ARIZONA CARDINALS (2-0) VS. SAN FRANCISCO 49ERS (2-0) Levi's Stadium | September 21, 2025 | 1:25 PM



THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

After taking down the Carolina Panthers last week to improve to 2-0 on the season, the Cardinals hit the road in Week 3 for an NFC West showdown with San Francisco at Levi's Stadium in the 49ers regular season home opener.

Arizona will look to improve to 3-0 in conference play and earn its first division win of the year against a 49ers team that also has a pair of conference wins and, to date, the only division win among NFC West teams.

The 2025 season has seen a solid start for the division. The four teams from the NFC West have a combined 7-1 record through the first two weeks, with the lone loss coming in an intra-division game (49ers over Seahawks in Week 1). The NFC West is the only division that remains unbeaten on the road in 2025 (5-0).

The Cardinals will be looking for their third straight win over the 49ers after sweeping the season series in 2024. Arizona will also look for its second straight win at Levi's Stadium and can improve to 8-4 all-time at the venue with a victory on Sunday.

The last time the Cardinals played at San Francisco - in Week 5 last season - Arizona overcame a 13-point halftime deficit, and a 10-point deficit entering the 4th quarter, to defeat the 49ers 24-23. In that contest, QB **Kyler Murray** threw for 195 yards and a TD while also rushing for 83 yards and a TD on just seven carries. A large chunk of the rushing total came on a 50-yard TD run on the Cardinals second offensive play of the game. Murray has won each of his last two starts at Levi's Stadium and has at least one passing TD and one rushing TDs in all three career starts there.

Last week DL **Calais Campbell** put on a spectacular performance in his return to State Farm Stadium. Playing in his 263rd game he recorded 2.0 fourth quarter sacks for the first time in his career, the second of which came on 4th down on the Panthers final drive to seal the AZ win. This week Campbell will be in a Cardinals uniform at Levi's Stadium for the first time in nearly nine years, when he registered a 2.0-sack performance in helping lead Arizona to a 33-21 victory in Week 5 of the 2016 season.

Arizona follows this week's game with a return home to State Farm Stadium for a Thursday Night matchup with the Seattle Seahawks in its Rivalries game. It is the first in a series of three home games in a four-week span for Arizona.

San Francisco will remain home in Week 4 as they host the Jacksonville Jaguars.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- On Sunday in San Francisco the Cardinals and 49ers will square off in one of just two Week 3 games across the NFL to feature a pair of unbeaten teams (other is Rams @ Eagles).
- Coming off a 2.0 sack performance last week vs. Carolina, DL **Calais Campbell** will face the 49ers as a member of the Cardinals for the first time since Week 10 of the 2016 season. Neither Brock Purdy nor Mac Jones - two possible starters for the 49ers on Sunday - are among the 56 QBs Campbell has sacked in his career.
- In his last outing vs. the 49ers (Week 18 of 2024), QB **Kyler Murray** tied his career high with 4 TD passes. Murray has a 4-4 record in 8 starts vs. San Francisco, with 15 TDs (12 passing; 3 rushing) and just 5 INTs in those contests.
- Stanford alums WR **Michael Wilson** and TE **Elijah Higgins** have played a combined three games at Levi's Stadium since joining the NFL. They combined for 3 TD receptions in those outings.
- In last week's win vs. Carolina, the Cardinals defense had a strip-sack resulting in a TD on the Panthers opening possession and ended the game on a 4th down sack of QB Bryce Young. The unit that finished the contest with 3.0 sacks, 6 tackles for loss, 10 QB hits, an INT, 9 passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery (returned for a TD).
- LB **Zaven Collins** finished last week's game with a tackle, a career-best 4 QB hits and a fumble recovery that he returned 3 yards for his second career TD (other came on a 30-yard INT return vs. Seattle on 11/6/22).
- WR **Greg Dortch** has punt returns of 23 and 29 yards already this season. He had three total punt returns of 20+ yards (49, 27, 23 yards) in 56 games played between 2019-24. Dortch joins Vikings WR Myles Price (20 and 22 yards) as the only players in the NFL this season with multiple punt returns of 20+ yards.

49ERS ROSTER FEATURES ARIZONA PREP STARS

Four current 49ers players are Arizona natives who played high school football in the state.

San Francisco's fourth-year QB **Brock Purdy** - selected by the Niners with the final pick (7th round, 262nd overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft - *is a native of Queen Creek, AZ and attended Perry High School in Gilbert.*

A two-time first-team All-State selection, Purdy was the 2017 Arizona Gatorade Player of the Year as a senior after throwing for 4,405 yards and 57 TDs in leading Perry to the Class 6A state championship game. Both his passing yards and passing TD totals were 6A state records. He also ran for 1,016 yards and 10 TDs that season.

Purdy was honored numerous times by the Cardinals during his prep career:

OTHER 49ERS WHO PLAYED HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL IN ARIZONA

49ers WR **Ricky Pearsall** is a native of Phoenix, AZ and attended Corona Del Sol (Tempe) High School where he set the Arizona High School 6A single-game record for receiving yards with 342 as a junior in 2017. Pearsall also played at Arizona State for three seasons (2019-21).

49ers CB **Chase Lucas** is a native of Chandler, AZ and attended Chandler High School, where he rushed for 2,219 yards and 25 TDs while tallying more than 1,000 receiving yards. He was a member of the school's 2014 state championship squad. Lucas then went on to attend Arizona State, appearing in 53 games over six seasons (2016-21).

49ers WR **Jacob Cowing** (IR) is a Maricopa, AZ native and was a three-year letterman at Maricopa High School, where he hauled in 89 receptions and 21 TDs during his prep career. He then attended the University of Arizona for two seasons (2022-23), setting the single-season program record for receiving TDs (13).

Cardinals Passing Game Coordinator/WRs **Drew Terrell** played four seasons as a WR and punt returner at Stanford (2009-12), earning honorable mention All-Pac 12 honors as a returner three times (2010-12).

GOING FOR WIN #8 AT LEVI'S STADIUM

The Cardinals head to San Francisco this week to take on the 49ers in Arizona's first divisional matchup of the 2025 season. **The Cardinals have had success at Levi's Stadium, posting a 7-4 record at the venue since it opened in 2014.**

QB **Kyler Murray** will make his 4th career road start vs. the 49ers. **He has won each of his last two starts at Levi's Stadium, with 599 total yards (425 passing; 174 rushing) and 4 TDs (2 passing; 2 rushing) in those contests.**

Murray has at least one passing and one rushing TD in all three career starts at Levi's Stadium.

Three pieces of the Cardinals offense - WRs **Michael Wilson** (2018-22) and **Simi Fehoko** (2018-20) and TE **Elijah Higgins** (2019-22) - were standout WRs at Stanford (Higgins switched positions to TE entering the NFL in 2023).

From 2019-20 all three were part of the same WR room. On Sunday the trio will return to the Bay Area as NFL teammates for the first time.

Wilson (2022), Higgins (2022) and Fehoko (2020) each earned All-Pac 12 honors as seniors at Stanford before entering the NFL. Fehoko was a fifth round pick (179th overall) by the Cowboys in 2021. Wilson was drafted by the Cardinals in the third round (84th overall) in 2023 and Higgins was selected by the Dolphins in the sixth round (197th overall) in 2023.

Sunday's game will mark Wilson third at Levi's Stadium with the Cardinals. In the first two he totaled 12 receptions for 154 yards and two TDs. Higgins made his Levi's Stadium debut in Week 4 last season and caught a two-yard TD pass. Fehoko will be making his first-ever visit to Levi's Stadium this week.

CONNER VS. THE NFC WEST

Since joining the Cardinals in 2021, RB **James Conner** has played 19 games against NFC West opponents. **He has 18 TDs in those contests. No player in the NFL has more TDs in division games over the last five seasons.**

MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

DL Calais Campbell

- With 1.0 sack, Campbell (113.5) would pass Sean Jones (113.0) for 25th place on the NFL's all-time sacks list.
- With 2.0 sacks, Campbell would tie J.J. Watt for 24th place on the NFL's all-time sacks list.
- With 2.0 sacks, Campbell would have 2.0+ sacks in back-to-back games for just the second time in his career: 2.0 in Weeks 6-7 of the 2017 season w/ Jax.

QB Kyler Murray

- With 119 passing yards, Murray would join Bills QB Josh Allen (84 games) as the only players in NFL history with 20,000+ passing yards and 3,000+ rushing yards in their first 85 career games. Murray would also join Jim Hart (34,639) and Neil Lomax (22,771) as the only players in franchise history with 20,000+ career passing yards.
- With a rushing TD, Murray would tie RB Stump Mitchell (32) for sixth place on the franchise all-time list for career rushing TDs.
- With 3 TD passes, Murray would have 16 career outings with at least three TD passes. That would surpass Neil Lomax (15) for the most such performances in team history.

WR Marvin Harrison Jr.

- With a TD reception, Harrison (10) would join Larry Fitzgerald (10) as the only players in franchise history with 10+ TD catches in their first 20 career games.

RB James Conner

- With a TD (of any kind), Conner would have seven TDs in seven games vs. the 49ers since joining the Cardinals in 2021.

S Jalen Thompson

- With 10+ tackles, Thompson would have double-digit tackles in back-to-back games for just the second time in his career (Games 15-16 in 2023). It would also give him 10+ tackles in four of his last six games played.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE CARDINALS 2-0 START IN 2025

ARIZONA REMAINS AMONG THE UNBEATEN

The Cardinals earned a 27-22 victory over the visiting Carolina Panthers at State Farm Stadium last week.

With victories over the Saints and Panthers in the first two games, **Arizona has now started a season 2-0 for the first time since 2021.** The Cardinals are one of 10 teams that enter Week 3 at 2-0. Six of those teams are in the NFC, including three in the NFC West.

A win on Sunday at San Francisco would give AZ its first 3-0 start since 2021 and its fifth 3-0 start in the last 51 years (1975-2025).

The Cardinals also started 3-0 in 2015, 2014 and 2012.

The victory over the Panthers was the Cardinals third straight win. Only four teams have longer active winning streaks during the regular season.

CAMPBELL PUTS ON SHOW IN AZ RETURN

Playing his first game for the Cardinals at State Farm Stadium in exactly 8 years, 8 months and 28 days (12/18/16 vs. NO), DL **Calais Campbell totaled five tackles, 2.0 sacks, two tackles for loss and two QB hits against the Panthers last week.**

His second sack came on the Panthers final offensive play as he took down QB Bryce Young on 4th-n-15 from the AZ 38-yard line with just 0:26 remaining, securing the Arizona victory.

With 2.0 sacks last Sunday, Campbell now has 112.5 sacks in his career. Of those, 58.5 have come as a member of the Cardinals. **It also gives Campbell 30.5 sacks at State Farm Stadium, passing Chandler Jones (29.0) for the most in the history of the venue.**

CARDS REMAIN HOT IN THE DESERT

Last week's victory over the Panthers kicked off the Cardinals 20th regular season at State Farm Stadium. With the victory, Arizona improved to 13-6-1 in home openers since beginning play at State Farm Stadium in 2006.

The Cardinals victory over the Panthers last Sunday gives Arizona a 6-1 record in its last seven home games. Dating back to Week 7 of the 2024 season, only three teams have a better home winning percentage than the Cardinals (.857).

SWEAT'S FIRST AZ SACK A MEMORABLE ONE

Playing in his first home game as a member of the Cardinals last week, LB Josh Sweat recorded a sack on Carolina's third play of the game. Sweat forced a fumble on the play that was recovered by LB Zaven Collins and returned 3 yards for a TD.

The takedown of Young gives Sweat 44.0 sacks in his career. It also marked his 7th career "strip sack" (including playoffs) and the first since the Week 2 of 2023 vs. Minnesota (2 years to the day - 9/14/23 and 9/14/25).



BROWNING OUT OF THE GATE FAST

LB **Baron Browning** continued his solid start to the 2025 season by recording two tackles, a tackle for loss, a QB hit and an INT in last week's contest. Through the first two games, Browning has six tackles, 1.0 sack, two tackles for loss, two QB hits, an INT and a pass defended.

He joins New England's Jaylynn Hawkins (1 INT, 1.0 sack) and Jacksonville's LB Foyesade Olukun (1 INT, 1.0 sack) as the only players in the NFL so far this season with both a sack and an INT.



DEFENSE KEEPING THE SCORE DOWN

In the back half of 2024 Arizona had one of the NFL's stingiest scoring defenses, allowing just 19.6 points per game over the final 11 games.

That trend has continued in 2025 with the Cardinals allowing an average of just 17.5 points per game so far. **Dating back to Week 7 last season, the Cardinals have allowed 20 points or fewer in seven of 13 games.**

Dating back to Week 7 of 2024, Arizona's defense has allowed an average of 19.3 points per game. Only three teams have allowed fewer points per game in that span.

A SACK GETS CARDS ON THE BOARD AND ANOTHER SACK ENDS IT

In last Sunday's win over the Panthers, the Cardinals defense put up the first score of the game when LB **Zaven Collins** picked up a Bryce Young fumble (caused by a LB **Josh Sweat** strip-sack) and returned it 3 yards for a TD to give Arizona a 7-0 lead. On the Panther's final play DL **Calais Campbell** sacked Young with just 0:26 left on a 4th-n-15 play from the AZ 38-yard line to seal the Cardinals 27-22 win.

Those were among the defensive highlights for a unit that finished Sunday's contest with 3.0 sacks, 6 tackles for loss, 10 QB hits, an INT, 9 passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery (returned for a TD).

EFFICIENT THRU THE AIR & THRILLING ON THE GROUND

QB **Kyler Murray** threw his third passing TD of the season on an 11-yard pass to WR **Michael Wilson** last week. It was his 118th career passing TD.

Between the 2nd and 3rd quarters the Cardinals scored 17 straight points to push their lead to 27-3. **On those three scoring drives (2 TD, FG) Murray completed 12-of-17 pass attempts (70.6%) for 167 yards and a TD.**

Murray also provided a highlight-reel play with a 30-yard run in the 4th quarter. **It was his 10th career run of 30+ yards. Dating back to Murray's rookie season in 2019, the only QB who has more such runs is Lamar Jackson (17).**

GAME-CHANGERS IN NEW ORLEANS

For all their tackle production so far this season, it was Baker and Thompson combining for a pass breakup in New Orleans on the game's penultimate play that has been the most crucial to date.

On the Saints final drive - with Arizona holding a 20-13 lead - QB Spencer Rattler appeared to connect with TE **Juwan Johnson** for an 18-yard TD with just 0:04 remaining. However, Baker and Thompson combined to dislodge the ball from Johnson to preserve the 7-point lead. They were both credited with a pass defended on the play.

JOHNSON EARNS HIGH MARKS IN NFL DEBUT

Rookie CB **Will Johnson** - AZ's 2nd round pick (47th overall) in the 2025 Draft - made a big impact in the secondary in his NFL debut vs. the Saints.

He finished the contest with a tackle and three passes defended. He also put a big hit on WR **Chris Olave** to break up a pass in the 4th quarter and had a highlight reel INT called back due to a penalty on another AZ defender.

According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Johnson became the first Cardinals defender since at least 2000 to have 3+ passes defended in his NFL debut.

JOHNSON RANKS NEAR TOP OF NFL IN PFF DEFENSIVE RANKINGS

According to ProFootballFocus.com, Johnson ranked 4th among all NFL DBs with a 90.2 defensive grade for his performance in his NFL debut.

That defensive grade also led all NFL rookie defenders in Week 1.

- The Cards added **6** veteran free agents, **5** 2025 draft picks and **1** rookie free agent that were not with the team at any point last season. In all, 12 of the 53 players (22.6%) on the current roster were not with the Cardinals in 2024.



- Of the 53 players on the current roster, just 10 (18.9%) were with the team prior to the hiring of GM **Monti Ossenfort** and HC **Jonathan Gannon** in 2023.

- The Cardinals current roster features 21 players (39.6%) who were selected by Ossenfort in the NFL Draft.

- The Cardinals roster features eight players - DL **Calais Campbell** (39), OL **Kevin Beachum** (36), LS **Aaron Brewer** (35), QB **Jacoby Brissett** (32), DL **Dalvin Tomlinson** (31), RB **James Conner** (30), DL **L.J. Collier** (30) and WR **Zay Jones** (30) - who are 30 years old or older.

- Arizona's roster features the only active player in the NFL who entered the league through the Supplemental Draft (S **Jalen Thompson**) and 9 players who entered the NFL as undrafted free agents.

CARDINALS HAVE THEIR CAPTAINS

The Cardinals named seven players to serve as team captains for the 2025 season, based on a vote of their teammates.

Both Murray and Baker are serving as team captains for the sixth consecutive season. Conner earned the honor for the fourth straight year (2022-25).

In his first season back with the Cardinals, Campbell was named a team captain for the sixth time in his career. He has earned the honor with three different teams in his career, including three times with Arizona: Cardinals (2014-15; '25), Jaguars (2018-19) and Dolphins (2024).

Three Cardinals players - Froholdt, Wilson and Blount - were named team captains for the first time in their careers. Froholdt is in his third season with Arizona as the team's starting center. Wilson is in his second with the team and Blount is in his third season w/ AZ.



CARDS LAND FREE AGENCY PRIZE IN SWEAT

In March, the Cardinals landed their most high-profile free agent in LB **Josh Sweat**. Arizona signed the 27-year old to a four-year contract after he spent his first seven NFL seasons (2018-24) with the Eagles.

Sweat entered the league with Philadelphia as a fourth round pick (130th overall) in the 2018 NFL Draft out of Florida State.

In the Eagles 40-22 victory over the Chiefs in Super Bowl LIX to cap the 2024 season, Sweat posted a career-high 2.5 sacks along with 6 tackles, 2 tackles for loss and 3 QB hits.



MORE SWEAT CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Selected to the Pro Bowl following the 2021 season, his first year playing under Gannon. Sweat played under Gannon and Cardinals Defensive Coordinator **Nick Rallis** for two seasons (2021-22) with the Eagles.

- His 43.0 sacks with the Eagles are the eighth most in franchise history.

- His 43.0 sacks and 97 QB hits led the Eagles during his seven-year tenure (2018-2024) in Philadelphia.

- In 2024, led the Eagles with 8.0 sacks and finished the year with 41 tackles, 15 QB hits, 9 tackles for loss and 2 passes defended in 16 games played (15 starts). Was part of an Eagles team that had the NFL's top-ranked overall (278.4) and pass (174.2 ypg) defense last season.

- Started 61 of his last 62 games played over his final four seasons (2021-24) in Philadelphia. Since becoming a regular starter in 2021, Sweat had at least 40 tackles and 6.5 sacks each season.

- In 2022, helped the Eagles defense rank second in the NFL in total defense (301.5 ypg) and first in pass defense (179.8 ypg) while the team had an NFL-high 70 sacks en route to a Super Bowl LVII appearance at State Farm Stadium.

CAMPBELL'S LEGENDARY LONGEVITY

DL **Calais Campbell** - selected by Arizona in the second round (50th overall) of the 2008 Draft - returned to the Cardinals as a free agent this offseason.

CAMPBELL THE LEAGUE'S OLDEST DEFENSIVE PLAYER

In Week 1 at New Orleans, Campbell (at age 39 years, 6 days old) joined Jim Thorpe and Jim Hart as the only position players to appear in a game for the Cardinals at age 39-or-older. GIRLS FLAG HS GAME OF THE WEEK RETURNS

Following a historic first season, the **“Arizona Cardinals Girls High School Flag Football Game of the Week presented by State Farm®”** returns to Arizona’s Family Sports (AZFS) in 2025.

WHERE TO WATCH: Arizona’s Family Sports is available over-the-air on Channel 44 in Phoenix and Channel 32 in Flagstaff, on Cox at Channel 13, DirectTV at Channel 32 and Dish Network at Channel 44. CARDINALS & GIRLS FLAG FOOTBALL: The Cardinals support of girls flag football is well-established. The team impacts thousands of high school and youth girls flag football players across the state of Arizona annually through a variety of camps, showcases, tournaments and equipment donations. The Cardinals became the first NFL team to have a flag football campus at an NFL stadium and established a two-year partnership with the Positive Coaching Alliance in 2024 and pledged \$70,000 to help support girls flag football in the state of Arizona and eliminate gender inequity in youth sports. The team has also held girls flag football games at State Farm Stadium during halftime of Cardinals games each of the past four seasons. In July, the Cardinals had four girls flag teams, including the high school girls team, Heat Wav Ladies, represent the organization at the NFL FLAG Championships in Canton, Ohio.

GIRLS HIGH SCHOOL FLAG FOOTBALL IN ARIZONA: Arizona is one of 17 states to offer girls high school flag football as a sanctioned sport. In 2023, 57 Arizona High Schools offered sanctioned girls flag football. That number has more than doubled to 136 high schools across the state offering the sport in 2025.

ENORMOUS GROWTH OF FLAG FOOTBALL: Flag football is the most accessible and inclusive version of American football and is spearheading exceptional worldwide participation growth of the sport, especially among women and girls. An estimated 20 million people in more than 100 countries currently participate in flag football. Flag football will be included in the 2028 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. It will mark the first time in history that the game of football in any capacity will be a part of the Olympic Games. In June, three collegiate programs (Arizona Christian, Benedictine Mesa and Ottawa University) in Arizona announced they would be adding sanctioned girl’s flag football programs this season and join the GSAC conference. Arizona State University, University of Arizona and Grand Canyon University also launched Women’s Flag Football clubs in early 2025.

RIVALRIES UNIFORM TO DEBUT NEXT WEEK



In late August, the Cardinals unveiled their **Rivalries** uniforms that will be worn for the first time on September 25 when the Cards take on the Seattle Seahawks at State Farm Stadium on Prime Video’s “Thursday Night Football.”

Rivalries is a new and exciting program developed by Nike and the NFL that gives athletes and fans an opportunity to connect like never before. The goal of **Rivalries** is to celebrate traditions and unite communities with unique and elevated product designs.

“We are thrilled to be part of the new Rivalries program and thank the NFL and Nike for including us in this inaugural group,” Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill** said. “The design elements of the Cardinals Rivalries uniforms reflect the strength and toughness required to thrive in the desert and celebrate the passion and perseverance that define us. Coincidentally, a couple days ago so many people saw the power, speed and ferocity of the Arizona sandstorm that is such an integral part of our Rivalries uniform design and a fitting metaphor for our identity as a team and a region. When we wear these Rivalries uniforms for the first time on September 25 against the Seahawks at State Farm Stadium, I hope Cardinals fans see them as a true embodiment of our team, our fan base and the spirit of Arizona that we proudly represent.”



Arizona was one of eight teams - four in the NFC West and four in the AFC East - selected to debut Rivalries uniform in 2025 as part a program that will elevate over the next four seasons.

The uniform is rooted extensively in local community insights and will be worn in a single home game against a division rival in each of the next three seasons. The designs were brought to life by pulling inspiration from the history of the Cardinals and the unique culture of Arizona. After the 2025 season, these Rivalries uniforms will remain in the teams’ uniform lineup for the subsequent three seasons (2026-28), in addition to existing alternate uniforms.

The Cardinals current roster features a pair of offensive linemen who were born internationally, and a number of other players who have immediately family members with international ties.

In addition to the players born outside of the United States, the Cardinals roster features a number of players who have immediate family members with international ties.

WR **MICHAEL WILSON**

Father, **Orville**, was born and raised in Jamaica while his mom, **Ngairé**, was born and raised in New Zealand. His aunt, **Maureen Jacobson**, played soccer for the New Zealand World Cup team and was the first women’s player inducted into the Wellington Football Hall of Fame.

OL **WILL HERNANDEZ**

His parents, **Robert Hernandez** and **Angelica Lemus**, moved to the United States from Mexico prior to his birth. His grandparents hail from Mexico City. Hernandez’s father was a professional soccer player in Mexico.

In April of 2022, Hernandez took a trip to Mexico City with the Cardinals for the 2022 NFL Draft. While in Mexico, Hernandez announced the Cardinals day three selections and helped teach local youth at a football skills clinic.

QB **KYLER MURRAY**

When the Cardinals selected him the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft, Murray became the first Asian-American ever selected #1 overall; Murray is one quarter Korean; his father is African American and his mother, **Missy**, is half Korean; Kyler’s maternal grandmother is from South Korea.

LB **BJ OJULARI**

Descendant of Nigerian royalty. His maternal grandfather was Olaniyi Osuntoki, who later changed his name to Prince Twins Seven-Seven (he was sole survivor of his parents’ seven sets of twins). A world-renowned artist, singer and dancer, Seven-Seven had multiple hit records as a musician and his artwork was featured in the National Museum of African American Art at the Smithsonian. In the 1890s, Prince Twins Seven-Sevens’ grandfather was the King of Ibadan, a city in southwestern Nigeria.


Individuals will have a number of ways to get involved:

This year, the Cardinals are celebrating their 20th season at State Farm Stadium, which opened in 2006. The world-class venue remains a prime example of sophisticated engineering, technology, and design. Featuring both a retractable roof and retractable natural grass playing field, State Farm Stadium set an industry standard for design excellence and flexibility that has allowed the venue to host some of the country's most high-profile events.

In addition to serving as the Cardinals home stadium, since opening in August of 2006, the building has also hosted three Super Bowls, the 2015 Pro Bowl, two NCAA Men's Final Four basketball tournaments, the first-ever BCS National Championship game (Florida-Ohio State), Fiesta Bowls, international soccer matches, high school football championships, high school proms, monster truck and motocross events, trade shows and conventions and countless other events. In 2023 alone, State Farm Stadium hosted the kickoff of Taylor Swift's Eras Tour and Beyonce's Renaissance World Tour as the artists joined the list of notable musical acts such as The Rolling Stones, U2, Garth Brooks, Guns N' Roses and Metallica who have played the venue. In 2025 State Farm Stadium has hosted concerts by Kendrick Lamar, Morgan Wallen, The Weeknd and Post Malone along with the Quarterfinals of the CONCACAF Gold Cup.

Hosting the country's most high-profile sports and entertainment events has resulted in over \$6 billion in economic impact for the state of Arizona.



STATE FARM STADIUM HAS BEEN HOME TO SOME ICONIC SPORTS MOMENTS

THE HAIL MURRAY

In Week 10 of the 2020 season, Arizona defeated Buffalo 32-30 on a 43-yard game-winning TD pass from QB Kyler Murray to WR DeAndre Hopkins with just 0:02 remaining in regulation.

The "Hail Murray" was named the "Best Play" at the 2021 ESPYS, and was also named the 2020 Bridgestone Clutch Play of the Year at NFL Honors.



CARDS TAKE DOWN EAGLES IN DRAMATIC NFC TITLE GAME

The Cardinals earned their first-ever Super Bowl appearance when they defeated the Eagles 32-25 in the NFC Championship Game in 2008.

After giving up 19 unanswered points (24-6 lead to a 25-24 deficit) the Cardinals went on a 14-play, 72-yard game-winning drive culminated in an eight-yard TD pass from Kurt Warner to RB Tim Hightower.



TWO THRILLING POSTSEASON WINS VS. THE PACKERS

2015 DIVISIONAL ROUND: In a game that featured 23 points in the final 4:49 of play, Arizona overcame a pair of improbable throws by QB Aaron Rodgers - including a 41-yard "Hail Mary" as time expired in regulation - late in the game for a 26-20 OT win. WR Larry Fitzgerald accounted for all 80 yards on the Cardinals game-winning drive in OT, including a 75-yard catch-and-run to set up his five-yard TD catch two plays later.



2009 DIVISIONAL ROUND: Arizona defeated Green Bay 51-45 in OT in what remains the highest scoring postseason game in NFL history. The teams combined for playoff record 13 TDs, with the game-deciding score coming on a 17-yard fumble return by LB Karlos Dansby following a CB Mike Adams sack of QB Aaron Rodgers on the third play of OT. QB Kurt Warner threw for 379 yards with a passer rating of 154.1, throwing more TD passes (5) than incompletions (4) in the game.

A PAIR OF UNFORGETTABLE PLAYS IN THE SUPER BOWL

State Farm Stadium has hosted three Super Bowls. Since opening in 2006, the venue joins Miami's Hard Rock Stadium (2006, 2009, 2019) as the only stadiums to host the Super Bowl at least three times.

The first two Super Bowls held at State Farm Stadium included two of the most memorable plays in Super Bowl history.

New England's dream of a perfect season in 2007 was dashed with a 21-17 loss to the Giants in Super Bowl XLII, a contest that featured the legendary "Helmet Catch" by Giants WR David Tyree. Seven years later they defeated the Seahawks 28-24 in Super Bowl XLIX in one of the most dramatic finishes in title game history as DB Malcolm Butler's goal-line interception preserved the victory.

A NEW YEAR BEGINS

The Cardinals began their 20th regular season at State Farm Stadium when they defeated the Carolina Panthers last week.

It marked the seventh time since beginning play at State Farm Stadium - and the first time since 2015 - that the Cardinals had at least six home wins in a season.

HISTORIC STREAK AT HOME WITHOUT A TD ALLOWED

In wins over the Chargers (Week 7), Bears (Week 9) and Jets (Week 10) last season, **the Cardinals had a streak of three consecutive home games in which they held an opponent without a TD.**

You had to go back nearly 100 years to find the last instance of the Cardinals accomplishing such a feat. Prior to last year's streak, the last time the Cardinals went three straight home games without a TD allowed was in 1926 (4 straight home games in Weeks 1-3 & Week 7).

PUTTING UP BIG WINS AT HOME

Of the Cardinals six home wins in 2024, four were decided by 20+ points.

That is the most such home wins in a season in franchise history.

Arizona finished the 2024 season outscoring opponents 240-173 at home in 2024, giving the Cardinals a +67 point margin at State Farm Stadium.

Just once in franchise history (242 points in 2008) did the Cardinals score more points at home in a season than they did in 2024 (240).

IT GETS LOUD IN THERE

Having sellout crowds on hand has given Arizona one of the NFL's most distinct home field advantages.

Dating back to the inaugural year at State Farm Stadium in 2006, **Cardinals opponents have accumulated 226 accepted false start penalties in the regular season.** That is the most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

ARIZONA DRAFTS SEVEN PLAYERS IN 2025

The Cardinals selected seven players in the 2025 NFL Draft, including six on the defensive side of the ball. **The 2025 NFL Draft marked just the third time in the Modern Draft Era (since 1967) that Arizona used each of its first five picks on defensive players: 1991 and 1983.**

The Cardinals used their second (CB **Will Johnson**) and fourth (LB **Cody Simon**) round picks on players that were named Defensive MVP in the last two CFP National Championship Games. Johnson earned the honor in the Wolverines victory over Washington in 2023 and Simon was named Defensive MVP in the Buckeyes win over Notre Dame last season.

LB JORDAN BURCH - ROUND 3 (78TH) - OREGON

Over five years at Oregon and South Carolina, **Burch** appeared in 58 games (36 starts) and finished his college career with 170 tackles, 16.0 sacks, 33.0 tackles for loss, a forced fumble, three fumble recoveries, an INT (returned 61 yards for a TD) and 11 passes defended.



In his final three college seasons - while serving as a full-time starter - Burch appeared in 37 games and totaled 125 tackles, 27.0 tackles for loss, 15.0 sacks, 10 passes defended, two fumble recoveries and a forced fumble.

Like Arizona's first round pick DL **Walter Nolen III**, Burch was one of the nation's top prep recruits. He left his prep alma mater - Hammond High School in Columbia, SC - as the #4 recruit in the country by ESPN in 2019.

LB CODY SIMON - ROUND 4 (115TH) - OHIO STATE

During his five seasons (2020-24) at OSU, **Simon** appeared in 58 games (30 starts) and totaled 259 tackles, 23.0 tackles for loss, 10.0 sacks, 11 passes defended, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, an INT and four QB hurries.



SIMON EARNS THE COVETED "O" JERSEY AT OSU
Named a team captain as a senior at Ohio State in 2024, Simon was presented with the **Bill Willis Block "O" jersey** for leadership, toughness, accountability and highest of character.

SHINING ON THE BRIGHT STAGES

Simon earned Defensive Player of the Game honors in both the Rose Bowl win over Oregon (11 tackles, 3 TFL, 2.0 sacks) and the CFP National Championship Game win over Notre Dame (8 tackles, 1 TFL) last season.

DL WALTER NOLEN III - ROUND 1 (16TH) - OLE MISS

Following two years (2022-23) at Texas A&M, **Nolen** had a breakout season as a junior at Ole Miss in 2024. He finished the year with career highs in tackles (48), sacks (6.5), tackles for loss (14.0), passes defended (3) and fumble recoveries (2) while starting all 13 games.

The performance earned Nolen consensus first-team All-American accolades, making him just the 14th player in school history to earn the honor.



NOLEN COLLEGE STATISTICS

In 35 games (27 starts) at Texas A&M and Mississippi, Nolen totaled 114 tackles, 11.5 sacks, 26.0 tackles for loss, a forced fumble, three fumble recoveries and four passes defended.

- Outland Trophy Finalist - 2024 (best interior lineman in college football)
- Walter Camp Player of the Year Award Semifinalist
- Bednarik Award Semifinalist (outstanding defensive player)
- 1st-team All-SEC - 2024 (Coaches, Phil Steele)

AMONG COLLEGE FOOTBALL'S TOP RUN STOPPERS

With Ole Miss last season, Nolen earned a 91.6 grade as a run stopper according to Pro Football Focus. Only Michigan's Mason Graham (92.6) ranked higher among all defensive linemen in college football.

Nolen started all 13 games for the Rebels at DT in 2024, helping anchor the best rush defense in the nation and one of the best defenses in school history. He contributed to team school records in sacks (52) and tackles for loss (120).

Ole Miss finished last season ranked #1 in the nation in run defense (80.5 ypg), #1 in tackles for loss (120), #2 in scoring defense (14.4 ppg) and #3 in sacks (52).

CB DENZEL BURKE - ROUND 5 (174TH) - OHIO STATE

A native of Phoenix, Burke was a standout prep DB and WR in Arizona before going on to college at Ohio State. He was a 4-star prospect who attended Brophy College Prep (Phoenix) before transferring to Saguaro (Scottsdale) High School.



BURKE SETS OSU RECORDS FOR STARTS AND SNAPS

Burke capped his four-year (2021-24) career with the Buckeyes by starting all 16 games as a senior in 2024 to set the record for the most starts by a DB (51) and to climb into a 50-starts club at Ohio State that only includes Billy Price (2014-17) and Luke Fickell (1993-96). Burke started all 51 games played with the Buckeyes.

He was the first Ohio State true freshman to start the season opener on defense since Andy Katzenmoyer in 1996, Burke started all 13 games that season to set school record for true freshman snaps at CB.

OL HAYDEN CONNER - ROUND 6 (211TH) - TEXAS

During his four seasons (2021-24) with the Longhorns, **Conner** started 43-of-51 games played. He started all 43 games played at left guard over his final three seasons, including starting all 16 games in 2024.



NOT EASY TO GET BY THE BIG MAN

At 6-6, 314 pounds Conner is an opposing presence. A 2023 semifinalist and 2024 finalist for the Joe Moore Award as the nation's top offensive lineman, Conner was credited with zero sacks allowed on 617 pass blocking snaps over 16 starts last year by ProFootballFocus.com.

S KITAN CRAWFORD - ROUND 7 (225TH) - NEVADA

Following four seasons (2020-23) at Texas, **Crawford** spent his final college season at Nevada in 2024.



In his five college seasons, Crawford appeared in 59 games (16 starts) and totaled 137 tackles, three INTs (one returned for a TD), 10 passes defended, five tackles for loss, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

Crawford was a standout who played 1,010 special teams snaps in his college career, collecting 17 tackles, a blocked FG and a blocked punt. In his final season at Texas in 2023, he was named Honorable Mention Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Year.

CB WILL JOHNSON - ROUND 2 (47TH) - MICHIGAN

In three seasons (2022-24) with the Wolverines, **Johnson** was a two-time All-American and two-time All-Big 10 pick who appeared in 32 games (21 starts) and totaled 68 tackles, 9 INTs (3 returned for TDs) and 10 passes defended.

Johnson's three career INT return TDs set a Michigan school record.

END ZONE OFF LIMITS: In his final two seasons (2023-24) at Michigan, Johnson had six INTs (3 returned for TDs) with no TD catches allowed on 478 coverage snaps according to ProFootballFocus.com.

In a remarkable 2023 campaign, Johnson allowed just 17 completions on 37 targets and 321 coverage snaps. He had four INTs and did not allow a TD reception.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME MVP: Johnson was named the Defensive MVP in Michigan's 34-13 victory over Washington in the CFP National Championship Game to cap the 2023 season.

He had four tackles and intercepted a pass on the first play of the second half in the Wolverines win.

YEAR THREE UNDER GANNON AND HIS STAFF


A BIG JUMP IN YEAR TWO UNDER GANNON

Jonathan Gannon became an NFL head coach for the first time when he was hired by the Cardinals on February 14, 2023. He came to Arizona after spending two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with Philadelphia where he helped the Eagles advance to Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium.

Gannon has 17 years of experience in the NFL with the Cardinals (2023-24), Eagles (2021-22), Colts (2018-20), Vikings (2014-17), Titans (2012-13), Rams (2009-11) and Falcons (2007).

A closer look at Gannon's impressive resume:

- **The Cardinals finished the 2024 season with eight wins, doubling their win total from last season (4).** Arizona did so despite facing one of the NFL toughest schedules for the second straight season (8 games vs. playoff teams in '23; 9 games vs. playoff teams in '24).
- Arizona posted a 6-3 record at home in 2024, winning five of its last six games at State Farm Stadium. Four of the Cardinals six home wins were decided by 20+ points. That is the most such home wins in a season in team history.
- Under Gannon's guidance, the Cardinals have been one of the NFL's best in protecting the football (5th in the NFL with 12 games of zero turnovers between 2023-24). Arizona also finished the 2024 season with just 92 penalties, the 2nd fewest in the NFL last season (LAR - 91).
- The Cardinals defense was one of the NFL's best in the second half of the 2024 season. **Over the final 11 games, Arizona allowed an average of just 19.6 points per game (only 3 teams allowed fewer points per game between Weeks 7-18). The Cards defense allowed the fewest total TDs (20) and passing TDs (10) in the NFL during that span.**
- Gannon presided over one of the NFL's best rushing attacks over the last two seasons. Arizona finished the 2024 season with 2,451 rushing yards, the 3rd-most in franchise history and the most since the team ran for a franchise record 2,582 yards in 1979. The Cardinals 5.29 rushing yards per attempt in 2024 was easily the highest single-season rushing average in franchise history, and also one of the top 20 single-season totals in NFL history.
- In his first season with Arizona in 2023, Gannon led the NFL's third-youngest team that relied heavily on rookies but was also highly competitive. Despite playing the league's 2nd-toughest schedule with eight games vs. playoff teams, the Cardinals held a lead in 14-of-17 games played.
- In 2023, the Cardinals rookie class, which led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4,654) in 2023. The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to have rookies combine for 2,000+ snaps on offense and 2,000+ snaps on defense last season. AZ's 2023 rookie class combined for: 151 games played, 7 TDs, 73 receptions, 847 receiving yards, 314 rushing yards, 206 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 15 tackles for loss, 13 passes defended, a fumble recovery and an INT in 2023.
- In 2023, Gannon led the Cardinals to three wins vs. teams that made the postseason in 2023, including two on the East Coast in the month of December in hostile environments (Pittsburgh and Philadelphia).
- Under Gannon, the Cardinals also had a historic season protecting the football in 2023. Arizona had eight games in which it committed zero turnovers in '23, the most such outings in a single season in franchise history.




ARIZONA'S COORDINATORS

PETZING CALLING THE SHOTS ON OFFENSE

The 2025 season is **Drew Petzing's** 3rd as the Cardinals offensive coordinator. He was hired by Arizona in 2023 following three seasons (2020-22) with the Cleveland Browns.

- Petzing has orchestrated one of the NFL's best rushing attacks in Arizona, as the Cardinals ranked 3rd in the NFL in rushing yards (4,816), 2nd in the NFL in rushing average (5.16), 9th in the NFL in rushing TDs (35) and 3rd in the NFL in games w/ 150+ rushing yards (14) over the last two seasons (2023-24).
- In 2024, Arizona had a 3,000-yard passer (QB **Kyler Murray**), a 1,000-yard rusher (RB **James Conner**) and a 1,000-yard receiver (TE **Trey McBride**) in a single season for just the fifth time in franchise history.
- Under Petzing, RB **James Conner** had his first two career 1,000-yard rushing campaigns (1,040 in 2023; 1,094 in 2024) while TE **Trey McBride** has blossomed into one of the NFL's top young players. In 2024, McBride earned his first Pro Bowl selection after totaling 111 receptions for 1,146 yards.



RALLIS' DEFENSE ENDS '24 AS ONE OF NFL'S BEST

The 2025 season is **Nick Rallis' (RAW-liss)** 8th in the NFL and his 3rd as the Cardinals defensive coordinator.

- Under Rallis, Arizona had one of the NFL's top defenses over the second half of the 2024 season. Between Weeks 7-18, the Cards defense ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in points allowed/game, total TDs allowed, passing TDs allowed, sacks, forced fumbles, first downs allowed, total defense and pass defense.
- Arizona had an NFL-high 12 different players record 2.0 or more sacks in 2024. The Cardinals also tied for the NFL lead with 17 different players who recorded at least 1.0 sack.
- The Cardinals defense finished the 2023 season with six takeaways in the red zone. Only two NFL teams - Pittsburgh (8) and Cincinnati (7) - had more red zone takeaways. Only one team had more red zone INTs (Pittsburgh - 7).



SPECIAL TEAMS CONTINUE TO SHINE UNDER RODGERS

Jeff Rodgers is in his eighth season with the Cardinals and seventh as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator in 2025. Arizona's special teams units have been among the best in the NFL during his tenure.

- Under Rodgers' tutelage in '24, K **Chad Ryland** was named a Pro Bowl alternate and was among the league's best kickers after joining Arizona in Week 5. P **Blake Gillikin** had another outstanding season, posting a 49.7 punting average with just one touchback (and 19 punts inside the 20) on 38 total punts.
 - In 2024, the Cardinals became the first team in the NFL to return one of the new "dynamic kickoffs" for a TD (96 yards in Week 1 at Buffalo).
- The 2024 campaign was Rodgers' 21st NFL season after previously coaching special teams with Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).





TERRELL RUNS THE PASSING GAME

Drew Terrell is in his 8th season in the NFL and 3rd with the Cardinals as passing game coordinator/WRs.

- In 2024, QB **Kyler Murray** completed 372-of-541 pass attempts (68.8%) for 3,851 yards, 21 TDs and a 93.5 passer rating. His 68.8 completion percentage was the 2nd-highest in franchise history, his 372 completions were the 3rd-most in team history, his 93.5 passer rating was the 6th-best and his 3,851 passing yards were the 7th-most in team history.
- Terrell orchestrated a Cardinals passing attack that saw rookie WR **Marvin Harrison Jr.** tie the franchise rookie record for TD receptions (8) while TE **Trey McBride** posted one of the best seasons by a TE in NFL history.



ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

Owner **Michael Bidwill** has been steering the Cardinals organization for nearly two decades. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Over the last three years, that transformation has led to the significant and successful restructuring of both the football and business sides of the organization.

That has included Bidwill's hiring of GM **Monti Ossenfort** and head coach **Jonathan Gannon** to lead the football operation and Chief Operating Officer **Jeremy Walls** to guide a revamped business structure.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- On the whole, Bidwill's most substantial accomplishment in his time leading the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium itself. The world-class venue has not only been critical for the franchise but has also resulted in over \$6 billion in economic impact for the state of Arizona.
- In response to the devastating wildfires that broke out in Los Angeles County in January of 2025, Bidwill led a remarkable effort to have State Farm Stadium serve as host to the Rams for their Wild Card matchup vs. the Vikings. Despite a short turnaround, State Farm Stadium hosted a sellout crowd in the first postseason game in NFL history to be moved due to a natural disaster.
- Under Michael's direction in 2025, the organization launched Cardinals Premier Travel, a first-of-its-kind, elevated travel experience to give all fans the opportunity to see the team play on the road in unmatched comfort and convenience. The all-inclusive experience includes round-trip private air transportation aboard the team's wide-body Boeing 777-200ER aircraft, two-night hotel accommodations, in-city transportation, a pre-game tailgate experience, game tickets and an immediate return to Phoenix after the game, among many other perks.
- On February 12, 2023 State Farm Stadium hosted its third Super Bowl when a then-record 115.1 million viewers watched Super Bowl LVII. State Farm Stadium also hosted Super Bowls XLII (following 2007 season) and XLIX (following 2014 season).
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land three Super Bowls, Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- Since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006 the Cardinals have sold out every non-pandemic game played at the venue.
- Bidwill also created the highly-successful Civics Matters Arizona community initiative which sends hundreds of high school students from across the state aboard the Cardinals team plane on an educational trip to Washington D.C. The fourth-annual Civics Matters Arizona trip took place in July of 2025 and saw 275 students visit the nation's capital where they were given a red coat tour of the U.S. Capitol and a private tour of the Supreme Court, where they met with Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh. They also met with elected representatives and experienced instructor-led visits to monuments, memorials, museums, and government institutions, providing them an opportunity to learn about civics in a way that is both educational and fun.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Michael's tenure leading the organization. Arizona has played in 10 postseason contests over the last 18 seasons (2007-24), after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

Within the National Football League, Bidwill's influence is illustrated by his appointment to numerous and notable league committees, including two of the most prestigious – the Compensation Committee as well as the Management Council Executive Committee that represents the league in labor discussions with the NFLPA. He also chairs the league's Security and Conduct Committee and serves on four others: Business Ventures, Social Justice, Health and Safety, and Diversity.




OSSENFORT MAKING BIG MOVES IN THE DESERT

Monti Ossenfort is in his third season with the Cardinals in 2025 after being hired as the team's General Manager in January of 2023.

A look at some of Ossenfort's career highlights:

- In just his second season as GM in 2024, Arizona finished the year with eight wins, doubling its total from 2023 (4) despite facing the NFL's fifth-toughest schedule based on opponent winning percentage.
- *In his first three drafts as the Cardinals GM, he executed seven draft-day trades that resulted in the team selecting 28 total players – including 14 who were taken in the first three rounds. Only the Packers (31), Jaguars (30), Patriots (30) and Rams (29) had more total draft picks over the last three years (2023-25).*
- Since being hired as GM in 2023, Ossenfort has completely re-shaped the Cardinals roster through the draft, trades and free agency. Arizona's current 53-man roster features just 10 players who were with the team prior to Ossenfort's arrival.
- Arizona's 2025 free agency period was Ossenfort's busiest one yet and included the signings of DL **Calais Campbell**, LB **Josh Sweat**, DL **Dalvin Tomlinson** and LB **Akeem Davis-Gaither** among others.
- The Cardinals 2024 NFL Draft class featured a league-high 12 total picks and seven selections in the top-90. Arizona's 12 picks were the most in a single draft for the team since 1992 (12), when the draft consisted of 10 rounds. The Cardinals became the first team since the 1991 Dallas Cowboys (7) to have at least seven picks in the top-90 of a single draft.
- In 2023, Ossenfort built a rookie class that led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4,654).



IDENTIFYING - AND EXTENDING - THE CORE

Since being hired by the Cardinals in 2023, **Ossenfort** has drastically overhauled the roster, bringing in talent through free agency, the draft and through trades.

He has also made the roster stronger by identifying, and rewarding, the existing players who make up the Cardinals core.

Over the span of just five months in 2024, Ossenfort signed four of the Cardinals core players to contract extensions: S **Budda Baker** (12/28), RB **James Conner** (11/30), OL **Hjalte Froholdt** (8/21) and LB **Zaven Collins** (8/3). In April of 2025, Ossenfort signed Pro Bowl TE **Trey McBride** to a four-year contract extension.



OSSENFORT DEALS ON DRAFT DAY

In his first three drafts as the Cardinals GM, Ossenfort executed seven draft-day trades, trading down six times and trading up once.

TEAM PLANE TAKES KIDS ON MEMORABLE TRIP TO D.C.

In June of 2025, the Cardinals joined forces with presenting partner Desert Financial Credit Union as well as Arizona Governor **Katie Hobbs** and the Close Up Foundation for the fourth annual "Civics Matters Arizona" trip to our nation's capital.



Through this highly-successful program, 275 high school students from across the state participated in an all-expenses-paid visit to Washington D.C. on the Cardinals team plane. The four-day, three-night trip took place from June 4-7.

The once-in-a-lifetime experience featured a red coat tour of the United States Capitol and private tour of the Supreme Court. The itinerary also included meetings with Supreme Court Justice **Brett Kavanaugh** and elected officials including Arizona Congressman **Juan Ciscomani** as well as issue deliberations and instructor-led visits to monuments, memorials, museums, and government institutions, providing students an opportunity to learn about civics in a way that is both educational and fun.

The Civics Matters Arizona program is a civic engagement initiative for high school students across the state. The program targets a diverse group of high schools and organizations serving Title I communities. Civics Matters Arizona engages students with their peers as well as their government and gives educators the tools and training to build positive dialogue in the classroom.

The students who participated in Civics Matters Arizona represent 35 schools, 14 school districts, 9 cities, and 6 of the 15 counties across Arizona.

Ahead of the D.C. program, teachers worked with 10th and 11th grade students in a series of non-partisan lessons designed by Close Up. The lessons culminated in an essay contest in which students could write about (1) how young people can be engaged participants in their community even without the right to vote, (2) the importance of civic engagement by everyday people to the health of our democracy, or (3) how young people can contribute to creating positive community change.

A REWARDING OFFSEASON FOR BIDWILL

BIDWILL GOES INTO ARIZONA SPORTS HALL OF FAME

In April of 2025, Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill** was inducted into the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame.

Bidwill was part of the eight-member 2024/2025 class that also featured former Olympic and Arizona State swimmer Melissa Belote Ripley, former University of Arizona basketball player Mike Bibby, former U.S. Women's soccer star and Mesa native Julie Ertz, former Diamondbacks GM Joe Garagiola Jr., former University of Arizona football standout Ricky Hunley, former MLB player and Scottsdale high school star Paul Konerko and Matt Shott, the former Senior Director of Amateur Hockey Development for the Arizona Coyotes.



Bidwill became the sixth member of the Cardinals organization to be inducted to the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame. He joined his late father, **Bill Bidwill**, WR **Larry Fitzgerald**, S **Pat Tillman**, S **Adrian Wilson** and QB **Jake Plummer**.

The Arizona Sports Hall of Fame honors athletes, coaches, administrators and others who have made exceptional contributions to sports in Arizona.

A PRESTIGIOUS HONOR FROM THE MCCAIN INSTITUTE



In May, Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill** received the 2025 "In The Arena Award" from the McCain Institute at the organization's signature annual event, the Sedona Forum, at the Enchantment Resort in Sedona, AZ.

According to the McCain Institute, its "In The Arena Award" is given annually to "salute extraordinary, character-driven leaders who conspicuously and bravely fight to defend human rights, foster security and advance freedom through action. The award reflects the ways in which the late Senator **John McCain** proudly modeled and espoused the philosophy set forth in Teddy Roosevelt's famous 1910 "Man in the Arena" speech praising those who have the courage and determination to get in The Arena and fight for a cause, rather than critiquing from the sidelines."

The McCain Institute cited Michael's leadership following the wildfires that broke out in Los Angeles County in January of 2025 and for his longstanding commitment to public service and civic education. Senator McCain's wife, **Cindy**, and his son, **Jack**, were on hand to present the honor.

The McCain Institute also noted Bidwill's efforts to enhance civics education in Arizona schools through the team's Civics Matters Arizona program. Now in its fourth year, Civics Matters Arizona is the Cardinals civic education program that annually provides a life-changing experience for more than 275 students from Arizona high schools. Students from across the state, most of whom are from Title I communities, travel on the Cardinals team plane to Washington, D.C. for a four-day, all-expenses-paid trip to experience the nation's capital. The students meet with elected officials, experience historical sites and get a behind-the-scenes look at how government works in a way that is both educational and fun.

GILLINS IS NEWEST BIDWILL FELLOWSHIP COACH

In February, the Cardinals announced the addition of **DJ Gillins** to the coaching staff as the newest participant in the **Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship** program.

ABOUT THE BILL BIDWILL COACHING FELLOWSHIP: The Cardinals established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship prior to the 2015 season. Gillins is the seventh individual to participate in the program, which is designed to increase diversity and create additional opportunities for coaching experience at the highest level.

The four most recent participants advanced from the fellowship to full-time assistant coach positions – three on the Cardinals coaching staff and one at the NCAA level. This offseason, **Connor Senger** was promoted to pass game specialist and **Blaine Gautier** was promoted to offensive quality control with the Cardinals.



Long-time Cardinals owner **Bill Bidwill**, who passed away in 2019, was at the forefront of providing opportunities to individuals regardless of race or gender. In 2010, he was honored with the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Paul "Tank" Younger Award for promoting diversity in the NFL. In 1978, Adele Harris became the first African American female executive in the NFL when she was hired as the Cardinals director of community relations. In 1981, Bidwill hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club. In 2004, the Cardinals became the first NFL team to have an African American general manager/head coach duo in Graves and Dennis Green.

Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill** was honored by the Fritz Pollard Alliance with the organization's 2019 "Paul J. Tagliabue Award," given to a league or team executive who demonstrates the integrity and leadership Tagliabue exhibited in career development opportunities for minority candidates and advocacy for diversity on the league and club level.

ARIZONA DOUBLES ITS WIN TOTAL

Arizona wrapped up their 2024 regular season with a 47-24 win over the San Francisco 49ers in front of a sellout crowd of 63,849 at State Farm Stadium.

The Cardinals finished the 2024 season with eight wins, doubling their win total from 2023 (4). Only three teams increased their 2023 win total by more games in 2024.

Arizona doubled its win total from 2023 despite having faced one of the NFL's toughest schedules in 2024, based on opponent winning percentage.

Only four teams faced opponents with a better combined winning percentage than the Cardinals. Of the teams who faced the top-5 toughest schedules in 2024, only Arizona finished with more than six wins. In 2023 the Cards faced the NFL's second-toughest schedule behind only Cincinnati.

The performances of QB **Kyler Murray**, RB **James Conner** and TE **Trey McBride** led the Cardinals offense to a rare feat in 2024.

MURRAY: With 3,851 passing yards in 2024, Murray surpassed 3,000 passing yards in a season for the fourth time in his career, tying Neil Lomax for the most such seasons in team history.

CONNER: Conner rushed for a career-high 1,094 yards in 2024. It marked his second straight season with 1,000+ rushing yards, joining Ottis Anderson (5x) and Edgerrin James (2x) as the only players in franchise history with multiple seasons of 1,000+ rushing yards.

MCBRIDE: McBride finished the 2024 season with 1,146 receiving yards, joining Hall of Famer Jackie Smith (1,205 in 1967) as the only TEs in franchise history with 1,000+ receiving yards in a season.

The Cardinals had a 3,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard receiver and 1,000-yard rusher in a season for just the fifth time in franchise history.





AT A GLANCE

- Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (55th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft, signed a four-year contract extension with Arizona on 4/3/25 that will keep him with the team through the 2029 season.

TE **Trey McBride** was named to his first Pro Bowl in 2024 after finishing the season with 111 receptions for 1,146 yards and two receiving TDs (also had a fumble recovery TD and a rushing TD).

In addition to shattering his own franchise single-season record for receptions by a TE (81 in 2023), McBride's 111 receptions in 2024 also represent the second-highest season total in franchise history by a player at any position.

He became just the fifth different player in franchise history to reach 100+ receptions in a season: WR Larry Fitzgerald (5x), WR Anquan Boldin (2x), WR DeAndre Hopkins (1x) and FB Larry Centers (1x).



He endured 12 rounds of chemotherapy and completed his last chemo appointment on May 9, 2016. On May 23, 2016, he announced that he was cancer free.

DORTCH'S REMARKABLE STORY CONTINUES

WR **Greg Dortch** - who originally entered the NFL as a rookie free agent with the New York Jets in 2019 - is in his fifth season in Arizona as he continues his remarkable NFL journey.

After signing with the Jets as a rookie free agent in 2019, *it began a stretch that saw him spend time with five different teams (Jets, Panthers, Rams, Falcons and Cardinals) while being released six different times in his first three NFL seasons (2019-21). During that time he appeared in just seven games.*

Since finding a regular spot in the Cardinals lineup in 2022, Dortch has become a key component on both offense and special teams. In that span he appeared in 51 games (12 starts) and had 2,738 all-purpose yards (broken down below):

- 115 receptions for 1,098 yards and 7 TDs
- 13 carries for 80 yards
- 80 punt returns for 708 yards
- 39 kickoff returns for 852 yards

After posting three receptions for 15 yards in his first three NFL seasons (2019-21), Dortch has 115 receptions for 1,098 yards and seven TDs in the last four seasons (2022-25) with Arizona.

In his NFL career, he has appeared in 58 games (14 starts) with 118 receptions for 1,113 yards and seven TDs to go along with 14 carries for 104 yards. On special teams has returned 48 kickoffs for 1,050 yards and 87 punts for 760 yards.

DORTCH MAKING BIG PLAYS IN THE RETURN GAME IN 2025

Dortch had a 23-yard punt return in Week 1 at New Orleans and followed that up with a 29-yard punt return in the second quarter last week vs. the Panthers that helped set up a Cardinals TD on the ensuing possession.

He joins Vikings WR Myles Price (20 and 22 yards) as the only players in the NFL so far this season with multiple punt returns of 20+ yards.

Dortch had three total punt returns of 20+ yards (49, 27, 23 yards) in 56 games played between 2019-24.

OFFENSE THAT CAN SCORE THE LONG WAY

In 354 regular season games between 2001 and 2022, the Cardinals had three total 99-yard TD drives.

Arizona has an NFL-high three 99-yard TD drives in 36 games under offensive coordinator Drew Petzing in the past three seasons (2023-25). Cincinnati (2) is the only other team with more than one such drive during that span.

• Following the 2008 season, attended the NFL Business Management and Entrepreneurial Program at the Harvard Business School. During the 2012 offseason, was one of 20 current and former NFL players who took part in the first NFL Pro Hollywood Boot Camp at Universal Studios.

AN NFL ELDER STATESMAN

Campbell is in his 18th NFL season in 2025. Equally as impressive as his longevity is the durability he has shown throughout his career - particularly for a player who makes a living in the trenches.

Campbell missed just 15 games in his first 17 NFL seasons and has never played fewer than 12 games during any season.

He leads all active NFL players in both career games played (263) and career starts (244).

RYLAND NAMED PLAYER OF THE MONTH

After joining the Cardinals practice squad on October 2nd, K **Chad Ryland's** historic first four games with Arizona earned him **"NFC Special Teams Player of the Month"** for October.

Ryland finished October 8-9 on FGAs (88.9%) and 6-6 on PATs for a team-high 30 points with three game-winning FGs in his first four games played with the Cards.

His achievement marked the sixth time a Cardinal has won "Special Teams Player of the Month" since the award's inception in 1993.

He is just the third Arizona kicker (K Neil Rackers - twice in 2005) and first since K Zane Gonzalez in October of 2019 to receive the honor.

His first month with the Cardinals ended with him becoming just the 3rd player in NFL history to have three-game winning FGs in the 4th quarter/OT in a single calendar month: Chris Jacke (Dec. of 1998 - Cardinals) and Stephen Gostkowski (Sept. of 2020 - Titans).

GILLIKIN ON FIRE IN THE DESERT

After establishing a franchise single-season record with a 50.6-yard punting average in his debut season with Arizona in 2023, P **Blake Gillikin** had another outstanding year with the Cardinals in 2024 - despite an injury that forced him to miss the final four games of the season.

Of his 38 total punts in 2024, Gillikin had 19 land inside the 20-yard line (including 15 in his final seven games played) and had just one touchback (in Week 6 at Green Bay).

Gillikin was the only punter in the NFL last season to have punted at least 30 times with one or fewer touchbacks.

FOLLOWING UP A CAREER YEAR IN 2023

In his first season with the Cardinals in 2023, Gillikin established a franchise single-season record with a 50.6-yard punting average.

In 2024, Gillikin averaged 49.7 yards per punt. That is the second-highest average in team history (min. 35 punts).

GILLIKIN TAKES HOME AWARD IN WEEK 9

P **Blake Gillikin** was named the "NFC Special Teams Player of the Week" for his performance in Week 9 victory over the Chicago Bears last season.

It was Gillikin's first career selection as Special Teams Player of the Week and he became just the third punter in team history to be selected as Special Teams Player of the Week (Ben Graham-2009, Jeff Feagles-1995).

Gillikin had an outstanding performance in the win over the Bears, punting four times for 187 yards (46.8 avg.) with three punts landed inside the 20-yard line. The one Chicago drive following a Gillikin punt that did not start inside its own 20-yard line started at the 21-yard line.

The Cardinals defense forced its second safety in two games after a Gillikin 45-yard punt pinned Chicago at their own 1-yard line in the fourth quarter.



QUARTERBACKS

Jacoby Brissett – Acquired by AZ in free agency. Started 53-of-88 games in his career. Named a team captain by the Patriots in 2024. Made his Cardinals debut last week and converted a QB sneak on 4th-n-1.

Kyler Murray – Won the 2018 Heisman Trophy, selected ninth overall in the 2018 MLB Draft and first overall in the 2019 NFL Draft. Earned 2019 AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year, is a two-time Pro Bowler and six-time team captain. Has started all 84 games played with Arizona and needs just 119 passing yards to reach 20,000 for his career.

RUNNING BACKS

Trey Benson – Selected by Arizona in the third round (66th overall) in 2024 out of Florida State. Established a career-high with 69 rushing yards - including a career-long run of 52 yards - in the season opener at New Orleans.

James Conner – Two-time Pro Bowler (2018, 2021) who signed with Arizona in 2021 after four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh. Has scored 46 TDs in 59 games with the Cardinals. Has rushed for for 1,000+ yards in consecutive seasons (2023-24), including putting up career highs in rushing yards (1,094) and scrimmage yards (1,508) in 2024.

Emari Demercado – Set the franchise record for rushing yards by an undrafted rookie (284) in 2023. From 2023-24, only Saquon Barkley (4 on 592 carries), De'Von Achane (3 on 306 carries), James Cook (3 on 444 carries) and Jonathan Taylor (3 on 472 carries) had more rushing TDs of 45+ yards than Demercado (2 on just 82 carries).

Zonovan 'Bam' Knight – Entering his third NFL season and first in Arizona. Last saw action in 2023 when he appeared in two regular season games with Detroit. Made his Cardinals debut last week vs. the Panthers.

TIGHT ENDS

Elijah Higgins – Has appeared in 30 games (9 starts) with 37 receptions for 383 yards and three TDs in his first three seasons (2023-25). Before switching to TE in the NFL was a WR at Stanford alongside current teammates WR Michael Wilson and practice squad WR Simi Fehoko.

Trey McBride – Coming off his first Pro Bowl appearance and consecutive record-breaking seasons, his 221 between 202-24 were the most by a TE in their first three seasons in NFL history. Finished the 2024 season with 111 receptions for 1,146 yards and two TDs to go along with a rushing TD and a fumble recovery TD. Shattered his own franchise single-season record for receptions by a TE (previous record was 81 in 2023) while his 1,146 receiving yards marked the second most in team history by a TE (Jackie Smith - 1,205 in 1967).

Tip Reiman – Selected by the Cardinals in the third round (82nd overall) of the 2024 NFL Draft out of Illinois. Has appeared in all 18 possible games in his first season-plus with the Cardinals, including 10 starts. Started in the opener at New Orleans and posted his seventh career catch, which went for 10 yards and resulted in a key first down. Missed last week due to injury.

Travis Vokolek – Signed with AZ on 12/21/23 from Baltimore's practice squad. Has appeared in five NFL games since joining the Cardinals, making his first career start in last week's home opener vs. Carolina.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Greg Dortch – Entering his fifth season with the Cardinals. Posted 37 receptions for 342 yards and a career-high three touchdowns in 2024. One of just two players in the NFL this season multiple multiple punt returns of 20+ yards (23, 29).

Simi Fehoko – Is in his first season with Arizona in 2025. Part of the same WR room at Stanford as current Cardinals teammates Michael Wilson and Elijah Higgins. Entered the NFL as a fifth-round pick (179th overall) of the Cowboys in the 2021 NFL Draft.

Marvin Harrison Jr. – Selected by AZ as the fourth overall pick in 2024 out of Ohio State and was the first non-quarterback taken. Finished rookie season with 62 receptions for 885 yards (14.3 avg.) and 8 TDs. His eight receiving TDs tied the franchise record for rookies. Added his 9th career receiving TD in New Orleans, joining Larry Fitzgerald (9) and Gern Nagler (9) as only AZ players with 9+ TD catches in first 18 career games.

Zay Jones – Second-year Cardinal entering his ninth NFL season. Posted 84 yards on eight receptions in his first season in the desert. His father, uncle and brother all played in the NFL. Had 82 catches for 823 yards and five TDs with Jax in his last full NFL season (2022).

Xavier Weaver – An undrafted rookie free agent out of Colorado, signed with the Cardinals in 2024. Was the only Cardinals UDFA to make the roster last season. Led Buffaloes receiving core in 2023 as he brought in 68 passes for 908 yards.

Michael Wilson – Entering his third season in the Valley. After posting 565 yards and three TDs as a rookie in 2023, he returned with 548 yards and four TDs in 2024. Caught his first TD reception of the season last week vs. Carolina and heads to SF this week where he has 2 TD catches in 2 games.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Isaiah Adams – From Ajax, Ontario. Selected by AZ in the third round (71st overall) in 2024 out of Illinois. Helped block for the Cardinals offense to run for 2,451 yards and 18 TDs on 463 carries (5.3 avg.) in 2024.

Kelvin Beachum – Selected by Pittsburgh in the seventh round (248th overall) in 2012 and has started 161 of 181 games played with the Steelers (2012-15), Jaguars (2016), Jets (2017-19) and Cardinals (2020-25). Is a humanitarian and a monthly visitor to the United Food Bank.

Evan Brown – Entering his seventh NFL season and second with Arizona. Started 58-of-64 games played over the last four-plus seasons with Detroit (2021-22), Seattle (2023), and Arizona (2024-25). Started all 19 games at LG in last two seasons (2024-25).

Hjalte Froholdt – Has started all 36 possible games at center since joining the Cardinals in 2023. Part of an offense line that allowed just 30 sacks, the fifth-fewest sacks in the NFL in 2024. Native of Denmark. On 8/21/24 signed a two-year contract extension with AZ.

Josh Fryar – Played 54 games (30 starts) in five seasons (2020-24) at Ohio State. In Arizona, he reunites with Cardinals O-Line coach Justin Frye, who was his position coach with the Buckeyes the past three seasons (2022-24) and OL Paris Johnson Jr., who played on the same line at OSU from 2020-22.

Jon Gaines II – Entering his third season in Arizona. Was a fourth-round pick by AZ in 2023 out of UCLA. After spending his rookie season in 2023 on injured reserve (knee), returned in 2024 and appeared in 13 games. Line up as a FB on James Conner's 2-yard TD run last week vs. Carolina.

Will Hernandez – A second-round pick by the Giants in 2018, signed with Arizona as a free agent in the 2022 offseason. Has started all 35 games he has appeared in at RG for AZ. One of four Cardinals to start all 17 games in 2023.

Paris Johnson Jr. – Cardinals first-round pick (6th overall) in 2023 out of Ohio State. Has started all 33 games played in his first two-plus seasons (2023-25), starting all 17 games at RT in 2023 and 16 games at LT in 2024-25. He was named a Pro Bowl alternate for the first time last season. His father, Paris Sr., was a fifth-round pick by AZ in 1999.

Jonah Williams – Signed with Arizona in 2024 following five seasons with the Bengals (2019-23). Has started all 67 games he's played in the NFL (42 at LT and 25 at RT). Scored his first-career TD vs. New England in 2024, recovering a fumble in the end zone.

SPECIALISTS

Aaron Brewer – Has played 134 games with Arizona (2016-25), the most of any active Cardinal. Entered the league with the Broncos as a rookie free agent in 2012 where he spent four seasons (2012-15) and won Super Bowl 50. Is just two games shy of 200 games played for his career.

Blake Gillikin – After establishing a franchise record averaging 50.6 yards per punt in 2023, returned in 2024 and averaged 49.7 yards per punt. That represents the second-best single-season total in team history (min. 35 punts). He came to AZ following two seasons with NO (2021-22).

Chad Ryland – After signing with the Cardinals in October of 2024, was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate after connecting on 28-of-32 FG attempts and 26-of-27 PATs for a team-high 110 total points in just 13 games in 2024. Connected on three game winning FGs in 2024. His 50-yard FG in Week 1 at New Orleans was his 5th FG of 50+ yards w/ AZ.



DEFENSIVE LINE

Calais Campbell – Originally drafted by the Cardinals in the second round (50th overall) of the 2008 NFL Draft, he played nine seasons (2008-16) in Arizona. A six-time Pro Bowl (2014-15; 2017-20) selection, was named to the NFL All-Decade Team of the 2010s. He was also the 2019 NFL Walter Payton Man of the Year. Played in his 263rd career game last week vs. Carolina and had 2.0 sacks in the 4th quarter, including a sack of QB Bryce Young on 4th-n-15 on the Panthers final offensive play of the game.

L.J. Collier – With the the Cardinals in 2024, started 15-of-17 games played and established or matched career highs in tackles (29), sacks (3.5), tackles for loss (4), passes defended (2) and fumble recoveries (1). Joined the Cards in 2023 from Seattle where a first round pick in the 2019 NFL Draft.

PJ Mustipher – Originally signed with the Broncos as a rookie free agent in 2023. After being released by Denver appeared in four games as a rookie with New Orleans in 2023 before spending the 2024 season on AZ's practice squad. Made his Cardinals debut in Week 1 at New Orleans.

Darius Robinson – Second of AZ's two first-round selections (27th overall) in 2024. Earned first-team All-SEC honors and a career-high 8.5 sacks in 2023 in his first season as an edge rusher. An injury limited him to six games played as a rookie in 2024 as he totaled 10 tackles, 1.0 sack and a tackle for loss.

Dante Stills – Has appeared in 33 games (18 starts) with 94 tackles, 8.0 sacks, 11 QB hits, nine tackles for loss, two passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in his first two-plus seasons (2023-25). Led all Cardinals D-Linemen in both tackles and sacks in each of his first two seasons. Is the fourth member of his family to play in the NFL.

Dalvin Tomlinson – Signed a two-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/14/25. Has started all 127 games played during the regular season and has 344 tackles, 67 QB hits, 37 tackles for loss, 19.0 sacks, seven passes defended, two fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles.

LINEBACKERS

Baron Browning – Traded to the Cardinals from Denver for a sixth-round selection in the 2025 NFL Draft on 11/4/24. Agreed to terms to a two-year contract with Arizona on 3/9/25. Had a sack in the season opener at NO and then recorded his first INT since 2022 in last week's home opener vs. Carolina. Joins New England S Jaylinn Hawkins (1 INT, 1.0 sack) and Jacksonville LB Foyesade Olukun (1 INT, 1.0 sack) as the only players in the NFL this season with both a sack and an INT.

Jordan Burch – Selected by the Cardinals in the third round (78th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Oregon. Had a career-high 8.5 sacks in his final year at Oregon in 2024, surpassing his total from his first four college seasons combined (7.5 sacks in 48 games).

Zaven Collins – Selected by the Cardinals in the first round (16th overall) in 2021 out of Tulsa. Signed with AZ on 8/3/24 to a two-year contract through the 2026 season. Scored his 2nd career TD on a 3-yard fumble return last week vs. Carolina (picked up Bryce Young fumble on Josh Sweat sack).

Akeem Davis-Gaither – Signed a two-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/13/25. Appeared in all 17 games (seven starts) with Cincinnati in 2024 and set career highs in tackles (77), tackles for loss (four) and passes defended (four).

Owen Pappoe – In first two-plus NFL seasons (2023-25), has appeared in 34 games (two starts) with 29 tackles, three passes defended, a QB hit and a forced fumble on defense to go along with 11 tackles on special teams. Was a two-time captain at Auburn, becoming just the fourth player in program history to earn the honor more than once.

Cody Simon – Selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (115th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Ohio State. Named a team captain as a senior in 2024 and went on to be named the Defensive MVP in Ohio State's 41-21 Rose Bowl victory over Oregon (11 tackles, three TFL, 2.0 sacks) and also in the Buckeyes' 34-23 victory over Notre Dame in the CFP National Championship Game (eight tackles, one TFL) last year. Saw action in the season opener at New Orleans before missing last week's game due to injury.

Josh Sweat – Signed a four-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/13/25 after spending his first seven seasons with the Eagles (2018-24). Recorded a sack of Panthers QB Bryce Young on the Panthers third play of the game last week, forcing a fumble that was returned for a TD. Marked his 7th career "strip-sack".

Xavier Thomas – Selected by Arizona in the fifth round (138th overall) of the 2024 Draft out of Clemson. Tallied 2.5 sacks, 10 tackles, two tackles for loss, four QB hits, one pass defended and a forced fumble as a rookie. Won a National Championship with the Tigers as a freshman in 2018.

Mack Wilson Sr. – Started all 16 games played in his first season as a Cardinal in 2024, totaling 75 tackles (four for loss), seven QB hits, five passes defended, 3.0 sacks, an INT and a fumble recovery. During the 2025 offseason, wrote, recorded and released a three-song EP to promote the release of the Cardinals 2025 regular season schedule that is available on most music platforms.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Budda Baker – Arizona's 2017 second-round pick (36th overall) out of Washington is a seven-time Pro Bowler (2017, '19-23), six-time team captain (2020-24) and earned 2020 first-team All-Pro honors and 2024 second-team All-Pro honors. He established a new career high and ranked second among all NFL defenders with 164 tackles in 2024.

Denzel Burke – Selected by the Cardinals in the fifth round (174th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Ohio State. A native of Phoenix, he was a standout prep DB and WR who attended Brophy College Prep (Phoenix) before transferring to Saguaro (Scottsdale) High School. Played his first NFL defensive snaps last week and finished with 3 passes defended vs. the Panthers.

Kei'Trel Clark – Selected by Arizona in the sixth round (180th overall) in 2023 out of Louisville. He saw action in 15 games and recorded 11 tackles, one tackle for loss, one sack and one quarterback hit in 2024.

Kitan Crawford – Selected by Arizona in the seventh round (225th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. He became the Cardinals first-ever draft pick out of Nevada. His second cousin is two-time NFL MVP and six-time Pro Bowl QB Patrick Mahomes.

Will Johnson – Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (47th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Michigan. In the season opener at NO, became the first AZ defender since 2000 to have 3+ passes defended in his NFL debut and posted the second-highest defensive grade (90.8) of the week according to PFF. Has 4 passes defended in his first two career games. Only Packers CB Keisean Nixon (5) has more passes defended.

Elijah Jones – Selected by the Cardinals in the third round (90th overall) in 2024 out of Boston College. He owns the Boston College record for career games played (64). Earned All-AAC honors in each of his final two seasons (2022-23).

Max Melton – Selected by Arizona in the second round (43rd overall) in 2024 out of Rutgers. He recorded 45 tackles, five passes defended, two tackles for loss and a forced fumble in 17 games last season. His brother, Bo, played two seasons (2023-24) at WR for the Packers before Green Bay switched him to cornerback in 2025 (Bo now plays same position and wears same #16 jersey as Max).

Dadrion Taylor-Demerson – Selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (104th overall) in 2024 out of Texas Tech. He saw action in all 17 games last season and tallied 35 tackles, five passes defended and three tackles for loss. Earned his nickname "Rabbit" for his speed in Pop Warner football.

Jalen Thompson – Selected by Arizona in the fifth-round of the 2019 NFL Supplemental Draft out of Washington State. Started all 15 games played last season and posted 98 tackles, three tackles for loss, three passes defended, two QB hits and a career-high two fumble recoveries. Only active player in the NFL who entered the league through the Supplemental Draft. Had team-high 10 tackles last week vs. Carolina and is tied with Budda Baker for team lead with 18 tackles in 2025.

Garrett Williams – Started 11 of 16 games played in 2024 and tallied 58 tackles, two INTs, a team-high nine passes defended and a forced fumble. Originally selected by Arizona in the third round (72nd overall) in 2023 out of Syracuse. Was a three-time All-ACC selection with the Orange.

Arizona opened the regular season on the road at New Orleans and left the Big Easy with a thrilling 20-13 victory after stopping a furious late comeback attempt by the Saints. Four consecutive Cardinals scoring drives (2 TDs, 2 FGs) between the 1st and 3rd quarters paired with a stout defensive effort resulted in Arizona taking a 20-10 lead midway through the 3rd. QB Tyler Murray threw TD passes to WR Marvin Harrison Jr. and RB James Conner while RB Trey Benson had a career-best rushing performance in leading the Cardinals to 146 yards on the ground. The Arizona defense held the New Orleans offense largely in check, highlighted by a stellar debut for rookie CB Will Johnson. But the Saints threatened on their final two drives and it took a spectacular defensive play from Arizona's safety tandem of Budda Baker and Jalen Thompson to break up a pass in the end zone on the game's penultimate play. The effort preserved the AZ victory and snapped New Orleans' NFL-best streak of six straight week 1 wins.

Arizona opened the scoring with 5:03 to play in the first quarter when Chad Ryland's 42-yard field goal capped an 11-play, 42-yard drive. The ensuing Saints series appeared to end when Johnson picked off a Spencer Rattler pass in the end zone. However, a defensive holding call away from the play on the other side of the field wiped away the INT. Six plays later, RB Alvin Kamara put the Saints up with his 18-yard scoring run around the right end. On the second play of Arizona's next drive, Murray connected deep down the right sideline with Harrison and the 45-yard completion moved it to the Saints 14. Murray and Harrison then connected on a 1-yard pass four plays later and the Cards went ahead 10-7 with 10:05 remaining in the second quarter. The Saints would then tie it at 10 on the next drive and ended it with Blake Grupe's 36-yard FG. With 4:53 left before halftime, the Cardinals took over at their own 29. They would embark on a 10-play, 71-yard drive that took 4:30 off the clock and James Conner took a 4-yard shovel pass from Murray into the endzone to put AZ ahead 17-10 with just :28 remaining in the quarter; Murray completed six straight passes to end the TD drive.

On AZ's first possession of the second half, Benson exploded on a 52-yard run to the Saints 30; the explosive run set-up Ryland's 50-yard FG that made it 20-10. New Orleans would reach the AZ19 on the next drive but Grupe's 37-yard FG try was wide left and the Cardinals continued to lead by 10. It remained that way deep into the fourth. With 4:34 to play, New Orleans took over at its own 36 before Rattler marched them downfield and the Saints ultimately had it first-n-goal at the AZ3. The Cards defense stiffened, stuffing Kamara for a loss of two and forcing a pair of incompletions. Grupe's 28-yard FG pulled the Saints to within 7 with 2:42 to go. After forcing an Arizona punt, New Orleans took over at its own 42 with 1:49 remaining. Rattler moved the offense to the AZ18 with 0:14 left and would get three throws into the end zone. On the second of those, he tossed it to TE Juwan Johnson, who leapt in the end zone and secured the ball with both hands before being separated from it by Baker and Thompson. One final throw to the end zone sailed out of bounds and Arizona emerged with the 7-point, week 1 win.

Carolina Panthers 22, Arizona Cardinals 27

The Cardinals began their 20th regular season at State Farm Stadium with a 27-22 victory over the Carolina Panthers. Arizona capitalized on defensive takeaways on the first two Panthers possessions to jump out to a quick 10-0 lead. Later, QB Kyle Murray led one TD drive to close the first half and another to open the second and the Cards would take that 27-3 lead late into the third quarter. Carolina would then score three unanswered touchdowns to pull to within 5 and got the ball back with 1:55 to go. But Arizona was able to close the door thanks in no small part to DL Calais Campbell who made a triumphant return to State Farm Stadium. The 18-year vet came up with two fourth-quarter sacks, including one in the closing seconds to seal the game. With the victory Arizona improved to 2-0 on the season, 6-1 in its last 7 home games and 13-6-1 in home openers at State Farm Stadium.

On the game's third play from scrimmage, the Panthers faced a 3rd-n-7 at their own 30. LB Josh Sweat stormed up the middle and chased down QB Bryce Young, jarring the ball loose. Fellow LB Zaven Collins tracked it down at the 3 and rolled into the end zone for his second career TD to give the Cards a quick 7-0 lead. On the ensuing series, the AZ defense struck again. This time it was LB Mack Wilson, Sr. who flew up the middle and hit Young as he was throwing, sending the ball into the air and LB Baron Browning corralled it for an INT. The takeaway set Arizona's offense up at the Carolina 48 and led to a 29-yard Chad Ryland FG that made it 10-0. The Panthers offense reached the Cardinals red zone on the next possession and had it 1st-n-goal at the 9 in the closing minute of the opening quarter. But the defense stiffened and the Panthers came away with just a short Ryan Fitzgerald FG that made it 10-3. It remained that way well into the 2nd quarter and with 7:19 on the clock, the Cards offense took over at its own 10. It would move 61 yards in 10 plays – the biggest of which was a 32-yard completion to McBride and Ryland's 47-yard FG with 1:55 remaining in the half made it 13-3. After the defense forced a quick Carolina 3-n-out, Greg Dortch's 29-yard punt return gave the offense the ball at the CAR45 with 0:51 to go before intermission. That was enough time for Murray to move deep into Panthers territory on 5-6 passing for 45 yards and with just 4 ticks on the clock, he found WR Michael Wilson in the back of the end zone to put the Cards up 20-3 at halftime.

The Cardinals carried that momentum into the 3rd quarter, opening it with a 9-play, 71-yard drive on which Murray was 4 of 5 passing for 64 yards. TE Eliah Higgins hauled in receptions of 18 and 27 yards and RB James Conner capped the drive with his 2-yard TD run that made it 27-3. Carolina found the end zone for the first time with 2:06 to go in the 3rd quarter on Young's 4-yard pass to WR Hunter Renfrow; after the 2-point try failed, the Cards led 27-9 heading into the 4th. Arizona responded by moving 70 yards in 8 plays before facing a 3rd-n-3 at the CAR12. On that play, Murray was hit while throwing and Panthers LB D.J. Wonnum hauled it in for an INT. Carolina capitalized on the opportunity and produced TDs on its next two possessions thanks to Young scoring passes, first to RB Chuba Hubbard (5 yards) and then again to Renfrow (1 yard). The Panthers had trimmed the deficit to 27-22 with 1:58 to play and then successfully executed an on-side kick attempt. Suddenly they had the ball at midfield with 1:55 to play and down just 5. The game appeared over when the Cardinals defense stopped Carolina on 4th-n-5 at the AZ46 but a defensive holding call kept the drive alive. Later, umpire Barry Anderson flagged Sweat for roughing the passer, giving the Panthers a 1st down at the AZ33 instead of 3rd-n-17 at the AZ48.
