FORMER 49ERS

- Raiders **Head Coach Pete Carroll** was the defensive coordinator for the 49ers for two seasons (1995-96), leading the league in total defense in 1995.
- **OC Chip Kelly** served as the head coach of the 49ers in 2016. He saw them improve from the league's 21st-ranked rushing attack in 2015 (1,544 yards) to the fourth-best rushing offense in 2016 (2,019 yards) as RB Carlos Hyde rushed for 988 yards in just 13 contests (76.0 yards per game).
- **QBs Greg Olson** entered the NFL as quarterbacks coach for the 49ers in 2001. That season, QB Jeff Garcia threw for a career-high 32 touchdown passes while posting a career-best 94.8 passer rating and 62.7 completion percentage.
- **Pass Game Coord./DBs Joe Woods** served the same role for the 49ers in 2019, who won the NFC Championship and had an appearance in Super Bowl LIV. Under Woods, San Francisco held opponents to 169.2 passing yards per game, the best mark in the NFL in 2019 and the lowest total allowed by an NFL team in a single season since 2009.
- **Sr. Offensive Asst. Bob Bicknell** served as the wide receivers coach under Chip Kelly for the 49ers in 2016.
- **Asst. ST Derius Swinton II** got his first opportunity as a special teams coordinator with the San Francisco 49ers in 2016. Swinton helped improve the 49ers kickoff coverage from the 25th fewest average return yards allowed to the fifth fewest return yards allowed in the NFL.
- **RB Raheem Mostert** spent six years with the 49ers (2016-21), where he appeared in 46 games with nine starts and rushed for 1,610 yards (5.7 yards per rush) and 11 touchdowns. Also caught 36 passes for 361 yards and three touchdowns. Against the Green Bay Packers in the NFC Championship, Mostert ran for 220 yards and four touchdowns, propelling them to an appearance in Super Bowl LIV.

PETE CARROLL

Pete Carroll was named Head Coach of the Las Vegas Raiders by Owner Mark Davis on Jan. 25, 2025, pairing one of the most accomplished and respected coaches in pro football history with the iconic NFL franchise. Carroll, whose storied coaching career has spanned the past five decades, joins the Silver and Black following 14 seasons as the most successful head coach in Seattle Seahawks history, a tenure that came at the heels of a dynastic nine-year run in the college ranks at USC.

Carroll's overall NFL head coaching record is 170-120-1 (.586) in the regular season and 11-11 in the postseason. In his 18 years of NFL head coaching, his 181 combined wins are the 16th-most in NFL history. Carroll guided the Seahawks to back-to-back Super Bowl appearances and a Super Bowl XLVIII victory following the 2013 season. His career as an NFL head coach has also included posts with the New York Jets (1994) and the New England Patriots (1997-99).

In his tenure as head coach in Seattle from 2010-23, Carroll helped construct the best teams in franchise history with a 137-89-1 record, two Super Bowl appearances, 10-plus wins in five consecutive seasons (2012-16) for the first time in franchise history, and five NFC West Division titles.

Seattle reached the postseason in 10 of Carroll's 14 seasons as coach, advanced to the divisional round seven times, won two NFC Championships and one Super Bowl, while claiming the No. 1 seed in the NFC twice. Under Carroll's watch, Seattle led the NFL in scoring defense for four-consecutive seasons from 2012-15, becoming the first defense in the Super Bowl era to accomplish that feat.

In 2023, Carroll's final campaign on the Seattle sidelines, the Seahawks posted the team's 11th season with a winning record in 12 years.

Carroll has been successful in establishing a winning culture behind a philosophy of team growth through competition with a strong emphasis on protecting the football. This was evident with Seattle returned to the postseason in 2022 as the NFC's seventh seed with a 9-8 record in the regular season. Seattle needed to win its final two games to join the playoff field, and the Seahawks were successful, helping Carroll become the ninth head coach in NFL history to make the playoffs in 12 different seasons.

The 2021 campaign was an uncharacteristic one for Seattle, as the Seahawks missed the postseason for the first time since 2017. However, after a disappointing 3-8 start, Carroll's Seahawks finished strong, rattling off four wins in their final six games, helped by the emergence of Seattle's running game, finishing the season with 1,056 rushing yards since Week 13, most in the NFL. Seattle scored 30 or more points in each of those wins.

In a year impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 Seahawks concluded the season with a 12-4 record and as champions of the NFC West. It was the 11th division title in franchise history and fifth under Carroll, tying Mike Holmgren for the most by a Seattle head coach. It was the 14th time in 18 seasons that Seattle qualified for the postseason and ninth time in Carroll's 11 seasons as head coach. The Seahawks scored a franchise-record 459 points while winning 12 or more games for the fifth time in club history.

Carroll's 2019 team held a 10-2 record through the first three quarters of the season but despite an uncharacteristic 1-3 mark to finish the year secured the no. 5 seed in the NFC playoffs, winning the Wild Card Game and advancing to the Divisional Round for the seventh time in the last 10 seasons. Posting a franchise-best 7-1 road record, Seattle reached 10 wins for the seventh time in eight seasons, something accomplished only five times in franchise history from 1976-2011. The Seahawks became the second team in NFL history to win 10 one-score games in a single season, joining the 1978 Oilers (10-6 record) and Carroll earned his 100th regular season win in franchise history, extending his own franchise record.

The 2018 Seahawks exceeded some expectations as they won 10 games for the sixth time in seven seasons and advanced to the Wild Card playoffs. After a 4-5 start to the season, Seattle became the 28th team with a losing record after nine games to advance to the postseason, scoring the second-most points in franchise history (428) and leading the NFL with a rushing attack that accumulated 2,560 yards, the third-most in franchise history, marking the top-three rushing seasons all under Carroll (2012, 2014, 2018).

Seattle concluded the 2017 season with a 9-7 record and a second place finish in the NFC West. Despite significant injuries on the defensive side of the ball and missing its top-two running backs, Seattle entered the final-quarter of the season with an 8-4 record and remained in the hunt for an NFC West.

The Seahawks won the 10th division title in franchise history in 2016 with a 10-5-1 record. Seattle's defense finished in the top five for the fifth consecutive season (2012-16), an impressive feat during an era of unprecedented scoring and yardage numbers in NFL history. Seattle's NFL-record streak of not losing by more than 10 points in 85 regular season games (95 games including playoffs) ended at Green Bay (12/11/16), and its NFL-record streak of 88 regular season games (98 games including playoffs) where it has led or been within one score in the fourth quarter came to an end at Tampa Bay (11/27/16).



After beginning the 2015 season 0-2, 2-4 and 4-5, the Seahawks became the 22nd team with a losing record after nine games to advance to the postseason, winning six of their last seven games to post a 10-6 record and finishing in the top-10 in defense for a franchise-record fifth consecutive season (2011-15). Seattle defeated the Vikings in Minnesota in the Wild Card round before bowing out to Carolina on the road in the divisional round.

Seattle's defense finished 2015 ranked second (291.8 ypg) while the offense ranked fourth in the NFL (378.6 ypg), setting the franchise-record with 6,058 yards. It was the fourth time in franchise history, the first since 2005, with a top-five offense.

The team won its ninth division title in club history in 2014, third under Carroll, after winning the NFC West with a 12-4 record. Seattle fell to New England, 28-24, in Super Bowl XLIX in Glendale, Ariz., in a season that saw it begin 3-3 but finish the season with a 9-1 record and the No. 1 seed in the NFC for the second consecutive season.

The Seahawks also became the fourth team in NFL history to lead the league in the fewest points and yards allowed in back-to-back seasons (2013-14), and first since the 1985-86 Chicago Bears. The Seahawks led the league in defense for the second straight year while the offense had the No. 1-ranked rushing attack with a franchise-record 2,762 yards and ranked in the top-10 in offense (ninth overall) for the first time since the 2007 season.

In 2013, Carroll led Seattle to its first Super Bowl title in franchise history with a resounding 43-8 victory over the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XLVIII in New York/New Jersey on February 2, 2014, after a franchise-best 13-3 regular season record, and joined Jimmy Johnson and Barry Switzer as the only coaches to win a college football national title and a Super Bowl in their career.

Carroll and Seattle General Manager John Schneider constructed one of the best defenses in the last 12 years at the time, leading them to the NFL title. The Seahawks defense ranked first overall in the NFL in total defense (273.6 ypg), passing defense (172.0 ypg), points allowed (14.4 ppg), takeaways (39), interceptions (28), turnover differential (+20) and opponent quarterback rating (63.4).

The youngest Super Bowl-winning roster in NFL history (26 years, 162 days) was led by second-year QB Russell Wilson, who became the third youngest quarterback to win the title game (25 years, 65 days).

In 2012, Carroll led Seattle to the NFC Divisional Playoff, posting the fourth-best record in franchise history (11-5). Seattle won its first post-season road game since 1983 with a Wild Card Game victory at Washington.

One of the youngest teams in the NFL to end the season for the second-consecutive year (second overall, third-youngest defensive starters, fourth-youngest offensive starters), Seattle started 4-4 but went on to finish the season 7-1 led by the rookie Wilson and the league's fourth-ranked defense, that also led the league allowing 245 points (15.3 ppg).

Carroll's 2011 squad also ranked as one of the youngest in the NFL,

beginning the season with the second-youngest roster in Week 1, once having the third-youngest offensive line during the season and ending the year with the second-youngest starting defensive unit in the league.

He saw his 2011 defense improve weekly, ending the season ranked ninth in the league in total defense, just the sixth time Seattle had boasted a top-10 defense and first since 1997. His offense switched gears from a quick strike, no-huddle group to a grind-it-out ground game led by RB Marshawn Lynch over the last half of the season. That offensive mentality helped Seattle rank fifth in the NFL with 1,212 rush yards over the last nine games of the season.

Always competing, the Seahawks jumped out to a 4-2 record to begin the 2010 season and parlayed that into the club's fifth NFC West title in the past seven seasons, punctuating the season with a 41-36 victory over the defending Super Bowl Champion New Orleans Saints at Lumen Field in the Wild Card Game.

Carroll returned to the NFL after spending nine years (2001-09) as head coach at USC, where he won seven consecutive Pac-10 titles (2002-08), two national championships (2003-04) and led the Trojans to a 97-19 (.836) record. He reached a bowl in each of his nine seasons and won seven of those contests. His 88 victories from 2001 to 2008 tied Bob Pruett of Marshall for most by a Division I coach in their first eight seasons since 1900 (Penn's George Woodruff - 102). He reached 50 career USC wins faster than any head coach in Trojans history. From 2002-08, his teams appeared in an NCAA-record seven consecutive BCS bowls, recorded at least 11 victories seven times (an NCAA record) and finished ranked in the AP top-four each year. USC was the AP's No. 1 team for a national-record 33 straight polls (including two preseason polls) and was ranked in the AP Top-10 for a school-record 63 consecutive games. His teams were ranked in the AP Top-25 for 102 consecutive games, a school record. In 2009, he was named Coach of the Decade by Lindy's.



Also under Carroll, USC was the first school to have three Heisman Trophy winners in a four-year span (QB Carson Palmer, QB Matt Leinart, RB Reggie Bush). He also coached winners of the Walter Camp, Chuck Bednarik, Johnny Unitas, Doak Walker and John Mackey Awards. Carroll produced 34 All-American first-teamers and 53 NFL draft picks (including 14 first rounders, with a No. 1 selection in Palmer and a No. 2 pick in Bush). His USC program had the nation's most draftees in 2006, 2008 and 2009.

USC posted a 12-1 record in 2008 and advanced to its fourth consecutive Rose Bowl, defeating Penn State, 38-24, to become the first team to win three straight Rose Bowls. In the polls, the Trojans finished ranked second by USA Today and third by AP. USC finished first in scoring defense (9.8 ppg, its finest in 41 years), surrendering just 14 touchdowns in 2008.

In 2007, USC went 11-2 and finished second in the USA Today poll and third in the AP poll, for its sixth-straight AP Top-4 ranking. USC's 49-17 win over Illinois in the Rose Bowl equaled the most points ever in the bowl game. Five players were named All-American first-team selections.

USC posted an 11-2 mark in 2006, finished No. 4 in the final polls and shared the Pac-10 title at 7-2 to capture an unprecedented fifth straight conference crown. Five Trojans were All-American first-teamers and Carroll was named the Pac-10 Coach of the Year for the third time.

Carroll's Trojans held AP's No. 1 ranking for the entire regular season in 2005. USC went 12-1 overall to advance to the BCS Championship Game in the Rose Bowl. The Trojans, who finished second in both polls, boasted a school-record six All-American first-team selections, including Heisman Trophy-winning tailback Bush. He was the 2005 Pac-10 Co-Coach of the Year, as well as the American Football Coaches Association Division I-A Region 5 Coach of the Year.

In 2004, he guided No. 1-ranked USC to its second consecutive national championship with a convincing win over Oklahoma in the BCS Championship Game in the Orange Bowl. USC became only the second team ever to hold its AP preseason No. 1 ranking all the way through a season. It was only the 10th time that a team won back-to-back AP crowns. His team was 13-0, setting a program record for wins, and went 8-0 in the Pac-10. A school-record six Trojans were named All-American first-team.

In 2003, the Trojans won the AP national championship, its first national crown since 1978, and entered the Rose Bowl also ranked No. 1 in the USA Today/ESPN poll. USC was 12-1 overall and finished the season ranked second. USC's 534 points set a Pac-10 record. Five Trojans were first-team All-Americans. Carroll was named the 2003 American Football Coaches Association Division I-A Coach of the Year, Home Depot National Coach of the Year, Maxwell Club College Coach of the Year, ESPN.com National Coach of the Year, Pigskin Club of Washington D.C. Coach of the Year and All-American Football Foundation Frank Leahy Co-Coach of the Year. He also was named the Pac-10 Co-Coach of the Year.

In 2002, USC posted its first 11-win season since 1979 and obtained its highest ranking (No. 4) since 1988. Heisman Trophy-winning QB Palmer and S Troy Polamalu were named first-team All-Americans.

Carroll was named USC's head football coach on December 15, 2000, and in his first season, led the Trojans to the Las Vegas Bowl and a 6-6 record.

Carroll began his NFL career as defensive backs coach for Buffalo (1984) and Minnesota (1985-89) before becoming the New York Jets' defensive coordinator (1990-93) and head coach (1994). He spent two years as San Francisco's defensive coordinator (1995-96), leading the league in total defense in 1995, before leading New England to a 27-21 record and two playoff appearances as head coach (1997-99).

Carroll spent the 2000 season as a consultant for pro and college teams, doing charitable work for the NFL and writing a column on pro football for CNN.com.

He began his coaching career at the collegiate level, serving as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Pacific, for three years (1974-76), working with the wide receivers and secondary. He then spent a season as a graduate assistant working with the secondary at Arkansas (1977) under Lou Holtz, helping the Razorbacks win the 1978 Orange Bowl, and then a season each as an assistant in charge of the secondary at Iowa State (1978) and at Ohio State (1979). He spent the following three seasons (1980-82) as the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at North Carolina State, before returning to Pacific in 1983 as the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator.

Carroll was a two-time (1971-72) All-Pacific Coast Conference free safety at Pacific and earned his bachelor's degree in business administration in 1973. He received his secondary teaching credential and master's degree in physical education from Pacific in 1976. He was inducted into the Pacific Athletic Hall of Fame in 1995. In May of 2022, Carroll received an honorary doctorate degree from the university.

He was a three-sport (football, basketball and baseball) standout at Redwood High School in Larkspur, Calif., earning the school's Athlete of the Year award as a senior. He played quarterback, wide receiver and defensive back on the football team. He was inducted into the inaugural Redwood High School Athletic Hall of Fame in 2009. He then played football at Marin Junior College in Kentfield, Calif., from 1969-70 before transferring to Pacific.

KYLE SHANAHAN

Kyle Shanahan was named the 20th head coach of the San Francisco 49ers on February 6, 2017. Shanahan signed a multi-year contract extension with the 49ers in September of 2023. Shanahan again led a top offense in 2024 by directing a unit that finished in the top five in the NFL in yards per game (376.3 - fourth) for the fifth time in his tenure with the 49ers. The 49ers defense wrapped up the 2024 season with the fifth-ranked passing defense (192.8) and eighth-ranked total defense (317.4) in the NFL.

The 2023 San Francisco 49ers finished the season with a 12-5 record, starting the season 5-0 and winning seven of their last nine games. Shanahan led his team to its second-consecutive NFC West title, the number one seed throughout the NFC playoffs, third-consecutive NFC Championship Game and the eighth Super Bowl appearance in franchise history. The 49ers boasted one of the most potent offenses in the NFL in 2023, finishing with top-five marks in total offense (398.4), scoring offense (28.9), rushing yards per game (140.5) and passing yards per game (257.9). The 49ers offense registered 491 total points and 6,773 total yards in 2023, both of which were the second-highest single-season marks in franchise history.

Shanahan and the 2022 49ers finished with a 13-4 regular season record, including wins in each of their last 10 games and a NFC West title. San Francisco earned a berth in the NFC Championship Game following a pair of home playoff game victories over the Seattle Seahawks and Dallas Cowboys.

In 2021, Shanahan led the 49ers to their second trip to the NFC Championship in three seasons (2019). San Francisco's offense finished the season averaging 127.4 rushing yards, ranking seventh in the NFL. TE George Kittle ranked second on the team with 71 receptions for 910 yards and six touchdowns while earning a trip to the Pro Bowl. The 49ers defense ranked third in the NFL in 2021, allowing 310.0 total yards per game. San Francisco also was sixth in the NFL, surrendering 206.5 passing yards per game. San Francisco saw eight different players record an interception on the season, as CB Emmanuel Moseley finished with a career-high 11 passes defended and one interception. The Niners forced 22 fumbles on defense in 2021, the most in the NFL and the most in a single season by the 49ers since 1994.

The 2020 San Francisco 49ers defense allowed 314.4 yards per game, ranking fifth in the NFL, while allowing just 207.9 passing yards per game, which ranked fourth in the league. On the ground, the defense allowed 12 rushing touchdowns on the season, which was tied for the fourth-fewest in the NFL. San Francisco's defense also ranked fourth in the NFL in 3rd-down defense (35.5 percent allowed) and three-and-out drives forced (41).

In 2019, he was named Coach of the Year by Sporting News and NFC Coach of the Year by the Committee of 101 after leading the 49ers to a 13-3 regular season record, the NFC West Division Title and an appearance in Super Bowl LIV. San Francisco's nine-win improvement from 2018 to 2019 was the largest win improvement from one season to the next in franchise history. The 49ers became one of three teams since the NFL switched to a 12-team playoff format in 1990 to finish 4-12 or worse one season followed by earning the number one seed in its conference the next season (1999 St. Louis Rams & 2016 Dallas Cowboys).

San Francisco's offense in 2019 ranked first in the NFL in rushing touchdowns (23), second in points per game (29.9) and rushing yards per game (144.1) and fourth in total offense (381.1 yards per game). The 49ers finished the regular season with 479 total points, tied for the second-most in franchise history and the most since 1994 (505). San Francisco also had 13 different players with at least one touchdown reception on the season, which tied the NFL record for the most players with a touchdown reception in a single season.

On the defensive side of the ball, the 49ers ranked second in the NFL in total yards allowed per game (281.8), the fewest total yards allowed per game by the team since 1997 (250.8). San Francisco ranked first in the NFL in passing yards allowed per game (169.2), the fewest passing yards allowed per game in the NFL since 2009 (NYJ - 153.7). It marked the first time San Francisco led the NFL in passing yards allowed per game since 1987 (165.6). The 49ers ranked tied for second in the NFL in third-down percentage allowed (33.3) and tied for fifth in the NFL in sacks (48.0), the most by the team in a single season since 1998 (51.0). San Francisco also ranked seventh in both opponent completion percentage (61.3) and opponent quarterback rating (83.0).

During his second season at the helm of the 49ers, the 2018 team overcame adversity early in the season after top free agent acquisition RB Jerick McKinnon tore his ACL prior to Week 1, as did starting QB Jimmy Garoppolo in Week 3, putting an end to both of their seasons. Following injuries to both Garoppolo and QB C.J. Beathard, undrafted QB Nick Mullens was able to fill the void and excel for San Francisco's offense after being promoted to the active roster from the team's practice squad on September 26.

In his first season as head coach, Shanahan led the team to a 6-10 record, which was a four-game improvement from the previous year. After a difficult stretch to start the season, the 49ers won six of their final seven

games, including victories in five-straight games to close out the season. With six wins on the season, San Francisco set the NFL record for the most wins by a team in NFL history that started 0-9. The 49ers closed the season as one of the hottest teams in the NFL, posting a perfect 5-0 record in December. San Francisco was the only team in the league to have a perfect record over the last month of the regular season as Shanahan became the fourth rookie NFL head coach in franchise history (Buck Shaw - 1950; Frankie Albert - 1956 & George Seifert - 1989), and the first in the NFL since Tony Sparano in 2008, to go undefeated in the month of December.

San Francisco's offense reached new heights under Shanahan in 2017. The 49ers ranked 12th in the NFL, averaging 349.2 yards per game, the highest output by the team since 2012 (361.8 - 11th). The team also finished the year with 3,925 net passing yards, the most in a single season since 2000 (4,239). Over the final six weeks of the season, San Francisco held opponents to an average of 87.7 rushing yards per game while allowing 100 rushing yards just once in that span.

Prior to being named head coach of the 49ers, Shanahan had 15 seasons of coaching experience at the NFL level, including nine as an offensive coordinator for the Atlanta Falcons (2015-16), Cleveland Browns (2014), Washington (2010-13) and Houston Texans (2008-09). In six of his nine seasons as an offensive coordinator (2008-09, 2012-13 and 2015-16), Shanahan directed an offense that ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in yards gained. Following the 2016 season, Shanahan was named Associated Press Assistant Coach of the Year, Coordinator of the Year by Sporting News and Assistant Coach of the Year by the Pro Football Writers of America after a record-setting performance by the Falcons offense en route to capturing the NFC South division title and an appearance in Super Bowl LI. Under Shanahan, the 2016 Falcons set franchise records in yards per game (415.8), points scored (540), net passing yards per game (295.3) and average yards per play (6.7). On the ground, Atlanta averaged 120.5 rushing yards per game and tallied 20 rushing touchdowns in 2016.

In Shanahan's first year in Atlanta, the Falcons offense ranked seventh in the NFL, averaging 374.1 yards per game, ranked sixth with a 273.7 passing yards per game average and led the league in time of possession (32:19) in 2015.

Shanahan joined the Falcons after spending 2014 as offensive coordinator of the Cleveland Browns. That year, his offense averaged 324.6 total yards and 108.0 rushing yards per game. Prior to his stint in Cleveland, Shanahan spent four seasons (2010-13) as offensive coordinator of Washington. In 2013, Washington finished ninth in the NFL in total offense (369.7) and fifth in rushing yards per game (135.3). Washington won the NFC East division championship in 2012 as they became the first team in NFL history to register 3,400-or-more passing yards (3,422) and 2,700-or-more rushing yards (2,709) in the same season. Washington led the NFL, averaging 169.3 rushing yards per game and finished second in rushing touchdowns (22).

In 2011, Shanahan worked with QB Rex Grossman, who finished with the second-best statistical season of his career, having thrown for 3,151 yards, 16 touchdowns and a career-high 57.9 completion percentage. WR Santana Moss also had his best professional season in 2010 under Shanahan, notching a career-high 93 receptions for 1,115 yards and six touchdowns.

Before joining Washington, Shanahan spent four seasons (2006-09) with the Houston Texans, including the final two as the team's offensive coordinator. Shanahan spent his first season with Houston (2006) as the team's wide receivers coach and moved to coach the quarterbacks in 2007 prior to his promotion to offensive coordinator in 2008. He broke into the NFL with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2004 where he served as an offensive quality control coach for two seasons (2004-05). His first coaching experience came as a graduate assistant at UCLA in 2003.

Born December 14, 1979, in Minneapolis, MN, Shanahan played wide receiver at Duke University before transferring to the University of Texas in 2000, where he spent two seasons. He and his wife, Mandy, have three children - Stella, Carter and Lexi. Shanahan's father, Mike, who served as the 49ers offensive coordinator from 1992-94, was the head coach of the Denver Broncos (1995-2008) and Washington (2010-13), where he accumulated an overall win total of 178 victories (eight postseason), including victories in Super Bowls XXXII and XXXIII.

COMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE

The Raiders - who began play in the American Football League in 1960 - are in their 66th year of professional football competition, including the last 55 as a member of the National Football League. In seven memorable decades - the 1960s, '70s, '80s, '90s, 2000s, 2010s and 2020s - the Raiders have been dominant in professional football since Al Davis first pledged in 1963 to build the finest organization in pro sports.

During these decades of dominance, the Raiders have won an AFL championship, four American Football Conference championships, and three World Championships of Professional Football, participated in five Super Bowls, played in 14 championship games, won or tied for 17 division championships, had 23 playoff seasons, finished 38 seasons at .500 or better and played in 45 postseason games.

Pro football's dynamic organization placed first in the AFC West in 2000, 2001 and 2002 despite playing among the toughest schedules in the NFL in each of those seasons. With their appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII, the Raiders became the first NFL team to have had a season end in the Super Bowl in four different decades.

The Raiders are the only team to have been in Super Bowls in the '60s, the '70s, the '80s and the 2000s. The Silver and Black are the only AFC team - and one of just two NFL teams - to have a season that advanced to the conference championship game in the '60s, the '70s, the '80s, the '90s and the 2000s.

The Raiders are one of only three original AFL teams to have captured three World Championships of Professional Football with Super Bowl victories. The Raiders are one of only five AFC teams to have won more than one Super Bowl since 1980. In their five Super Bowl appearances, the Raiders have been led by four head coaches and started four quarterbacks.

Since 1963, when Al Davis first took over the failing Oakland franchise that had struggled to win only nine of 42 league games in the initial three seasons of the new AFL and pledged to build the finest organization in sports, the Raiders have dominated professional football in terms of consistent victory. During the memorable 65 years in Oakland, Los Angeles and now Las Vegas, the Raiders have won 509 league games, tied 11 and lost 480. "Commitment to Excellence" has never been an idle phrase to those who have proudly represented the Raiders organization as shown by their domination of pro football.


Thirty of the great players who proudly wore the Silver and Black, as well as Owner-Leader Al Davis and legendary Head Coach John Madden, have been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The Raiders have also produced six Coaches of the Year. In addition, 102 Pro Bowl players have earned 284 Pro Bowl selections representing the Silver and Black.

Another innovation came to professional football in 1970 - Monday Night Football. The Raiders' domination of this prime-time television series has seen the Silver and Black build a 43-33-1 record in Monday night play. The Raiders won 12 games at home to begin this series and are 21-10-0 at home in the 55 years of Monday Night Football.

Through the seven decades of pro football competition, the Raiders have had the greatest players, the greatest coaches, the greatest plays and participated in the greatest games in the annals of professional sports. Challengers to Raider domination of professional football will arise as they have in the '60s, '70s, '80s, '90s and the new millennium. The Raider organization will continue to meet these challenges.

In addition, the Raiders are proud to contribute to community engagement, youth initiatives, multicultural awareness, and global outreach. The Raiders played in Oakland from their inception through 1982, relocated to Los Angeles in 1983, moved back to Oakland in 1995, and made Las Vegas home in 2020.

The Raiders base training and business operations in Henderson, Nevada at Intermountain Health Performance Center and play home games at Allegiant Stadium, a fully enclosed, state-of-the-art facility located adjacent to the world-famous Las Vegas Strip. The Raiders maintain an international presence and communicate with the worldwide Raider Nation through the team's official website and social media channels.



HE WAS ALSO INTEGRAL IN THE SIGNINGS OF KEY FREE AGENTS C RYAN JENSEN, LB SHAQ BARRETT, DT NDAMUKONG SUH, QB TOM BRADY AND QB BAKER MAYFIELD, WHILE HELPING TRADE FOR DE JASON PIERRE-PAUL AND TE ROB GRONKOWSKI. THE BUCCANEERS WERE THE ONLY TEAM IN THE NFL TO HAVE MULTIPLE DRAFT PICKS SELECTED TO THE ALL-ROOKIE TEAM IN CONSECUTIVE SEASONS FROM 2019-20. IN 2021, TAMPA BAY WAS ABLE TO RETURN ALL 22 STARTERS FROM THE SUPER BOWL LV CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM, BECOMING THE FIRST TO DO SO IN THE SALARY CAP ERA.

PRIOR TO JOINING THE BUCCANEERS, SPYTEK SPENT THREE SEASONS WITH THE DENVER BRONCOS, WHERE HE WORKED AS SOUTHWEST AREA SCOUT IN 2013 AND AS A NATIONAL SCOUT FROM 2014-15. THE BRONCOS' 37 REGULAR SEASON AND 42 OVERALL WINS WERE THE MOST IN THE NFL OVER THAT THREE-YEAR SPAN, CULMINATING IN A SUPER BOWL 50 VICTORY FOLLOWING THE 2015 SEASON. BEFORE JOINING THE BRONCOS, SPYTEK SPENT THREE SEASONS (2010-12) AS THE CLEVELAND BROWNS' DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE SCOUTING. WHILE WITH THE BROWNS, SPYTEK ASSISTED IN DRAFTING SIX PLAYERS WHO EARNED PFW/PFWA ALL-ROOKIE TEAM HONORS AND FIVE PLAYERS WHO WERE SELECTED TO A PRO BOWL.

SPYTEK BEGAN HIS PLAYER PERSONNEL CAREER WORKING AS AN INTERN WITH THE PHILADELPHIA EAGLES IN 2005, EARNING A FULL-TIME COLLEGE SCOUTING ASSISTANT POSITION IN 2006 AND SPENDING THREE YEARS AS A COLLEGE/PRO SCOUT FROM 2007-09. HIS FIRST JOB IN THE NFL WAS AS AN OPERATIONS INTERN WITH THE DETROIT LIONS IN 2004.

A NATIVE OF PEWAUKEE, WISC., SPYTEK PLAYED LINEBACKER AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN FROM 1999-2002, EARNING A BACHELOR'S DEGREE IN GENERAL STUDIES AND A MASTER'S IN SPORTS MANAGEMENT.



- With 1,000 receiving yards, Bowers would become the first tight end in NFL history to start his career with back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons.
- With 75 receptions, Bowers would become just the 12th player in NFL history – the first tight end – to record 75+ receptions in each of his first two seasons.
- With 100 receptions, Bowers would become the first player in NFL history to record 100+ receptions in each of his first two seasons.
- With five receiving touchdowns, Bowers would become just the 15th tight end in NFL history to record 5+ receiving touchdowns in each of his first two seasons.
- With three games of 100+ yards in 2025, Bowers would become just the sixth tight end in NFL history to record five games of 100+ receiving yards in his first two NFL seasons.
- With one game of 10+ receptions Bowers would become the first player in NFL history to record five games of 10+ receptions in his first two seasons in the NFL.
- With 85 receptions, Bowers would pass Justin Jefferson (196), Amon-Ra St. Brown (196) and Michael Thomas (196) for the most receptions in NFL history by a player in their first two seasons.



DANIEL CARLSON

- With 30 made field goals in 2025, Carlson would notch his fifth career season with 30+ made field goals, tied for the second most of such seasons in NFL history – only behind Justin Tucker (9). Carlson would be one of seven kickers in NFL history with five seasons of 30+ makes.
- With 100+ points scored in 2025, Carlson would notch his sixth consecutive season of 100+ points. He would become one of 24 kickers in NFL history to record six-straight seasons of 100+ points.
- With eight makes of 50+ yards, Carlson would reach 40 made field goals of 50+ yards in his career. He would become one of 15 kickers in the NFL since 2000 to accomplish the feat.
- With above an 80.0 field goal percentage, Carlson would notch his seventh career season making 80.0% of his field goals (min. 10 attempts). He would become one of 11 kickers in NFL history to make at least 80.0% of his field goals in seven of his first eight NFL seasons (min. 10 attempts) – trailing only Justin Tucker (eight).
- With 96 points scored in 2025, Carlson will pass Dan Bailey (927) for the 10th most points scored in NFL history among kickers in their first eight NFL seasons.
- With 24 made field goals, Carlson will pass Wil Lutz (226) for the second most field goals made by a kicker in their first eight seasons in NFL history – only trailing Justin Tucker (265).
- With 68 points in 2025, Carlson will become the 16th kicker in NFL history to reach 900 points in his first eight NFL seasons.
- With 125 points, Carlson would post his fifth season with 125+ points, tied for the nine most of such season in NFL history.
- With 140 points, Carlson would notch his third career season with 140+ points, tied for the third most of such season in NFL history among kickers. He would be one of only five kickers in NFL history to have three or more seasons of 140+ points.

- With 73 tackles in 2025, Chinn would reach 500 career tackles, becoming one of 24 defensive backs in the NFL since 1987 to reach 500 tackles in his first six NFL seasons.

Among defensive backs in their first six NFL seasons, his four 100-tackle seasons would be tied for the third most in NFL history (since 1987) – one of just 11 defensive backs in the NFL since 1987 with 100+ tackles in four of his first six seasons.
- With six tackles for loss, Chinn would become one of 25 defensive backs in the NFL since 1999 to record 25+ tackles for loss in his first six NFL seasons.
- With three games of 10+ tackles in 2025, Chinn would own 15 career games with 10+ tackles. He would be one of seven defensive backs in the NFL since 2020 to record 15 games with 10+ tackles in his first six seasons.



AJ COLE

- If Cole averages at least 50.0 yards per punt in 2025, he will notch his fourth career season averaging over 50.0 yards per punt (min. 50 punts). His four seasons would be the most in NFL history.

- With 15 tackles for loss, Crosby would reach 120 career tackles for loss, one of only four players in the NFL since 1999 to reach 120 tackles for loss in his first seven seasons.
- With 20 tackles for loss, Crosby would notch his third career season with 20+ tackles for loss. Crosby would be one of only four players since 1999 to record 20+ tackles for loss in three of his first seven seasons – trailing only J.J. Watt (four).
- With 15 tackles for loss, Crosby would notch his fifth season with 15+ tackles for loss, joining Aaron Donald (6), Nick Bosa (5) and DeMarcus Ware (5) as the only four players in the NFL since 1999 to record five seasons with 15+ tackles for loss.
- With 10.5 sacks in 2025, Crosby would be one of 30 players in NFL history (since 1982) to reach 70.0 career sacks in his first seven seasons.
- With 36 tackles, Crosby would reach 400 career tackles, becoming one of eight defensive linemen in the NFL since 2000 to reach 400 career tackles in his first seven NFL seasons.
- With 36 tackles and 5.5 sacks, Crosby would become one of only six players in the NFL since 2000 to record 400+ tackles and 65.0+ sacks in his first seven NFL seasons.



JAKOBI MEYERS

- With 800 receiving yards, Meyers would notch his fifth career season with 800+ receiving yards. He would become one of only nine undrafted players in NFL history to record five seasons of 800+ receiving yards.
- With 800 receiving yards, Meyers would notch his fifth career season of 800+ yards, tied for the second most in NFL history among undrafted players in their first seven seasons – only trailing Gary Clark (6).

GENO SMITH




