent four years (2019-22) in San Francisco as the director of performance monitoring/assistant strength & conditioning coach.

49ers OL **Austen Pleasants** had two stints with the Cardinals as a member of the practice squad in 2023 and in 2024.

BAY AREA CONNECTIONS

Three pieces of the Cardinals offense - WRs **Michael Wilson** (2018-22) and **Simi Fehoko** (2018-20) and TE **Elijah Higgins** (2019-22) - were standout WRs at Stanford (Higgins switched positions to TE entering the NFL in 2023). From 2019-20 all three were part of the same WR room. Wilson (2022), Higgins (2022) and Fehoko (2020) each earned All-Pac 12 honors as seniors at Stanford before entering the NFL.

Cardinals OL **Jonah Williams** and TE **Josiah Deguara** are both natives of Folsom, CA and attended Folsom High School - where they were teammates for three seasons (20-12-14). The duo were both members of the Folsom team that won the CIF State Division I Championship in 2014.

Prior to entering the NFL coaching ranks, Cardinals TEs coach **Ben Steele** was an offensive assistant for two seasons (2011-12) at the University of California before serving as the TEs coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of California-Davis in 2013.

Cardinals Passing Game Coordinator/WRs **Drew Terrell** played four seasons as a WR and punt returner at Stanford (2009-12), earning honorable mention All-Pac 12 honors as a returner three times (2010-12).

ARIZONA CONNECTIONS

49ers Special Teams Coordinator **Brant Boyer** played linebacker at the University of Arizona from 1992-93, earning second-team All-Pac 10 honors in his final season.

49ers Offensive Asst. **Miguel Reveles** served as a quality control coach at the University of Arizona for four seasons (2013-16).

49ers DBs/CBs coach **Ray Brown** was a graduate assistant/CBs coach at Arizona State for two seasons (2014-15).

49ers QB **Mac Jones** played with Cardinals LB **Mack Wilson Sr.** and OL **Jonah Williams** at Alabama for two seasons (2017-18).

In doing so he will join WR Larry Fitzgerald (121) as the only players to appear in at least 80 games at the venue.

CARDINALS CELEBRATE SALUTE TO SERVICE

PAT TILLMAN'S LEGACY

After a decorated career at ASU, Bay Area native **Pat Tillman** was selected by Arizona in the 7th round (226th overall) of the 1998 NFL Draft. He played for Arizona from 1998-2001 before enlisting in the U.S. Army. Tillman's No. 40 is retired by the Cardinals and he is a member of the team's Ring of Honor.

TILLMAN MEMORIAL

On November 12, 2006, the Pat Tillman Memorial at State Farm Stadium was unveiled. Located on the northwest side of the plaza, the memorial includes a large bronze sculpture of Tillman and a circular reflection pond.

The sculpture is approximately eight-feet tall, weighs more than 500 pounds and took nearly nine months to complete.

The statue's sculptors consulted with the team and Pat's wife, Marie, who selected the image of Tillman that best conveys his character and spirit. Serving as a backdrop to the sculpture is a nine-foot concrete wall that measures 42 feet across, symbolic of Tillman's jersey number at Arizona State.



The brimming pool of water on the western side consists of a 60-foot circular pond made of black concrete and stainless steel. To the west of the memorial is a grove of 40 Oak trees that symbolizes the jersey number Tillman wore as an Arizona Cardinal.

The plaza surrounding State Farm Stadium is known as the Pat Tillman Freedom Plaza, in honor of the former Cardinal who was killed in action on April 22, 2004 while serving his country as a member of the elite Army Ranger unit.

TILLMAN'S LOCKER

On September 11, 2015, the 14th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, the Cardinals unveiled the locker of **S Pat Tillman** at the Dignity Health Arizona Cardinals Training Center.

A new locker room was built as part of a two-year, \$15 million renovation of the facility, but Tillman's locker was preserved to display in a glass enclosure between the weight room and cafeteria. Included in the locker are Tillman's jersey, helmet, shoulder pads and draft card, along with a description of his life and career.

"We've decided to preserve Pat Tillman's locker, and tell his story," Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said at the unveiling ceremony. "Many of our future players, and even current players, may not know the stories of the Cardinals. But we wanted to tell the stories and talk about the history, the history of our organization and the history of Pat Tillman."



TILLMAN PRACTICE TEAM PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Over the last three seasons, the Cardinals player who performed the best on scout team the week prior earns the honor of **Tillman Practice Team Player of the Week**. The player selected by the team's coaches wears a camouflage #40 jersey for that week's practices and is recognized in a display outside the team's locker room. The program honors the life and legacy of Tillman while highlighting a player who best helped the team prepare for their most recent opponent.



"When I came here I knew what Pat Tillman was to the world and this organization," said head coach **Jonathan Gannon**. "I think that it serves a really good purpose for our guys because they know his story. They know what he is, who he was, and they compete for that week to week."

HIGGINS TAKES USO TRIP TO KUWAIT

During the offseason, Cardinals TE **Elijah Higgins - Arizona's 2025 Salute to Service Award nominee** joined Vikings RB Aaron Jones on the NFL's annual USO Tour as part of the Salute to Service initiative. While on the trip, Higgins and Jones visited military bases, received a behind-the-scenes look at military equipment, sat in on a call with Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth, and met with service members.



Elijah's father, George, served 28 years in the Air Force. As a senior master sergeant, he served as an electronic countermeasures avionics technician and recruiter. He was deployed to Afghanistan three times.

Higgins first heard of the USO opportunity from his fellow tight end, **Trey McBride** who participated in the same tour in April of 2024 to visit U.S. service members at six military bases in Poland.

SALUTE TO SERVICE

As part of the league's long-standing support of America's Armed Forces, the Cardinals are honoring current and former members of the military by taking part in the NFL's Salute to Service campaign on Sunday. Since 2011, the NFL's Salute to Service campaign has raised more than \$73 million for military and veteran nonprofits.

Salute to Service is the NFL's ongoing commitment to honor, empower, and connect with U.S. service members, veterans, and their families. Since 2011, it has created partnerships with leading organizations, including the Bob Woodruff Foundation (BWF), Pat Tillman Foundation (PTF), Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS), United Service Organizations (USO) and Wounded Warrior Project® (WWP) and their fallen loved ones.



The Cardinals will honor current and former service members before and during Sunday's game against the 49ers:

National Anthem: Lisa Cimino (Professional Vocalist and U.S. Air Force Veteran)
Colors: Shadow Mountain High School Space Force JROTC

Halftime: Seven veterans will be honored and accompanied by U.S. Air Force/Afghanistan War Veteran, Mark J. Lindquist, singing Lee Greenwood's God Bless the USA.

Cardinals coaches and staff will wear special NFL-issued Salute to Service branding and gameday apparel. Cardinals Cheerleaders and the flag team will be dressed in Salute to Service themed uniforms.

Each Cardinals player will wear a #40 sticker on his helmet to honor former Cardinals safety Pat Tillman and will also use camouflage towels, hats and gloves on the sidelines.

All proceeds from the NFL's Salute to Service campaign are donated to the NFL's military nonprofit partners: The Bob Woodruff Foundation, the Pat Tillman Foundation, TAPS, the USO and Wounded Warrior Project.

CARDINALS HOST SALUTE TO SERVICE EVENT

On Monday, the Cardinals hosted a special event as part of the NFL's Salute to Service initiative for families from the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS) and Pat Tillman Scholars at Benihana



QB **Jacoby Brissett**, TEs **Trey McBride** and **Elijah Higgins**, WR **Greg Dortch**, OL **Paris Johnson Jr.**, LB **Bj Ojulari**, LS **Aaron Brewer**, K **Chad Ryland**, P **Blake Gillikin** and P **Pat O'Donnell** teamed up with chefs at Benihana to prepare tableside meals for representatives from the Pat Tillman Foundation and TAPS families. It was a vibrant night of service, food, and entertainment designed to strengthen civic pride and honor those who serve.

In the afternoon, Cardinals players along with assistance from Tillman Scholars and civics educators around the Arizona community built benches to be placed outside of the Hardy Police Substation.

TILLMAN'S LEGACY LIVES ON

On November 6th in Chicago - on what would've been former Cardinals **S Pat Tillman's** 49th birthday - the Pat Tillman Foundation named former Cardinals WR **Larry Fitzgerald** their 2024 recipient of The Champion Award. Fitzgerald was honored for his dedication to veterans and the military community, as well as his connection to the Pat Tillman Foundation.



The Champion Award honors Pat's legacy and belief that we should always strive to be part of something bigger than ourselves, by recognizing those whose remarkable civic contributions, extraordinary fortitude, and spirit of service inspire us to be better every day.

Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** was in attendance as Fitzgerald received the award. The Cardinals and the NFL were the recipient of The Champion Award in 2024.

"His legacy motivated me to raise my ambitions and embrace the elevated expectation that Pat established for the Cardinals," Fitzgerald said in his acceptance speech. "Initially, I believed my role was just simply contribute to the football team. However, I soon recognized the standard set by Pat was far greater, challenging me to not only elevate my commitment but to honor his enduring example."



CARDS LOSE MURRAY TO IR

After missing three games due to a foot injury suffered in Week 5 vs. Tennessee, QB **Kyler Murray** was placed on injured reserve last week (11/5). The earliest Murray - AZ's starter and six-time team captain - is eligible to return is for the Cardinals Week 14 matchup vs. the L.A. Rams.

Murray started each of the first five games this season, completing 110-of-161 pass attempts (68.3%) for 962 yards, 6 TDs and an 88.6 passer rating. He also rushed for 173 yards and a TD on 29 carries.



INJURY LOSSES CONTINUE TO MOUNT

The Cardinals have been hit hard with injuries throughout the lineup in 2025. Since the season began, AZ has seen its starting QB (**Kyler Murray**) and its top two RBs (**James Conner** and **Trey Benson**) placed on injured reserve along with other key contributors like TEs **Tip Reiman** and **Travis Vokolek**, DL **L.J. Collier** and P **Blake Gillikin**.

Already entering last week's game at Seattle without starting Murray (foot), LB **Mack Wilson Sr.** (ribs) and CBs **Will Johnson** (back/hip) and **Max Melton** (concussion), Arizona saw seven players leave the game and not return: DLs **Walter Nolen III** and **Darius Robinson**, OL **Jonah Williams**, WR **Zay Jones**, S **Dadrian Taylor-Demerson**, WR **Simi Fehoko** and RB **Zonovan Knight**.

In all, Arizona has had 30 different players miss a combined 140 games due to injury so far this season.





Brissett's eight TD passes are the most in franchise history in a player's first four starts with the Cardinals.



A STELLAR SHOWING ON MONDAY NIGHT

Brissett finished AZ's Week 9 win over the Cowboys having completed 21-of-31 pass attempts (67.7%) for 261 yards, 2 TDs, 0 INTs and a 115.1 passer rating. He also scored his first rushing TD of the season.

The victory over the Cowboys was Brissett's first start on MNF since Week 8 of the 2022 season with Cleveland when he led the Browns to a 19-13 win vs. Cincinnati. In that victory over the Bengals, Brissett completed 17-of-22 pass attempts (77.3%) for 278 yards, a TD and a career-best 133.7 passer rating. He also rushed for 12 yards and a TD on six carries.

Brissett's first rushing TD of the 2025 season came on a one-yard QB sneak just prior to halftime to give Arizona a 17-7 lead. It was his 16th career rushing TD and his first since he had a 3-yard TD run in the Browns 19-13 victory over Cincinnati in Week 8 of the 2022 season on Monday Night Football.


Playing in his 85th career game in Week 3 at San Francisco earlier this season, QB **Kyler Murray** surpassed 20,000 passing yards for his career.

WILSON SR. THRIVING IN NEW ROLE

Signed as a free agent by the Cardinals in 2024, LB **Mack Wilson Sr.** started all 16 games he played last season and totaled 75 tackles, 3.0 sacks, an INT, 5 passes defensed, 7 QB hits, 4 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery.

The seventh-year pro has taken on a much larger role in the middle of the Cardinals defense in 2025. **He was given the "green dot" as Arizona's "Mike" linebacker in training camp, earning the responsibility as the units play-caller. Prior to the season opener, Wilson was then named a team captain for the first time in his career.**

Wilson joins Bears LB Tremaine Edmunds (80; 8), Jaguars LB Foyesade Oluokun (75; 6), Bucs S Tykee Smith (74; 9), Broncos S Talanoa Hufanga (70; 8) and Broncos S Brandon Jones (61; 6) as the only players in the NFL with 60+ tackles and 6+ passes defensed in 2025.

Wilson Season Highlights:

In Week 9 at Dallas, Wilson had his first forced fumble of the season when he knocked the ball loose for Cowboys TE Jake Ferguson.

In Week 6 vs. Indianapolis, Wilson recorded his first INT of the season when he picked off Colts QB Daniel Jones in the 2nd quarter.

In Week 3 at San Francisco, Wilson established career highs in total tackles (12) and passes defensed (2). It was his first career outing with 10+ tackles.

RYLAND'S CAREER REVIVAL IN ARIZONA

Out of football prior to signing with Arizona in October of 2024, K **Chad Ryland** made his Cardinals debut in Week 5 at San Francisco last season - just three days after signing to Arizona's practice squad. **Since making his Cardinals debut in Week 5 last season, Ryland ranks 5th in the NFL in made FGs (43) and 7th in total points (176).**

- The Cards added **10** veteran free agents, **6** 2025 draft picks and **1** rookie free agent that were not with the team at any point last season. In all, 17 of the 53 players (32.1%) on the current roster were not with the Cardinals in 2024.
- Of the 53 players on the current roster, just **8** (15.1%) were with the team prior to the hiring of GM **Monti Ossenfort** and HC **Jonathan Gannon** in 2023.
- The Cardinals current roster features **20** players (37.7%) who were selected by Ossenfort in the NFL Draft.
- The Cardinals roster features six players - DL **Calais Campbell** (39), OL **Kelvin Beachum** (36), LS **Aaron Brewer** (35), P **Pat O'Donnell** (34), QB **Jacoby Brissett** (32), DL **Dalvin Tomlinson** (31) - who are 30 years old or older.
- Arizona's roster features the only active player in the NFL who entered the league through the Supplemental Draft (**S Jalen Thompson**) and 10 players who entered the NFL as undrafted free agents.

Both Murray and Baker are serving as team captains for the sixth consecutive season. Conner earned the honor for the fourth straight year (2022-25).

In his first season back with the Cardinals, Campbell was named a team captain for the sixth time in his career. He has earned the honor with three different teams in his career, including three times with Arizona: Cardinals (2014-15; '25), Jaguars (2018-19) and Dolphins (2024).

Three Cardinals players - Froholdt, Wilson and Blount - were named team captains for the first time in their careers. Froholdt is in his third season with Arizona as the team's starting center. Wilson is in his second with the team.



PAT TILLMAN PRACTICE PLAYER OF THE WEEK


Although former S **Pat Tillman**'s #40 jersey is one no longer worn on Sundays, it can still be seen on the field at the team's training facility each week during the season.

The award was first instituted by head coach **Jonathan Gannon** when he arrived in 2023. "Pat Tillman, what he stands for, he's a huge part of our organization," Gannon said. "Monti (Ossenfort), Michael (Bidwill) talked about it. I've always wanted to do something with (the scout team) because it's such an important part of preparation for all three phases. That's what we decided to implement."

In addition to wearing the #40 jersey during practice, the selected player also receives his name and photo on a wall outside the locker room that also features Tillman's former locker in a glass display.


Tillman was selected by the Cardinals in the 7th round (226th overall) of the 1998 NFL Draft out of Arizona State. He defied odds to become a three-year starting safety and set a franchise single-season record with 224 tackles in 2000. Following the 9/11 attacks, Tillman turned down a three-year contract and left the Cardinals prior to the 2002 season to enlist in the U.S. Army with his brother, Kevin. He was killed in action on April 22, 2004 in Afghanistan. He was inducted into the Cardinals Ring of Honor in 2006.

FITZGERALD AMONG HALL OF FAME NOMINEES

Near the end of October, the Pro Football Hall of Fame released the list of 52 Modern Era players who advanced in voting for the Hall of Fame's Class of 2026. Among the 8 players with Cardinals ties was WR **Larry Fitzgerald**.

FITZGERALD CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- An 11-time Pro Bowl selection, 10-time team captain and 2016 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year co-recipient.
- Joins Jerry Rice (13) as the only WRs in NFL history selected to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Selected 3rd overall in 2004 NFL Draft, played 17 seasons with Cardinals (only QB Jim Hart played more with 18).
- No player in franchise history appeared in more games (263).
- Ranks second in NFL history in receptions (1,432) and receiving yards (17,492) and sixth in TD receptions (121).
- His 1,432 career receptions are the most for any player in NFL history with a single team (#2 is Jerry Rice, 1,281 with SF).
- Named to NFL's 100 All-Time Team and All-Decade Team for 2010's; made NFL Network's Top 100 team all 10 years of its existence and is only non-QB to do that.
- Played more games with the Cardinals (263) than any WR in NFL history with a single team. Among all offensive players ever, only OL Bruce Matthews (296 w/Ten) and QB Tom Brady (285 w/NE) played more with a single team.
- Ended career with reception in 256 consecutive games, dating back to his rookie season. It is the second-longest streak in NFL history (Jerry Rice - 274) and he posted a catch in 262 of 263 career games.

CARDS ANNOUNCE NEW PERFORMANCE CENTER

In September, the Cardinals announced updated plans and location for the team's new Performance Center: Paradise Ridge located in North Phoenix, west of Scottsdale Road and north of the Loop 101.



The targeted opening for the new Cardinals Performance Center and team headquarters is 2028.

This past summer, the Cardinals - with the assistance of real estate development company Mortenson - purchased the 217-acre property at auction from the Arizona State Land Department for \$136 million.

The new Performance Center and business operations will anchor the mixed-use development site, occupying 30 acres and over 250,000 square feet. The footprint of the team's current facility is 14 acres and 156,000 square feet.

It will feature three natural-grass outdoor practice fields and a fieldhouse with a full-size turf field indoors. Additional elements of the new, world-class Performance Center will include a greatly expanded and modern locker room and state-of-the-art team spaces for athletic training, sports medicine and strength and conditioning in addition to updated dining areas, meeting rooms, a player lounge and more.

The new Performance Center and team headquarters are being designed by Rossetti, a leading sports architecture firm that has worked with a number of NFL teams on new facilities.

As for the remainder of the mixed-use site, an affiliate of the team will work closely with the City of Phoenix and the Arizona Commerce Authority to consider uses that are complementary. Options include potential corporate headquarters as well as restaurant and retail locations, medical facilities and residential development.

TEAM ANNOUNCES INAUGURAL “CARDINALS CLIMB” TO SUPPORT SPECIAL NEEDS COMMUNITY

One hundred percent of the Climb's proceeds will support special needs organizations, including the Foundation's four Cornerstone Beneficiaries: **Barrow Neurological Foundation**, **SARRC** (Southwest Autism Research & Resource Center), **Special Olympics Arizona**, and **Treasure House**.

This year, the Cardinals are celebrating their 20th season at State Farm Stadium, which opened in 2006. The world-class venue remains a prime example of sophisticated engineering, technology, and design. Featuring both a retractable roof and retractable natural grass playing field, State Farm Stadium set an industry standard for design excellence and flexibility that has allowed the venue to host some of the country's most high-profile events.

In addition to serving as the Cardinals home stadium, since opening in August of 2006, the building has also hosted three Super Bowls, the 2015 Pro Bowl, two NCAA Men's Final Four basketball tournaments, the first-ever BCS National Championship game (Florida-Ohio State), Fiesta Bowls, international soccer matches, high school football championships, high school proms, monster truck and motocross events, trade shows and conventions and countless other events. In 2023 alone, State Farm Stadium hosted the kickoff of Taylor Swift's Eras Tour and Beyoncé's Renaissance World Tour as the artists joined the list of notable musical acts such as The Rolling Stones, U2, Garth Brooks, Guns N' Roses and Metallica who have played the venue. In 2025 State Farm Stadium has hosted concerts by Kendrick Lamar, Morgan Wallen, The Weeknd and Post Malone along with the Quarterfinals of the CONCACAF Gold Cup.

Hosting the country's most high-profile sports and entertainment events has resulted in over \$6 billion in economic impact for the state of Arizona.



STATE FARM STADIUM HAS BEEN HOME TO SOME ICONIC SPORTS MOMENTS

THE HAIL MURRAY

In Week 10 of the 2020 season, Arizona defeated Buffalo 32-30 on a 43-yard game-winning TD pass from QB Kyler Murray to WR DeAndre Hopkins with just 0:02 remaining in regulation.

The "Hail Murray" was named the "Best Play" at the 2021 ESPYS, and was also named the 2020 Bridgestone Clutch Play of the Year at NFL Honors.



CARDS TAKE DOWN EAGLES IN DRAMATIC NFC TITLE GAME

The Cardinals earned their first-ever Super Bowl appearance when they defeated the Eagles 32-25 in the NFC Championship Game in 2008.

After giving up 19 unanswered points (24-6 lead to a 25-24 deficit) the Cardinals went on a 14-play, 72-yard game-winning drive culminated in an eight-yard TD pass from Kurt Warner to RB Tim Hightower.



TWO THRILLING POSTSEASON WINS VS. THE PACKERS

2015 DIVISIONAL ROUND: In a game that featured 23 points in the final 4:49 of play, Arizona overcame a pair of improbable throws by QB Aaron Rodgers - including a 41-yard "Hail Mary" as time expired in regulation - late in the game for a 26-20 OT win. WR Larry Fitzgerald accounted for all 80 yards on the Cardinals game-winning drive in OT, including a 75-yard catch-and-run to set up his five-yard TD catch two plays later.



A PAIR OF UNFORGETTABLE PLAYS IN THE SUPER BOWL

State Farm Stadium has hosted three Super Bowls. Since opening in 2006, the venue joins Miami's Hard Rock Stadium (2006, 2009, 2019) as the only stadiums to host the Super Bowl at least three times.

The first two Super Bowls held at State Farm Stadium included two of the most memorable plays in Super Bowl history.

New England's dream of a perfect season in 2007 was dashed with a 21-17 loss to the Giants in Super Bowl XLII, a contest that featured the legendary "Helmet Catch" by Giants WR David Tyree. Seven years later they defeated the Seahawks 28-24 in Super Bowl XLIX in one of the most dramatic finishes in title game history as DB Malcolm Butler's goal-line interception preserved the victory.


GIRLS FLAG GAME OF THE WEEK WRAPS YEAR TWO

CARDINALS & GIRLS FLAG FOOTBALL: The Cardinals support of girls flag football is well-established. The team impacts thousands of high school and youth girls flag football players across the state of Arizona annually through a variety of camps, showcases, tournaments and equipment donations. The Cardinals became the first NFL team to have a flag football campus at an NFL stadium and established a two-year partnership with the Positive Coaching Alliance in 2024 and pledged \$70,000 to help support girls flag football in the state of Arizona and eliminate gender inequity in youth sports.

IT GETS LOUD IN STATE FARM STADIUM

Having sellout crowds on hand has given Arizona one of the NFL's most distinct home field advantages.

Dating back to the inaugural year at State Farm Stadium in 2006, *Cardinals opponents have accumulated 228 accepted false start penalties in the regular season.* That is the second most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

Multiple culinary stations showcase an all-inclusive, thoughtfully-crafted menu that reflects Fox's renowned culinary vision, providing ticket holders with an exceptional dining journey before returning to their prime midfield seats for unparalleled views of the action.

Casa Roja at the Fifty joins an impressive lineup of premium experiences unveiled at State Farm Stadium. Following the successful debut of the *Morgan Athletic Club presented by The Global Ambassador Hotel, Casita Garden Club, and Field Level* offerings last season, this new Spanish-inspired haven continues the Cardinals' commitment to elevating fan experiences.



Beyond luxury spaces, the stadium's refresh includes vibrant new concessions featuring five celebrated local restaurant partners—innovations that propelled the Cardinals to #7 in the NFL's Voice of the Fan surveys.

CARDS PLAYERS WITH INTERNATIONAL TIES

In addition to the players born outside of the United States, the Cardinals roster features a number of players who have immediate family members with international ties.

WR MICHAEL WILSON

Father, **Orville**, was born and raised in Jamaica while his mom, **Ngaire**, was born and raised in New Zealand. His aunt, **Maureen Jacobson**, played soccer for the New Zealand World Cup team and was the first women's player inducted into the Wellington Football Hall of Fame.

OL WILL HERNANDEZ

His parents, **Robert Hernandez** and **Angelica Lemus**, moved to the United States from Mexico prior to his birth. His grandparents hail from Mexico City. Hernandez's father was a professional soccer player in Mexico.

In April of 2022, Hernandez took a trip to Mexico City with the Cardinals for the 2022 NFL Draft. While in Mexico, Hernandez announced the Cardinals day three selections and helped teach local youth at a football skills clinic.

QB KYLER MURRAY

When the Cardinals selected him the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft, Murray became the first Asian-American ever selected #1 overall; Murray is one quarter Korean; his father is African American and his mother, **Missy**, is half Korean; Kyler's maternal grandmother is from South Korea.

LB BJ OJULARI

Descendant of Nigerian royalty. His maternal grandfather was Olaniyi Osuntoki, who later changed his name to Prince Twins Seven-Seven (he was sole survivor of his parents' seven sets of twins). A world-renowned artist, singer and dancer, Seven-Seven had multiple hit records as a musician and his artwork was featured in the National Museum of African American Art at the Smithsonian. In the 1890s, Prince Twins Seven-Sevens' grandfather was the King of Ibadan, a city in southwestern Nigeria.

CARDINALS 2025 NFL DRAFT CLASS HIGHLIGHTS

ARIZONA DRAFTS SEVEN PLAYERS IN 2025

The Cardinals selected seven players in the 2025 NFL Draft, including six on the defensive side of the ball. *The 2025 NFL Draft marked just the third time in the Modern Draft Era (since 1967) that Arizona used each of its first five picks on defensive players: 1991 and 1983.*

The Cardinals used their second (CB **Will Johnson**) and fourth (LB **Cody Simon**) round picks on players that were named Defensive MVP in the last two CFP National Championship Games. Johnson earned the honor in the Wolverines victory over Washington in 2023 and Simon was named Defensive MVP in the Buckeyes win over Notre Dame last season.

DL WALTER NOLEN III - ROUND 1 (16TH) - OLE MISS

Following two years (2022-23) at Texas A&M, **Nolen** had a breakout season as a junior at Ole Miss in 2024. He finished the year with career highs in tackles (48), sacks (6.5), tackles for loss (14.0), passes defensed (3) and fumble recoveries (2) while starting all 13 games.

The performance earned Nolen consensus first-team All-American accolades, making him just the 14th player in school history to earn the honor.

NOLEN COLLEGE STATISTICS

In 35 games (27 starts) at Texas A&M and Mississippi, Nolen totaled 114 tackles, 11.5 sacks, 26.0 tackles for loss, a forced fumble, three fumble recoveries and four passes defensed.

AMONG COLLEGE FOOTBALL'S TOP RUN STOPPERS

With Ole Miss last season, Nolen earned a 91.6 grade as a run stopper according to Pro Football Focus. Only Michigan's Mason Graham (92.6) ranked higher among all defensive linemen in college football.

Nolen started all 13 games for the Rebels at DT in 2024, helping anchor the best rush defense in the nation and one of the best defenses in school history. He contributed to team school records in sacks (52) and tackles for loss (120).

Ole Miss finished last season ranked #1 in the nation in run defense (80.5 ypg), #1 in tackles for loss (120), #2 in scoring defense (14.4 ppg) and #3 in sacks (52).

CB WILL JOHNSON - ROUND 2 (47TH) - MICHIGAN

In three seasons (2022-24) with the Wolverines, **Johnson** was a two-time All-American and two-time All-Big 10 pick who appeared in 32 games (21 starts) and totaled 68 tackles, 9 INTs (3 returned for TDs) and 10 passes defensed.

Johnson's three career INT return TDs set a Michigan school record.

END ZONE OFF LIMITS: In his final two seasons (2023-24) at Michigan, Johnson had six INTs (3 returned for TDs) with no TD catches allowed on 478 coverage snaps according to ProFootballFocus.com.

In a remarkable 2023 campaign, Johnson allowed just 17 completions on 37 targets and 321 coverage snaps. He had four INTs and did not allow a TD reception.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME MVP: Johnson was named the Defensive MVP in Michigan's 34-13 victory over Washington in the CFP National Championship Game to cap the 2023 season.

He had four tackles and intercepted a pass on the first play of the second half in the Wolverines win.

LB JORDAN BURCH - ROUND 3 (78TH) - OREGON

Over five years at Oregon and South Carolina, **Burch** appeared in 58 games (36 starts) and finished his college career with 170 tackles, 16.0 sacks, 33.0 tackles for loss, a forced fumble, three fumble recoveries, an INT (returned 61 yards for a TD) and 11 passes defensed.

In his final three college seasons - while serving as a full-time starter - Burch appeared in 37 games and totaled 125 tackles, 27.0 tackles for loss, 15.0 sacks, 10 passes defensed, two fumble recoveries and a forced fumble.

Like Arizona's first round pick DL **Walter Nolen III**, Burch was one of the nation's top prep recruits. He left his prep alma mater - Hammond High School in Columbia, SC - as the #4 recruit in the country by ESPN in 2019.



LB CODY SIMON - ROUND 4 (115TH) - OHIO STATE

During his five seasons (2020-24) at OSU, **Simon** appeared in 58 games (30 starts) and totaled 259 tackles, 23.0 tackles for loss, 10.0 sacks, 11 passes defensed, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, an INT and four QB hurries.

SIMON EARNED THE COVETED "O" JERSEY AT OSU

Named a team captain as a senior at Ohio State in 2024, Simon was presented with the *Bill Willis Block "O" jersey* for leadership, toughness, accountability and highest of character.



SHINING ON THE BRIGHT STAGES

Simon earned Defensive Player of the Game honors in both the Rose Bowl win over Oregon (11 tackles, 3 TFL, 2.0 sacks) and the CFP National Championship Game win over Notre Dame (8 tackles, 1 TFL) last season.

CB DENZEL BURKE - ROUND 5 (174TH) - OHIO STATE

A native of Phoenix, Burke was a standout prep DB and WR in Arizona before going on to college at Ohio State.

He was a 4-star prospect who attended Brophy College Prep (Phoenix) before transferring to Saguaro (Scottsdale) High School.



BURKE SETS OSU RECORDS FOR STARTS AND SNAPS

Burke capped his four-year (2021-24) career with the Buckeyes by starting all 16 games as a senior in 2024 to set the record for the most starts by a DB (51) and to climb into a 50-starts club at Ohio State that only includes Billy Price (2014-17) and Luke Fickell (1993-96). Burke started all 51 games played with the Buckeyes.

He was the first Ohio State true freshman to start the season opener on defense since Andy Katzenmoyer in 1996, Burke started all 13 games that season to set school record for true freshman snaps at CB.

OL HAYDEN CONNER - ROUND 6 (211TH) - TEXAS

During his four seasons (2021-24) with the Longhorns, **Conner** started 43-of-51 games played. He started all 43 games played at left guard over his final three seasons, including starting all 16 games in 2024.



NOT EASY TO GET BY THE BIG MAN

At 6-6, 314 pounds Conner is an opposing presence. A 2023 semifinalist and 2024 finalist for the Joe Moore Award as the nation's top offensive lineman, Conner was credited with zero sacks allowed on 617 pass blocking snaps over 16 starts last year by ProFootballFocus.com.

S KITAN CRAWFORD - ROUND 7 (225TH) - NEVADA

Following four seasons (2020-23) at Texas, **Crawford** spent his final college season at Nevada in 2024.



In his five college seasons, Crawford appeared in 59 games (16 starts) and totaled 137 tackles, three INTs (one returned for a TD), 10 passes defensed, five tackles for loss, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

Crawford was a standout who played 1,010 special teams snaps in his college career, collecting 17 tackles, a blocked FG and a blocked punt. In his final season at Texas in 2023, he was named Honorable Mention Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Year.

YEAR THREE UNDER GANNON AND HIS STAFF

A BIG JUMP IN YEAR TWO UNDER GANNON

Jonathan Gannon became an NFL head coach for the first time when he was hired by the Cardinals on February 14, 2023. He came to Arizona after spending two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with Philadelphia where he helped the Eagles advance to Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium.

Gannon has 17 years of experience in the NFL with the Cardinals (2023-24), Eagles (2021-22), Colts (2018-20), Vikings (2014-17), Titans (2012-13), Rams (2009-11) and Falcons (2007).

A closer look at Gannon's impressive resume:

- **The Cardinals finished the 2024 season with eight wins, doubling their win total from last season (4).** Arizona did so despite facing one of the NFL's toughest schedules for the second straight season (8 games vs. playoff teams in '23; 9 games vs. playoff teams in '24).
- Arizona posted a 6-3 record at home in 2024, winning five of its last six games at State Farm Stadium. Four of the Cardinals' six home wins were decided by 20+ points. That is the most such home wins in a season in team history.
- Under Gannon's guidance, the Cardinals have been one of the NFL's best in protecting the football (5th in the NFL with 12 games of zero turnovers between 2023-24). Arizona also finished the 2024 season with just 92 penalties, the 2nd fewest in the NFL last season (LAR - 91).
- The Cardinals defense was one of the NFL's best in the second half of the 2024 season. **Over the final 11 games, Arizona allowed an average of just 19.6 points per game (only 3 teams allowed fewer points per game between Weeks 7-18). The Cards defense allowed the fewest total TDs (20) and passing TDs (10) in the NFL during that span.**
- Gannon presided over one of the NFL's best rushing attacks over the last two seasons. Arizona finished the 2024 season with 2,451 rushing yards, the 3rd-most in franchise history and the most since the team ran for a franchise record 2,582 yards in 1979. The Cardinals' 5.29 rushing yards per attempt in 2024 was easily the highest single-season rushing average in franchise history, and also one of the top 20 single-season totals in NFL history.
- In his first season with Arizona in 2023, Gannon led the NFL's third-youngest team that relied heavily on rookies but was also highly competitive. Despite playing the league's 2nd-toughest schedule with eight games vs. playoff teams, the Cardinals held a lead in 14-of-17 games played.
- In 2023, the Cardinals' rookie class, which led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4,654) in 2023. The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to have rookies combine for 2,000+ snaps on offense and 2,000+ snaps on defense last season. AZ's 2023 rookie class combined for: 151 games played, 7 TDs, 73 receptions, 847 receiving yards, 314 rushing yards, 206 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 15 tackles for loss, 13 passes defensed, a fumble recovery and an INT in 2023.
- In 2023, Gannon led the Cardinals to three wins vs. teams that made the postseason in 2023, including two on the East Coast in the month of December in hostile environments (Pittsburgh and Philadelphia).
- Under Gannon, the Cardinals also had a historic season protecting the football in 2023. Arizona had eight games in which it committed zero turnovers in '23, the most such outings in a single season in franchise history.



BIDWILL COACHING FELLOWSHIP

In February, the Cardinals announced the addition of DJ Gillins to the coaching staff as the newest participant in the **Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship** program.

ABOUT THE BILL BIDWILL COACHING FELLOWSHIP: The Cardinals established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship prior to the 2015 season. Gillins is the seventh individual to participate in the program, which is designed to increase diversity and create additional opportunities for coaching experience at the highest level.

Long-time Cardinals owner **Bill Bidwill**, who passed away in 2019, was at the forefront of providing opportunities to individuals regardless of race or gender. In 2010, he was honored with the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Paul "Tank" Younger Award for promoting diversity in the NFL. In 1978, Adele Harris became the first African American female executive in the NFL when she was hired as the Cardinals director of community relations. In 1981, Bidwill hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club. In 2004, the Cardinals became the first NFL team to have an African American general manager/head coach duo in Graves and Dennis Green.



ARIZONA'S COORDINATORS

PETZING CALLING THE SHOTS ON OFFENSE

The 2025 season is **Drew Petzing's** 3rd as the Cardinals offensive coordinator. He was hired by Arizona in 2023 following three seasons (2020-22) with the Cleveland Browns.



- Petzing has orchestrated one of the NFL's best rushing attacks in Arizona, as the Cardinals ranked 3rd in the NFL in rushing yards (4,816), 2nd in the NFL in rushing average (5.16), 9th in the NFL in rushing TDs (35) and 3rd in the NFL in games w/ 150+ rushing yards (14) over the last two seasons (2023-24).
- In 2024, Arizona had a 3,000-yard passer (QB **Kyler Murray**), a 1,000-yard rusher (RB **James Conner**) and a 1,000-yard receiver (TE **Trey McBride**) in a single season for just the fifth time in franchise history.
- Under Petzing, RB **James Conner** had his first two career 1,000-yard rushing campaigns (1,040 in 2023; 1,094 in 2024) while TE **Trey McBride** has blossomed into one of the NFL's top young players. In 2024, McBride earned his first Pro Bowl selection after totaling 111 receptions for 1,146 yards.

RALLIS' DEFENSE AMONG NFL'S BEST

The 2025 season is **Nick Rallis'** (RAW-liss) 8th in the NFL and his 3rd as the Cardinals defensive coordinator.



- Under Rallis, Arizona had one of the NFL's stingiest scoring defenses in the back half of last season, allowing just 19.6 points per game over the final 11 games. That trend has continued in 2025 with the Cardinals' defense ranked 10th having allowed just 20 offensive TDs through nine games. Arizona's defense also ranks 7th in passing TDs allowed (10).
- Arizona had an NFL-high 12 different players record 2.0 or more sacks in 2024. The Cardinals also tied for the NFL lead with 17 different players who recorded at least 1.0 sack.
- The Cardinals' defense finished the 2023 season with six takeaways in the red zone. Only two NFL teams - Pittsburgh (8) and Cincinnati (7) - had more red zone takeaways. Only one team had more red zone INTs (Pittsburgh - 7).

SPECIAL TEAMS CONTINUE TO SHINE UNDER RODGERS

Jeff Rodgers is in his eighth season with the Cardinals and seventh as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator in 2025. Arizona's special teams units have been among the best in the NFL during his tenure.



- Under Rodgers' tutelage in '24, K **Chad Ryland** was named a Pro Bowl alternate and was among the league's best kickers after joining Arizona in Week 5. P **Blake Gillikin** had another outstanding season, posting a 49.7 punting average with just one touchback (and 19 punts inside the 20) on 38 total punts.
- In 2024, the Cardinals became the first team in the NFL to return one of the new "dynamic kickoffs" for a TD (96 yards in Week 1 at Buffalo).

The 2024 campaign was Rodgers' 21st NFL season after previously coaching special teams with Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).

TERRELL RUNS THE PASSING GAME

Drew Terrell is in his 8th season in the NFL and 3rd with the Cardinals as passing game coordinator/WRs.



- In 2024, QB **Kyler Murray** completed 372-of-541 pass attempts (68.8%) for 3,851 yards, 21 TDs and a 93.5 passer rating. His 68.8 completion percentage was the 2nd-highest in franchise history, his 372 completions were the 3rd-most in team history, his 93.5 passer rating was the 6th-best and his 3,851 passing yards were the 7th-most in team history.
- Terrell orchestrated a Cardinals passing attack that saw rookie WR **Marvin Harrison Jr.** tie the franchise rookie record for TD receptions (8) while TE **Trey McBride** posted one of the best seasons by a TE in NFL history.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

Owner **Michael Bidwill** has been steering the Cardinals organization for nearly two decades. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Over the last three years, that transformation has led to the significant and successful restructuring of both the football and business sides of the organization.

That has included Bidwill's hiring of GM **Monti Ossenfort** and head coach **Jonathan Gannon** to lead the football operation and Chief Operating Officer **Jeremy Walls** to guide a revamped business structure.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- On the whole, Bidwill's most substantial accomplishment in his time leading the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium itself. The world-class venue has not only been critical for the franchise but has also resulted in over \$6 billion in economic impact for the state of Arizona.
- In response to the devastating wildfires that broke out in Los Angeles County in January of 2025, Bidwill led a remarkable effort to have State Farm Stadium serve as host to the Rams for their Wild Card matchup vs. the Vikings. Despite a short turnaround, State Farm Stadium hosted a sellout crowd in the first postseason game in NFL history to be moved due to a natural disaster.
- Under Michael's direction in 2025, the organization launched Cardinals Premier Travel, a first-of-its-kind, elevated travel experience to give all fans the opportunity to see the team play on the road in unmatched comfort and convenience. The all-inclusive experience includes round-trip private air transportation aboard the team's wide-body Boeing 777-200ER aircraft, two-night hotel accommodations, in-city transportation, a pre-game tailgate experience, game tickets and an immediate return to Phoenix after the game, among many other perks.
- On February 12, 2023 State Farm Stadium hosted its third Super Bowl when a then-record 115.1 million viewers watched Super Bowl LVII. State Farm Stadium also hosted Super Bowls XLII (following 2007 season) and XLIX (following 2014 season).
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land three Super Bowls, Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- Since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006 the Cardinals have sold out every non-pandemic game played at the venue.
- Bidwill also created the highly-successful Civics Matters Arizona community initiative which sends hundreds of high school students from across the state aboard the Cardinals team plane on an educational trip to Washington D.C. The fourth-annual Civics Matters Arizona trip took place in July of 2025 and saw 275 students visit the nation's capital where they were given a red coat tour of the U.S. Capitol and a private tour of the Supreme Court, where they met with Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh. They also met with elected representatives and experienced instructor-led visits to monuments, memorials, museums, and government institutions, providing them an opportunity to learn about civics in a way that is both educational and fun.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Michael's tenure leading the organization. Arizona has played in 10 postseason contests over the last 18 seasons (2007-24), after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

Within the National Football League, Bidwill's influence is illustrated by his appointment to numerous and notable league committees, including two of the most prestigious – the Compensation Committee as well as the Management Council Executive Committee that represents the league in labor discussions with the NFLPA. He also chairs the league's Security and Conduct Committee and serves on four others: Business Ventures, Social Justice, Health and Safety, and Diversity.



OSSENFORT MAKING BIG MOVES IN THE DESERT

Monti Ossenfort is in his third season with the Cardinals in 2025 after being hired as the team's General Manager in January of 2023.

A look at some of Ossenfort's career highlights:

- In just his second season as GM in 2024, Arizona finished the year with eight wins, doubling its total from 2023 (4) despite facing the NFL's fifth-toughest schedule based on opponent winning percentage.
- *In his first three drafts as the Cardinals GM, he executed seven draft-day trades that resulted in the team selecting 28 total players – including 14 who were taken in the first three rounds. Only the Packers (31), Jaguars (30), Patriots (30) and Rams (29) had more total draft picks over the last three years (2023-25).*
- Since being hired as GM in 2023, Ossenfort has completely re-shaped the Cardinals roster through the draft, trades and free agency. Arizona's current 51-man roster features just 9 players who were with the team prior to Ossenfort's arrival.
- Arizona's 2025 free agency period was Ossenfort's busiest one yet and included the signings of DL **Calais Campbell**, LB **Josh Sweat**, DL **Dalvin Tomlinson** and LB **Akeem Davis-Gaither** among others.
- The Cardinals 2024 NFL Draft class featured a league-high 12 total picks and seven selections in the top-90. Arizona's 12 picks were the most in a single draft for the team since 1992 (12), when the draft consisted of 10 rounds. The Cardinals became the first team since the 1991 Dallas Cowboys (7) to have at least seven picks in the top-90 of a single draft.
- In 2023, Ossenfort built a rookie class that led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4,654).



IDENTIFYING - AND EXTENDING - THE CORE

Since being hired by the Cardinals in 2023, **Ossenfort** has drastically overhauled the roster, bringing in talent through free agency, the draft and through trades.

He has also made the roster stronger by identifying, and rewarding, the existing players who make up the Cardinals core.

Over the span of just five months in 2024, Ossenfort signed four of the Cardinals core players to contract extensions: **S Budda Baker** (12/28), **RB James Conner** (11/30), **OL Hjalte Froholdt** (8/21) and **LB Zaven Collins** (8/3). In April of 2025, Ossenfort signed Pro Bowl TE **Trey McBride** to a four-year contract extension.



OSSENFORT DEALS ON DRAFT DAY

- Named to his first Pro Bowl following the 2024 season, becoming just the second TE in franchise history to earn Pro Bowl honors and the first since Hall of Famer Jackie Smith in 1970.

- “Cardinals/Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year” in 2024.

- In 2024, became the first TE in NFL history to have 12+ catches in consecutive games. With three games of 12+ catches in 2024, only All-Pro WR CeeDee Lamb (4 in 2023) and HOFer Cris Carter (4 in 1995) had more such games in a single season.

- Had three games with 120+ receiving yards in 2024. Only Travis Kelce (4 in 2020) and Tony Gonzalez (4 in 2005) had more such games in a season in NFL history among TEs.

- Had five 100-yard receiving performances in the previous two seasons (2023-24), trailing only Kittle (7) for the most in the NFL among TEs.

- Finished second among NFL TEs in both receptions (111) and receiving yards (1,146) in 2024 behind only Brock Bowers (112 receptions for 1,194 yards). His 111 receptions in 2024 were the fourth-most in a single season by a TE in NFL history.

FRANCHISE HISTORY

- Has six games with 10+ catches in the past three seasons (2023-25). Prior to McBride, no TE in franchise history had ever had 10+ receptions in a single game.

- Set the franchise record for most receptions in a season by a TE in consecutive years (81 in 2023, 111 in 2024).

- His 111 catches in 2024 were the second most in team history regardless of position (DeAndre Hopkins – 115 in 2020).

- With 1,146 receiving yards in 2024, joined HOFer Jackie Smith (1,205 in 1967) as the only TEs in franchise history to have 1,000+ receiving yards in a single season.

- In Weeks 12-13 of the 2024 season, posted back-to-back games with 12 receptions. He became the first player in Cardinals history - regardless of position - to have consecutive games with 12+ catches.

- Has six career 100-yard receiving performances, with the first coming on in Week 10 of the 2023 season vs. Atlanta (131 yards). Prior to that performance, no Cards TE had recorded a 100-yard game since 1989.

MCBRIDE HAULS IN 111 CATCHES IN 2024

TE Trey McBride was named to his first Pro Bowl in 2024 after finishing the season with 111 receptions for 1,146 yards and two receiving TDs (also had a fumble recovery TD and a rushing TD).

In addition to shattering his own franchise single-season record for receptions by a TE (81 in 2023), McBride's 111 receptions in 2024 also represent the second-highest season total in franchise history by a player at any position.

He became just the fifth different player in franchise history to reach 100+ receptions in a season: WR Larry Fitzgerald (5x), WR Anquan Boldin (2x), WR DeAndre Hopkins (1x) and FB Larry Centers (1x).




In Week 10 of the 2023 season vs. Atlanta, McBride caught eight passes for 131 yards to mark his first career 100-yard outing.

The performance came 34 years to the day since the last 100-yard outing by a Cardinals TE: Rob Awalt, 105 yards vs. Dallas on 11/12/89.

McBride hit the 100-yard mark again four games later (102 vs. SF in Week 15) and added three 100-yard outings in 2024.

McBride joins HOFer Jackie Smith as the only TEs in team history with at least six 100-yard receiving performances in their career. McBride has played in just 56 games.





AT A GLANCE

- Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (50th overall) of the 2008 NFL Draft. Played his first nine seasons (2008-16) with Arizona and was a rookie on the Cardinals Super Bowl XLIII team. Spent the previous eight seasons with the Jaguars (2017-19), Ravens (2020-22), Falcons (2023) and Dolphins (2024).

- In his initial nine-year run with AZ (2008-16), played 138 games (120 starts) during the regular season and totaled 501 tackles, 56.5 sacks, 124 QB hits, 107 tackles for loss, 8 forced fumbles, 8 fumble recoveries (1 returned for a TD), 3 INTs and 42 passes defensed.

- Has missed just 15 games in his first 18 NFL seasons and has never played fewer than 12 games during any season.

QUARTERBACKS

Jacoby Brissett – Acquired by AZ in free agency. Started 57-of-93 games in his career. Named a team captain by the Patriots in 2024. Has passed for 250+ yards and 2+ TDs in all four of his starts this season, becoming the first Cardinals player with multiple TD passes in each of his first four starts. His eight TD passes are also the most in franchise history by a QB in the same time frame.

Kedon Slovis – Signed to the practice squad on 8/28 before being elevated to the Active Roster on 10/11. Attended Desert Mountain (Scottsdale, AZ) High School where he started his final two seasons (2017-18) and passed for more than 5,500 yards and 50 TDs. During his two seasons as a starter, his offensive coordinator/QBs coach was former Cardinals QB Kurt Warner. Made his NFL debut in the fourth quarter at Seattle in Week 10.

RUNNING BACKS

Michael Carter – Claimed off waivers by Arizona from the Jets on 11/15/23. Three-year NFL veteran who has rushed for 381 yards on 95 carries (4.1 avg) in 14 games with AZ. Has rushed for 1,460 yards and 9 TDs on 364 carries (4.0 avg.) in 53 career games (24 starts). Made his 2nd start with the Cardinals vs. Ten and scored his 2nd rushing TD with the team.

Emari Demercado – Set the franchise record for rushing yards by an undrafted rookie (284) in 2023. In 35 games (two starts), has 108 carries for 740 yards (6.9 avg.) and three TDs to go along with 43 receptions for 275 yards and a TD. Has runs of 71 and 55 yards this season, joining Indy's Jonathan Taylor (3 on 189 carries) and NE's TreVeyon Henderson (2 in 81 carries) as the only players in the NFL with multiple runs of 50+ yards.

Zonovan 'Bam' Knight – In his third NFL season and first in Arizona. Made his Cardinals debut on special teams in Week 2 vs. Carolina. Scored a rushing TD in Weeks 5 and 6; marked his first rushing TD in consecutive games since his sophomore year at North Carolina State in 2020. In seven games (three starts) this season has rushed for 157 yards and 2 TDs on 48 carries while adding 8 receptions for 65 yards.

TIGHT ENDS

Elijah Higgins – Has appeared in 37 games (13 starts) with 48 receptions for 486 yards and three TDs in his first three seasons (2023-25). Before switching to TE in the NFL was a WR at Stanford alongside current teammates WR's Michael Wilson and Simi Fehoko.

Trey McBride – Coming off his first Pro Bowl appearance and consecutive record-breaking seasons, his 221 receptions between 2022-24 were the most by a TE in their first three seasons in NFL history. Finished the 2024 season with 111 receptions for 1,146 yards and two TDs to go along with a rushing TD and a fumble recovery TD. Shattered his own franchise single-season record for receptions by a TE (previous record was 81 in 2023). Leads all NFL TEs in receptions (253) and receiving yards (2,574) over the last three seasons (2023-25). In his last four games, he has 32 receptions for 328 yards and 5 TDs.

Josiah Deguara – Signed by AZ in free agency in March, he has appeared in 69 games (10 starts) over five NFL seasons. Deguara has recorded 450 yards on 50 receptions including two touchdowns in his career.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Greg Dortch – Entering his fifth season with the Cardinals. Posted 37 receptions for 342 yards and a career-high three touchdowns in 2024. Had a season-best 4 receptions in Week 4 vs. Seattle. Scored his first TD of the season on a 12-yard reception in Week 6 at Indianapolis. One of just six players in Cardinals history with 1,000+ kickoff return yards and 700+ punt return yards. Scored the first rushing TD of his career in Week 10 at Seattle; it was his first rushing TD since his senior year of HS in 2015.

Simi Fehoko – Is in his first season with Arizona in 2025. Part of the same WR room at Stanford as current Cardinals teammates Michael Wilson and Elijah Higgins. Entered the NFL as a fifth-round pick (179th overall) of the Cowboys in the 2021 NFL Draft.

Marvin Harrison Jr. – Selected by AZ as the fourth overall pick in 2024 out of Ohio State and was the first non-quarterback taken. Finished rookie season with 62 receptions for 885 yards (14.3 avg.) and 8 TDs. His eight receiving TDs tied the franchise record for rookies. Leads all Cardinals receivers with 525 receiving yards and ranks second in both receptions (34) and receiving TDs (4) so far this season. Had a career-high 7 receptions for a game-high 96 yards and a TD in Week 9 at Dallas. Has posted back-to-back games with a TD for the third time in his career.

Xavier Weaver – An undrafted rookie free agent out of Colorado, signed with the Cardinals in 2024. Was the only Cardinals UDFA to make the roster last season. Led Buffaloes receiving core in 2023 after hauling in 68 passes for 908 yards. Recorded a 24-yard kick return in Week 7 vs. GB.

Michael Wilson – In his third season in the Valley after being drafted by Arizona in 2023. After posting 565 yards and three TDs as a rookie in 2023, he returned with 548 yards and four TDs in 2024. Caught his first TD reception of the season in Week 2 vs. Carolina. Recorded a season-high 61 yards in Week 9 at Dallas.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Isaiah Adams – From Ajax, Ontario. Selected by AZ in the third round (71st overall) in 2024 out of Illinois. Helped block for the Cardinals offense to run for 2,451 yards and 18 TDs on 463 carries (5.3 avg.) in 2024. Has started five games at RG in 2025.

Kelvin Beachum – Selected by Pittsburgh in the seventh round (248th overall) in 2012 and has started 164 of 188 games played with the Steelers (2012-15), Jaguars (2016), Jets (2017-19) and Cardinals (2020-25). Made 1st start of '25 (LT) at San Francisco in Week 3 and has started the past two weeks at TE. Is a humanitarian and a monthly visitor to the United Food Bank.

Evon Brown – Is in his seventh NFL season and second with Arizona. Started 65-of-71 games played over the last four-plus seasons with Detroit (2021-22), Seattle (2023), and Arizona (2024-25). Started all 25 games played at LG in last two seasons (2024-25) with Arizona.

Hjalte Froholdt – Has started all 43 possible games at center since joining the Cardinals in 2023. Part of an offensive line that allowed just 30 sacks, the fifth-fewest sacks in the NFL in 2024. Native of Denmark. On 8/21/24 signed a two-year contract extension with AZ.

Josh Fryar – Played 54 games (30 starts) in five seasons (2020-24) at Ohio State. In Arizona, he reunites with Cardinals O-Line coach Justin Frye, who was his position coach with the Buckeyes the past three seasons (2022-24) and OL Paris Johnson Jr., who played on the same line at OSU from 2020-22.

Jon Gaines II – Now in his his third season in Arizona. Was a fourth-round pick by AZ in 2023 out of UCLA. Lined up as a FB on James Conner's 2-yard TD run in Week 2 vs. Carolina. Saw his first action on the offensive line in Week 5 vs. Ten.

Will Hernandez – A second-round pick by the Giants in 2018, signed with Arizona as a free agent in the 2022 offseason. Has started all 40 games he has appeared in at RG for AZ. Has started each of the last five games following his return from an injury suffered in Week 5 last season.

Demontrey Jacobs – Signed by the Broncos as a rookie free agent in 2023 and spent the 2024 season in New England, where he started 13-of-15 games played at RT (11) and LT (2). Signed to AZ's active roster on 9/23/25.

Paris Johnson Jr. – Cardinals first-round pick (6th overall) in 2023 out of Ohio State. Has started all 39 games played in his first two-plus seasons (2023-25), starting all 17 games at RT in 2023 and 19 games at LT in 2024-25. He was named a Pro Bowl alternate for the first time last season.

Jonah Williams – Signed with Arizona in 2024 following five seasons with the Bengals (2019-23). Has started all 74 games he's played in the NFL (42 at LT and 32 at RT). Scored his first-career TD vs. NE in 2024, recovering a fumble in the end zone.

SPECIALISTS

Aaron Brewer – Has played 141 games with Arizona (2016-25), the most of any active Cardinal and the second-most of any specialist in team history. Entered the league with the Broncos as a rookie free agent in 2012. Played in his 200th career regular season game in Week 4 vs. Seattle.

Pat O'Donnell – Has played 157 career games with the Bears (2014-21), Packers (2022), 49ers (2024), and Cardinals (2025) punting 649 times for 29,230 yards (45.0 average) with 235 punts landed inside-the-20 yard-line.

Chad Ryland – After signing with AZ in October of 2024, was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate last season. Since making his AZ debut in Week 5 of '24, is tied for 5th in the NFL in made FGs (43) and 7th in points (176).

**DEFENSIVE LINE**

Calais Campbell – Originally drafted by the Cardinals in the second round (50th overall) of the 2008 NFL Draft, he played nine seasons (2008-16) in Arizona. A six-time Pro Bowl (2014-15; 2017-20) selection, was named to the NFL All-Decade Team of the 2010s. He was also the 2019 NFL Walter Payton Man of the Year. Playing his 18th season at age 39 in 2025, ranks second on the Cardinals with 12 QB hits.

P.J. Mustipher – Originally signed with the Broncos as a rookie free agent in 2023. After being released by Denver appeared in four games as a rookie with New Orleans in 2023 before spending the 2024 season on AZ's practice squad. In nine games this season has 15 tackles, a tackle for loss and a pass defensed.

Bilal Nichols – In his second season with AZ after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Bears (2018-21) and Raiders (2022-23). Played six games (five starts) and totaled 10 tackles, a tackle for loss and a QB hit before with Arizona in 2024 before missing the final 11 games. Returned to the lineup in Week 5.

Walter Nolen III – Drafted by the Cardinals in the first round (16th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. Made his NFL debut in Week 9 at Dallas and became the first player since T.J. Watt in 2017 and 4th in NFL history with 1+ sack, 2+ TFLs & 1+ pass defensed in first career game.

Darius Robinson – Second of AZ's two first-round selections (27th overall) in 2024. Earned first-team All-SEC honors and a career-high 8.5 sacks in 2023 in his first season as an edge rusher at Missouri. After an injury limited him to six games in 2024, totaled 10 tackles, 1.0 sack and a tackle for loss as a rookie. Recorded his first sack of 2025 in Week 4 vs. Seattle.

Dante Stills – Has appeared in 40 games (21 starts) with 109 tackles, 8.0 sacks, 11 QB hits, 10 tackles for loss, 2 passes defensed, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in his first two-plus seasons (2023-25). Led all Cardinals D-Linemen in both tackles and sacks in each of his first two seasons.

Dalvin Tomlinson – Signed a two-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/14/25. Has started all 134 games played during the regular season and has 359 tackles, 69 QB hits, 38 tackles for loss, 19.0 sacks, eight passes defensed, two fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles.

LINEBACKERS

Baron Browning – Traded to the Cardinals from Denver for a sixth-round selection in the 2025 NFL Draft on 11/4/24. Agreed to terms to a two-year contract with Arizona on 3/9/25. Has appeared in nine games (seven starts) this season with 15 tackles, 2.0 sacks, an INT, a pass defensed, 5 QB hits, 3 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery.

Jordan Burch – Selected by the Cardinals in the third round (78th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Oregon. Had a career-high 8.5 sacks in his final year at Oregon in 2024, surpassing his total from his first four college seasons combined (7.5 sacks in 48 games). Has appeared in all nine games this season on both defense and special teams.

Zaven Collins – Selected by the Cardinals in the first round (16th overall) in 2021 out of Tulsa. Signed with AZ on 8/3/24 to a two-year contract through the 2026 season. Scored his 2nd career TD on a 3-yard fumble return in Week 2 vs. Carolina (picked up Bryce Young fumble on Josh Sweat sack). Recorded his first sack of the season in Week 7 vs. GB.

Akeem Davis-Gaither – Signed a two-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/13/25. Appeared in all 17 games (seven starts) with Cincinnati in 2024 and set career highs in tackles (77), tackles for loss (four) and passes defensed (four). Is fourth on the team in tackles (49) this season.

Owen Pappoe – In first two-plus NFL seasons (2023-25), has appeared in 41 games (two starts) with 29 tackles, three passes defensed, a QB hit and a forced fumble on defense to go along with 22 tackles on special teams. Was a two-time captain at Auburn becoming just the fourth player in program history to earn the honor more than once.

Cody Simon – Selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (115th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Ohio State. Named a team captain as a senior in 2024 and went on to be named the Defensive MVP in Ohio State's 41-21 Rose Bowl victory over Oregon and also in the Buckeyes' 34-23 victory over Notre Dame in the CFP National Championship Game last year. Forced his first career fumble in Week 9 at Dallas and made his first start wearing the green dot in Week 10 at Seattle.

Josh Sweat – Signed a four-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/13/25 after spending his first seven seasons with the Eagles (2018-24). His 8.0 sacks, 10 tackles for loss, 12 QB hits and 3 forced fumbles are all team highs. His 8.0 sacks are tied for 5th in the NFL in 2025 and match his season total from last year with the Eagles.

Xavier Thomas – Selected by Arizona in the fifth round (138th overall) of the 2024 Draft out of Clemson. Tallied 2.5 sacks, 10 tackles, two tackles for loss, four QB hits, one pass defensed and a forced fumble as a rookie. Won a National Championship with the Tigers as a freshman in 2018. Made 2025 season debut in Week 7 vs. GB.

Mack Wilson Sr. – Started all 16 games played in his first season as a Cardinal in 2024, totaling 75 tackles (four for loss), seven QB hits, five passes defensed, 3.0 sacks, an INT and a fumble recovery. Given the "green dot" as the "Mike" LB and was named a team captain for the first time in his career in 2025. In eight starts this season, he ranks second on the team in tackles (60) and is tied for the team lead in passes defensed (6).

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Budda Baker – Arizona's 2017 second-round pick (36th overall) out of Washington is a seven-time Pro Bowler (2017, '19-24), six-time team captain (2020-25) and earned 2020 first-team All-Pro honors and 2024 second-team All-Pro honors. He established a new career high and ranked second among all NFL defenders with 164 tackles in 2024.

Denzel Burke – Selected by the Cardinals in the fifth round (174th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Ohio State. A native of Phoenix, he was a standout prep DB and WR who attended Brophy College Prep (Phoenix) before transferring to Saguaro (Scottsdale) High School. Has posted interceptions in back-to-back games (Weeks 9-10) and is the first Cardinals rookie to accomplish the feat since Corey Chavous in 1998.

Kei'Trel Clark – Selected by Arizona in the sixth round (180th overall) in 2023 out of Louisville. Has appeared in 37 games (9 starts) with 75 total tackles, 1.0 sack, an INT, a FF, 7 passes defensed and 4 tackles for loss in his first three seasons (2023-25). Made his first start of '25 in Week 5 vs. Ten.

Kitan Crawford – Selected by Arizona in the seventh round (225th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. He became the Cardinals first-ever draft pick out of Nevada. His second cousin is two-time NFL MVP and six-time Pro Bowl QB Patrick Mahomes. Ranks 6th among all NFL rookies in special teams snaps (168) in '25 and has seven special teams tackles.

Will Johnson – Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (47th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Michigan. In the season opener at NO, became the first AZ defender since 2000 to have 3+ passes defensed in his NFL debut. Despite playing just 321 defensive snaps over six games, his 6 passes defensed are tied for 1st among rookies in 2025.

Elijah Jones – Selected by the Cardinals in the third round (90th overall) in 2024 out of Boston College. He owns the Boston College record for career games played (64). Earned All-AAC honors in each of his final two seasons (2022-23).

Max Melton – Selected by Arizona in the second round (43rd overall) in 2024 out of Rutgers. He recorded 45 tackles, five passes defensed, two tackles for loss and a forced fumble in 17 games last season. His brother, Bo, played two seasons (2023-24) at WR for the Packers before Green Bay switched him to cornerback in 2025.

Dadrian Taylor-Demerson – Selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (104th overall) in 2024 out of Texas Tech. He saw action in all 17 games last season and tallied 35 tackles, five passes defensed and three tackles for loss. Earned his nickname "Rabbit" for his speed in Pop Warner football. Tied for second on the team in INT's (2).

Jalen Thompson – Selected by Arizona in the fifth-round of the 2019 NFL Supplemental Draft out of Washington State. Only active player in the NFL who entered the league through the Supplemental Draft. Had team-high 10 tackles in Week 2 vs. Carolina and is third on the team in tackles this season (58).

Garrett Williams – Started 11 of 16 games played in 2024 and tallied 58 tackles, two INTs, a team-high nine passes defensed and a forced fumble. Originally selected by Arizona in the third round (72nd overall) in 2023 out of Syracuse. Was a three-time All-ACC selection with the Orange. Recorded a forced fumble and pass defensed in his first game back from injury in Week 9 at Dallas.

Arizona opened the regular season on the road at New Orleans and left the Big Easy with a thrilling 20-13 victory after stopping a furious late comeback attempt by the Saints. Four consecutive Cardinals scoring drives (2 TDs, 2 FGs) between the 1st and 3rd quarters paired with a stout defensive effort resulted in Arizona taking a 20-10 lead midway through the 3rd. QB Kyler Murray threw TD passes to WR Marvin Harrison Jr. and RB James Conner while RB Trey Benson had a career-best rushing performance in leading the Cardinals to 146 yards on the ground. The Arizona defense held the New Orleans offense largely in check, highlighted by a stellar debut for rookie CB Will Johnson. But the Saints threatened on their final two drives and it took a spectacular defensive play from Arizona's safety tandem of Budda Baker and Jalen Thompson to break up a pass in the end zone on the game's penultimate play. The effort preserved the AZ victory and snapped New Orleans' NFL-best streak of six straight week 1 wins.

Arizona opened the scoring with 5:03 to play in the first quarter when Chad Ryland's 42-yard field goal capped an 11-play, 42-yard drive. The ensuing Saints series appeared to end when Johnson picked off a Spencer Rattler pass in the end zone. However, a defensive holding call away from the play on the other side of the field wiped away the INT. Six plays later, RB Alvin Kamara put the Saints up with his 18-yard scoring run around the right end. On the second play of Arizona's next drive, Murray connected deep down the right sideline with Harrison and the 45-yard completion moved it to the Saints 14. Murray and Harrison then connected on a 1-yard pass four plays later and the Cards went ahead 10-7 with 10:05 remaining in the second quarter. The Saints would then tie it at 10 on the next drive and ended it with Blake Grupe's 36-yard FG. With 4:53 left before halftime, the Cardinals took over at their own 29. They would embark on a 10-play, 71-yard drive that took 4:30 off the clock and James Conner took a 4-yard shovel pass from Murray into the endzone to put AZ ahead 17-10 with just :28 remaining in the quarter; Murray completed six straight passes to end the TD drive.

On AZ's first possession of the second half, Benson exploded on a 52-yard run to the Saints 30; the explosive run set-up Ryland's 50-yard FG that made it 20-10. New Orleans would reach the AZ19 on the next drive but Grupe's 37-yard FG try was wide left and the Cardinals continued to lead by 10. It remained that way deep into the fourth. With 4:34 to play, New Orleans took over at its own 36 before Rattler marched them downfield and the Saints ultimately had it first-n-goal at the AZ3. The Cards defense stiffened, stuffing Kamara for a loss of two and forcing a pair of incompletions. Grupe's 28-yard FG pulled the Saints to within 7 with 2:42 to go. After forcing an Arizona punt, New Orleans took over at its own 42 with 1:49 remaining. Rattler moved the offense to the AZ18 with 0:14 left and would get three throws into the end zone. On the second of those, he tossed it to TE Juwan Johnson, who leapt in the end zone and secured the ball with both hands before being separated from it by Baker and Thompson. One final throw to the end zone sailed out of bounds and Arizona emerged with the 7-point, week 1 win.

The Cardinals began their 20th regular season at State Farm Stadium with a 27-22 victory over the Carolina Panthers. Arizona capitalized on defensive takeaways on the first two Panthers possessions to jump out to a quick 10-0 lead. Later, QB Kyler Murray led one TD drive to close the first half and another to open the second and the Cards would take that 27-3 lead late into the third quarter. Carolina would then score three unanswered touchdowns to pull to within 5 and got the ball back with 1:55 to go. But Arizona was able to close the door thanks in no small part to DL Calais Campbell who made a triumphant return to State Farm Stadium. The 18-year vet came up with two fourth-quarter sacks, including one in the closing seconds to seal the game. With the victory Arizona improved to 2-0 on the season, 6-1 in its last 7 home games and 13-6-1 in home openers at State Farm Stadium.

On the game's third play from scrimmage, the Panthers faced a 3rd-n-7 at their own 30. LB Josh Sweat stormed up the middle and chased down QB Bryce Young, jarring the ball loose. Fellow LB Zaven Collins tracked it down at the 3 and rolled into the end zone for his second career TD to give the Cards a quick 7-0 lead. On the ensuing series, the AZ defense struck again. This time it was LB Mack Wilson, Sr. who flew up the middle and hit Young as he was throwing, sending the ball into the air and LB Baron Browning corralled it for an INT. The takeaway set Arizona's offense up at the Carolina 48 and led to a 29-yard Chad Ryland FG that made it 10-0. The Panthers offense reached the Cardinals red zone on the next possession and had it 1st-n-goal at the 9 in the closing minute of the opening quarter. But the defense stiffened and the Panthers came away with just a short Ryan Fitzgerald FG that made it 10-3. It remained that way well into the 2nd quarter and with 7:19 on the clock, the Cards offense took over at its own 10. It would move 61 yards in 10 plays – the biggest of which was a 32-yard completion to McBride and Ryland's 47-yard FG with 1:55 remaining in the half made it 13-3. After the defense forced a quick Carolina 3-n-out, Greg Dortch's 29-yard punt return gave the offense the ball at the CAR45 with 0:51 to go before intermission. That was enough time for Murray to move deep into Panthers territory on 5-6 passing for 45 yards and with just 4 ticks on the clock, he found WR Michael Wilson in the back of the end zone to put the Cards up 20-3 at halftime.

The Cardinals carried that momentum into the 3rd quarter, opening it with a 9-play, 71-yard drive on which Murray was 4 of 5 passing for 64 yards. TE Elijah Higgins hauled in receptions of 18 and 27 yards and RB James Conner capped the drive with his 2-yard TD run that made it 27-3. Carolina found the end zone for the first time with 2:06 to go in the 3rd quarter on Young's 4-yard pass to WR Hunter Renfrow; after the 2-point try failed, the Cards led 27-9 heading into the 4th. Arizona responded by moving 70 yards in 8 plays before facing a 3rd-n-3 at the CAR12. On that play, Murray was hit while throwing and Panthers LB D.J. Womack hauled it in for an INT. Carolina capitalized on the opportunity and produced TDs on its next two possessions thanks to Young scoring passes, first to RB Chuba Hubbard (5 yards) and then again to Renfrow (1 yard). The Panthers had trimmed the deficit to 27-22 with 1:58 to play and then successfully executed an on-side kick attempt. Suddenly they had the ball at midfield with 1:55 to play and down just 5. The game appeared over when the Cardinals defense stopped Carolina on 4th-n-5 at the AZ24 but a defensive holding call kept the drive alive. Later, umpire Barry Anderson flagged Sweat for roughing the passer, giving the Panthers a 1st down at the AZ33 instead of 3rd-n-17 at the AZ48. Ultimately, Carolina faced a 4th-n-15 at the AZ38 with 0:32 left when Campbell sealed the game with his second sack of Young.

In a match-up of 2-0 teams fighting through a host of injuries, the host 49ers rallied for a late Eddie Pineiro FG as time expired to claim a 16-15 divisional victory. Arizona was without two starting CBs who were injured the week before (Will Johnson and Garrett Williams) and starting LT (Paris Johnson) while players San Francisco was missing included QB Brock Purdy, TE George Kittle, and WR Rashaan Jennings. Each team would lose more key contributors as this physical NFC West battle went on. With 3:15 to play, the Cardinals took the lead when they broke a 13-13 tie when DE Calais Campbell drew a holding penalty in the end zone resulting in a safety. However, back-up San Francisco QB Mac Jones would lead the last minute FG drive to hand Arizona its first loss of the season.

The Cardinals offense began the game with three straight drives of 10+ plays while forcing San Fran 3-n-outs in between. However, the only scoring that took place was on a 34-yard Chad Ryland FG that made it 3-0 midway through the second. During this time, SF pass rusher Nick Bosa exited with a knee injury. The 49ers answered with a FG drive of their own and Pineiro's 38-yarder tied it at 3 with 4:33 to go in the second. His 55-yarder in the closing seconds of the final half-minute of the second quarter gave the hosts a 6-3 lead at intermission.

On the 2nd play of their opening offensive series of the 3rd quarter, the Cardinals lost RB and captain James Conner with a serious ankle injury. The drive produced another Ryland FG - this one from 28 yards - and the game was tied at 6. The ensuing 49ers drive saw them reach the AZ 6-yard line where they had it 1st-n-goal. But the Arizona defense stiffened with a goal-line stand that included a Mack Wilson shoulder-to-chest hit of RB Christian McCaffrey on a 4th-n-goal pass at the 1. On their next series, the 49ers went for it again on 4th down - this time on 4th-n-2 at the AZ40. This time, Jones lofted it deep down the right sideline where WR Ricky Pearsall hauled it in at the 6 for a 34-yard gain. Two plays later, Jones hit FB Kyler Juszczyk out of the backfield for a 1-yard TD that put SF up 13-6. Arizona answered quickly on its next drive. Murray's 32-yard completion to WR Marvin Harrison, Jr. moved it to the SF33 and a 33-yard pass interference penalty in the end zone gave the Cards offense the ball at the 1. That set up Murray's 1-yard TD pass to TE Trey McBride that tied the game at 13 midway through the 4th. The next SF drive ended when Arizona S Darrion Taylor-Demerson notched his first career INT, halting a drive that had reached the AZ36. While the Cards did not capitalize on the takeaway, Blake Gillikin's punt pinned the Niners at their own 6. Two plays later, a holding call in the end zone resulted in a safety that put AZ up 2 with 3:15 to play. With 1:46 to go, the 49ers took over at their own 20. Jones would then complete 5 passes for 59 yards to set-up Pineiro's game-winner.

In a Thursday night, prime-time match-up of 2-1 teams, the Cardinals debuted their new Rivalries uniforms and marked the occasion with a typical intra-division thriller. The Seahawks held the lead for 46:05 of the game's 60 minutes and were up 20-6 deep into the 4th quarter. But led by QB Kyler Murray, the Cards rallied to score two touchdowns in the game's final six minutes to tie the game. WR Marvin Harrison, Jr. rebounded from a challenging first half and was a central figure in the comeback with several key receptions, including a leaping, highlight-reel TD to pull within 7. But after Murray's TD pass to RB Emari Demercado knotted it at 20 with :28 left, Seahawks QB Sam Darnold led the visitors into position for a 52-yard game-winning FG attempt by Jason Myers. The try snuck inside the right upright and for the second straight week, the Cardinals fell in a division game decided on a walk-off field goal.

The Seahawks first drive of the game crossed midfield but when they went for it on 4th-n-1 at the AZ48, RB Zach Charbonnet was stuffed by S Budda Baker and LB Akeem Davis-Gaither. Seattle briefly got the ball back on the ensuing possession when S Coby Bryant picked off a Murray pass across the middle but he fumbled at the end of the return and RB Trey Benson recovered. That drive would end on a 33-yard Chad Ryland FG that put the Cards up 3-0. The Seahawks answered quickly with a 7-play, 77-yard drive that Darnold ended with his 16-yard TD pass to TE AJ Barner. It remained a 7-3 game midway through the second quarter when the Cards advanced to the Seattle 33 and faced a 3rd-n-11. Murray fired it downfield to Harrison but the ball bounced from the WR's hands to LB Ernest Jones IV who returned the INT 29 yards to the AZ49. Seattle would not capitalize on the takeaway as the Cards defense forced a punt. The Seahawks, however, got the ball back at their own 10 with 3:45 remaining in the first half. They would move 90 yards in 7 plays – including chunk gains of 32, 24, and 15 yards as well as a pass interference in the end zone – and took a 14-3 halftime lead on Charbonnet's 1-yard scoring run.

Seattle got the ball to start the 3rd quarter and almost turned it over on the first play. LB Josh Sweat got to Darnold and forced the ball loose but the Seahawks recovered. They would end the drive with a 44-yard Myers FG to take a 17-3 lead. Late in the 3rd quarter, Arizona pulled to within 17-6 thanks to Ryland's 57-yard FG. With 9:33 remaining in the 4th, another Myers FG – this one from 31 yards – put the Seahawks back up by 14 at 20-6. The Cards would need to rally and they did. The second play of the next series saw Murray scramble for a gain of 29 to the SEA41. Later, on 2nd-n-goal at the 16, he fired into a tight window in the back left corner of the end zone where Harrison leapt, landed and came down with the TD, trimming the deficit to 7. Seattle's attempt to extend that lead on its next possession failed as Myers was wide right from 53 yards and Arizona took over at its own 43 with 3:16 to play. The Cards soon faced a 4th-n-4 at their own 49 when WR Michael Wilson made a 1-handed grab for 5 to keep the drive alive. On 3rd-n-9 at the SEA45 just after the 2:00 warning, Murray connected with WR Greg Dortch for 15 yards to the SEA30. Two plays later, Harrison pulled in an 18-yard reception on 3rd-n-5 at the 25, taking it to the SEA7. Two plays after that, Murray hit Demercado out of the backfield and the RB took it to the end zone to tie the game at 20 with :28 left. When the ensuing kickoff hit just short of the landing zone, Seattle took over at its own 40 with :28 left. Following an incompletion on 1st down, Darnold and WR Jaxon Smith Njigba connected down the left sideline for a 22-yard gain to the AZ38. After a 4-yard Charbonnet run moved it to the 34, Myers' FG from 52 yards away won the game as time expired.

In week 5, the Titans made just their second-ever visit to State Farm Stadium and emerged with a 22-21 comeback victory thanks to a series of improbable plays that were just as uncommon. Despite losing their top two RBs to injuries in each of the preceding two weeks, the Cardinals scored rushing TDs on three of their first four possessions and led 21-6 midway through the second quarter. Arizona could not capitalize on opportunities to put the game away in the second half and rookie QB Cam Ward led the Titans to 16 unanswered points in the fourth quarter. For the third straight week, the Cardinals would fall on a go-ahead FG as time expired. This time it was a Joey Slye's 29-yarder that dropped Arizona to 2-3 on the season while giving Tennessee its first victory.

The Cardinals opened the scoring on the game's first possession. A Kyler Murray scramble on 3rd-n-2 from the TEN46 moved the chains and on the next snap, the QB hit WR Marvin Harrison, Jr. for 43 yards to the TEN20. That set-up a 1-yard run by RB Michael Carter to make it 7-0. After a 44-yard Slye FG made it 7-3, Arizona doubled its point total on the next possession when Murray ended a 7-play, 65-yard drive with his 12-yard TD run. Early in the 2nd quarter, the Cardinals defense halted a Titans drive on its first play when LB Baron Browning recovered a Tony Pollard fumble caused by DL Zach Carter. That set the offense up at the TEN27 and 3 plays later, RB Bam Knight punched it in from a yard away to make it 21-3 with 10:43 to go in the half. A 51-yard Slye FG midway through the 2nd quarter made it 21-6 and it remained that way heading into halftime.

Arizona's defense would force 3-n-outs on Tennessee's first three drives of the second half and the Cardinals had several opportunities to increase their lead. The offense's first drive of the 3rd quarter reached the TEN20 before a mistimed shotgun snap hit Murray in the facemask and the Titans recovered. Two drives later, AZ faced a 3rd-n-1 at its own 28 when RB Emari Demercado raced 72 yards and appeared to give AZ a 28-6 lead early in the 4th; however, replay review ruled that he let go of the ball short of the goal-line, resulting in a touchback instead of a touchdown. Tennessee then moved 80 yards in 8 plays and Pollard's 1-yard TD run made it 21-12 after the PAT kick failed. The next Titans drive saw them reach the AZ20 where they faced a 3rd-n-2. LB Mack Wilson, Sr. tipped the pass at the line and S Dadiion Taylor-Demerson made a diving INT at the 5 but lost possession before he was touched down; the loose ball squirted around before WR Tyler Lockett pounced on it in the end zone for an improbable TD that made it 21-19 with 4:33 to play. Arizona would pick up one first down on the ensuing series before punting it back to the Titans, who took over at their own 18 with 1:53 left. Ward would complete passes of 3, 4, 6 and 16 yards to move it to the TEN47 with :32 left. He then connected with WR Calvin Ridley for 38 yards down the right sideline, taking it to the AZ15. Three plays later, Slye hit from 29 yards away as time expired to give Tennessee the win.

The Cardinals (2-3) traveled to Indy for a week 6 showdown with the 4-1 Colts. Arizona entered the contest undermanned - most notably as a foot injury forced QB Kyler Murray to miss his first game since 2023 - and would lose several key more players as the game went on. But behind veteran signal-caller Jacoby Brissett, Arizona rolled up 400 yards of offense and would trade punches with Indy throughout the back-and-forth affair. After the Colts went ahead by 4 with a late TD, Brissett marched the Cards to the Indy 9 inside the final minute but the comeback attempt fell just short and the AZ dropped its 4th straight nail-biter in the closing seconds. The combined differential in those games was just 9 points (1, 3, 1 and 4). Already without their top two RBs, the Cards would lose starting WR Marvin Harrison, Jr. to a concussion in the second quarter. Still, Brissett threw for 320 yards and a pair of TDs on 27 of 44 passing and gave Arizona every opportunity to win the tight ballgame.

The afternoon began with the Colts winning the toss, electing to receive and moving 65 yards in 9 plays for a game-opening score. It came in the form of an 8-yard Daniel Jones TD pass to TE Tyler Warren that put the hosts up 7-0. Later in the first quarter, Cards RB Bam Knight ran it in from a yard out to end an 11-play, 56-yard game-tying drive; the biggest play of it came when Brissett connected with TE Trey McBride for a 26-yard gain to the 7 on 3rd-n-7. Early in the second, Arizona LB Mack Wilson, Jr. picked off a Jones pass to set the Cardinals offense up at the Indy 27. Two plays later, though, Brissett attempted a pass to WR Zay Jones, who was bumped off his route by downfield contact that officials deemed incidental rather than illegal; the resulting INT by Colts CB Mekhi Blackmon gave the ball back to Indy's offense and it took advantage. Jones' 3-yard TD run capped a 9-play, 87-yard drive that put the Colts up 14-7 midway through the second. On the next series, Harrison recorded a 21-yard completion to the Indy 43 but hit his head on the turf and would not return. The drive did result in a 40-yard Chad Ryland FG that made it a 14-10 game at halftime.

Brissett opened the second half hot, completing 6 of 6 passes for 53 yards and put AZ up 17-14 with a 1-yard TD pass to McBride. The Colts then tied it at 17 on the ensuing series thanks to Michael Badgley's 45-yard FG. Arizona would answer. Playing in place of Harrison, Zay Jones had catches of 21 and 12 yards on the next drive and Greg Dortch's 12-yard TD reception put the Cards up 24-17 late in the third. Jones would soon tie it at 24 early in the fourth with his 5-yard TD pass to WR Josh Downs. Arizona then re-took the lead on the next possession thanks to Ryland's 44-yard FG. With 4:32 left, RB Jonathan Taylor's 1-yard TD run ended a 9-play, 66-yard Colts drive and the hosts were up 31-27. After the kickoff, AZ's offense took over at its own 13 with 4:26 remaining. Brissett moved the Cards to the Indy 42 at the 2:00 warning and on the next play connected with WR Michael Wilson for a 30-yard gain to the Indy 12. With 0:58 left, the Cards faced a 4th-n-7 at the Indy 9 and trailed by 4. Brissett lofted a pass toward McBride in the end zone that fell incomplete and officials ruled the defender's contact in the end zone did not rise to the level of a foul resulting in a turnover on downs that effectively ended the game.

In week 7, the Cardinals (2-4) hosted the Packers (3-1-1) at State Farm Stadium. With QB Jacoby Brissett starting his second straight game in place of Kyler Murray (foot), Arizona was looking for a win after dropping its previous 4 games by a combined 9 points (1, 3, 1 and 4). Like those others, this one would also come down to the wire. Brissett was again sharp, completing 25 of 36 passes for 279 yards and a pair of TDs with no INTs. Both scoring passes were to TE Trey McBride who had his first career multi-TD day and finished with 10 catches for 74 yards overall. Thanks in part to that production, Arizona led by 7 at the half as well as by 7 at the start of the 4th. However, the Packers scored twice in the final quarter including a go-ahead TD with 1:50 to go. While the Cards rally would reach the Packers 27 in the final minute, it would ultimately fall short and Green Bay emerged with the 4-point victory.

After receiving the opening kickoff, the Cardinals chewed up almost half of the first quarter on a 15-play drive that ended with Chad Ryland's 32-yard FG; those were the first 1st quarter points allowed by the Packers in 2025. On its initial possession, the Green Bay offense moved to the AZ 39 where the Packers faced a 4th-and-5 and went for it. They didn't get it as Jordan Love overthrew his receiver down the deep middle. The Pack's next drive did produce points when Lucas Havisic's 31-yard FG capped a 9-play, 67-yard drive and knotted the game at 3. The Cards would soon untie it when Ryland's 40-yard FG ended a drive that was aided by Marvin Harrison's 22-yard completion to the GB27. LB Zaven Collins' 3rd down sack of Love forced a 3-and-out on the ensuing GB possession and the Cards got it back at their own 29 with 3:04 in the half. They were soon staring at a 3rd-and-23 from the 16 before Brissett found WR Zay Jones with a 43-yard completion down the right sideline. Three plays later, WR Michael Wilson came down with a 14-yard grab on 3rd-and-4 at the GB35. Brissett then hit McBride in the end zone with a 15-yard TD completion on 3rd-and-4 that put the Cards up 10 with :07 left in the first half; on the drive, Brissett was 6 for 6 for 79 yards passing. After a touchback on the ensuing kickoff, Love's 22-yard completion moved it to the AZ43. Havisic then nailed a franchise-record 61-yard FG as time expired to make it a 13-6 game at intermission.

Green Bay would get the ball to start the 3rd quarter but Arizona's defense forced a 3-and-out. After moving near midfield on the ensuing series, Brissett was hit while throwing, forcing a fumble that the Packers recovered at the AZ44. They would capitalize on the takeaway 4 plays later when RB Josh Jacobs ran it in from 7 yards away to tie the game at 13. The Cards would again answer with a scoring drive highlighted by a key 3rd-and-long conversion. This time it was Harrison whose 35-yard reception on 3rd-and-14 at the AZ41 moved the chains and took it to the GB24. Four plays later, Brissett again found McBride, this time with a 12-yard scoring play that put the Cards back up 7 with 4:10 to go in the third. Green Bay responded with a game-tying TD drive, going 67 yards in 9 plays and Love's 7-yard completion to TE Tucker Kraft on the first play of the 4th quarter evened the score at 20. Greg Dortch returned the ensuing kickoff 39 yards and a facemask penalty tacked on gave the Cardinals offense possession at the GB45. It would reach the 8 but no further and Ryland's 39-yard FG put AZ back up by 3 with 9:01 to play. After forcing the Packers to go 3-and-out, the Cards took over at their own 27 with 7:58 to play. Soon they faced a 4th-and-1 at the AZ48 with 5:58 to go and went for it. However, GB stopped a QB sneak short and the Cards turned it over on downs. Soon, the Packers had their own 4th down decision, going for it at the AZ29 and needing 2 yards. They got it on a 14-yard completion to Kraft to the 14 and 3 plays later, Jacobs' 1-yard TD run gave GB a 27-23 lead with 1:50 remaining. After a touchback on the kickoff, AZ took over at its own 35 with 1:50 to go and 2 timeouts. Brissett would get them to the GB27 with :19 left; it was enough time for two throws to the end zone but neither was successful and the Cards fell 27-23.

In a week 9 Monday Night showdown in Dallas, the Cardinals came off their bye to face an explosive Cowboys team that was averaging an NFL-best 41.3 points per game at home in 2025. In an outstanding effort, the Arizona D allowed just 10 points, recorded 3 takeaways and notched 5 sacks - two each for Josh Sweat and Calais Campbell and one from rookie D-lineman Walter Nolen III, the team's first-round pick who was dominant in his NFL debut after returning from a calf injury. He was one of several rookies who had standout efforts in the win. Offensively, the team was led by QB Jacoby Brissett who started his 3rd straight in place of Kyler Murray (foot). The veteran completed 21 of 31 passes for 261 yards with 2 passing TDs, a rushing TD and no turnovers. His most frequent target was WR Marvin Harrison, Jr. who had a career-best 7 catches for 96 yards and a score (6-80-1 in the first half alone). The collective effort resulted in a 27-17 victory that snapped a streak that had seen the Cardinals drop 5 straight games by 13 total points, including the first 3 on walk-off field goals.

The Cowboys opened the game on offense and had the first crack at points. They quickly moved to the AZ7 in 6 plays before Arizona's defense stiffened, first with a 2-yard tackle for loss by Nolen followed by a 3rd down pass break-up by CB Garrett Williams that set-up a 4th-n-goal at the 4. The Cowboys went for it but turned it over on downs when Sweat sacked Dak Prescott back to the 11. Arizona's offense then embarked on a long drive (15 plays, 60 yards) that saw it convert four 3rd downs, including a pair of long ones on Harrison catches of 18 and 15 yards. That series ended with Chad Ryland's 48-yard FG that made it 3-0. After the AZ defense forced a 3-n-out, the offense took over at the DAL47 but soon faced a 3rd-n-14. Brissett again found Harrison, this time for 20 to move the sticks on the last snap of the first quarter. Four plays later, the Cards had it at the DAL4 and on 1st-and-goal, Harrison put an ankle-breaking move on the Dallas defender at the line of scrimmage and Brissett hit him for an easy TD that made it 10-0. The ensuing Cowboys drive advanced into AZ territory but LB Mack Wilson forced a fumble at the end of a catch and run by TE Jake Ferguson and S Budda Baker recovered. Dallas would keep the Cards from capitalizing and forced a punt. On it, DE Sam Williams came up the middle and blocked it back into the end zone where fellow DE Marshawn Kneeland recovered in the end zone for a TD. Undeterred by the momentum swing, Brissett and the Cardinals answered right back by moving 74 yards in 11 plays. On 2nd -n-goal from the 1, Brissett called it own number and plunged across the goal line for a TD that made it 17-7 with 0:49 left in the half. That was enough time for Prescott to move into position for an NFL-record tying FG try of 68 yards by Brandon Aubrey but the attempt was wide left.

The Cards exploded out of the second half gate. On the first play from scrimmage Brissett hit WR Michael Wilson with a 50-yard pass play to the DAL24 and on the next snap RB Bam Knight raced 19 yards to the 7. A penalty - one of just two marched off all night on the Cards - pushed it to the 12 but it didn't matter. Brissett found TE Trey McBride in the end zone for a 12-yard TD that put AZ up 24-7. The next Cowboys drive saw them advance to earn a 1st-n-goal at the AZ5 but another Sweat sack resulted in a 10-yard loss and Aubrey's 26-yard FG cut it to 14. With 2:31 left in the 3rd, Ryland's 34-yard FG increased the AZ lead to 27-10. On the opening play of the 4th quarter, the Cowboys had it at the AZ21. Down 17 they chose to go for it on 4th-n-3 but rookie CB Denzel Burke broke up a pass intended for WR CeeDee Lamb and AZ took over on downs. After a Cardinals punt, Dallas started its next possession at its own 22 with 12:52 left. In hurry-up mode, the Cowboys moved 78 yards in 7 plays, capping the drive with a 5-yard Prescott TD pass to WR Ryan Flournoy. That score made it a 10-point game with 10:51 to play. With 4:46 remaining, Dallas again had the ball and faced a 3rd-n-12 at the AZ37; RB Javonte Williams caught a short pass from Prescott before rookie LB Cody Simon raked the ball out and LB Akeem Davis Gaither recovered. The AZ offense would take a little more than two minutes off the clock before Dallas got the ball back at its own 37 with 2:31 left. Two Campbell sacks in the span of 3 plays backed the Cowboys into a 4th-n-28 and Burke iced the game with his first career INT.

The Cardinals headed into a week 10 tilt at Seattle coming off a Monday night win at Dallas and looking to even the season series with the 6-2 Seahawks. Arizona's defense was without its signal-caller, LB Mack Wilson, Sr. and two starting cornerbacks, Will Johnson and Max Melton while the offense was again led by QB Jacoby Brissett, who started his 4th straight game following a foot injury to Kyler Murray. The Seahawks would jump out early with four TDs in the game's first 16 minutes, including a pair of eerily similar defensive scores. Despite trailing 38-7 at halftime, the Cardinals continued to fight and outscored Seattle 15-6 after intermission. TE Trey McBride was the game's leading receiver with 7 catches for 127 yards and a TD; it was his 4th straight game with a receiving TD and 11-straight with at least 5 receptions. Brissett's 2 TD passes gave him the most by any Cardinals QB in his first 4 starts (8) and CB Denzel Burke became the first Cardinals rookie with INTs in consecutive games since Corey Chavous in 1998.

The Seahawks started their scoring on the game's opening series when they advanced to the AZ43 in 6 plays; on first down from there, QB Sam Darnold went deep down the left side to WR Jaxon Smith-Njigba who hauled it in at the goal-line for a TD. On the 3rd play of the ensuing drive, Brissett went back to pass on 2nd-n-11 at the AZ 33. His arm was hit while throwing by LB Tyrice Knight, forcing a fumble that fellow LB DeMarcus Lawrence scooped up and returned 34 yards for a touchdown to make it 14-0 with 9:22 remaining in the first quarter. The next Seahawks possession saw them move 81 yards in 9 plays and RB George Holani scored on a 9-yard run to make it 21-0 late in the first. History would repeat itself on the next Arizona offensive possession when it faced a 3rd-n-12 at its own 41; in a duplication of the earlier play, Knight hit Brissett's arm in the pocket and Lawrence again scooped it for a TD, this one from 22 yards out to make it 28-0. The Seahawks faced a 3rd-m-4 at their own 30 early in the next drive when Darnold found WR Cooper Kupp for a 67-yard catch-n-run to the 3. That set up RB Zach Charbonnet's 6-yard TD run that made it 35-0 with 8:33 to go in the 2nd. The Cardinals marched deep into Seattle territory on the next possession and ultimately faced a 4th-n-goal at the 1 but were stopped short on a Bam Knight run. Two plays later, however, LB Zaven Collins recovered a fumbled QB-center exchange, giving the offense the ball back at the 3. WR Greg Dortch took a direct snap and ran it in from 4 yards out to make it 35-7. Seattle kicker Jason Myers would connect from 46 yards out with 1:37 left in the first half to make it a 38-7 game at intermission.

Arizona's opening drive of the 3rd quarter reached the Seattle 2 but an incompletion on 4th-n-goal from there turned it over on downs. On the very next snap, however, Burke picked off a Darnold pass to give the ball back to the offense at the 19. Three plays later, McBride hauled in a pass from Brissett and took it into the end zone for a 15-yard score. That and Marvin Harrison, Jr.'s catch for a 2-point conversion made it 38-15 with 8:42 left in the 3rd. It remained that way until Myers' 32-yard FG early in the 4th again increased Seattle's lead. Brissett's 9-yard TD completion to Harrison capped an 8-play, 84-yard drive and it was 41-22 with 9:50 to go. Myers' 3rd FG of the day – this one from 34 yards with 5:31 remaining – provided the game's final points in a game that dropped Arizona to 3-6 and improved Seattle to 7-2.
